# New Combat Pay Creating Big Problem

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Military officials said today they will take them a long time to determine how many American men have been promoted in Korea.

They will soon start paying \$48 a month to those who have been promoted in Korea.

But the job of sorting out and deciding which men will receive the extra pay will be a long and difficult task, experts in Congress say.

Congress approved this special combat pay shortly before adjournment in early July. The law is retroactive to the start of the Korean campaign for those who were promoted before the law was passed.

Pentagon officials estimate it will cost between \$50 million and \$60 million dollars.

The measure applies chiefly to infantrymen of the army and marines. Senator Moody, D. Mich., the sponsor, said the main purpose is to give hazardous duty pay to men in the foxholes, thus putting them on equal footing in this respect with fliers, submarine and paratrooper.

Criticism said the bill would discriminate against men who could not be sent to meet its requirements.

Nobody knows yet how many services and ex-servicemen are eligible. To qualify, they must have spent any six days in one month under conditions subjecting them to enemy fire.

# Prices Spiral Less in U. S.; Survey Finds

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Americans may shudder at current price tags but a United Nations survey indicates they have risen less in the U. S. since 1948 than in such tightly-controlled nations as Britain, Norway and Sweden.

Moreover, the U. S. has held the line against inflation better than such uncontrolled countries as Canada, France and Argentina, according to figures released in the latest U. N. monthly bulletin of statistics.

The survey showed U. S. prices have gone up 10 per cent since 1948. Figures for other countries: Canada, 25 per cent; Britain, 28 per cent; Norway and Sweden, 31; Canada, 21; France, 45; Argentina, 185.

Some experts, however, claim the survey is not a fair gauge of country-by-country difference in cost-of-living. They say 1948 is the base year. By that time, these experts contend, the U. S. already had undergone the worst of its post-war inflation. The process has just beginning in many other countries.

**Started High**  
This means that even though U. S. prices have not increased since 1948 at anywhere near the rate of inflation in some other countries, they started from a higher plateau and in actual cash often are higher.

The steepest rise in American prices, the survey showed, came immediately after the outbreak of the Korean war. The Korean inflation was not felt in other countries until much later.

Nearly 1,000 members of local 417, International Union of Electrical Workers, set up token picket lines over the week-end after the union ordered a walkout at plants here and at Easton and Long Branch Friday.

Local Vice President Irving Spielman said no negotiations were held over the week-end and none were scheduled. However, he said the union was ready to talk if the company called a session.

The local demanded a 15-cent-an-hour across-the-board increase, reflecting a 4-to-6-cent cost-of-living proposal by Bendix.

# Political Guesswork Specialists Still Ponder Switch From Idahoan to Utah

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (Special)—The switch of feminine leadership in the Republican presidential drive last week from Mrs. Gliford Mayes of Idaho to Mrs. Roy Priest of Utah, still has many political guesswork specialists wondering.

Replacement of the Kellogg woman and a half year was expected since she was a protégé of the pro-Taft former Chairman Guy Gabrielson. The brusque manner of the dismissal (the announcement Friday made no mention of Mrs. Mayes' retirement from the post) was unexpected.

Choice of Mrs. Priest as successor also was hard to explain. A losing Republican congressional candidate in 1949, she would not conceivably have enough personal influence to put Utah in the Republican presidential column this year. Both Utah and Idaho were strongly for Taft before the nomination of Eisenhower, with the result that lingering dissonance makes the two states equally bad bets for a GOP victory.

The national committee headed by the new chairman, Arthur Summerfield, apparently thinks Utah's prospects are brighter. The committee Summerfield ousted other Gabrielson appointees a week earlier than Mrs. Mayes and when the Johnson left on her vacation she expressed the hope that she would be able to remain.

"I was for Ike all alone," she declared, "although I had to stand up and be counted with Gabrielson."

Many westerners in the capital didn't realize the charge had been made, since Mrs. Priest's new title was announced as "assistant to the chairman in charge of the women's division." Mrs. Mayes' position until it was changed at the past convention, was that of assistant chairman.

Under either title, though, the job is the top woman in the campaign.

Summerfield's publicity chief, Robert Humphreys, made some effort to remedy the omission when he issued a statement on behalf of his chief declaring: "The job done by those Mayes during the last two years has been most effective. Mrs. Priest is fortunate to have such groundwork laid."

"Mrs. Mayes gave unstintingly of her time and energy and we are most anxious that she continue to participate in the campaign."

Asked why Summerfield had kept the women's leadership in the high mountain area instead of transferring the appointment to a more populous locale, Humphreys answered heatedly: "My Priest was chosen because she's Ivy Priest, not because she comes from any particular part of the country."

One Idahoan in Washington speculated that the charge might have been because "Rose sort of laid an egg" in her convention speech at Chicago. Others figured Summerfield may have laid a larger egg by replacing a woman from a "doubtful" state with one from a neighboring and equally "doubtful" state, especially when the new appointee is not a demonstrably superior vote-getter.

If the shift had accompanied other staff replacements in the general shakedown, the move would not have been so noticeable. But Summerfield's delay after Mrs. Mayes had expressed her willingness to continue in the unpaid post looked like plain tactlessness.
