Increase Due October on Aid Payments

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Some 10 million persons may receive an increase of from \$2.50 a month in social security benefits with their October payments.

Some 6,000 of them increase in that range are certain; for the amount depends on age and other factors.

Important changes also made in the old-age and survivors insurance program by the Congress.

\$2.50 Limit

Under the amendments to the social security law it is certain that 6 million persons now receiving social security insurance benefits will receive increases of \$2.50 a month, with the top possible increase being \$8.60 a month.

\$25 Maximum

The new maximum is \$25 a month for a retired worker himself, compared with \$20. The maximum for payments to a family will be \$168.75, compared with \$150 now, but the increase may not exceed 80 percent of the retired worker's average wage before he retired.

Attention on the part of the beneficiaries on the social security law is needed to get the increase, checks to be mailed about September 15. Automatically will include other amount.

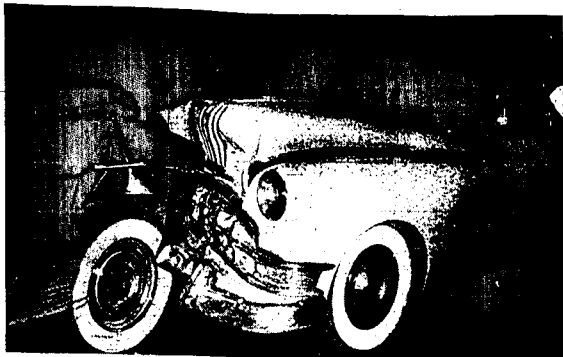

Cattle Losses Are Heavy to New Disease

POCATELLO, Aug. 4 (AP)—More than 100 head of cattle in the Teton and Arco desert areas are reported to have been killed by a disease comparable in malaise to humans, and transmitted by blood-sucking insects.

Dr. J. C. Hayden, Pocatello veterinarian, said the total loss within a 50-mile radius of Pocatello amounts to nearly \$100,000. He said the main outbreak of the disease, called anaplasmosis, has been in the Arco desert area this spring.

He said the disease generally is considered a southern disease and that it was brought to Idaho when drought-stricken cattle were brought here five years ago.

One Teton rancher, S. Albert Johnson, said 12 head of his cattle have died from the disease.

Other losses have been reported from the Malad Outfitters' association range in Arbon valley, the Bannock creek area south of American Falls, the Soda Springs area, and recently the Island Park area.

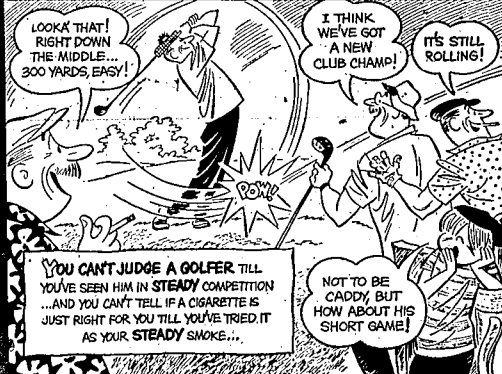

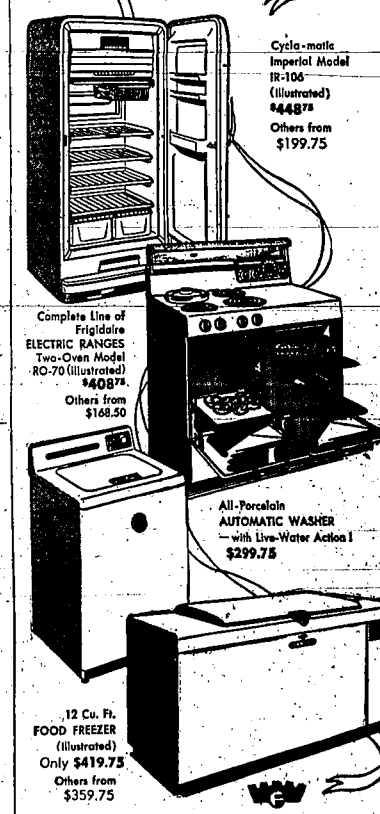

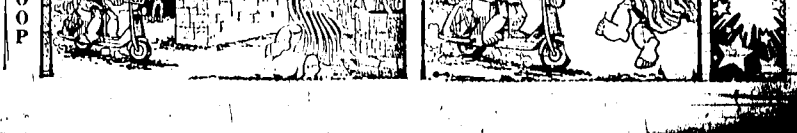

Land Bureau Profits Great, Report Notes

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—The north-west region of the bureau of land management took in \$2,700 for every dollar it spent in the last fiscal year, Administrator Roscoe F. Bell said Saturday.

Profits in administering some 30 million acres in Idaho, Washington and Oregon totaled \$2,676,384, he said, and revenues were \$9,800,700.

The revested Oregon and California railroad grant lands of western Oregon produced the most money through timber sales.

Timber Sale High
All told, timber sales in the three states brought in \$9,297,713 with well over a million dollars to be added to that in this year's collections on last year's sales.

Some of the Oregon and California lands are in controversy, whether under BLM or forest service jurisdiction—and the \$1,196,413 from timber sale on them has been added to a fund to be paid out when final decision is made on how big a share the counties of western Oregon get and how much the government keeps.

Idaho Data Listed
Public domain land in Idaho produced \$25,854 in timber products sales, grazing brought in \$730,294 and minerals \$139,673 in the three states.

Among expenses, Bell listed \$700,000 for removing snags, brush and stumps, creating wheatgrass on 64,000 acres of Idaho and Oregon, \$317,000 for fire protection, \$80,000 for reforestation, \$44,000 for blaster rust control and fire as means of fire control, and \$100,000 for roads and trails and other activities.
