## "Ike" Wins Invitations Battle for Talk at Minnesota Plowing Fete

AP and UP Reports

Presidential Candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower won a battle today to secure the main invitation to address the Minnesota Plowing Fete on Sept. 6.

It was reported that the fete would be held at Kason, Minn., and that Eisenhower would be the main attraction.

Other candidates for the invitation included Earl Warren, Hubert H. Humphrey, and Lyndon B. Johnson.

Eisenhower's acceptance of the invitation was announced by the Twin Falls News.

Leaders confer today with Eisenhower to draft plans for a drive to win the women's vote—a vote some believe could mean the margin of victory in the presidential election.

Associates of Eisenhower said today that the campaign headquarters in New York's Commodore hotel, leaving only a rear detachment in Denver. However, Eisenhower's main base of operations on or after Sept. 14 will be a headquarters on wheels—his campaign train—and most of his advisers would travel with him.

It also was disclosed that Eisenhower would make a strong pitch for the support of organized labor in his address to the American Federation of Labor convention in New York Sept. 15.

Meanwhile, Stevenson underwent his "rumor hour" with the press in Chicago today before leaving on a four-day Wisconsin holiday.

Stevenson flew to Chicago from Springfield, Ill., on the first leg of his vacation trip. After the dental appointment today he left for Minocqua, Wis., where he will be for a week.

## Whistle-Stop Plans Halted By President

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower has abandoned his plans for a whistle-stop campaign this fall but will deliver a major speech in behalf of Democratic policies in pivotal states.

The president's decision to curtail his whistle-stop campaign was announced today by a spokesman in the White House.

The spokesman said that the president had decided to spend more time in the White House and to focus on his major speeches in key states.

### "Secret" Tag Is Taken Off Report on Oil

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The White House agreed Monday to strip the "secret" label off of a long-suppressed federal commission report on alleged monopoly practices of international oil cartels.

Suppression of the report on grounds of national security caused a row at the recent session of Congress after word leaked out that it had been written.

A special secret investigation subcommittee looking into monopoly practices in government has said it will probe into the reasons the oil report was kept secret for months.

The decision to make it public was announced by Sen. Joseph P. Kamp, Ala., president of the subcommittee and chairman of the senate anti-trust committee.

He said he believed "an important reason for issuing the report is to subject the activities of great concentrations of economic power to the public publicity."

Senator Humphreys, D. Mo., among the critics of the report, said the document dealt with price fixing monopoly practices in various nations collaborating for their own profit.

One source close to the federal trust commission said the justice department intends to use the report in a federal grand jury investigation of oil monopolies now underway.

BOISE, Aug. 19.—Idaho's general fund balance at the end of the 1935-36 fiscal year was \$2,254,445, more than two million dollars above two years ago figures compiled for the annual report of the State Treasurer.

The general fund balance on June 30, 1935, was \$1,210,419. Full balance was \$2,711,974. The balance of all state funds, including the general fund, was \$2,711,974, which shows that it was two years ago. The balance is distributed in the following manner: \$1,210,419 in state bonds, and \$1,501,555 to the treasurer's office.

Pact Possible; Delegate Says—MUNSBY, Ore., Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Gen. William Harrison, senior U. N. command armistice delegate, said today he thought "an armistice is possible, but I haven't the faintest idea when."

He made the observation at a news conference here. Harrison, 62, is a member of the U. N. and communist negotiators traded acid words for an hour at Panmunjom and made "no visible progress" toward settlement of the Korean blocking issue of prisoner exchange. The negotiations called a fourth strike for Aug. 27. Gen. Nam Il, senior red delegate, protested, then agreed to setting the next meeting for Aug. 27.

On chances of the talks to succeed, Harrison declared: "If I thought the communists do want an armistice, it is a matter of how much they are willing to pay for it."
