# English Jet's Explosion Is Fatal for 27

BARNBOROUGH, England, Sept. 6 (AP)—Britain's spectacular new jet fighter, the De Havilland 110, blew up in a high-speed flight over an airfield swarming with more than 600 spectators today and killed 27 persons.

More than 600 spectators were officially listed as injured. John Derry, 30, Britain's ace test pilot, and his observer, John Richards, died in the flaming wreckage of the twin-engine all-weather craft and 25 spectators were killed by falling debris. Among the thousands who watched horror was Derry's young wife, who had been waiting nearby at the pilots' tent of the borough air show.

The jet was made by four years ago. Derry made it by becoming the first Briton to exceed the speed of sound in a 12-mile-a-minute dash to tell about it.

First Flight in 1948

Derry made his 1948 supersonic dash in a De Havilland 110. That version of the De Havilland 110, which is called the "boom" at the factory, was built by Geoffrey de Havilland in a blow-up like Saturday's jet.

Barnborough police station flooded with inquiries for misseers after today's disaster. The investigation is being handled by the Barnborough hospital and a police car had to race miles through crowded roads to get fresh supplies.

Probe Stated

# T. F. County's Fair Closes With Totals of 26,000 in 4 Days

FILER, Sept. 6.—The Twin Falls county fair closed its doors Saturday night on one of its most successful, if not the most successful, seasons in its long history. When the final tally was made at a late hour Saturday there had been nearly 26,000 paid admissions for the four days of the exposition. The 26,921 attendance was the greatest on record although there were two years in the history of the fair when no admissions were charged and when no attendance records were kept.

The final day of the fair was the smallest of the four days but even it was greater in attendance than the last day in 1951, officials said. There were 3,191 paid admissions on Saturday, 7,880 on Friday, 10,225 on Thursday and 5,525 on Wednesday. These figures do not include the hundreds of persons who were admitted free for one reason or another nor do they include those persons "who slipped under the fence."

The official tabulation should not be taken as a record for the East End or the West End, pulled the largest crowd. Normally the West End day has greater attendance than the East End day but the trend was reversed this year by nearly 3,000. Early in the season Thursday appeared to be a favorite with fairgoers. Demand for reserve seats at the Thursday rodeo was greater than for any other day.

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

When a mother says "my son," with the accent on the *my*, there is danger to her happiness in her attitude. Nobody, no mother, no father, nobody, can say with truth "my" in relation to any human being. To do so with conviction of righteousness is to ask for trouble, which will not be slow about arriving.

A child is dependent upon his mother and father for some years but, as physical dependence lessens, spiritual association should begin to take over. That relationship between parent and child is the only one worth while, because it is the only one that holds down the youngster. The "my" implies domination and no human being of sound mind accepts that from anybody. Few children ever do. When they dare not rebel openly, they bide their time and, when opportunity offers, break loose to remain aloof forever after. That makes for bitterness and grief, for there can be no communication between parent and child with that feeling blocking the way.

No other cause has made so much trouble with the in-laws. The grudging parent who says "my son," "my daughter," arouses the antagonism of the opposing parents and, after that, the cut-throat hostility between the two families.

When the grandchildren come the underlying antagonism rises to the surface. Grandparents have to live again in these children; they

often try hard to do so to the distress of the young parents and to the anger of the other set of in-laws, who may have the same possessive feeling.

Parents must understand and accept the hard fact that, from the day a child is born, he is going away from home and family. He must, or fall as a human being. Human infancy lasts a long time, about twenty years or so. But that is a preparation time. Life is calling to the child to grow up, strike out for himself, follow the pattern set in him from the beginning that makes him an unique personality, nobody's property. He must obey that call or fall as a human being.

The father and mother who accept this, and make friends of the son and daughter, will never lose them. The parent who understands that maturity comes by degrees and stands ready to meet each forward step with one of his own, so that when the child emerges as a man, a woman, he is in step with the best friend he will ever know, will never find himself lonely in his old age.

In rearing children, parents dwell always in the future, if they will.

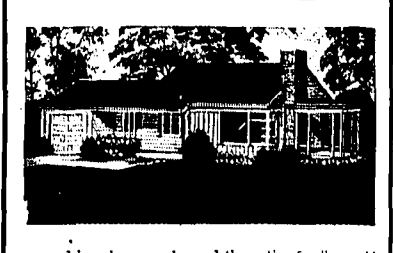

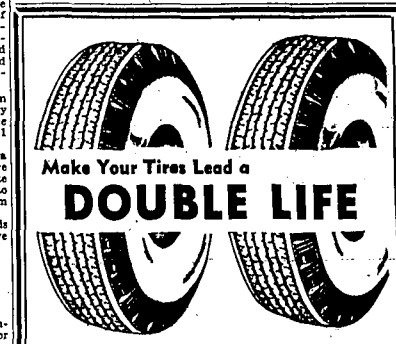

### Work Scheduled Next Week On Little Wood Dam Addition

CAREY, Sept. 6.—Work is to begin by Wednesday on the Little Wood river dam, announced Mrs. Beeste Stanford, Little Wood River Irrigation district secretary, Thursday.

Bids were opened by the board earlier this week and contract was given to Uhrig Brothers Construction company, Halley.

Amount of the contract and the two bids received was not announced by the board. The Uhrig firm was given the contract because its equipment is immediately available for the work, a board member explained.

The work will save the district about \$60,000 over the originally planned cost of completion of the spillway and will meet bureau of reclamation specifications, officials said.

Meeting with the directors were Raymond J. Briggs, Boise consulting engineer, and C. E. Fix of Parry, Keenan, Robertson and Daly law firm, Twin Falls, legal advisers of the district.

The contract designates the com-

pletion of the spillway on the Little Wood River dam within 30 days. An additional two feet will be added on the spillway, with 24-inch permanent flashings. This will provide storage of an additional 888 acre feet of water in the dam.

When the dam was built in 1941 by FWA the spillway was not completed. Temporary work by the irrigation district was not according to bureau specifications. As a result the bureau would not issue the district a license.

Work also contemplated by the district, but not included in the contract, is construction of a gauge-house and meter measuring device along the river channel just below the dam. Through installation of this measuring-device housing a

more accurate check of storage can be made. A resident engineer will be sent to the dam by Briggs. He will remain at the dam during construction to check and supervise all work.

A few days ago I overheard a remark which set me thinking. I heard someone ask, "Do you have good schools here?" The reply was "Yes" and we are now building a new high school. That reply reveals a very common and serious mistake. What is the mistake? It is the assumption that fine buildings near fine schools. This is definitely not true. Fine buildings help but they are not by any means the most important factor in good education.



The most important factor in good education is the teacher. The personality, character, education and ability of the man or woman who meets your child in the school room five days a week holds the key to his future and to the future of our country. Competent school administration is important, the best textbooks, curricula and activities are important, too. But the key factor is the teacher.

It is no secret that able public school teachers are hard to find. It is no secret that the scarcity is largely our own fault. In the field
