WASHINGTON—Great Britain is approaching such a state of economic collapse that a vast new program of American aid will be required soon to bolster our principal European ally, says a leading British expert.

The expert, who is a member of the British War Cabinet, is believed to have written the report of a presidential commission which is now being set up to study the situation in Europe.

At a time when the British government is still in the midst of the "blitz," the expert's report is believed to be the most realistic and most valuable that has been made to date.

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Naguib Makes Drastic Shifts In Egypt Life

CAIRO, Egypt, Sept. 8 (AP)—Premier Gen. Mohammed Naguib's new cabinet dissolved all political parties today and ordered the army to surrender all their land in excess of 200 acres for redistribution to the rest of the population.

The two historical decrees at the stroke altered the whole face of Egypt's political and economic life. They were designed to wipe out political corruption and end the feudal economic system that has kept millions of Egyptians in a state of penury for centuries.

First Step

Naguib described the land reform law as the "first step toward re-building the political, economic and social structure."

The decrees were announced by the cabinet at the end of a two-hour nine-hour meeting and came less than 48 hours after strongman Naguib already had taken control of the army, assumed the premiership.

They will become law when signed by the three-member infant council in the name of infant King Ahmed Fouad.

Named Governor

To see that the new laws are carried out, the cabinet named Naguib military governor-general of Egypt with all the powers formerly held by the king. He will be assisted by a British military officer named Sir John.

Naguib thus became undisputed ruler of Egypt with powers exceeding even those of the late Farouk, whom he forced off the throne and into exile last July 28. The three-member council signed the law in the name of Farouk, who was handed-picked by Naguib.

FRIENDSHIP FOR U. S.

CAIRO, Egypt, Sept. 8 (AP)—Premier Gen. Mohammed Naguib, Egypt's new strong man, said today his country's policy toward America is one of friendship and understanding.

He said the possibility of seeking stepped-up American point four aid will be studied soon.

Red China Seeks Trial for Boatner

MUNSAN, Korea, Sept. 8 (AP)—Red China demanded today that an international tribunal try Maj. Gen. Hayden L. Boatner, who broke last year's Communist prison mutiny on Koje island, as a war criminal.

The Chinese government radio at Peking announced that the commander of the Koje camps for Communist war prisoners as a "notorious traitor" who had "betrayed the trust of the United States."

It said Boatner "admitted" in San Antonio, Tex., that the Americans are treating Korean and Chinese prisoners with "inhumanity."

Peiping quoted "this monstrous American" as saying he used "red baiting" to get prisoners to say he was responsible for "massacres" on Koje.

Testimony Given On Ship Sinking

JUNEAU, Alaska, Sept. 8 (AP)—Preliminary testimony was taken here yesterday afternoon into the grounding and sinking of the 17th coast guard cutter, said further information probably will be developed at a hearing at Ketchikan or Seattle and turned over to Canadian officials.

He said the Canadian government undoubtedly would investigate the accident in which 27 passengers and 84 crewmen were evacuated safely when the vessel plowed into the rocks north of Juneau.

Oil Charges Data Provided by MSA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—The mutual security agency announced today it has turned over to the justice department data involving possible overcharges on oil purchased by the government from three American firms for distribution to Marshall plan countries.

The three firms are the Gulf Corporation, the Humble Oil & Refining company, and the Atlantic Refining company. MSA said the sales under study involved oil shipments from Kuwait, a British protectorate on the Persian gulf, to western European nations.

MSA said the bulk of the oil was supplied by Gulf and the other two firms handled smaller shipments.
