Ketchum Lots To Be Sold at Monday Sale

HAILEY, Sept. 12.—Plans have been completed here for the public auction of 140 Ketchum lots at 10 a.m. Monday at the courthouse.

The lots were ordered sold at auction by the bureau of land management when patents were not filed by the deadline date, last July 1.

Originally 812 lots were included in the Ketchum townsite, but many were not patented. On Jan. 12, 1940, the bureau ruled that preferential rights could be filed by claimants and gave them three years to prove their claims.

Few took advantage of that ruling, however, and 322 lots still remained in the public domain on July 27, 1946. The bureau then extended the deadline for claims for five years and since then all but 140 lots have been claimed.

About 80 of the lots have builders on them, Blaine County Assessor Floyd W. Wilson reports, and have had taxes paid on them. But no claims were filed by the July 1 deadline, he added.

He said the lots are appraised at \$36 each for 44, \$60 each for 69, and \$100 for one lot.

The bureau's regional administrator, or his designated agent, will conduct the sale.

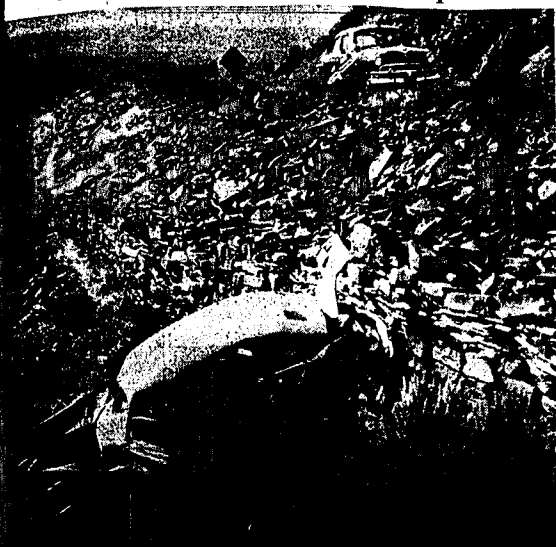

New Zealand Woman Scoffs at Opinion Her Country Is "40 Years Behind U.S."

New Zealand is not 40 years behind the United States in its living conditions and a car is not a sign of luxury in New Zealand. The opinions are those of Mrs. Emily Hewitt, a native of New Zealand who is currently visiting her daughter, Mrs. Emory Roberts, and family in Twin Falls.

She was referring to recent statements made by David B. Wharton, vice consul in the American embassy in New Zealand.

"I don't want to hurt anyone's feelings. But Mr. Wharton's statements about New Zealand are misleading," Mrs. Hewitt declared.

According to Wharton, an automobile in New Zealand is a luxury. Not true, says Mrs. Hewitt. New Zealand is a smaller, more compact country than the United States and people don't need cars like they do in this country. Most of the population travels by bus and "tram."

"It is true that we don't have your lovely cars," Mrs. Hewitt conceded, "but we can't afford them and our highways are not big enough to handle such cars."

Mrs. Hewitt said she and her husband owned a car before his death, which to live. If I didn't, I wouldn't spend the money to return here the second time."

Mrs. Hewitt was visiting her son-in-law and daughter in College Place, Wash., four years ago when she returned to New Zealand.

As for living conditions, the picture isn't as bad as Wharton paints it. "The many Yanks who visited us during the war know that," Mrs. Hewitt stated. New Zealanders are not going hungry either. Far from it, Mrs. Hewitt points out that all New Zealand meals are planned around a meat dish. The country is a meat-eating country with the per capita meat-consumption topping that of the United States. Meat is served three times a day in almost every New Zealand home.

Butter is cheaper and New Zealanders "load" it on their food, according to Mrs. Hewitt. Inflation has hit New Zealand, but Mrs. Hewitt believes it isn't as bad as inflationary prices here.

"Now don't get me wrong," she says, "I love the United States. I think it is a wonderful place in

Cautious Use Of Spray for Dairy Urged

Extreme caution in the use of DDT near dairy cows and their feed was urged Friday by Keith A. Harvey, public health department sanitary inspector at the south central district health unit here.

Harvey issued the warning after receiving reports that various Magio Valley dairymen are making slugs from sweet corn which has recently been sprayed with DDT.

Harvey said information available here does not determine how much DDT can be consumed without being harmful to humans and animals.

He said that food and drug administration has issued a ruling that milk containing even a trace of DDT is subject to seizure if shipped interstate.

Some recent studies have indicated that DDT residues tend to disappear from feed or three weeks after it has been sprayed. Disappearance depends on weather conditions and application factors that cannot be controlled.

Harvey pointed out that grade A milk producers are not permitted to use DDT in dairy barns on cows or their feed because of the poisoning danger. Feeding DDT-contaminated silage direct would increase the health hazard greatly, he said.

Milk from grade A dairy farms is subject to removal from grade A market if found contaminated with DDT.

Documented evidence shows DDT is stored in the body fat. It is eliminated slowly from the milk of dairy cows. Department of agriculture officials have labeled DDT as a slow, insidious poison for both humans and cows, Harvey pointed out.

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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The words "police magistrate" usually call up a picture of a stern, hard-bitten face, pasty with age, at least middle age or past.

The GOOING police magistrate picture, Police Judge Stanley Legg, youngest, if not the youngest, presiding police magistrate in this area. He has a sensitive face, brown hair, and a friendly smile.

But neither of these should be misled by his gentle appearance and think they are up before an easily intimidated, "moulin rouge" when it comes to handling the law.

Several citizens of the world, believing they were up before a "push over" in Judge Legg, have found he can handle his court in a dignified manner and that he is a most respectful and efficient magistrate. He will get what they get for a contempt of court.

Although Judge Legg had had no specific training for his position, he did have the desire and the ability to learn.

In many small towns the job of police judge usually is a chore handed to someone as a part time job, to be filled in where it could. Gooding, though, considers it an important office and has placed it on as nearly a full time basis as possible.

On Oct. 17, 1931, after having served on the local volunteer fire department for more than two years, Judge Legg was hired as the police judge. After having cleaned up the fire house and keeping the two fire trucks in tip-top condition he had plenty of time on his hands. He didn't relish the idea of "sitting around" so he asked the city council for more work. He was appointed to serve as police magistrate on Jan. 1, 1932, and on April 10 was appointed acting justice of the peace. He was nominated for the office of justice of the peace for precinct No. 1 in the August primaries.

Every case is different, although they may come under the same category. Leg claims.

Judgment depends upon the crime or violation, the place committed and arresting officer. Under the city ordinance the police judge can fine a maximum of \$100 and can sentence a term in jail unless in the person cannot pay the fine in cash.

The justice of the peace, having state and county offenses, can fine a maximum of \$300 and can impose jail sentences, according to his judgment. The state law, however, at the city ordinance, he pointed out.

Although he has learned the laws and could state them from memory when passing judgment, Legg has found that most people accept the fact more easily when it is read from the "book."

"When asked how he feels about "throwing the book" at a tough character he said the person "had it coming or he wouldn't have it out of hand in the first place." But generally a few minutes of reasonable discussion eases the tension and most people accept with good grace the punishment which they know they deserve, he adds.

"I don't like to pick on people, but when they break a law the punishment must be dealt out accordingly," Legg said.

Reviewing the three-in-one position which Legg holds in the community, his philosophy seems to be that he likes to help people out.

Land Valuations Up for Minidoka

RUPERT, Sept. 13—The North side was a factor in the increase in county valuation last year, Claude Bowman, county assessor, said Friday.

Last year 3,425 acres of private land were assessed on the pumping project. This year 17,184 acres were assessed. Valuation has increased from \$47,581 in 1951 to \$211,420 in 1952. Next year, if the proposed operation is realized, another 9,000 acres will be added to the county's valuation.

Under personal property, farm machinery has increased from \$184,859 to \$266,780; range stock from \$28,495 to \$69,418; and yearlings from \$53,431 to \$98,152.
