Soviet Seeks Reich Peace Treaty Meet

Previously, in the U. N. general assembly which set up a five-nation commission to study whether German-Wehrmacht free relations could be held the western powers had insisted that the record of four power agreement on Germany had not indicated Russian proposed machinery could act since the "fourth" Russia and East Germany refused to have anything to do with the "four" nations.
The Soviet proposals were contained in notes handed the three western ambassadors in Moscow by Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko late Saturday.
The Soviet note, which at length sets forth the objectives of the western power proposals, is contained in their notes of 23 to 24 and 25 and 26 by declaring that the Soviet government is prepared to discuss at a meeting of the four powers the conditions proposed by the governments of the three powers on a commission for investigation of conditions in carrying out free elections in all Germany.

Lincoln Area 'Brain Fever' Cases Mount

SHOSHONE, Aug. 23.—The outbreak of "brain fever" in horses in this area has reached 18 horses in total, Dr. R. W. Stapp, local veterinarian, reported Friday.

The first case was reported a month ago at Marley. Others developed in the next two weeks and 12 cases occurred during the past week.

Typical of the cases are the one in the Richfield area and four in North Shoshone. No case to date has been found at Blatch.

Not Confined

The cases have not been confined to one particular spot and horses miles apart have become ill with no apparent connection with preceding cases.

The disease, encephalomyelitis, is commonly known as brain fever and the horses attacked vary in behavior. Some are listless, some show distortion of the facial features and most of them stagger and their intelligence is impaired.

No Known Cure

There is no known cure, Dr. Stapp said. Prevention is by vaccine developed in the past 20 years.

There are three strains of the fever, Dr. Stapp explained, the western, eastern and St. Louis strains. The eastern and St. Louis strains are particularly virulent when human beings get the disease. The western strain, while humans may be affected with it, is not so virulent although it seems to be no deadly for horses.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

"Where has the summer gone?" is a question being put by SHOSHONE residents who contemplate the beginning of school just 14 hours away and there are signs of reluctance for the approaching confinement which comes with ringing the school bell. A lot of reasons are given why school would many who look at it from the point of Mrs. Nippy Murphy.

Mrs. Murphy retired from the teaching field last spring after having taught in the elementary school most of the time since 1913.

"After all those years," Mrs. Murphy said, "it doesn't seem possible I can't be teaching this fall but even though I have enjoyed my years as a teacher I feel the time has come for me to stop teaching."

During her first years in Shoshone she taught in the little brick room building on the north side. The late Mrs. Leah Bovey was the other teacher there. Later Mrs. Murphy taught in the building which she turned down and replaced by the present high school building.

After the fire, when classes were held in every available building in town, she taught the seventh grade in a tool shed at the North Side school grounds.

A. I. McMahon and Laura Patton, both residents of Shoshone, were fellow faculty members in that old brick building back in 1904 and 1905. They, with Mrs. Bovey, made up the faculty for grades one through nine. Instead of calling them grades in those days, though, the classes were called readers, McMahon said.

McMahon came here in 1892 and for two years acted as a teacher. Bob McMahon, in running a store, had attended a normal school in Indiana prior to coming to Shoshone and was ready to accept the teaching job when it was offered him.

Mr. Ben Darrah was a teacher in the vicinity of Shoshone prior to 1900 and there are countless other residents of the city today who have served as teachers in the schools since that time. Tracy Coker, who taught here in the early 1920's, received recognition for his novel "Edith" which is cast in the setting of Shoshone and was written while he was here.

Dr. C. W. Dill and Mrs. Frank Grosse, both still living here, were students when McMahon was teaching at the school. Mr. Dill attended the public school and said he also took private lessons from C. B. Reeves, now an attorney at Buhl.

Mrs. Grosse came to Shoshone in 1887 to attend her first year at school and she recalls the two-story brick building as something quite elegant with its fence and walk. When the bell rang, Mrs. Grosse said the students marched into the building in two straight lines and to the beat of a drum. The drum was the only musical instrument owned by the school, she said.

Top Nominees Appear Agreed On Farm Crop Price Support

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—Farmers may find little difference in the views of the two main presidential candidates on the question of price support for agricultural commodities.

Statements made by Sen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican nominee, and Gov. Arthur F. Leavenworth, the Democratic standard bearer, at news conferences Tuesday indicated their positions on this issue, when the two nations may be quite similar.

Eisenhower at Kansas City said in reply to a query that if he were elected there would be no tampering with the price support law. He said he had received no suggestions that support be lowered.

Leavenworth ruled out the controversial Bureau plan. Eisenhower and the GOP national platform had sought to tie to the Democrat.
