Excavation Started for New High School Gymnasium

Work Started on New T.F. Gymnasium; Completion Is Contracted in One Year

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new \$253,070 Twin Falls high school gymnasium were held Friday morning at the 40-acre site of the new high school building. The gymnasium will be completed in approximately one year, according to terms of the building contract.

Howard Reynolds of the Reynolds and Walker Construction company said the structure is expected to be completed by early spring of 1953. However, everything depends upon the steel situation, he pointed out.

Steel for the structure was ordered two days ago. The existing steel shortage may reflect in the progress of the gymnasium. "Right now we are keeping our fingers crossed," Reynolds said.

All other building materials are available for the gymnasium. The building problems are anticipated. The job begins with the excavation work and concrete, masonry, erection of steel and building follow in that order, Reynolds said.

Plans are to complete as much of the building as possible before winter sets in. Workers will then move inside the building to work on the interior.

Foundations are expected to be completed in about 45 days. DeWetter Brothers, Inc., has the heating, plumbing and electrical contract amounting to \$53,230. Of that amount, \$28,935 is for the heating and plumbing and \$24,295 is for electrical work.

The gymnasium will be one of the finest buildings in the state, according to Holmes G. Lash, architect.

It will hold between 2,700 and 2,800 persons. It will house two full practice basketball courts separated by a folding partition. Games will be played on a full length court.

Dressing and locker rooms will be of tile. A spacious entrance lobby will be provided. The athletic director's office also will be located in the building.

The gymnasium will be connected to a wing of the main building by a weatherproof corridor.

Construction foreman for Reynolds and Walker is Hugh Holzinger, who was construction superintendent of the Jerome hospital building project.

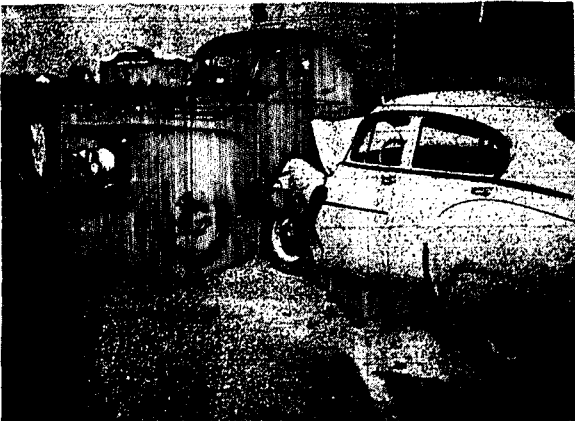

New July Record Established By Visitors to Craters of Moon

An all-time July record was established by visitors at the Craters of the Moon national monument and Magic Valley visitors helped swell the local \$2. (Staff engraving) Houston, superintendent, announced on Saturday.

The July total was 18,796 persons in 4,384 vehicles. Every state but Vermont was represented. Also represented were Canada, Alaska, District of Columbia, Virgin Islands, Hawaiian Islands, Germany and the Canal zone.

An usual Idaho led other states with 4,638 persons and 1,103 cars. Other high states were California, 2,586 people and 826 vehicles; Oregon, 1,855 people and 459 vehicles; Washington, 1,257 people and 373 vehicles; Utah, 972 people and 261 vehicles; and Illinois, 519 people and 138 vehicles.

Total travel during July was 30 per cent greater than last year when 2,884 vehicles brought 13,517 people, Houston reported. He said travel to date has been in excess of 43,000 people compared with 37,000 during the entire season last year. About six weeks of the season remains.

Houston said the camp grounds are receiving a great deal of use this year and there have been many favorable comments, especially about the shower. He said visiting hours have had to be limited to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. because there are not enough men to keep the place open longer. However, the camp grounds are open 24 hours daily, with only the loop road closing at 8 p.m.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

It's over now for another year, the annual cattle roundup in Laidlaw park, but it will have to be done again next year and residents of GARLEY, who still talk about it, are planning for the one next July. The roundup, even with its modern innovations, still smacks of the west as it was in the past; it is a page of history transcribed into a modern community.

As usual, the roundup is a movie camera has neither the time, the space nor the versatility to take all the details that go to make up one gigantic picture of horses and cattle and dust and sky and or of camp cooked food and lava rock and a bed under a black blanket quilted with gold specks.

No speaker system can pick up the real sounds, from the bellowing of the critters to the moans of tired men around a dining campfire, and nothing has been devised yet to impart to a movie audience the smell of sage and the feel of the acid dirt that clogs the nose and sears the lungs.

The background for the Laidlaw park cattle roundup is natural—a lot of blue sky and open range, little lakes dotting the countryside and cows and calves peacefully grazing until started in motion by the wandering cowboys. There are plenty of hills to climb and holes to avoid, but the fence is the fence that keeps the stock from wandering from the park. This fence is made of live wire and is so high and so tight that cattle will not cross it unless forced. Between these stretches of ancient wire fences are areas covered by rich grass upon which cows can grow fat.

Across the flow winds a lone road, barely wide enough in places for a horse and rider. The road is so narrow that it is so crooked it would break a snake's back. Yet over this high-way cattle, mules and horses are brought from the park. This year the cattle stretched for two miles along the road as cowboys herded their charges from spring to summer range.

The 2,000 head of cattle in the park this year belongs to the 1200 members of the Laidlaw Park Cattle Association. While the park is in the hands of the association, on water and the cattle have to be moved before summer is too far along. Lowell Mocham, Carey, was boss of the roundup this year.

The night prior to the beginning of the roundup 20 or so men arrive at the park with their gear, which usually includes at least two horses. They make camp near the chuck wagon and settle down for a short night. They are rolled out for breakfast at 4 a. m. and long before the sun they have eaten, washed and saddled their horses and have departed.

Each man receives a territory to cover. All the cows in the territory are brought to a gathering point as the long day drags through until sundown. From the gathering place the critters are herded to the cutting corral at Hart lake 15 miles away. There the animals are separated according to their brands and are taken to summer range by their respective owners.

No roundup is carried out without a few mishaps no matter how well laid the plans are.

The first mishap occurred when Jim Stocking dumped two saddle horses from a trailer. One of the horses was bruised in the accident and John Green, who had come to the roundup just for fun, ended up as a cook's helper because he had no horse.

Mocham's plans called for the chuck wagon to lead the cattle along the road through the lava rock so that while the herd is being brought to the cutting corral, the cooks would have time to prepare dinner.

Mrs. Sherman Smith, one of the cooks, decided the men dividing cattle could stand a drink of water. She pulled off into one of the flats beside the road but instead of getting back on the main road she followed the side one that was infested with mud holes. She managed to miss all but one. Her companion cooks, Mrs. Lowell Mocham and Mrs. Cecil Smith, saw her predicament and through skillful maneuvering and much pushing they freed the outfit.

But trouble comes in bunches and Mrs. Smith's outfit had moved barely 20 feet when it blew a tire. The women, with no spare tire, unhooked the camp wagon, and proceeded with only one wagon from which to feed the cattle drivers.

Much to their chagrin they discovered they had wasted too much

Best's Sheep Ranches Pace Top Earnings

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—The family-sized farms in the West are showing a sharp increase in earnings for the year ending in 1951, according to a report that summarizes the income situation in the West.

The report, which is based on a survey of 1,000 farms, shows that the average income per acre was \$1.25 in 1951, compared with \$1.00 in 1950. This is a 25 percent increase over the 1950 figure.

The report also shows that the average income per head of sheep was \$1.50 in 1951, compared with \$1.25 in 1950. This is a 20 percent increase over the 1950 figure.

The report is based on a survey of 1,000 farms in the West, including 500 in Idaho, 250 in Montana, 150 in Wyoming, and 100 in Utah. The survey was conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

We're on the Eve of Something



Drive to Arm Western Nations Against Russians Appears to Be Slowing Down

By JOHN M. NIGHTOWAY
WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—The drive to arm the western world against Russia appears to be slowing down.

It is difficult by economic and political obstacles which threaten to grow into a crisis later this year.

Facing with this crisis, unless it is forestalled or quickly overcome by astute and fast-moving statesmen, may prove to be the first foreign policy lapse on the part of the next President of the United States.

The outcome, however, will almost certainly have an impact on events ranging far beyond the military sphere of the West.

It may involve France's conduct of the cold war against communism in Indo-China and final approval of plans for rearming western Europe.

Several developments this week began to bring into focus the difficulties over which officials here and abroad have been worrying for some weeks.

A visit to Secretary of State Acheson by French Ambassador Henri Bonnet brought into the open the fact that the United States has turned down a request that it pick up the check for a total of \$50 million worth of French government armament contracts placed with French factories. Instead, the United States will contribute only \$10 million.

French Premier Antoine Pinay subsequently declared at Paris that he intended taking France's case for increased American aid to the North Atlantic council. French officials regularly argued that the help was essential if France was to meet its commitments for contributions to the allied defense effort.

There were worried hints that unless the additional help was forthcoming, France might be delayed indefinitely and France might find it difficult to go on bearing the main burden of the war in Indo-China.

On another front Prime Minister Winston Churchill's Conservative government announced new belittling moves in hard-pressed Britain and a new emphasis on production of civilian goods for export rather than on weapons and military equipment. It was the latest in a long series of steps to try to balance Britain's income with its costs and thereby solve its basic economic problem. It raised the question as to Britain's future ability to meet its defense commitments on present schedules.

A third difficulty was the disclosure that Spain is asking a price in American aid for the use by the United States of Spanish naval and air bases which American officials consider far too high.

Causes of these developments have become a subject of considerable speculation and concern, but in general, it is felt that the allied buildup is concerned, they appear to embrace these major factors:

1. There is now and has been for some months a lack of an urgent sense of danger from Russia.
2. The basic economic illnesses of Britain, France and other European countries have not been cured despite heavy doses of United States aid.

It's over now for another year, the annual cattle roundup in Laidlaw park, but it will have to be done again next year and residents of GAREY, while still talking about the roundup last month, already are making plans for the one next July. The roundup, even with its modern innovations—still smacks of the west as it was in the past. It is a page of history transplanted into the lives of people living in a modern, civilized, no movie scene can compare with.

An actual roundup. The movie camera has neither the time, the space nor the versatility to pick up all the details that make up the scene. It is a page of history transplanted into the lives of people living in a modern, civilized, no movie scene can compare with.

The background for the Laidlaw park cattle roundup is natural—lots of blue sky and open range, little lakes dotting the countryside and cows and calves peacefully grazing until started in motion by the whistles of the men on horseback. There are plenty of hills to climb and holes to avoid. And best of all is the fact that it keeps the stock from wandering from the park. This fence is made of lava rock so sharp and jagged that cattle will cross it unless forced. Between these stretches of ancient lava flow are areas covered by rich grass upon which cows graze fat.

Across the flow winds a lone road, barely wide enough in places for a car to travel. The road is twisted and crooked. It would break a snake's back. Yet over this highway cattle, bawling and protesting, are brought to the park. This year the cattle stretched for two miles along the road as cowboys herded and exchanged from spring to summer range.

The 2,000 head of cattle in the park this year belonged to the two old members of the Laidlaw Park Cattle Association. While the park is ideal as a spring range it is short on water and the cattle have to be moved before summer is too far along. Lowell Meacham, Carey, was boss of the roundup this year.

The night prior to the beginning of the roundup 20 or so men arrive at the park with their gear which usually includes at least two horses. They make camp near the chuck wagon and settle down for a short night. They are rolled out for breakfast at 4 a. m., and long before the sun is up they have eaten, caught and saddled their horses and have departed.

Each man receives a territory to cover. All the cows in the territory are brought to a gathering point as the long day drags through until sundown. From the gathering point the critters are herded to the cutting corral at Huff lake 16 miles away. There the animals are separated according to their breed and are taken to summer range by their respective owners.

No roundup is carried out without a few mishaps no matter how well laid the plans are. The first mishap occurred when Jim Blockley dropped two saddle horses from a trailer. One of the horses was bruised in the accident and John Green, who had come to the roundup just for fun, ended up as a cook's helper because he had no horse.

Mecham's plans called for the chuck wagon to lead the cattle along the road through the lava rock so that while the herd is being brought to the cutting corral the cooks would have time to prepare dinner.

West's Sheep Ranches Pace Top Earnings

BY J. M. HIGHTOWER
TWIN FALLS, Aug. 7 (AP)—The top family-sized farms hit their peak last year with earnings probably the highest of all.

The government report that summarizes this income situation is a surprise to emphasize that there is a heavy inflow of money from families, inflation from factors of the lowest point in the start of World War II to the start of these past several years.

The income is mainly from the sale of sheep. Twenty types of farms are included. They are family-sized farms, excluding large scale farms and those in the mountain, prairie or suburban areas. Only farms from 1941 to 1951 are included. The income was included in the type of farming, such as sheep, were not covered.

Total income of all farm operations in 1951 was estimated at \$1.1 billion dollars. It is the highest income American farmers have ever received.

The top operated sheep ranches in the Rocky mountain region had the greatest gross return in 1951, averaging \$47,664 each. Next were the sheep ranches of the mountain prairie, \$31,461, and then the sheep ranches of the prairie, \$25,261, and cotton farms of the southern Piedmont, \$18,794.

The lowest gross of total income was from the purchasing of wool blankets. The income declined from \$1.1 billion in 1947, government estimates. That is the price of things which have to be paid to operate their households went up in 1951.

The purchasing power of the dollar in 1951 was estimated that family incomes were in about the condition in 1951 as around 1947.

The cost of production, the government estimates, the sheep ranchers had an average income in 1951 of \$19,108 and that of the family farm was \$20,155. The income of the sheep ranches was \$13,565, for hog-bee farms of the corn belt, and the southern Piedmont \$10,023.

Many factors have returned to farm returns in 1951 but the most important was the use of more fertilizer and the use of improved techniques and the use of new equipment.

It is careful to point out that recent years have been the best in American farm history. It is that in the 1930's the income of many farm operators was sufficient to pay expenses. Agriculture department says that anyone rushes out to the sheep business he should expect a second year. Unusually low for wool and meat income making profitable the last year, say continue to be profitable as time to come. But department do not expect profits anywhere near the present level. This year the price of wool dropped from 95 to 60 cents.



Drive to Arm Western Nations Against Russians Appears to Be Slowing Down

TWIN FALLS, Aug. 7 (AP)—The drive to arm the western world against Russia appears to be slowing down.

It is being held back by economic and political difficulties which threaten to slow the pace of the program. Dealing with this crisis, unless it is forestalled or quickly overcome by astute and fast-moving allied states, may prove to be the first foreign policy task confronting the next President of the United States.

The outcome, moreover, will almost certainly have an impact on events ranging far beyond the building speed of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's Western European army. It may involve France's conduct of the cold war against communism in Indo-China and final approval of plans for rearming western Germany.

Several developments this week began to bring into focus the difficulties over which officials here and abroad have been worrying for some weeks.

A visit to Secretary of State Acheson by French Ambassador Henri Bonnet brought into the open the fact that the United States has turned down a request that it pick up the check for a total of \$25 million dollars worth of French government armament contracts placed with French factories. Instead, Acheson told Bonnet this country could only take on 100 million dollars worth and possibly a few more orders later on.

French Premier Antoine Pinay subsequently declared at Paris that he intended taking France's case for increased American aid to the North Atlantic council. French officials generally argued that the help was essential if France was to meet its commitments for contributions to the allied defense effort.

These were worried hints that unless the additional help was forthcoming French reaffirmation of a European defense treaty, clearing the way for West German rearming, might be delayed indefinitely and France might find it difficult to go on bearing the main burden of the war in Indo-China.

On another front Prime Minister Winston Churchill's Conservative government announced new lightening moves in hard-pressed Britain and a new emphasis on production of civilian goods for export rather than on weapons and military equipment. It was the latest in a long series of steps to try to balance Britain's income with its costs and thereby solve its basic economic problem. It raised the question as to Britain's future ability to meet its defense commitments on present schedules.

A third difficulty was the disclosure that Spain is asking a price in American aid for the use by the United States of Spanish naval and air bases nearby. American officials consider far too high.

Causes of these developments have become a subject of considerable speculation and concern here but in general, insofar as the overall allied buildup is concerned, they appear to embrace these major points:

1. There is now and has been for some months a lack of an urgent sense of danger from Russia.
2. The basic economic illnesses of Britain, France and other European countries have not been cured despite heavy doses of United States aid.

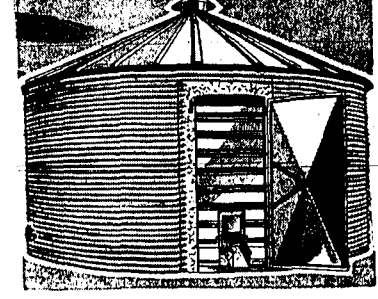

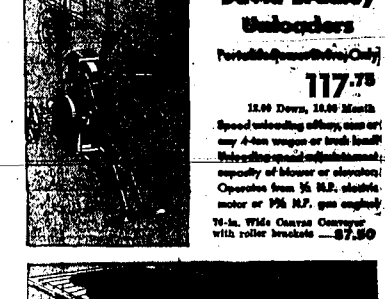

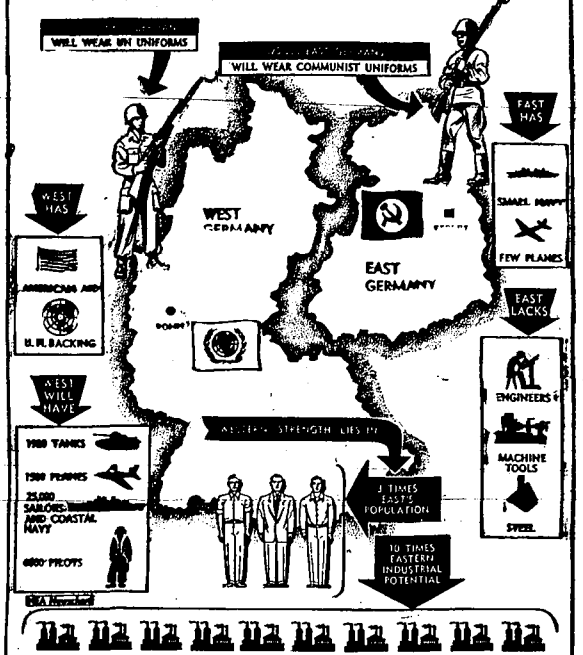

TWO NEW GERMAN ARMIES: EAST AND WEST



When and if the six-power European defense community pact is ratified, the way will be cleared for a West German army, wearing uniforms of the U. N. European force. It will take up the largest armament group for the East. Opposed to it will be the highly organized "people's army" of East Germany, led by East German Security Minister Wilhelm Zaisser and taking orders from the Kremlin. How the two armies stack up in their respective potentialities is illustrated on this Newstart. The West German forces will carry heavy American arms and be organized on the U. S. model. They will be part of the six-power European force to which France, Italy, Germany, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg will contribute. The communist-sponsored East German force, with its individual blue uniforms, is trained by Russians and led by former Nazi officers. Members attend classes in communist doctrine two hours a day. A weak point in its morale and recruiting is the fact that young East Germans have only a grim choice—join the "people's police" or die in the war zone.
