Addison T. Smith Arrives for Visit, Reception, Anniversary

Mr. Smith said Twin Falls town and county has a reputation for prosperity and is often referred to as one of the outstanding farming communities in the United States.

Mr. Smith explained that the reputation was grounded not only for the production per acre, but on the value of crops per acre.

Smith's political career began even before he started out a horse-raiser in his home. In 1904 he was serving as secretary to Idaho's Sen. Weldon B. Heburn. From 1904 to 1911 he served also as secretary to the state Republican central committee. He resigned to become a candidate for representative in congress. He was elected in 1912 and served for 20 years.

'Ike' Gets Warm Welcome at Boise, Sees Governors and Basts Demos in Talk

BOISE, Aug. 20—Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential candidate, got a warm welcome as he arrived here today to make a speech charging the Democrats with hiding the same old socialistic ideas behind new faces.

Eisenhower's party landed at the Boise airport on schedule at 11:22 a. m. (MST) after a smooth, 3 hours and 10 minute flight from Denver.

The GOP presidential nominee was to confer this afternoon at the Idaho statehouse with the Republican governors of nine western states.

His first "frankly political" speech since his nomination for the presidency was scheduled for delivery from the capital steps this afternoon. At 7 p. m. he will appear for Kansas City, Mo., and more political meetings in the Idaho state capitol.

Some people are preaching the idea that there are only two roads into the future and that America must choose one or the other of them. They say we must take either the road leading constantly to the right or the road going always further to the left. If we take the road to the right, we become "reactionaries." If we take the road to the left, we become "radicals."

The extreme right holds that government should have little concern for the welfare of the individual. It assumes that man can do everything for himself. The left has little belief in the individual. It assumes that man can do hardly anything for himself. The plain truth is that neither extreme right nor extreme left has any real faith in the people.

That is why both doctrines and both roads lead to the same disastrous destination—and always will. The right always goes so far to the right it has to use force to control the future and the America left always goes so far to the left that it has to use compulsion to make people do what government determines is good for them. Thus at the end of either road, it is tyranny.

The American founders said that there is a better way. It has sometimes been called the middle way. Because they knew that this was the single route of progress for free men, our people have resisted those who have tried to turn us aside toward either flank.

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Cash Experts Surprised by Funds Revise

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—Congressional money experts expressed surprise today at President Truman's estimate that direct taxes on corporations this fiscal year will yield three billion dollars less than figures in his budget seven months ago.

However, among the few lawmakers available for comment on the revised budget estimates released last night, none challenged the possibility that the "dropback" point has been reached.

Rep. Daniel A. Hoey, ranking Republican on the tax-writing house ways and means committee, said it had been expected to him for some time that retail business has been lagging. He observed that such a condition could hardly exist without a backwash on manufacturing.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Greyhound corporation said today it plans to assume "complete control" Oct. 1 of two bus lines linking Chicago and Los Angeles.

The lines involved are Union Pacific stages and Interstate Transit line, intercity bus systems operating between Chicago, Los Angeles and Portland under the name of Overland Greyhound.

Greyhound corporation, which has owned 33 1/3 per cent of stock in the two lines, announced it has purchased the stock of Richfield in two firms held by the Union Pacific railroad and the Chicago and North-Western.

Interstate Transit operates between Chicago and Los Angeles via Omaha and Salt Lake City, with connections to Denver, Kansas City, St. Louis, St. Paul, and Portland, Minn. Union Pacific stages run from Salt Lake City to Portland, Ore., and Spokane, Wash.

The announcement said Overland will continue to be operated from its present headquarters in Omaha, Neb., by an autonomous organization and no changes in personnel are contemplated.

U.S. Attack Shift Seen by Admiral

TOKYO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Vice Adm. Robert P. Briscoe, far east navy chief of staff, said today that the navy force might give up their all-out attempt to destroy communist air bases in North Korea as an "impossible situation."

Briscoe said "The problem of knocking out all communications in North Korea is a very difficult one. It requires an effort that probably doesn't warrant the expenditure of that amount of effort."

U.S. Seeks Joint Aid Plan for Iran

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The United States reportedly has urged Britain to join in an Anglo-American emergency aid program for Iran.

The program is aimed at averting a possible communist coup.

Secretary of State Acheson is expected to announce the program in a memorandum to British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden within a few days.

Acheson is said to have stressed the need for joint action to keep Iran's vast oil resources from falling by default into Russian hands.

American diplomats disclaim the aid to a Soviet policy, indicating the British are decidedly cool to Acheson's idea, but apparently have not rejected it flatly.

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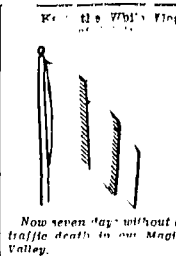

Giannini was in an oxygen tent in a critical condition for several days.

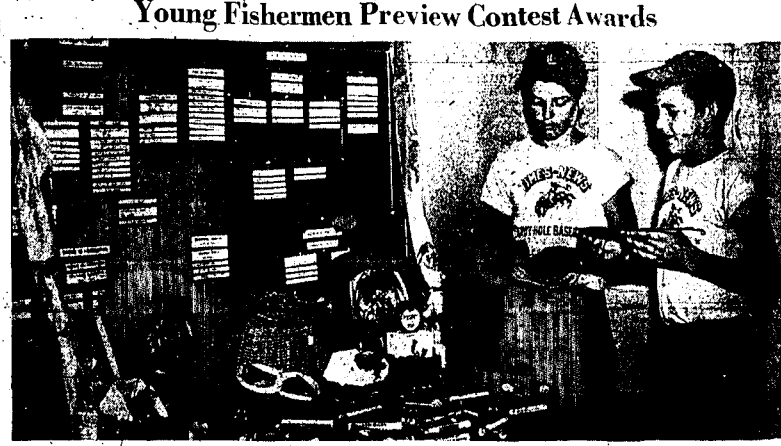
Giannini had been in a hospital since March and was admitted for treatment of a heart attack after developing a heart attack while on a business trip to New York.

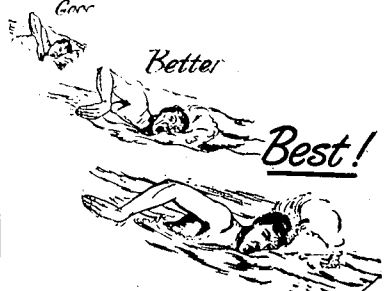

VITAL CONTRIBUTION

There are today about a half million patients in mental institutions in this country. That's one out of every 300 population.

The incidence of mental disease is about one in 20. That means one out of every 20 people in a mental disease, has had it, or will have it.

Because mental hospitals are so overcrowded, many people suffering from mental disease cannot get in. Just how many is not definitely known.

Furthermore, according to the American Psychiatric association, about 45 per cent of the patients in mental hospitals are in the old-age group—"with or without psychoses," an association of professional men explains.

His point is that too many old people are being placed in public mental institutions today because rising costs of living have made it impossible for their relatives to support them.

But there is another angle of the relationship between mental disease and economic status that is being explored in a trial-breaking study by a team of Yale university scientists working with support of a \$75,000 grant from the United States public health service.

Already the Yale team reports it has found a higher rate of deranged persons in the lower social-economic classes and more neurotics in the higher.

Also, schizophrenia, the leading mental disease, was found to occur mostly in the lower economic classes. About 40 per cent of all mental hospital patients are schizophrenics, and unfortunately for the country's welfare, the disease strikes most heavily at younger people.

While they draw few positive conclusions from their studies thus far, the scientists suggest that the large number of seriously deranged persons in the lower economic group may be because they couldn't afford to have, or continue to have, the necessary treatment, and so the diseases become progressively worse.

Most of the poorer cases studied were in state hospitals. While 60 per cent of the more well-to-do had private care.

Generally, as the economic level of the patient rose, so did the quality of the therapeutic treatment he received.

But the study has only just gotten under way, comparatively speaking. Much remains to be done in this as in other aspects of a disease which takes such a large toll of our people. The contribution of the Yale group can be an important one.

IKE'S DIPLOMATIC TACT

In disposing of the dispute between Arthur E. Summerfield, chairman of the Republican national committee, and Walter Williams who headed the citizens' committee for Eisenhower, Ike displayed the diplomatic tact for which he became noted when he commanded allied armies overseas. It is a good omen.

Despite its reorganization, the national committee is still loaded with Taft men. To have given it a subordinate or even an equal place with the amateurs and volunteers would have been regarded not only as an affront to the Ohio Senator's friends, but to the regulars' in general.

It was their reverence for their own coteries of politicians rather than on the party's ordained management body which cost Willie and Dewey grassroots support they could not afford to lose.

Moreover, Ike faced the same problem that confronts Stevenson with respect to Truman. Neither man can permit an organization or an individual to make speeches, give promises or outline prospective policy without a check on them.

In declaring that he will be the "sole boss" of his campaign, both nominees show a lively realization of this fact.

The impressive feature in Ike's performance is that he seems able to transfer to the political realm, so quickly and so easily, the compromising and conciliatory traits he showed in an altogether different field of human relations.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Although millions of Americans undoubtedly will welcome the January day when the assured prospect of the end of the Truman administration is realized, it is not clear that such a feeling on the expiration of national and international policies of grave import.

For the next few months, or until Jan. 20, 1953, the world's single solvent country and the "terminal" of world affairs for both the East and West will have to be like a ship without a captain.

For a while, the "ship" will be the Truman administration until Jan. 20, the night Joe Adlai F. Stevenson was nominated for the "ship" almost overnight. Truman is the unhappy victim of the American equivalent of the royal dog and patent "The King is dead! Long live the King!"

PERILOUS—Like General Eisenhower, FDR refused Hoover's offer to discuss depression solutions between the election and the inauguration. Roosevelt defeated Herbert Hoover in November of that year.

Coming in the depths of a depression, the shift in the actual transfer of authority, had a far-reaching effect upon the nation's affairs.

CARETAKER—Both the people and the politicians who once paid him homage seem to have forgotten that a mere political caretaker. Their interest has turned toward Governor Stevenson and General Eisenhower. Save for essential amenities and ceremonies involving the Democratic and Republican parties, the presidential possibilities lavishes any concern on the man one of them will succeed.

The President has been reborn with a week in once friendly territory. W. Stuart Symington swamped the White House favorite in the Missouri senatorial primary. Even independence delivered only a vote for Symington's opponent, and Mr. and Mrs. Truman cast two of the minority ballots.

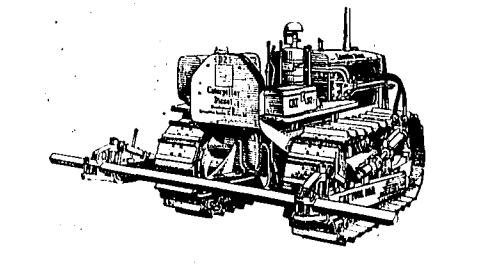
