Record of Demos Binds Stevenson, Truman Declares

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—President Truman said today that the record of the Roosevelt and Truman administrations binds Adlai E. Stevenson as President if he is elected in the coming election.

Mr. Truman told a news conference, in all the Democratic party had to run on. The President said this makes Adlai E. Stevenson a key figure in the campaign.

"I do not know anything about any mess in his administration," the President made the statement when asked if any comment on an exchange of letters between Stevenson and the Oregon Journal, Portland, in which the Democratic presidential nominee said he would do as his host did when he was in charge of the mess in the Oregon Journal.

Adlai Asserts 'Ike' Another 'Me-Too' Man

MINOCQUIA, Wis., Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Gov. Adlai Stevenson described Dwight D. Eisenhower today as a "me-too" candidate "in a sense."

He said Eisenhower, the Republican presidential nominee, had given general approval to the Eisenhower party record of the past 20 years in a speech yesterday at Boise, Idaho.

Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, charged Eisenhower with "interesting but obsolete" criticism of national health insurance proposals and the Brannan plan.

The Illinois governor commented on the Eisenhower speech at an outdoor news conference held in chilly breezes the summer home where he is taking a three-day holiday.

Reading from notes, Stevenson said:

"I am glad that the general disapproved of unnecessary expansion of the services directly performed by the federal government. I have been preaching and writing about that for a long time, most recently at the Illinois state fair last week when I was talking about health insurance and the so-called Brannan plan are interesting but obsolete. Neither is in the Brannan plan as recommended by the Democratic candidate."

Blank Drawn In Search for Lake Victims

Search parties at Pettit lake for the bodies of Dr. Valdi Penderlin and his daughter, Susan, drew another blank Wednesday but operations were continued Thursday and are expected to be continued indefinitely.

The marine spotlight which searchers had hoped would illuminate the bottom of the lake was a complete failure, Twin Falls firefighters reported Tuesday. When the rays of the light were directed at the bottom of the lake searchers drew another blank. "When the light was turned on, it reflected off the surface but nothing more, firefighters reported.

The 300-foot rope suspended between two boats was used again Wednesday and early today but, as yet, searchers said. It is the best means of search devised so far but it has produced no results. Grappling hooks are fastened to the rope approximately 18 inches apart. Use of such a long rope permits searchers to work in a wide area. Approximately 12 volunteer workers assisted at the scene of the tragedy Wednesday.

U.N. Bombers Stage 2 Raids

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—B-29 Superforts, B-26s and lighter bombers left communist factories, stockpiles and troop installations in flames today in two massive raids over northwest Korea.

Thirty-eight Okinawa-based B-29s first struck at 10:15 p.m. with 20 bombs on Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, after civilians were ordered to get out.

The air force said the big bombers dropped 400 acres of troop, supply and industrial areas and left huge fires burning at opposite ends of the city in the first formation and five in the second.

More than 100 B-26s and fighter bombers followed with a daylight bombing of a giant cement plant at Hwangju, returning pilots estimated they destroyed 63 buildings and 20 officers.

Ground actions were extremely light. Only fighting reported by the U. S. Army was on the central front southeast of Kunson.

Nine Objects Sighted in V Formations Over City

Lieut. Ree Montgomery of the Salvation Army doesn't know what he saw about 9:45 p.m. Wednesday, but there were nine of them, they were high and traveling at a terrific rate of speed.

Lieutenant Montgomery said he and Mrs. Montgomery had just left the rear door of the Salvation Army clothing store at 123 Third avenue south when something attracted his attention in the sky. He saw two V formations of luminous objects, four in the first formation and five in the second. He said the objects were not clearly defined but appeared more like the glow from a rocket or the tail pipe of a jet plane.

Lieutenant Montgomery said the objects swooped "down to about 30 feet" and then ascended to high altitude. He sighted them over the southwest part of the city.

The Salvation Army leader said he spent four years in the navy, part of the time as an airplane spotter. When asked for an estimate of the speed of the objects, he said it was "probably over 1,000 miles an hour," but explained the objects were moving so fast it would be difficult to judge their speed.

"I've always thought these reports were the result of the imagination," Lieutenant Montgomery said. "I got a cold chill looking at whatever it was."

'Ike' Pledges Full West Partnership, Flays Leftist Path

BOISE, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower says the paths to the extreme left and the far right both lead to tyranny—and that the Truman administration is traveling left.

The Republican presidential nominee set forth these views in a speech Wednesday night in Boise and then flew to Kansas City for a conference with GOP leaders from seven midwestern states.

Eisenhower's plane circled an hour and 20 minutes before landing at Maxwell airport at Kansas City, waiting for rain and gusts of wind sweeping the runways to moderate. A crowd of approximately 200 greeted him.

At Boise, Eisenhower told a police-estimated crowd of about 20,000 persons:

"Left" Philosophy

"We have had for a long time a government in power that applies the philosophy of the left to government."

And he said centralization of power in Washington has become so great that the government "does everything but come in and wash the dishes for the housewives."

The general spoke from the steps of Idaho's capitol in making what his associates had billed in advance as his first frank political speech since leaving the GOP nomination July 11.

'Ike' Backs U.S. Entry in Korea Battle

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said today this country might face much more serious trouble if it had not reacted to the 1950 communist attack on South Korea.

The Republican presidential nominee made the statement in reply to a question at an open meeting with GOP leaders from seven midwestern states.

"Terrible blunders" Eisenhower said he believes "we could point out terrible blunders" which brought on the Korean war.

But he added "I believe we would have been in greater danger if we had not reacted by meeting the communist aggression."

And then he said that if this country had not reacted it might be involved in much more serious trouble now.

Stress Points

Eisenhower's stand lined him up with President Truman who has urged going into Korea, but the general stressed he feels "terrible blunders" were made which brought on the Korean war.

The Republican presidential nominee, in a general discussion of foreign policy, also said he would be "indefensible for any member of the executive branch to go up and down the land criticizing our president."

This apparently was a reference to President Truman's 1948 campaign attack on Congress. "Back" mentioned names.

U.S. Is Firm In PW Stand

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—President Truman has assured diplomatic officials the United States will not weaken its Korean truce terms in order to gain a peace settlement before the November elections.

Authoritative sources said today that Truman privately concluded the United States would not "buy" an armistice.

Mr. Truman seized an opportunity Tuesday to give public notice of the world—and particularly to communist leaders—that this country is standing firm on the position of war since destroying the Korean truce.

In an open letter to an army colonel who had written that the United States would not force any prisoners to return to communist rule against their will, Mr. Truman said:

"I am sure you will agree that the United States will not weaken its Korean truce terms in order to gain a peace settlement before the November elections."

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Harry B. Tucker was anxious for nomination to his present office, and engaged in nomination campaigns to obtain it until he became convinced his chance was hopeless.

GENTLEMEN IN THE FOURTH ROW

SCHEME—Democratic old-timers with retentive memories liken the attempt of the Americans for Democratic Action to nominate Franklin D. Roosevelt to the proposed coup by the Hopkins-Corcoran-McLesh faction in 1932. Thus, Chicago marked the second repulse of the radicals.

It came in 1932, with Franklin D. Roosevelt's train approval. "Tommy" Corcoran, then the top brain trust, concocted the scheme. They selected Harry Hopkins as the 1932 nominee, paid for by the Roosevelt campaign. He was not elected. Hopkins was to be shifted from head of WPA to secretary of commerce so as to remove him from the "no-gooding" atmosphere, and to give him a conservative business background.

"Archie" McLesh, the poet, was to appoint the late "Cherley" Michelson as publicity director of the national office. Charles "Charlie" Quarterer, who had been Hopkins as a "lightweight." James A. Farley was to be retained as national chairman because Corcoran thought he could "control Jim."

DEFIANCE—When Farley and Vice President John Nance Garner heard of this conspiracy they set out immediately to block it, and to prevent a Roosevelt nomination, if possible, because of FDI's sympathy with the scheme. As it turned out, some things came up on the national scene at the last minute which changed a lot of people's minds. To take care of that possibility this year the pollsters are understood to be extending their polling right up to voting time.

Which is all very good and in the best scientific tradition. However, there remains a hope that it ill defined feeling that the American people will somehow forever defeat attempts to pervert down to the last decimal point.

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 21 (AP)—President Syngman Rhee began the formidable task of cleaning up war-shattered Seoul today with a promise from elated army commander, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, that Korea's capital "will never again be taken by the communist."

Van Fleet pledged that the United Nations "will stay in Seoul to resist the communist aggression. We will keep the beautiful city as it never again let it fall into enemy hands."

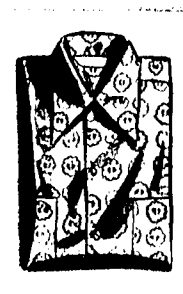

Role of Farm Prices in 1952 Presidency Bids Poses Puzzle

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—Will farm prices become a major issue on how farmers vote for President this year?

Four years ago at this time, they were a red-hot political topic. Secretary of Agriculture Brown already had taken out after the Republican-controlled 80th Congress, blaming it for a sharp decline in grain prices.

The Truman campaign has been credited with a major role in obtaining the midwestern farm support that helped President Truman win his upset victory over Dr. Thomas E. Dewey.

Indeed, as prices are concerned, the history of 1948 is being repeated to a considerable extent this year. Farm prices as a whole, as well as prices of many individual farm products, are lower now than they were at this time in 1948 and 1949.

Yet little political attention has been focused on this situation, either by Democrats or Republicans. Some political observers have predicted farmers will be more interested this fall in such issues as war and peace, taxes, government controls, and charges of corruption and communism in government, than in farm prices.

Agriculture department reports show farm prices as a whole are two per cent lower than at this time

In 1948 they knew also the prices farmers pay out for what they need are about 15 per cent higher than in 1949.

Much of the 1948 campaign was centered on Democratic charges that a Republican Congress had restricted government price support operations to such an extent that farmers were unable to take advantage of best of price support programs.

Yet this year department reports show market prices for wheat are further below the federal price support level than they were in 1948. In the summer of 1948, farmers received an average of \$1.92 a bushel for wheat or only 2 cents below the support level.

So far this summer, wheat prices have averaged around \$2, or about 20 cents below the level the department said at planting time—support this year.
