**A LABOR DAY THOUGHT**  
 What, it may be pertinent to ask on this Labor day, has happened to our quality of workmanship? And since it is a subject lagging in many fields, what can be done to bring it back?

Where now is the genius of the individual craftsman, who with his own hands forged and fashioned such imperishable marvels as the Kentucky rifle, the Conestoga wagon, the cutlery that cut, the houses which lived as long as the trees around them?

The answer is that a lot of things have happened, among them the industrial revolution, this technical upheaval in the art of making man's goods resulted in change away from the workman producing goods with his own hands in his own home, and toward many men working side by side in factories, fashioning their products with power machinery.

More goods could be produced cheaper the new way, and quality, however, worked into each item by a man's hands, suffered.

Something else suffered and suffers still. That is the attitude of the factory worker toward his work. That attitude—good or bad—bears directly upon the quality of the product the workman turns out.

One of the great motivating forces in a man's life should be the personal pride and the recognition of others for a job well done. Without this basic motivation, his work is going to suffer, and why not? If music were produced by a couple of dozen musicians each writing a bar, what kind of music would they have? And if a couple of dozen painters collaborated on a single picture, who would want it?

Painters and composers and the like—the old hand craftsmen was once one of them—demand and get personal recognition for the job they do. They wouldn't work without it, and we wouldn't want them to.

But the country has moved fast since the industrial revolution, and man industries have sprouted to supply the nation's giant needs, and the industries need and pay well the workers whose hands guide the power tools.

With the tremendous industrial progress has come a material standard of living unequalled in the world, and few would want to go back to anything else.

Still, we have the problem of encouraging personal initiative to the point that it makes for better individual craftsmanship, with its commensurate rewards. There is a great need for self-expression and self-recognition which more and more are being obscured in the great labor organizations.

It's a serious problem that employer and worker alike should recognize. If we don't, millions of workers will continue to go to the shop, the mill and the mine, only because it means a pay-check at the end of the week. And when that occurs, it means that for too many workers, the tendency will be to do as little as possible, short of being fired. That in turn brings pressure against the worker who appears to be better than the rest. Thus, this doing more or a better job than his fellows.

This already has happened too much. It has been encouraged by the union bosses themselves, who continually clamor for higher wages and shorter hours, with little if any emphasis on individual production or craftsmanship. The union publications are devoted almost entirely to demands, threats and recriminations against government and business generally, with a conspicuous selfishness that minimizes any thought of the individual laborer's initiative, capabilities, or his rating as a craftsman. In our workmanship, to the good with the bad, for a minimum number of hours at the highest collective scale, with little or no regard for the difference in their abilities, their pride of workmanship, or their desire to produce.

Something can be done about all this, but if it is not, we shall continue to suffer from lack of quality in our workmanship. And that is a matter of vital importance, both for the workman and his country.

### Pruett Relates Status of Skies For September

By J. HUGH PRUETT  
Astronomer, Extension Division  
Oregon Higher Education

If you have the energy to do early morning stargazing, you will be rewarded by the view of stars in the planets. An hour before sunrise Jupiter is gorgeous high in the south-west. Mercury, although less brilliant than Venus, is conspicuous as a little above the horizon somewhat near east. Just after sunrise rises late in the evening.

2 Reddish Objects  
Low and toward the southwest, the star Arcturus, Spica and Antares also belong in this class. They are distant stars, so very far away they appear small. Many are very bright and especially more brilliant than our sun.

Very high in the heavens, a little to the left of the west, we see the orange star Arcturus. This is at the lower end of a rather large, kite-shaped group of stars. To the left of this group is the distinct circle of stars outlining the northern crown. The open end of the crown is the higher part.

3 Dipper Stars  
Look at the big dipper as it seems to be sliding down the northwest, bowl first.

Almost directly overhead, blue-white Vega gleams in the harp of Orion. A little to the east of the harp, the seven stars of the Pleiades head the northern group, with runs toward the south. High in the southeast, Altair is prominent as the summer star on each side of the Form γ.

Note the five main stars of Cassiopeia high in the northeast. The stars are arranged in a rather awkward letter W.

Two hours after sunset, sooner if your position is favorable, the bright yellow Capella will be glistening brightly in the north.

### Region Parole Officer Gives Work Outline

BOHONONE, Aug. 30 — Harry Clark, Twin Falls parole and probation officer for the fourth and 11th judicial districts, spoke at the local Rotarian's meeting Wednesday noon.

He was accompanied by Mark Maden, Higby, probation officer for the sixth and ninth districts. Other guests were Fred Malix, Wendell, George Hansen, Omaha; Ken Curry, Dan MacLean, Calif., and Howard Thomas, Richfield.

**Explains Work**  
Clark told of probation work in general and gave figures to prove the need of the program in Idaho. In the four-year period from July, 1937, to June, 1938, 113 persons were placed on probation. Of that number 222 were discharged because of good conduct, 54 violated probation and two died. The percentage is 71.4 per cent making good with 18.4 per cent failing.

Parolees from the penitentiary make good in about 50 per cent of the cases, Clark said. It costs \$1.27 a day to keep a man in prison and only 40 cents a day if he is on parole, he added.

In cases of juvenile delinquency, Clark said 90 per cent of the cases result from lax parents. He said parents who set a poor example or who let their children run loose on the streets with no supervision are inviting trouble.

**Only 2 Fail**  
Of 18 persons given probation in this area, he concluded, only two have failed to make good. He concluded with a plea that persons on probation be given every chance to make good.
