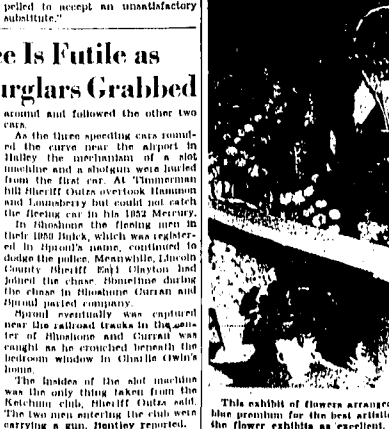

### Newest Type Winter Gear Still Checked

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—The army's new winter uniform is still being checked for comfort. The new uniform will be issued to troops in Korea through a few more tests. The wet-sold uniform issued last winter was a considerable improvement over clothing worn during the first winter of the Korean war, when troops suffered intensely from the bitter cold.

The wet-sold uniform, designed for temperatures as low as 14 degrees Fahrenheit, fits loosely to trap layers of warm air. It includes a parka, a flannel shirt, wool trousers with an additional liner, and a jacket lined with double-faced "frene cloth" for insulation.

Frontline army troops in Korea soon will get 25,000 armored vests of the new type. The army also plans to issue some of its own type of laminated nylon body armor, still in the experimental stage.

The quartermaster corps is working on a new type of plastic and aluminum helmet but it will not be issued in Korea this winter.

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### Nine Mothers Start "Strike"

COEUR D'ALENE, Sept. 4 (AP)—Angered by a school reorganization plan, nine mothers in this area have announced that they are "on strike" and will keep their children home from school.

The mothers have 12 children who went to the St. Maries school in Benewah county last year. The reorganization plan would place the children in the Harrison school in Kootenai county this fall.

The mothers kept their children home when classes began Tuesday and sent a statement to school officials. They said the reorganization takes their children from class A facilities to class B and they don't think it's right.

Copies of the signed statement were sent to the county school superintendent and to Gov. Len Jordan.

There was no immediate comment from school authorities.

### Increase in Arms Flow Is Reported

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steelman reported today the dollar value of deliveries of military goods for the defense program reached a new peak in July.

In his monthly report to President Truman, Steelman said deliveries hit two billion dollars a month in June and "rose slightly" higher in July. Steelman said increases in the following month will be slower, "due partly to the steel strike." He said, however, steel companies rapidly will fill a "large part" of their pre-strike backlog of military, atomic energy and machine tool orders by Sept. 30.

Most of Steelman's report was secret, but parts were made public.

### Parley Recessed In Plane Dispute

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—Negotiations between the Lockheed Aircraft corporation and the AFL unionists were recessed early today. The federal mediation service announced talks will be resumed again in California.

The recess came after the mediation service had both sides in almost continuous conference since last Wednesday in an attempt to avert a strike at Lockheed's Burbank plant.

A mediation service spokesman said both sides had agreed that negotiations would be resumed in Burbank as soon as the union and management representatives could return to California.

### Wheat Is Stored On Ground Near Hansen Elevator

HANSEN, Sept. 4—Nearly 145,000 bushels of wheat had to be stored in a vacant lot next to the Hansen elevator this week when the elevator became plugged with wheat. The pile is more than 500 feet around at the base and a fence is being erected to confine it to its present bounds.

This is the first time wheat has been stored outside at Hansen since before the present elevator was built.

The wheat came from the Hansen area, the new pump land area south and east to the foothills and from the Murtaugh area.

### Big Increase for Air Travel Seen

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—Passenger traffic on U. S. airlines will increase 14 to 57 per cent during the next two years, according to an official of the civil aeronautics board.

The prediction was made at the opening yesterday of a lengthy CAB investigation in which non-scheduled airlines are fighting for their lives against scheduled lines which contend "non-skeeds" do more harm than good.

E. Bruce Miller, statistician in the board's bureau of operations, said he could not forecast how the increased passenger traffic would be split among the two types of airlines.

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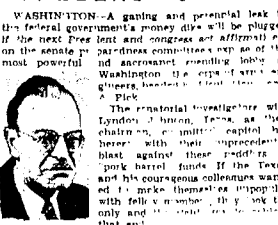
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## TRUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG



**WASHINGTON**—A gaming and potential lock in the federal government's money may be plucked if the next President and Congress act differently. The most powerful and successful gambling lobby at Washington is a group of men who are known as the "Pickers".

The practical investigator with London's bureau, James, is "the best" of the "pickers" who have succeeded in their efforts to get a "pick" law passed in the last Congress. It is a law that will make it possible for a man to "pick" a horse, a dog, or a race track.

At the same time we happily are free to point out that we think he is wrong, lead wrong. And by "we" I mean all the Republicans, nearly all the Democrats and all the persons who have finally declared that a mess does exist in Washington.

Furthermore, newspaper readers and the radio and television audience—lacking the psychic compulsion to forget certain things—recall all too vividly the big Washington stories about corruption, graft, bribery, infidelity and peddling.

There is just one more point to take up here and that is that maybe President Truman doesn't know what the word "mess" means. You find people sometimes who go through life with an imperfect understanding of a fairly common word.

Like, for instance, you'll sometimes find a fellow who thinks a tycoon is one of those big storms out around the South Pacific, that a typhoon is a big, fat, captain of industry, that a tycoon is something you jab into whales, and a tycoon is a jokester.

Webster's New International dictionary, a fat, authoritative tome weighing as much as a bucket of rocks, has a whole list of meanings for the word "mess".

Most of them have to do with meals, particularly as applied to the mess seamen eat. That's not the meaning we have in mind. Mr. President, meaning Number 2 says mess can mean the milk given by a cow at one milking. Not that one, either Mr. President. Nobody's sore about the milk some cow gave down in Washington.

Meaning Number 3 says mess can mean the food given to a beast at one time. Nobody's begrudging a horse his hay.

But with meaning Number 4 we begin to get some place. In fact, we arrive.

Meaning Number 4 says mess can mean, "A confused, inharmonious, or disagreeable mixture of things; a medley; a hodgepodge; hence, a situation resulting from blundering or from misunderstanding; a state of confusion, embarrassment, or the like; a muddle; a hodge".

That's what we mean by mess, Mr. President. All those things.

And now that we understand each other, we hope, what's going to be done between now and Nov. 4 about cleaning up that mess—M-E-S-S, that is?

**MEDALS FOR MOTORISTS**

Somewhere recently we read about a small airplane darting down out of the sky to spot a particular motorist driving down the highway. At the next town the motorist was stopped by the police. The driver's apprehension changed to bewildered astonishment when the cops handed a medal on him. It was for careful driving.

The plane was one used by the state police to patrol the highways. After watching the motorist in question drive along for several miles, obeying all the rules and driving in a mannerly way, the plane police radioed to the headquarters in the next town that this guy deserved a medal.

They've been doing it for some time, now, and the results are reported fine.

That sort of psychology seems to be one successful antidote to our dangerous lack of driving manners—the attitude that the smart guy is the one who breaks the rules and gets away with it.

And that goes back to the fact that somewhere along the line we've acquired a whole lot of false values regarding our conduct while in the driver's seat.

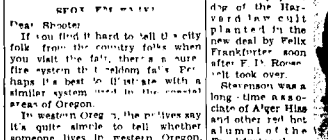
Everyone knows too well the kind of person who is as gentle and considerate as he can be until he gets behind the wheel of his car. Then something comes over him. His jaws clench, his eyes narrow, his hands grip the wheel and the knuckles are white. And we bet the driver who causes his own plight, beside the driver who causes his own, will be an ordinary good mannered completely decent fellow as he darts duncerously through holes in the traffic line, forces other cars out of their paths, blows his horn, and in general becomes a 160-horsepower bully.

It would probably be overstimulating to say this too-general falling is all the result of trying to compensate for a feeling of social inadequacy. That may be part of it, but there seems to be more.

Somewhere we've gotten so distracted thinking that traffic laws are something it's smart to beat—like betting on the horses and winning, or not paying our family tax.

Use that attitude which might be changed if we hope to live a little of the more than 30,000 lives which are lost in traffic accidents each year. Just saying "don't" isn't enough. "That already has been proved."

### White House Asks Airport Safety Work

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—The White House has ordered incident on a long range of safety work against air disasters and the shutting of passenger and nearby airports.

White House announcement has directed four federal agencies to begin putting into effect the recommendations of a commission headed by James H. Doolittle, World War II pilot, who led the fact-finding team in 1948.

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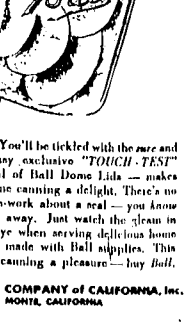

### Power Claims Are Spiraling

**GENE, Sept. 4 (AP)**—The Pacific West could use two and one-half times as much power as it does at present, Paul J. Flaver, Pacific administrator, said today.

Flaver would bring up by industrial concerns and homes this year's average of about 10 million kilowatts to 15 million. Flaver told a meeting of the Bonneville power council, the power supply, under the most favorable conditions, is expected to reach no more than 3,000,000 average kilowatts by 1955.

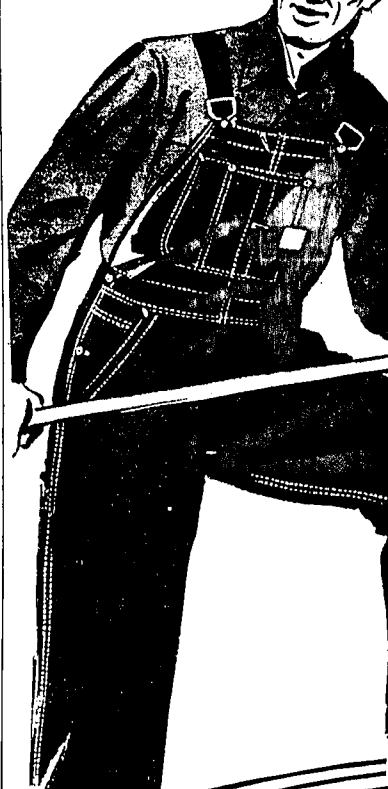

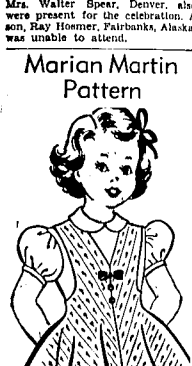
Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI The car is part of the home and it is plain that, because it is so, the parents must learn how to care for it. They must learn how to care for it, they must understand how it is built, how it functions, and that means a course in high school. Our civilization is moving ahead on machines, speedier and speedier machines, and young people must learn all they can about them because in time they will have to use them. To neglect their education in this field is to handicap them later when they have to live and work with motors, intricate gadgets that have become commonplace, intricate and delicate machines that do the work of the active world. Every adolescent boy and girl needs, and should have, instruction in mechanics, electricity, auto energy as applied to useful ends. Every healthy boy and girl long for the day when he can sit behind the wheel of a car or a plane and ride to where he wants to go. There is a tremendous thrill of power in that position, guiding a great machine along the highway or through the sky, and when it is at last granted the young man or woman, what strength is added to their spirits. Then, too, the safety of the people going about their daily concerns must be safeguarded. No young person should be granted a license to drive until he has a certificate of efficiency from high school or other authorized source. A driver takes over the responsibility of life and death for those he drives and for all about him on the road, and in cars and that responsibility must not be taken lightly. To allow anybody old or young, a driver a car without proper training and experience is to endanger the lives of helpless people, helpless because they cannot protect themselves against an ignorant, irresponsible driver. One thing is more, perhaps most important. Nobody who drinks an intoxicant or uses a narcotic drug should drive a car and, should he do so, his right to drive should be taken from him. The accident roll is too long. We must do something about a situation that destroys thousands of our people yearly. The best way is to teach safety, based on thorough knowledge of the machine and on a keen regard for the life and limbs of other people. Some children are sensitive and afraid. Fear is poison to the mind and children who fear cars suffer. How to overcome fear is explained by Dr. Fairs in his book, 'To Obtain a Car, and 16 cents in cash to him.' (The Times-News, P. O. 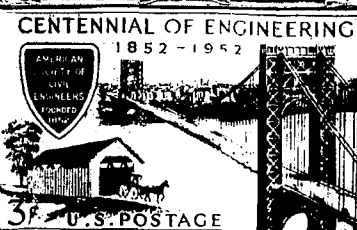

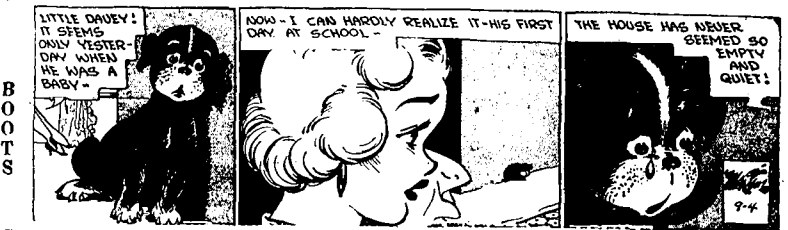
