## F. Firemen Directing Search For Bodies; Volunteers Asked

Miller guest ranch near the lake to hunt and feed volunteer workers. Additional trapping hooks are being made in Twin Falls as the work of looking for the bodies can be carried forward.

At the lake the firemen will erect a blackboard to give volunteer workers instruction in how to handle the search equipment and where to look on the lake bottom.

Officials at the fire department Tuesday said they are certain the hooks being used at the lake are not reaching bottom and that little of the lake bottom actually has been dragged to date. They are of the opinion heavier hooks and more rope should be used.

Search for the bodies began immediately after the tragedy and was continued by moonlight that night. The following day Sheriff L. E. Outz and Forest Supervisor Charles Dougherty supervised the efforts of volunteer workers. Last week the navy, at the request of Sen Henry W. Wood, sent a survey crew to the lake to investigate the feasibility of using divers separate to recover the bodies.

The crew objected against the use of divers but did furnish the researchers with valuable information relative to the temperature of the water and the form of the lake currently. According to instruments used in the lake there is no current in the water where the bodies are believed to have submerged.

When Sheriff Outz and Dougherty gave up direction of the search they called on the county engineers, Dick Bailey, Twin Falls, was placed in charge of search operations for their off-duty hours as asked by Dr. Fuenfeling Tuesday.

## 'Ike' Rejects Truman Call For Briefing

DENVER, Aug. 14 (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee, politely but firmly rejected today an invitation from President Truman to attend a White House briefing on the foreign situation.

Eisenhower told Mr. Truman in a 300-word telegram he felt that under present circumstances any communications between them "should be only those which are known to all the American people."

He thought it would be "unwise and result in confusion in the public mind" if he were to attend a White House meeting.

The GOP nominee thus took a position contrary to that of Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Illinois, the Democratic presidential candidate, who attended a White House cabinet meeting and foreign policy briefing Tuesday.

Eisenhower had been sharply critical of Stevenson's visit to Washington. He said it showed the Democratic position on "subsequent" to Mr. Truman's political forces.

In his telegram to the President today, Eisenhower made a point of stating that he was not invited to attend a briefing until after Stevenson had returned to Springfield, Illinois. He said he would not attend Mr. Truman's invitation, Eisenhower said he felt it was his duty "to remain free to analyze the reasons for turning down Mr. Truman's invitation. ## Gooding County Fair and Rodeo Opens With State Hospital Show

GOODING, Aug. 14—Amid a last minute hurry and scurry, Gooding county's annual fair and rodeo opened Thursday morning with specialty acts performing for patients at the state tuberculosis hospital and judging taking place at the fairgrounds. The West Point Grange was awarded first prize in the Grange exhibits and Gooding Grange placed second. The parade, larger than in recent years, got under way at 1 p. m. and specialty acts and a horse show were held during the afternoon in the rodeo arena. All afternoon events are free.

The carnival is ready for operation although Thursday was warm, the heat was relieved somewhat by a breeze that swept across the fairgrounds and set banners and flags to fluttering. The odds that go to make up a fair, including hand-sawed planks, popcorn and dust, combined with the overhanging hum of voices and other noises gave the air to the celebration.

Open class judging was started Thursday morning as did judging in the 4-H livestock, 4-H projects and 4-H produce events. A 4-H style show was held Wednesday night at the fairgrounds and was a popular event.

As has been the custom for the last three years the specialty acts were taken to the state hospital where ambulatory patients saw the show from ring-side seats on the lawn. Band patients were moved to the windows in the building to watch the show.

Forty-six contestants from seven states and Canada have signed up for the riding events in the rodeo.

Among the registrants was Mitch Owens, Fresno, Calif., the one-handed cowboy who has been riding in rodeo circuits for 20 years. Owens still holds the world's championship for bull riding which he won in New York in 1939, and has won several other rodeo events. He has signed up for both bareback and saddle bronc riding. Owens is accompanied this trip by the bride of three weeks, Hiss.

Another experienced rider is Jack Wilson, Deadwood, B. D. who has won the all-round championship cowboy award in the last five years.

EDEN, Aug. 14—Two cars were demolished and a small boy was cut severely and lost several teeth as a result of two accidents near Eden Wednesday night.

Glen Leuder, son of Martin Leuder, Eden, was taken to a Twin Falls hospital for treatment after the 1941 Chevrolet sedan in which he was riding skidded on loose gravel on a mile east of "Fingers" bridge. The car crossed the road into the borrow pit and rammed through a fence. The accident occurred at 7:45 p. m.

Martin Leuder, driver, will appear before Judge Theron Ward in probate court Thursday afternoon to answer the charge of driving with an expired driver's license. Leuder said he was traveling about 45 miles an hour.

Two hours earlier, about 5:30 p. m., a 1950 Buick demolished a Twin Falls house in the Eden district, missed a curve six miles east of Eden on highway 25 and lost control of the vehicle.

The car skidded 100 feet after crossing the highway. Gordon escaped with no injuries other than a bruise on his forehead.

Deputy Sheriff Gordon Newbery investigated both accidents.

## Rites Not Set For Victim of Truck Crash

FUNERAL services for Frank Harney, 46, Murlaugh, who was killed Wednesday on the wind-whipped highway east of Eden, will be announced in Twin Falls as soon as word has been received from relatives.

Harney was driving a truck belonging to Dale L. Kevan, Hansen, when the vehicle left the highway and plunged over an embankment. Kevan, a passenger, was treated for shock and bruises at Fairfield and then taken to the Gooding Memorial hospital. Both men were pronounced dead.

State Patrolman Stanley Pace, who investigated the crash with Sheriff John Hirsch, Fairfield, said the accident happened at 2 a. m. but was not discovered until 8 a. m. H. O. Bryan, Gooding, who was on his way to Fairfield, came upon the crashed pickup and took Kevan to a doctor in Fairfield.

Patrolman Pace said evidence indicates the two men had been drinking heavily in Fairfield and that they left the city shortly after midnight. He said the truck rolled 72 feet down the embankment and came to rest on its wheels. Harney's body was found 11 feet beyond the truck. Pace said, "The top of the dead man's head had been crushed. He died." Bryan told Patrolman Pace both he and Harney had been drinking.

"The body was taken Wednesday afternoon to the Thompson funeral home in Gooding and then to the Reynolds funeral home, Twin Falls. Harney is survived by two sons, Robert Harney, Rupert, and Dick Harney, Hope, and one daughter, Mrs. Karl Bates, Milner. He farmed in the Milner area many years."

## Marines Beat 2 Fierce Red Drives on Hill

SEOUL, Aug. 14 (AP)—U. S. marines beat back two fierce communist attacks Wednesday night and today to retain their newly won hill on Bunker Hill, in western Korea.

The battalion-size red assaults were the third and fourth full scale attempts by the communists since early Tuesday by the leadership.

## T. F. County Rates High in Potato Output

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (Special)—Twin Falls county ranked 20th in acreage and 15th in production of potatoes among the nation's leading 100 counties, census figures for 1949 showed today.

Twin Falls fell behind four other Idaho counties in acreage but was exceeded only by Blaine and Benewah in production.

Cassia, Jerome, Minidoka and Gooding were first among the 12 Idaho counties in the top 100—making the Gem state first in the country. Pennsylvania had 11 counties in the top brackets, followed by New York with 16.

Although Maine had only two counties in the list, Arrostook again won first place in both acreage and production, harvesting 62,317,788 bushels from 127,120 acres.

The Arrostook rate of 474 bushels per acre was far above Idaho rates, although Canyon county, which had insufficient acreage to rank among the first 100, was credited with a 385-bushel figure.

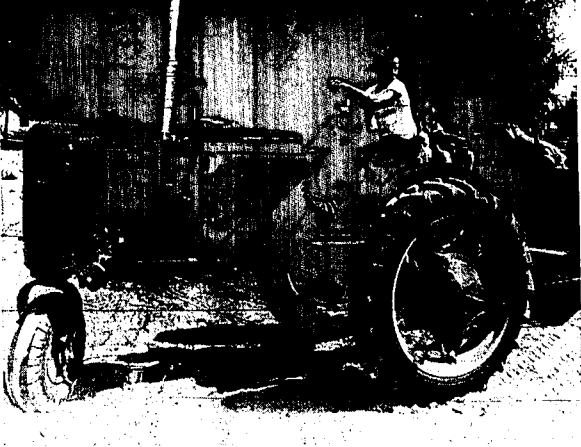

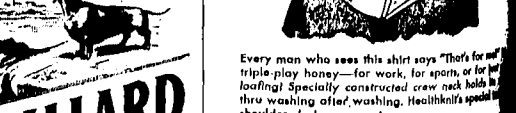

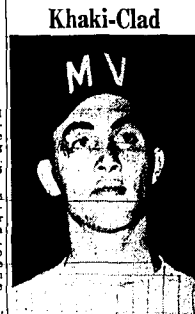

### Heart Seizure Fatal to Mark Sullivan at 78

WEST CHESTER, Pa., Aug. 14 (AP)—Mark Sullivan, 78, nationally-known newspaper columnist, died of a heart attack Wednesday night in Chester County hospital.

In the newspaper business for 44 years, Sullivan was the author of several books, including his own autobiography, and once served as editor of Collier's magazine.

A life-long resident of Chester county, he was born in Avondale, Pa., near West Chester on Sept. 10, 1874. Sullivan was the youngest of 10 children. His parents were Irish immigrants who became prominent Pennsylvania farmers.

**Ambitious Man**  
Sullivan, himself greedy for education and ambitious for success, was a past master of a newspaper at 18.

He was living in the farmhouse his father built, writing two columns a week which were syndicated nationally by the New York Herald-Tribune.

His new Mark Jr. reported the famed newspaperman had a heart attack late Wednesday afternoon and was taken immediately to the hospital. He succumbed before midnight.

**Recalled First Job**  
Sullivan's first newspaper job was with the West Chester Daily Local News. In 1938, celebrating 50 years in the newspaper business, Sullivan returned to the daily Local News for one day. He read copy on county news—a job he learned in his newspaper apprenticeship—made up the front page and put the edition to bed.

In his autobiography "The Education of an American" Sullivan told of his impoverished beginnings, the struggles of his family, his constant quest for education.

### Nazi-Dressed Iran Raiders Stir Troubles

TEHRAN, Iran, Aug. 14 (AP)—Russian and Hungarian officials were expected to protest to the Iranian government today the raids by a band of men dressed in Nazi uniforms on the Soviet and Hungarian embassies reading rooms in Tehran.

The band of 21 men, wearing swastika arm bands, rolled up in trucks before the Soviet reading room was the Russian embassy last night.

They broke into the reading room, smashing doors, windows and statues of Lenin and Stalin. The portraits of the Soviet leader from the walls and tipped up flag and communist literature.

The men rushed back in their trucks and drove a few blocks to the Hungarian embassy reading room where they again smashed furniture and fixtures and destroyed the structure.

The Iranian communist Tudeh party heard of the raids and raised slinging-arm squads to the two reading rooms.

The communists were too late to catch the raiders, but placed guards around the buildings. Priests are investigating the incidents.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 14 (AP)—The 15 men who bailed out of a B-29 Superfortress over Bitterle, Wash., received only minor bruises and light cuts. Col. M. G. Zumwalt, commander of the 47th Strategic Bombing Squadron, said today:

### People Flock To Seoul for Friday Rites

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 14 (AP)—Peasants, soldiers and politicians flocked to the ancient city of Seoul today to be on hand for the inauguration of President Syngman Rhee and the fourth anniversary of the repudiation of South Korea.

More than 80,000 Koreans were expected to view the inauguration ceremonies tomorrow in front of the deserted, shell-battered capitol building. Another 10,000 will line the streets to pay homage to the 77-year-old Rhee.

**U. N. Represented**  
Representing the United Nations will be Gen. and Mrs. M. Clark, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Ambassador John J. Muccio and ministers of allied nations fighting in Korea.

Rhee, who won an overwhelming victory in South Korea's first popular presidential election last week, pledged himself to work for the unification of his country and to drive the communists out.

**Goal Remains Same**  
... Our goal remains as it was—the resurrection in democratic form of an ancient nation which, for more than 40 centuries, has contributed so much to the preservation of peace in the orient.

A national assemblyman warned of grave times immediately ahead for the young republic. Kim Dong Song, vice chairman of the assembly, said famine threatens next year because of a lack of rain.

### Pacific Bases Check Slated

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—A party of home members, most of them members of the armed services committee, will leave Friday morning by air force plane to inspect multi-billion-dollar military construction work in the Pacific.

Being of the construction is reported behind schedule.

The group will be gone a month. The itinerary includes Korea, where the members will discuss with commanders military activities including supplies of ammunition.

Other points on the schedule are Hawaii, Johnston Island, Kwajalein, Guam, Manila, Okinawa, Tokyo and on the return trip, Alaska. Most of these points construction totaling billions of dollars in cost has been authorized by congress.
