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Perforated Ballot to Be Initiated Here Tuesday

A new type primary election ballot will be used for the first time in Tuesday's election. The ballot is perforated down the center. Only one side is used but both halves of the ballot must be returned to election judges. According to County Clerk T. W. Stivers, the new ballot is expected to save considerable time for the judges. In the past, a ballot with both parties on it was given to voters. Although voters were supposed to vote for only one party, some attempted to split their votes. As a result, judges spent a great deal of time deciding which party the voter intended to vote for. The unused portion of the new ballot should be folded in the same manner as the voted portion. The unused section is placed in the blank ballot box which must be kept locked securely at all times. Voters must be careful that the ballots are placed in the proper box. The distributing clerk will place an inked impression of the official election stamp on each side of the perforated ballot before the election votes.

Car Industry Still Working On Materials

Renovated Building Displayed By Nurses During Open House

County commissioners and Magic Valley Memorial hospital board members were guests at an open house Friday to inspect the private home where about \$3,500 has been spent for renovations. Mrs. Hester Myers, hospital housekeeper, and Mrs. Carl Harder, Buhl, hospital board member and chairman of the improvement committee, gave the tour.

Work on the building where some plaster had to be replaced, floors washed, rooms painted and repaired, and the hall, stairs and two rooms tiled. Improvements also were made in plumbing and heating. According to commissioners, it was the first complete renovation since the building was constructed about 1880.

Outside improvements on the structure are planned. These will include painting outside window frames and installation of 10 new screens in the upstairs porches of the building. A new washing machine and a new floor buffer have been purchased.

New window shades have been purchased and the hospital guide contributed \$300 for new curtains. Mrs. Harder and Mrs. Martin Miller, Castleford, furnished curtains for special rooms in the nurses' home. A local doctor, who asked that his name not be used, donated and the board donated a total of \$150 for throw rugs.

L. W. Hestings, county commission chairman, says landscaping at the new hospital is in the planning stages. He says donations in the form of shrubs and flowers will be accepted through a landscaper to assist in funding. Shrubbery probably will not be ordered until the fall, although it might be possible to order it now.

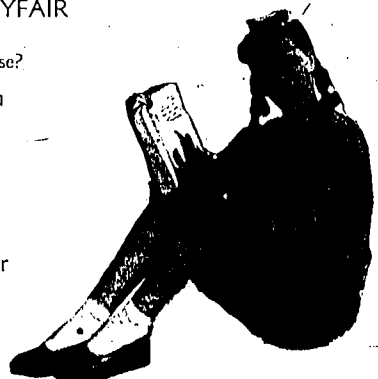

ber of Commerce director for two years. A present he also is a director of the Associated Exchanges of Idaho.

Insurance Man
Merrill, 45, is owner and manager of a Twin Falls insurance agency and holds bachelor of arts degree from the University of Utah. He has served in two regular and special sessions of the state legislature over a four year period.
Self, 36, is an automobile dealer and farm implement manufacturer. He was graduated from high school and has been in business for 11 years.

Cowher, 67, is a former range sheep breeder and lamb and cattle feeder. He was graduated from high school and attended college for one year. He has been a state representative for eight years.

Two Don't Answer
Of the three candidates for state representative on the Democratic ticket, only one gave biographical data and answered the league's questions. Asler, B. Wilson and the Rev. Mackey J. Brown, both Twin Falls, did not reply.

James L. Barnes, 75, third Democratic candidate, is a retired rancher and has served in the Twin Falls county commissioner for 10 years and is a graduate of high school, Spencetown Business college and National university law school, Washington, D. C. He also holds a master of laws degree from the Washington law school.

Three Questions Asked
Three questions were asked by the league in its efforts to provide voters with views of candidates. These questions were approved on a state level by the Idaho league and to be asked of local candidates throughout the state. They are:

1. Do you believe the present state contribution to the support of the Idaho public school system is adequate? If not, how would you raise additional revenue to provide for it. It has been suggested that juvenile cases be removed from the probate courts and assigned to the district courts with a separate judge handling all family and juvenile cases. What is your opinion?

2. In what state legislation are you especially interested? Please state your support or opposition.

Answers provided by Irvin were:
1. I believe it would be desirable to have some more money from the state level, but not until there is a more equitable method of taxation on the county level. I would not go so far as to initiate a sales tax.
2. This legislation has been considered and has advantages. I would not feel competent at this time to register an opinion until I could hear the pros and cons.

3. I am not crusading for any particular legislation. I am generally inclined to think that streamlining our present statutes to fit the present conditions works better than a lot of new legislation.

Self Replies
Answers given by Self were:
1. I believe the current pay scale is inadequate for present living costs, but I believe we should exhaust every means of raising funds within the present revenue without additional taxes.

2. It is my opinion that a separate juvenile court would have many advantages in handling these cases. However, I should like the opportunity to find out first what the cost of such an operation would be.

3. At present I am especially interested in a complete review of all the tax laws. I should like also an opportunity to examine the present truck law to see if it can be made more workable for all parties concerned.

Opinions of Bllek
Bllek gave these answers:
1. It is adequate for the four phases of the minimum school pro-

gram set up by the state. The incentives lie in the counties and districts with low valuation. The state guarantees each district a certain sum, the rest lies with the district and county. If taxpayers will be called on to put more money into the general pool, they should have more voice in determining how the money is spent.

2. If we could attract well qualified men as probate judges the present handling of juvenile cases would be satisfactory. I think this is not the case, so the interim committee appointed by the governor will have valuable suggestions for the next legislature.

3. The education program is the one requiring most thought and study, since it commands such a great percentage of the state budget and affects all the people in the entire state.

Chaney Answers
Chaney's answers to the questions were:
1. I believe in increasing contributions to the Idaho public school system, resulting in higher school standards.

2. Juvenile cases should be removed from the probate courts and assigned to district courts with a separate judge handling family and juvenile cases.

3. I feel the state should take advantage of federal funds allocated for armories, training boys on a local level in the national guard. These armories could be paid for and owned by the state in a period of 10 years with money the state is paying now for rent for inadequate space. I also am opposed to local option as it now stands, preferring it to be on a state referendum, thereby giving all the people a voice in the vote instead of the population in the cities. I also am interested in any legislation for the improvement and safety of our state highways.

Colner Gives Stand
Question answers by Colner were:
1. I think we should contribute to the support of the Idaho public schools all we can afford on the state level, and be sure to fix enough levy for the county to handle for all school districts to be able to pay school teachers as much as other adjoining states. In this way we can keep our good teachers.

2. The suggestion that juvenile cases be removed from probate courts and assigned to the district courts, with adding a separate judge, would be just another on the payroll pay what we have well and eliminate all extra that we can.

3. At present I'm livestock chairman on the agriculture committee

and the fish and game committee. I also am interested in remodeling part of our truck bill.

Merrill Explains
Merrill's answers were:
1. I favor the highest possible educational standards the already overtaxed citizens of Idaho are able and willing to pay for. The 1951 session of the legislature appropriated 51.84 per cent of all funds available from the general fund and endowment income for education. It would seem unwise to increase the percentage of present state income available for education. To do so would only result in serious curtailment or elimination of the other state services and activities. While the legislature may devote some new tax to obtain additional funds earmarked for education, the only possible source of such revenue is the Idaho taxpayer's pocket. At this time I doubt the advisability, or acceptability, of a sales tax for this or any other purpose.

2. My sincere interest in the welfare of the young people of our state has resulted in considerable concern and some dissatisfaction with the present handling of juvenile cases by probate courts. It would be ideal if all family and juvenile cases could be assigned to a district court judge who by training, temperament and experience was especially qualified. However, here again we cannot blindly ignore financial considerations. To establish and maintain such courts would be expensive. Every such additional state service must be paid for out of the already flat pocketbook of Idaho taxpayers.

3. I favor and support legislation designed to eliminate entirely slot machines, punchboards, games of chance and gambling in any form in the state of Idaho. I oppose any

proposed repeal of the local option section of the present Idaho liquor control law. I strongly favor economic, business-like administration on all state affairs and I believe such administration will enable Idaho to continue delivery of all needed and desirable services without incurring debt of any kind and without materially increasing taxation.

Barnes Replies
Answers given by Barnes were:
1. If funds are not adequate, why not a sales tax to be used for teachers' needs and old-age assistance?
2. Present method is okay in my opinion.
3. Let's abolish liquor by the drink and slot machines.

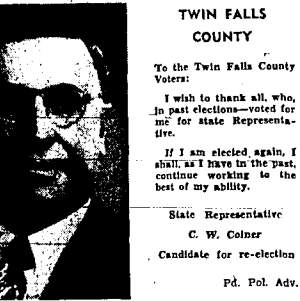

U. S. Building Two Types
Of Power Plants for Sub

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (The
United States has "rival" atomic
submarine power plants under con-
struction.
Theoretically one could be smaller
than its competitor while pro-
ducing equal energy. It also could
be more "barbaric" in its design,
being a reactor of being a "fast"
atomic bomb.

This device is to be called the
submarine intermediate reactor
(SIR). It is now under construction
by the General Electric company at
an Atomic Energy plant in West
Mifflin, Pa.

The trial further advanced he
cause work was started on it soon
er, is to be called the "submarine
thermal reactor" (STR). It is being
built by the Westinghouse Electric
company at the AP27 reactor facil-
ity in Arco, Ida.

The navy already has laid the
keel of the USS Nautilus, the sub-
marine which will house an atomic
power plant of the STR type. It
has authorized construction of an-
other sub which eventually will be
equipped with an SIR model.
The fact that construction plans
are already settled—even before
land-based models of the power
plants have been tested—is a strong
indication that the navy and the
AEC figure both types of power

Living Hobby Becomes Practical Wardrobe Asset

When young lady decides she must have a smart frock, she does not go to a store of all the shops in town, tearing madly through racks of dresses trying to find that "dream-frock" she has dreamed of. After a long ordeal she usually returns home without a dress. After a headache, not to mention the headache.

But Marty Ostrander, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Ostrander, doesn't have to experience any such disappointment, since she can weave her own material, design her own pattern and display, to advantage, the finished product.

A dress of off-white mercerized cotton of her own design is something that Marty can be proud of, having made everything in it herself with the exception of the thread. And, best of all it is just as she dreamed it would be, and before she started. A border trim of green and blue novelty yarn with gold metallic thread accents the dress.

In addition to the dress, Miss Ostrander has made place mats, tablecloths, including one of Swedish lace pattern in ecru. She also has a white shawl with teaching weaving, ceramics and metal craft at Antioch college, Yreka, Calif. Her first apron is of cherry-red warp and weft with gold metallic thread used for the Swedish crackle weave pattern.

Marty at present has no loom but owning one is in her plans for the future. When she has one, she is presently located, she wants to make weaving a business—not a hobby—and combine ceramics with her weaving.

Before accepting the position at Antioch, she had a major interest in best ceramics. She had also made some jewelry for her friends. When she found that this would also be an instructor in weaving, she studied at the Loom Craft studio, Wilmington, O.

Her work at the college required that she take full responsibility and care of seven floor looms for the art department. Her duties included warping and general upkeep of looms ranging in size from 24 to 54 inches and the handling of from 200 to 1,000 yards of yarn. The size of the thread used mostly is about the same as No. 50 sewing cotton. Since all her students were beginners, only cotton warp was used, as linen and wool are reserved for the more advanced.

The principle of the loom is primarily to create a shed (separation) of the warp threads. This is accomplished by the treadling and through this variation a pattern is achieved. The treadles are arranged to hold the threads through which the warp threads are threaded. Each time the loom is treadled the shuttle holding the weft material is thrown.

According to Marty, there are different types of looms including the over-shot, lace weaving, and canvas, and within these various types there are many variations. A creative weaver will generally design his own pattern; however, there are numerous traditional patterns that may be used. A beginner could start out by designing a piece and warping the loom according to the pattern. The weaver and the operator create his own piece.

At the school, Marty says, the old traditional patterns were featured, there still was a lot of room for creative work by variation of color, texture and pattern as the pattern could be varied by different treadlings.

Marty designs her own work and as far as weaving goes her primary interest is in color and texture. "I think it is more contemporary and you are able to more create a new design than the traditional patterns seem to have been fully exploited and leave little room for creative weaving," she explains. "However, I do not appreciate traditional weaving for one must have a knowledge of it before going on and becoming experimental in the craft."

She intends to go to California to investigate the possibilities there and take advanced craft work at the University of California at Los Angeles or possibly at the School for American Craftsmen at Rochester, N. Y.

Noise goes, comes, with children. Grow up, forgetting that they once were noisy and a nuisance to older people, object to the noise and try to make the children keep still. That only makes trouble for both the children and their elders. The children cannot keep still, the older people cannot make them do so and either lose their tempers and punish the children or content themselves by denouncing them as nuisances.

The family is likely to accept the noise as inevitable and try to keep it within reasonable limits, but neighbors are not so likely to accept it. They think that the parents who are responsible for the children should see to it that they don't annoy other people.

That, too, has its limits. How quiet must children be so they don't annoy other people? Nothing but absolute stillness would satisfy most of the complaining ones, and children, by nature, cannot possibly be that quiet. It would be cruel to demand that of them.

Noise worries all of us, mothers as much, or more, than anybody. We need relief from it for our own sake. Then, too, the children need the relief their shouts and thumps and yells allow them to get. We must exercise that muscle of theirs, the voice, and a place for the noise, the shouts, the screeches, the hard exercise that prompts growth in the children. And there must be the quiet hours in the house, too, so that older people can keep sane.

A yard, some safe play place, outdoors, is essential for children's play. Play is the business of a child's day, an important part of his health of body and mind as his daily schedule of food and rest. We must give him the opportunity for exercise and must be endured for the sake of the child.

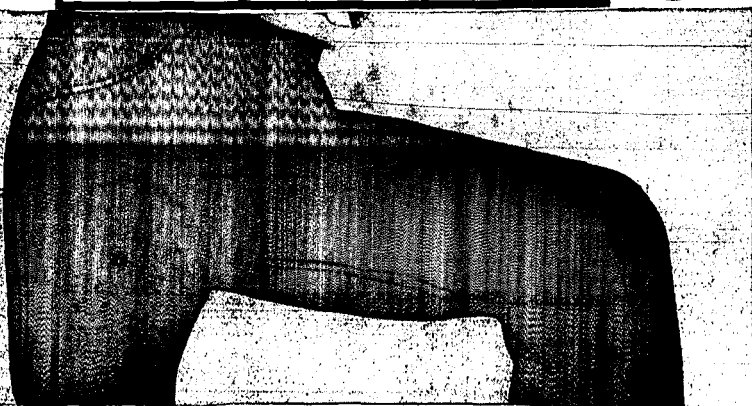

Pruett Looks For Facts on 1952 Meteors

By J. HUGH PRUETT

The annual visit of the August meteors is an event of interest to all who watch the sky. Commonly known as Perseids since they appear to radiate from the star group Perseus, they furnish a display of shooting stars which varies little in intensity from year to year.

Some comets they are called the "tears of St. Lawrence." They are yellow, often trace long arcs across the dark sky. Sometimes they leave paths which remain visible for several seconds.

The Perseids travel in the orbit of the comet of 1862 ("Tuttle") and are thought to be the debris of this disintegrating. In August, the earth in its travel around the sun, runs into the path of these meteors. As one writer expressed it, "The earth and swarm reach the grade crossing near the same time."

Travel Fast
The tiny particles are not luminous from heat until they enter our higher air. Traveling at 38 miles per second in relation to the earth, they are slowed but not enough by atmospheric friction to glow when at heights of 70 or 80 miles. Most are entirely burned by the time they get down to the 50-mile level.

Yearly year large numbers of the membership of the American Meteor society observe and count the Perseid meteors. There usually are most numerous on the nights of Aug. 10-13, but some may be seen earlier and later than this.

Tallies High
Average individual counts under good seeing conditions are about 70 per hour at the time of maximum. Some persons with good eyes and at high elevations have counted as many as 90 per hour.

Counting Urged
Dr. Oliver requests that large numbers of observers be in the counting this year. The best counts will be obtained after midnight. A count of two hours at each sitting is suggested. Look any direction, but record it.

Very few meteors will be seen if the observer walks around making only casual glances at the sky. A reclining chair in a dark place with the eyes constantly "bored forward" will bring the best results.

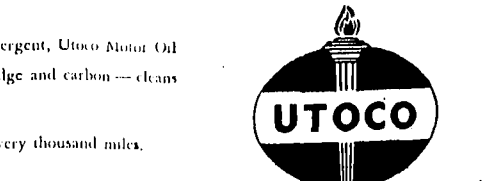

Carolyn replied Friday that there was something special about Gwyn. She answered it and the correspondence blossomed into romance. "I knew I was falling in love with him," she said.

She's completely recovered from the disease now but her memory recalls nothing of her illness and only the last parts of her childhood.
