NEW YORK, Sept. 1 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower angrily attacked today an alleged effort by a Kansas Demo- cratic leader to get \$100 campaign contributions from government workers under threats they would lose their jobs if the Republicans win the November elections.

"When I get sore, I'm sore," the Republican presidential nominee exploded. The threat charge was denied by Kenneth T. Anderson, Kansas Demo- cratic national commit- tee chairman, in a statement made at Emporia, Kans.

"There was no threat whatsoever," Anderson said. But he admitted letters had gone to rural letter carriers and postmen asking for Democratic campaign contributions.

President Blasts GOP Drive 'Mud-Slinging'

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN En Route to Milwaukee, Sept. 1 (AP)—President Truman, in top whistle-stop form, kicked off his first campaign tour today by accusing the Republicans of trying to win the election by "abuse" of Democrats and "mud-slinging."

"He predicted victory for Adlai Stevenson as well as party victory in Pennsylvania."

"Mr. Truman told a Pittsburgh crowd the Republicans 'can't find anything on which to stand,' and that 'their only issue is to throw mud.'"

"Mr. Truman spoke from the rear platform of the special train carrying him to Milwaukee for a major address in behalf of Ste- venson, Democratic presidential nominee."

"Just about this time of the campaign," said Truman, "the Republi- cans begin to tell the people how bad the other candidate is so that they can get in power themselves."

"The President boarded his heavy, bullet-proof private car at the Grand Central station at 9 a.m. and the presidential special started rolling two and a half hours later."

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Toll in Violent Deaths Nearing 400 for Holiday

The number of violent deaths across the nation moved toward the 400 mark today as Americans celebrated the last big summer holiday.

At least 382 persons had died violently since the start of the long Labor day week-end at 9 p.m. Friday. The dead included 24 men, 133 women and 125 children.

California reported 30 deaths on the highways. New York and Michigan each had 20, Indiana 16, Oklahoma 15, Ohio 13 and Illinois 11. Idaho had added 40 to the highway accident toll.

Valiant Swimmer Achieves His Aim

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 1—A Cuban who vowed he would rather die than fall rested today after swimming the Catalina Channel against near insurmountable odds.

Sportsmen praised the stamina of Jose Cortinas in completing the 21-mile crossing despite unusually powerful currents, a severe leg cramp, the threat of sharks and other trouble that separated his pilot boat from him for several hours.

Cortinas, 35, was in the water 28 hours and 55 minutes before he bobbed onto rocks at Point Fermin yesterday at 10:05 p. m. P.D.T. It took him longer to swim the channel than any of the eight persons who previously accomplished the feat. Sportsmen estimated the powerful currents and waves forced him to swim 35 to 40 miles instead of the 21-mile direct route.

Afghanistan Freedom More Than U.S., Vice Consul Says

BURLEY, Sept. 1—America is not the most free nation in the world, it's Afghanistan.

That's the opinion of one man, an American, a career diplomat in the consular service now on a two-month leave of absence from his post in the American embassy at Wellington, New Zealand. He is David B. Wharton, vice consul in the American diplomatic service. With his wife and two children he is visiting Mr. and Mrs. Herman King in Burley. Mrs. King and Mrs. Wharton are sisters.

Wharton, who has served the United States in Afghanistan, says that while the people of that nation do not have as many conveniences and luxuries as the American people, they have a greater freedom. The government of Afghanistan is an absolute monarchy, but the rule of tribes prevails.

"In an elective tribal system," he explained, "the individual cannot be controlled by the government. The social system in Afghanistan does not require government regulation and control."

Wharton laughs as some of the disagreeable living conditions he and his family experienced in Afghanistan. He said the people there are hospitable and "mentally friendly."

He would rather talk about the 25-year front he caught in New Zealand, though, than he would about his work. And he'd rather enlarge upon his culinary artistry than he would upon living conditions in Afghanistan or any other country. He claims the peak of his ability is reached in his "Goop," a concoction that brags of chicken as a base.

The career diplomat was assigned to New Zealand two years ago. On the end of his vacation he and his family will return to Wellington. He said living conditions there are comparable to those in the United States in 1910 and an automobile is a sign of luxury.

New Zealand, he said, is ahead of the United States in the matter of education. He said schools emphasize

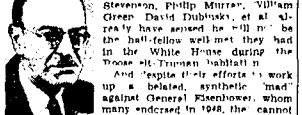

New Round in Old Tideland Fight Is Seen

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The new congress in January will face another round in the long dispute over whether the federal government of the states own the "tidelands" off the coast.

Congress has been debating the issue off and on for 15 years. Twice it acted to settle the question by passing legislation. In 1946 and again last spring, granting title to the states. But President Truman vetoed both measures.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D., La., announced this week he will make a third try next year to pass a state-ownership bill that will settle the issue.

Discovery of oil under the water off the Gulf and west coast led to the argument over ownership of the submerged oil-rich lands.

Started in 1927, the first issue came before congress in 1937 but was shoved into the background by the outbreak of World War II. In 1945, the government stepped in with a suit claiming federal jurisdiction over the submerged coastal lands off California. The supreme court in 1947 held the federal government had "paramount right" and in 1950 issued similar opinions regarding the coastal lands off Louisiana and Texas.

Texas had claimed that because it was an independent republic when it joined the union it was entitled to keep control over submerged lands three marine leagues (12 miles) off its coast. It argued that the Texas annexation agreement recognized this claim. But the supreme court held Texas relinquished the claim when it transferred its sovereignty over external affairs to the U. S.

Term Wrong Actually, "tidelands" is a common misnomer for the disputed territory, which extends from the low-tide mark to the three-mile limit off California and Louisiana and 10 1/2 miles off Texas and the west coast of Florida. The real tidelands lie between high- and low-tide marks, generally regarded as within state boundaries. Because of the controversy over federal vs. state ownership, the submerged lands are producing only a fraction of the oil they are believed to contain. Royalties from wells that started operating under state laws before the supreme court rulings go into a special fund for disposition later when the ownership issue is settled. However, the dispute has delayed further exploration and development of the underwater oil fields.

Two Officers Finish Class

Col. Kenneth A. Keever and Maj. H. Lloyd Young, both of Twin Falls, have completed a two-week course of command and general staff instruction at Vancouver barracks, Wash.

The classes are part of a year-around ORG school program for reserve officers. The training is designed to prepare officers for staff and command positions. Instruction was given by the same officers who conduct the command and general staff branches of ORG schools in various cities of the sixth army area.

The course included classes in principles of war, fundamentals of combat, nature of the situation and infantry division in combat. The instruction followed lesson plans, complete with maps and instructional material, prepared by the army's command and general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth. Inspectors were by regular army officers who have served as instructors at that school, and examination papers written by the students were forwarded to that school for grading.

The two-week course is part of a three-year course which will continue with night classes in local ORG and similar two-week schools each summer.
