## Death on Summit Road Is First for Camas for Years

TRIFIELD, Aug. 13.—Camas county experienced its automobile fatality in at least three years Wednesday when a pickup truck went out of control on the north side of Coach summit, 15 miles west of Fairfield, and killed Harney, address unknown. The death raises the total to 21 this year.

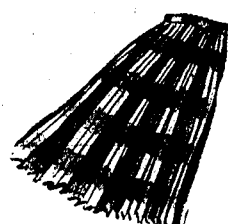

### Workers Causing Alexandria Riots

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 15 (AP)—A state of emergency was declared today in Alexandria, Egypt's second largest city, after an outbreak of rioting and arson in a factory town in the first civil violence since the army coup which ousted King Farouk.

Workers at the mills set fire to the plant this morning. Police reinforcements were rushed from Alexandria and the town of Damamhur to restore order and surrounded the cotton spinning and weaving factory while fire engines rushed to fight the blaze.

Fire damage was estimated at \$200,000 (\$1,146,000).

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### Mossedegh Is Quick as New Powers Given

TEHRAN, Iran, Aug. 15 (AP)—The shah of Iran signed today a decree giving Premier Mohammed Mossedegh dictatorial powers and the premier promptly wiped out all taxes on peasants' and shahs' landlords' shares of the income of tenant farmers.

The legislation for the sweeping powers in political, economic and financial matters was passed in parliament in the past week.

Mossedegh issued his first two decrees as soon as the shah made the legislation official.

The first decree annuls all taxes and surcharges imposed on peasants and stipulates that landlords may no longer evict peasants labor without paying them fixed wages. Heavy fines and prison terms are provided for violators.

The second decree aims at increasing peasant incomes and putting control over their affairs into the farmers' hands. It slashes by 20 percent the share of landlords' in tenant farmers' crops.

Mossedegh said the purpose of the decrees was to make Iran's peasants "independent and prosperous" and "less liable" to fall prey to communist propaganda.

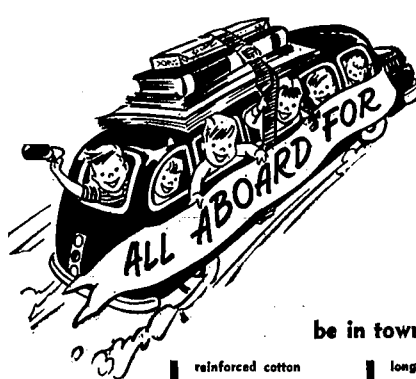

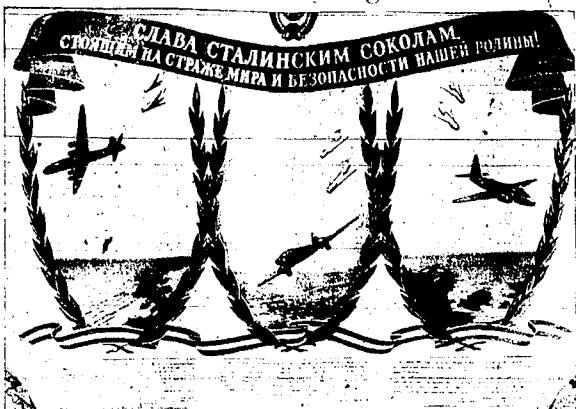

### Valley City to Finish Work On New Well

SHOSHONE, Aug. 13—Drilling of Shoshone's second well is expected to be completed Wednesday, city officials announced Wednesday morning. Work was started by George Eaton and Son, Wendell contractors, have been working 24-hour shifts to complete the well. The well was down to 265 feet Wednesday morning and is expected to reach 300 feet before nightfall.

A fault in the lava bed through which the well is being drilled was hit at 250 feet and drilling operations had to be suspended while the hole was cased. Dirt and lava was falling into the hole making it impossible to continue drilling without casing.

City officials feel that 300 feet will be deep enough for the well since water was hit at 190 feet. The well that was drilled last October was sunk to 390 feet. Officials are of the opinion the new well is of the same flow as the well drilled last October.

If the new well is in the same flow as the first well tests, which are expensive, will not have to run, officials claim. Because the water from the well has been tested and found since water was struck in the second well officials are positive the new well is in the same flow as the old.

When the drilling operation had been completed a small pump will be attached to be used in case of emergency and during the winter when the demand for water will not be so great. The well was drilled both as a precautionary and an economical measure.

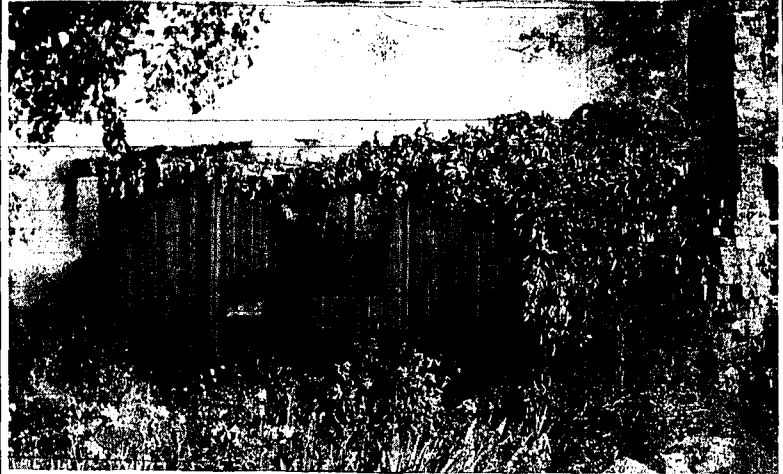
### Mountain Climber Taken From Peak

### Five Latvian Refugees Declare People Hope for War, Defeat of Soviet Union

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—Five men just out from behind the iron curtain which surrounds Latvia say the people there hope for war. The people of the Baltic country for years under Stalin's totalitarian yoke, can see no other way out of their misery, these men say.

When a loaf of "Stalin's cake"—black bread—takes 120 rubles out of a monthly wage of only 400 or so—when to buy a pair of shoes may mean to spend a whole month's income, there isn't much to live for except the hope that some day the liberation will come. War, say many Latvians, is horrible, but "things cannot go on like this."

This is part of the story told by

five fishermen who escaped from Latvia to Sweden in June and a month later were given Sweden's "foreigners' passport" to stay and work in that country. Their story is the first account in several years of living conditions in a Baltic country since Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania were swallowed by Russia and incorporated into the Soviet Union.

The story has been relayed by a Latvian desk of the National Committee from Free Europe, an American organization devoted to broadcasting hope to countries behind the iron curtain. The fishermen are not most such known to have escaped since 1944.

The fishermen range in age from 21 to 26. They were members of an "Ariete" association of laborers for collective work and division of profits. Fishing is an important industry in the USSR and fishermen are paid much better than farmers or white collar workers, but these five could stand it no longer.

Here are some of the conditions they told about:

The collective farms: Living standards seem to be the worst in all Latvia. Impossible quotas of production are set for the farmers, who cannot meet such norms even in down-to-earth work.

For a working day, a farmer receives a kilo (about two pounds) of rye, about a half pound of wheat, six pounds of potatoes and 60 kopecks, 15 cents at the Russian valuation. In case some farmers are granted about an eighth of an acre for their private gardens, but these are taxed heavily and failure to meet the payments means deduction of the payments from what he gets for his work in the collective. Peasants may leave the collective only with the management's consent.

Salaries and wages: White collar workers get less than factory workers. Office employes get from 400 to 500 rubles a month. In purchasing power this means less than subsistence since "Stalin's cake" is 120 rubles; white bread up to four rubles, eggs, 120 rubles each, margarine, 25 rubles a kilo, shirts, 100 rubles, suits, 400 to 1,000 rubles; shoes, 400 rubles; overcoat, 1,200 rubles. ### Egypt Leader Slices Budget, Boosts Levies

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 13 (AP)—Premier Aly Maher's government slashed the royal cabinet's budget by 10 percent today and boosted high bracket income taxes by as much as 10 percent.

At the same time, the all-powerful army, which put Maher in power in a military coup last month, asked the government to reduce a subsidy to 30 percent out in rents. The government was certain to comply.

It all was part of the campaign by Gen. Mohammed Naguib to wipe out corruption, to brighten Egypt's economy and ease the plight of the nation's 20 million people.

The government cut the budget of the royal cabinet—a group of political, economic and military advisers—to the sum of \$14,000,000 to \$14,000,000.

The cabinet had been particularly active during the reign of ex-King Farouk, who liked to dabble in domestic politics. It was expected to have considerable influence during a recency council rules for Farouk's baby son, 7-month-old King Ahmed Fouad.

### New Model of Famed War II Landing Craft Made of Plastic

BREMERTON, Wash. (NEA)—Take several hundred pounds of resin, add a little pine oil, some glycerol, and a dash of Xylene Bake in a hot mold. Forty hours later remove one plastic LCPV landing craft vehicle personnel for the U. S. navy.

The process used in building the navy's new plastic landing boats at the Bremerton navy yard is more complex than the above recipe indicates, but the formula is basically correct. The navy yard is turning out the boats in batches like cookies.

The 30-man plastic ships will replace wood and steel models that carried thousands of soldiers and marines on assault landings on beaches throughout the world during World War II.

The navy decided to build the heavy landing boats after it had built 150 12-foot, four-man plastic wherries which have earned a reputation for durability and economy. One doubtful navy officer made his own personal test of one of the small boats by beating on it with a 12-pound sledge hammer. He wore himself out, but the little lifeboat remained intact.

Styrofoam, a synthetic compound, is selected for its buoyancy and strength. A block of Styrofoam twice the size of an apple box can be carried easily by a 3-year-old child.

### CIO Political Job Begun at Session

For eight hours, nearly 2,000 pounds of resin are pumped into the mold. Forty hours later the outer mold is removed, and a completed hull is ready to receive its cargo.

As a test, one fully loaded plastic boat was beached at top speed—both on sand and gravel beaches. The only damage consisted of a few minor scratches which were patched easily.

In addition to lower maintenance costs, the new plastic boat economies on construction cost. Very little steel is needed. The boat can be built with semi-skilled labor instead of expensive mechanics.

The solid plastic hull has no seams to caulk and is non-sinkable. The hull is stronger than wood, will not splinter from gunfire like steel or wood.

One puzzled sailor who operated the boat during a test commented: "First it's wooden ships and iron men; then it was iron ships and wooden men—now it's plastic ships and—does that make me a synthetic sailor?"

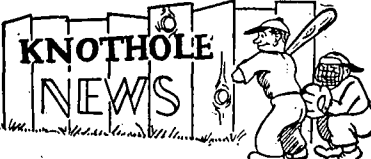

### Woman Celebrates Birthday in Switzerland

It is always pleasant to celebrate one's birthday with the family and in the case of twins, especially so. The Fred and Gertrude I. Buhl, really went overboard and abroad so the celebration could spend her 40th anniversary with her twin brother, still residing in their home town of Schaffhausen, Switzerland.

Leaving her March 22, the Burkhalter were gone for two months, spending most of the time in Switzerland where both were born and raised. The former was a well known artist and painter, Elizabeth.

Although Mrs. Burkhalter found her childhood home in Schaffhausen still intact, her twin brother and school, both close to the Italian border, had been destroyed by accidental bombing. Instead, she discovered a new church, partially built with American funds to reimburse for the bombing, now gracing the spot where the old church stood.

The Burkhalter, accustomed to hopping into the car or picking up running errands, found quite a trifle muscle bound for the Swiss routine, since the lost arts (in America) of walking and bicycling are the primary means of transportation for the shorter distances. Few cars are used on the steep, narrow roads there and distances between points are indicated on signposts by walking time required.

Bicyclists by the thousands pour into the streets each day and that, explains Mrs. Burkhalter, "is why we didn't rent a car over there, as we had had in mind to do so. Switzerland isn't all necessity, as Burkhalter recalls one 83-year-old man who would not let his car be taken and then cycled in the afternoon for his "constitutional."

For longer trips, boats, buses and the famous cable cars are used. The couple found travel on the government-owned railroads reasonable—particularly in comparison with the gasoline cost of the equivalent 75 cents per gallon—since a month's transportation, regardless of the distance to be traveled, costs only \$40.

The pair found Switzerland dotted with ancient castles, many of which now have been converted into hotels or restaurants. A number of the buildings are ornately carved and of great number of them still have the famous red-tiled roofs. Preferring flora and fauna with a little less discipline, Mrs. Burkhalter was most interested in the beauty of the dance of wild flowers and has pictures of entire hillsides covered with various species of flowers.

The Burkhalter didn't take many pictures, relying on professional work of some postcards. However the Burkhalter did take a number of group playing the Alphorn, a long, upward instrument which widens gradually from the mouthpiece.

Among the souvenirs of the trip, the couple includes Swiss watches and jewelry, Swiss watches, boxes, and a favorite is a box set of bread, which was used as a bread dish. The music ceases when the plate is set and the music is allowed to be passed across the table, the melody plays again.

### Crash of Vessels At Sea Blamed on Turning of Ship

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP).—A naval court of inquiry announced Tuesday the "sole cause" of the disastrous mid-Atlantic collision between the carrier Wasp and the destroyer-minesweeper Hobson on April 26 was an "unexplained left turn" made by the smaller vessel.

A total of 126 crewmen died in the striking of the Hobson.

The court said Lieut. Commander W. J. Tierney, skipper of the Hobson, "committed a grave error in judgment" in making the turn. The Hobson was run down by the 22,000-ton carrier. Tierney died in the collision.

The court, which began its hearings immediately after the badly damaged Wasp reached New York last May, absolved all other officers on both ships of any responsibility for the accident, one of the worst peacetime disasters in U. S. naval history.

The three-admiral court said both vessels were in good condition and that no material, mechanical or electronic failures in either ship contributed to or caused the collision.

**Senator Accused By Mining Union**  
DENVER, Aug. 13 (AP).—The International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers said Tuesday Sen. Pat McCarran, D., Nev., was trying to disrupt the bargaining campaign of 100,000 non-ferrous metal workers in the United States.

The union's newspaper, The Union, said the senate subcommittee on internal security, headed by McCarran, had subpoenaed four top union officials to appear at a hearing in Salt Lake City Oct. 7 and 8.

The subpoenas were sent to International President John Clark, International Secretary-Treasurer M. E. Travis, Regional Director Al Skinner and Graham Dolan, who does special assignments for the officers.

McCarran, confirmed at Reno, Nev., that he had sent the subpoenas.

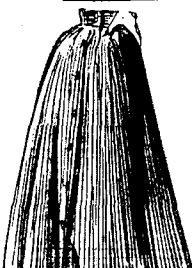

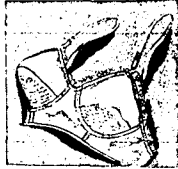

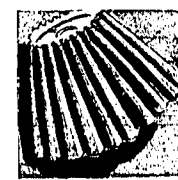

### 2 Rocket Experts Believe They Have Found "Saucer" Answer

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13 (AP)—Two southern California rocket engineers have come up with a scientific explanation of flying saucers, but they only figure in about 10 per cent of the cases.

Dr. William W. Gillespie and Wilthrop K. Cox, who met two years ago while working on secret rocket projects at the jet plant in Azusa, Calif., decided they couldn't buy the more than \$10 million saucer theory and set out to explain it on their own.

"Stories like the one about a saucer landing in the desert and spouting jets, while six little men 18 inches tall climbed out," said Gillespie, made the job start rough for the rocket.

According to their theory, said Cox, flying saucers are electromagnetic vortex rings. He explained there are two types, the saucers and the oblong or egg-shaped variety. In the first type, the disc is a magnetic field with the ions of charged particles in a central position inside, he said. The oblong type has the ions on the outside giving the object a rounder appearance.

The two men have conducted an intensive campaign for the past two years, interviewing observers and classifying all the newspaper stories and magazine articles they could find on the subject.

"These observations that appeared to come from more than one person or from persons with common sense to be reliable got special attention," said Gillespie.

These objects are attracted and give off luminous glow. They could appear orange, yellow, blue or white, according to their activation, they said.

The saucers have no weight and therefore can travel in any direction at any speed, depending on what they bump into in the way of counter-fields in the atmosphere.

Once they are generated, said Cox, they are self-sustaining and only lose energy by their luminosity and aero-dynamic drag. They would have the ability to give radar echoes.

Cox said he agreed with the recent theory of Dr. Donald H. Menzel.

### U. S. Combat Pay Nearing, Lovett Avers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—American fighting men in Korea may get their new \$45-a-month combat pay this month by July service, Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett said Tuesday.

But retroactive pay for Korean veterans will be delayed at least a month, he said.

The new combat pay does not go to men already receiving incentive or special pay for aviation, submarine, parachute, medical or dental duty.

Lovett said a form for claiming combat pay for eligible veterans is expected to be available through postoffices on or after Sept. 15. Veterans should not file claims for combat pay until the forms are on hand, he said.

Congress this year approved the combat bonus for men who have fought in Korea since June, 1949. To be eligible in any month, a serviceman must in general have been under enemy fire for not less than six days in that month while serving a combat unit.

However, a combat pay for up to three months also will go to men wounded, captured or missing in action, or to the dependents of men killed in action while they were killed.

### 'Copters Use Is Advised to Help Service

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—A helicopter manufacturer advises city transport planners take a lesson from the marines and provide for helicopter shuttle service between airports and cities.

Charles M. Kaman, president of the Kaman Aircraft Corporation, Winston Locks Conn., contrasted the ease with which helicopter-borne marines move from forward airfields to front lines in Korea with the difficulty that surface fighters have in moving from big airports to centers of cities, such as New York.

"Certainly the buildings of Manhattan are less formidable than the mountains of Korea," Kaman said in a speech at an aviation education institute sponsored by the civil aeronautics administration, airlines and airplane manufacturers.

"Every progressive city and town can do well to plan now for the coming helicopter line," he said. The helicopter, he said, is the "only aircraft capable of flying into and out of the centers of cities with maximum safety in all kinds of weather."

This fact will become more important as the increasing size of airliners "magnifies the problem of airport location farther and farther away from cities served."
