Training courses for polio emergency volunteer workers will begin at 2 p.m. Monday at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital, reports Mrs. Mary Ann Knight, vice president of the Twin Falls county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The training classes are sponsored by the women's activity committee of the local chapter of the national foundation. Mrs. Ann Knight, Twin Falls county public health nurse, will instruct the classes. Her services are being loaned by the south central Idaho district health unit which is cooperating in the training program. Mrs. Knight has received special conducting by the joint orthopedic nursing advisory service qualifying her as a polio expert. The course will consist of intensive training in theoretical and practical care and treatment of polio patients. Classes will be conducted from 2 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital, also cooperating in the emergency polio training. First volunteers for the training are 10 Women of the Magic Valley. Ten observers will attend the course and receive actual training in the second training cycle. SHOSHONE, Aug. 16—This has been a buggy season in Lincoln county, County Agent Fred Kohl maintains. "Water conditions favored survival of insects and most of them came through the winter before eating."

Grasshoppers have been causing some damage to crops and gardens. In places as little as they are being sprayed for. The corn sawworm is prevalent over southern Idaho this season, he continued, and is causing damage to both field and sweet corn and alfalfa.

There are chemicals which are very effective against grasshoppers, the county agent said, and should be used if damage is taking place. The chemicals are chlorodane, rotophene, aldrin and dieldrin and may be used as spray dust or baits.

Where hoppers are moving from wasteland, success may be had by treating only the margin of the field. Rate of application for aldrin and dieldrin is only 2-4 ounces an acre; for chlorodane, up to one and one-half pounds and for rotophene, up to two and one-half pounds. Rates vary with the type of crop being sprayed and between the dust and spray.

Roland W. Portman, extension entomologist, will be in Lincoln county Aug. 22 to work on grasshoppers. Anyone having any type of insect problem is invited to contact the county agent if they wish help from Portman, however.

Farmers are causing damage in corn and other vegetables and are otherwise making a nuisance of themselves. DDT still is the best.

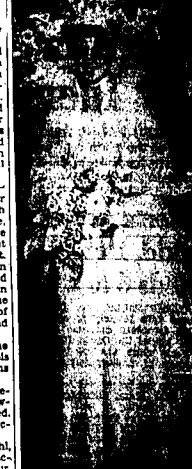

It was there that the bronzed, gray-haired patriarch of the game heard himself called the "most influential factor" in the development of American football. The words came from another old-timer, Chris Bentley (Pop) Taylor, who is almost as old as Stagg, himself.

"As a coach and a member of the rules committee," said Warner, "I know how much influence on the game of football than any other person in history. He has performed a wonderful service for his country."

Stagg, himself, said that he had decided to be a minister when he was a young man at college.
