WAGONER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The nation's leading politicians and pollsters are more puzzled by various freakish and unaccountable aspects of the 1952 Presidential election than they have been in any other Presidential campaign because their general "expectation" that Governor Dewey would win has been completely shattered.

The Democratic strategists are so surprised that they are beginning to look for a "pull" in the lead, and they have to have it to maintain it.

He has displayed a better presence and drive than his opponent. He has shown an ability to relate to the masses in a way that has surprised the political establishment.

WORST MONTHS COMING UP

While it's encouraging to note that traffic fatalities in Magic Valley so far this year total 25 as compared with 31 deaths in automobile accidents during the same period in 1951, that is no reason for us to be over confident that the end of the year will show any reduction in the total number of lives lost.

We must bear in mind that automobile accidents have not reached their peak for the year once the much publicized labor day week-end traffic toll is past.

Last year, Sept. 30 was observed as Traffic Memorial day in various communities from coast to coast for two main reasons. One reason was to correct the erroneous impression that automobile accidents reach their peak in labor day and decline throughout the remainder of the year.

The other reason was to make the public realize that the most tragic months on our highways, in fact, are always October, November and December. In these three months last year, automobile accidents claimed the appalling, almost incredible, toll of 10,910 killed and approximately a half million injured in the United States.

So, instead of taking for granted that present fatality statistics in Magic Valley point to an actual total reduction in lives lost at the year's end, let's bear in mind that we are now entering the most hazardous time of the year for highway fatalities.

The Automobile Safety association recommends that Traffic Memorial day in 1952 be observed by press, radio and television, as well as in the pulpit, school room and at public gatherings. States, cities and towns are asked to call for 30 seconds of silence and prayer at midday and everyone is exhorted to do his or her share in bringing the national tragedy of automobile accidents under control.

The association further recommends that special consideration be given to the need to make the automobile itself safer to operate. If any other man-made machine—the electric or gas stove used in kitchens throughout our country, for instance—were involved in accidents killing tens of thousands and injuring approximately two million persons a year, the association reasons, surely everyone would insist that the machine be made safer to operate.

But whether the people of Magic Valley do anything about observing Traffic Memorial day or supporting various other recommendations for greater traffic safety, there is one thing they should keep in mind. Every last one of us, all up and down the line, must redouble our efforts between now and the end of the year, if we are going to show any appreciable reduction in the number of lives lost on our highways.

That's a responsibility we all should fulfill without fail.

VACILLATING DISAGREEMENT

England's Sir Olaf Caroe, whose opinion should carry some weight, says the western world's big trouble in its difficult dealings with the middle east today is that we don't have a man with "the touch of vision to stir a response in the minds of the Moslems."

Caroe is one of the world's outstanding specialists on the middle east, for years a foreign secretary of the former British empire of India, and one of the chief creators of the new state of Pakistan.

Caroe readily points out that the west has given the middle east much in the last 30 years—aid to some countries in emerging from medieval domination, helping them get started on the road to nationhood and independence, building some of the world's irrigation works and highways, making some of their rulers rich from oil royalties.

Americans can add to that our Point Four aid on a pretty impressive scale.

What else do they want? Why all the present scolding and unrest? Why do many of these countries still bitterly dislike westerners?

Caroe's answer is that we are giving them everything but ideas and leadership.

His idea of leadership is that the west should speak with a firm and single voice, instead of with many voices often vacillating and in disagreement. This, he says, is necessary to give the peoples of the middle east assurance that the west will stand up to support them in event of a showdown with Russia.

YOU FIGURE IT OUT

One of the facts of life and nature that upsets weather scientists in trying to account for the occurrence of droughts and wet spells is that they will hit one area and miss another.

In 1934, for instance, in the worst year of the great plains that low drought, Washington, Virginia had a 12 per cent deficiency in rainfall, while Virginia was 10 per cent over average. And for the whole 1930-39 period, Washington, New Mexico, Florida and New England had the four corners of the U. S.—had excess rainfall while the rest of the U. S. was deficient.

"To believers in the theory that upsets come droughts, the question is asked, 'How could a handful of million miles away, flow out any one of these areas for special treatment?'"

POE SHOES



A very important and sinister political mystery is concealed in the murky activities of the Poe Foundation, headed by Paul Hoffman and Robert M. Although Dickey and Benton were together in the state department, Dickey's appointment to the Dartmouth job is attributed to the influence of Nelson Rockefeller and the money-power of the Rockefeller foundation, headed by his son-in-law, John D. Rockefeller 3rd, who took over the cult and a Dartmouth alum.

There will be further discussions which attempt to disclose the facts of this ominous unnatural political distortion carried on by a few men of towering ambition, but highly questionable ethics and motives, with great money power behind them.

A GIFT FOR THE TIMES

Ours is the Century of the Homeless Man. It has been a million dollars since the Homeless Man's affairs to the World Council of Churches. His life became the deep tragedy of this era—no relief can be more than a man to have no place to call his home.

Miller started the saving of people's souls in their native lands and countries. He headed national, international and local committees and out to the death camps. The Hungarians fled and the explosion of the atom and the war and increased the tempo of expulsions, instead of diminishing it.

Today there are 10 million people in West Germany who were expelled from the Sudetenland, Poland, East Prussia and other provinces beyond the Iron Curtain.

There are 5 million homeless Moslems in India and 5 million homeless Hindus in Pakistan. There are 2 million Chinese exiles on Formosa. There are the Japanese pushed out of the far eastern territories and the Chinese driven out of Manchuria and out of Szechwan by the Yankings. There are the Arabians forced out of Palestine by the Israeli war.

The problems created by these millions of homeless, homeless people are among the most important that our government authorities must face in this country. The refugees create social and economic pressures which are not being met by the government.

The money will help the U. S. study the needs of resettlement, social acclimation and of training some among the refugees for a new start in new countries. It will help to pay for the cost of resettlement and to offset the financial which will disquiet you as you look on the faces of the homeless and the displaced.

Extension for Levy Inquiry Is Demanded

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Rep. William P. Gray today demanded that a new Judiciary subcommittee investigate the justice department's conduct of the inquiry into the "Cruz" case.

The group's ranking GOP member, who sponsored the investigation, said the subcommittee has such a "big job" ahead that it must "stay on the job" well into October.

"I'm convinced that it is, he said, 'not certain any one going to shake my faith in it' is important that we do not allow any artificial delay to be introduced."

Chairman Frank L. Chaff, D-Mo., was not available for comment. But he has said in the past that the investigation is a "target date" was fixed in October.

Chaff said the investigation has "no loss ends" at that time, he favors referring it after the November elections.

The subcommittee, deep in a study of the justice department's handling of tax cases and last year's chief tax frauds program, may add the Cruz case to its agenda.

Chinese Red Soldier Smashes Blockade to Escape to Allies

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Sept. 12 (AP)—A Chinese soldier smashed through a Communist roadblock at the northern end of the Panmunjom neutral zone in a 2 1/2-ton truck last night and escaped to allied forces.

The soldier from Red China's "volunteer" army in Korea, clutching a burp gun in one hand, raced through the middle of the truce village in a Russian-built truck.

An American soldier at the southern end of the neutral zone, Pfc. Roy L. Thompson, St. Louis, Mo., saw the Chinese was going to smash through the barrier.

The Chinese surrendered to U. S. marines manning a roadblock farther south in the truce village.

It was the second time in a week a Communist had surrendered to the U. S. N. from the neutral zone. Last Friday, a security officer assigned to the truce village surrendered to U. S. guards just outside the circle.

Several months ago, two North Korean soldiers surrendered by running down the road from the conference area to the safety of U. S. marine outposts.

Texas Rivers Subside After Rainfall Ends

NEW BRUNSWICK, Tex., Sept. 12 (AP)—A half-day's heavy stream slowly subsided today after pouring rain ended over their banks and killed two people and did millions of dollars of damage.

Only four days ago, the same area was pouring under a multi-million dollar drought. It rained for three days last week.

Rolling hills, creek and the Granddewey, Connel Swan, Maroon and Pecos rivers were dropped after receiving a good breaking rain and flooding about 15,000 acres.

Rain poured wide area of Texas from the "hot spot" inland in the north west. It was measured in one place in the central Texas at an up to 2.9 inches in 24 hours at one spot today.

Corso and Victoria, Tex., still were in the path of the torrential waters, but an extensive chain of large dams on the Big Colorado river, into which most of the flooded rivers and streams flow, began absorbing the flood as the crest passed seaward.

Operation Slated On Siamese Pair

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 (AP)—Surgery will attempt to separate baby Siamese twins joined at the crowns of their skulls, in an operation this fall, the American Medical Association disclosed today.

The AMA yesterday issued the first official medical report on the Brody Siamese twins of Rock Island, Ill. The report was prepared by Dr. Samuel P. Durr, Rock Island, the physician who attended the twins' birth.

At the same time the AMA disclosed that the University of Illinois research and educational hospitals in Chicago will conduct a surgical attempt to separate the twins "during this fall."

Russians End Travel Block

BERLIN, Sept. 12 (AP)—Soviet Gen. Vasily Chulikov has called off a blockade against movement of U. S. military police patrols over a strip of Soviet zone highway between West Berlin and an American checkpoint on its outskirts.

The chief of the Soviet control commission, to whom U. S. High Commissioner Walter J. Donovan appealed Wednesday, notified American authorities officially that the three-day-old restriction had been lifted by his order.

Decrease in U.S. Cash Circulation Noted by Report

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Money in circulation decreased 27 million dollars during the week ended Sept. 10, the federal reserve board reported Thursday.

The text of the board's statement: "During the week ended Sept. 10, member banks increased deposits by 580 million dollars. The principal changes supplying reserves were an increase of 50 million dollars in reserve bank credit and decreases of 368 millions in treasury deposits and 14th federal reserve bonds held by member banks."

The increase of 58 million dollars in reserve bank credit resulted from increases of 68 million in float and 47 million in U. S. government securities, and a decrease of 69 million in loans, discounts, and advances and holdings of U. S. government securities reflected an increase of 75 million dollars in bills and a decrease of 28 million in certificates.
