TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—World diplomat reports on the meeting of the United Nations committee on disarmament for next month furnish no cause for concern over imminent war on a global scale.

Although the meeting was a far-flung listening party, even the most realistic realist 1947 as the earliest possible date for the start of the next world war.

Many communists express doubt that the "anti-war" slogan will bring to a halt the arms race. They believe that the arms race will continue to grow, and that the world will be plunged into a new world war.

The Soviet Union is the only one of the major powers that has not yet signed the Geneva Convention on the prohibition of chemical and bacteriological warfare.

LABOR LEADERS UNFAIR

Inevitably, the Taft-Hartley labor law is a live subject in this presidential campaign.

General Eisenhower, the Republican nominee, says he favors amendments to the act where evidence indicates they are necessary to improve it.

Governor Stevenson, his Democratic opponent, originally spoke, too, of "modifying" the law. He said it contains a number of features good for management-labor relations.

More recently, however, Stevenson called for repeal of Taft-Hartley.

It should be thoroughly clear, however, that the Democratic candidate is for repeal of the name, "Taft-Hartley" rather than for scuttling the whole law itself. In other words, he is the enemy of the labor leaders to whom repeal has been a political rallying cry since the act was adopted in 1947.

If this kind of repeal really satisfies union leaders, they have changed. For what they meant by it in earlier days was a complete junking of everything in the act except the elements of the old, pro-labor Wagner act which Taft-Hartley incorporated.

As proof of this, they flatly rejected in 1949 a string of 28 amendments, sponsored by Senator Taft himself, to improve the law. They wanted repeal or nothing.

Should they now, by some chance, get what Stevenson proposes for them? It would not be much different from what Taft offered in 1949. The only distinction would be getting rid of the hated "Taft-Hartley" label.

No one can prevent them from being satisfied with this if they wish to be. But labor leaders ought not to be allowed to pose before their membership as having achieved real repeal if they should manage what Stevenson suggests. They could be compelled to be honest about the issue.

When union chiefs had an honest chance in 1949 to better the law, they passed that by, too. They preferred to battle for no regulation at all.

Short of an unlooked-for change in the complexion of the 1953 congress, labor is unlikely to get repeal. As a matter of fact, there is not much prospect that any American will get the repeal in name only which Stevenson recommends.

For the American people and their lawmakers are convinced that unions, like every other vital segment of society, should be within the law—not above it.

OUR SCHOOL PROBLEM

The U. S. office of education tells us that the country is short of teachers and 50,000 classrooms for the important elementary grades in the months ahead. Since grade-school students do not vote, our politicians have been somewhat slow to attend to this problem.

There is nothing new about it. In its present acute phase, it has been foreseeable for years. It is the result of the impact of the tremendous World War II increase in the birth rate. The war babies are in school now, and there's not enough room.

Our world is crammed with problems, no doubt of that. It's perfectly understandable that, in such a welter of compelling needs, we should debate long and hard about what comes first.

We can all grasp that defense against a potential enemy takes priority over all. Highways, schools, hospitals, municipal facilities, all these accomplishments to national growth must fall in line behind defense preparations. But the question is: How far behind?

U. S. leaders plainly appreciate that there cannot be total neglect of these great public necessities on the domestic front. But it is questionable whether they really grasped with the matter of what a proper minimum development is during such a period of "cold war" as we now are experiencing.

A shortage of 30,000 classrooms means a week doubling up or skimping of hours by many thousands of young American students. To solve the problem a decade hence will be of no advantage to those youngsters. Their opportunity of educational attention in their formative years is now—and only now.

If we would spend more on our schools and less for the various gratitudes our national government keeps handing out with taxpayers' money to big business, our country would be better off.

Lush Growth Noted for Tropical Plant Raised From Seed by Twin Falls Woman

Twin Falls climate is far from tropical but at least one instance of tropical growth is evident at the Albert Stevens residence, 1543 Maple avenue. The hybrid Palma Christi (castor-bean) has claimed a lot of attention and interest this summer as it has continued to grow and expand to front of the Stevens' house.

Planted in early May it has attained a growth of nine inches in circumference at the base of the largest of the three stalks. Huge leaves, measuring up to 31 inches across, wave gracefully from long rubberlike stems. Small markings on a grouping of three small eyes are found under the leaf where it joins the stem. The same odd markings are noted on the stems near where they grow from the trunk. The trunk of the tree is covered with a powdery substance which rubs off, leaving a smooth rubberlike surface.

The plant differs from the ordinary castor bean not only in the mammoth growth, but in the lack of blossoms. In order to see the tropical difference, one can view other castor-bean plants in many yards in Twin Falls. The average growth will be from three to five feet and the flowers, without petals, are surrounded by dark brown spikes, which give them a burrlike appearance. "The fruit of the castor-bean plant is a large capsule containing three large seeds. These yield the castor oil of commerce, and also are valuable in ridding gardens of moles," according to the garden encyclopedia description.

Bearing out the tropical nature of the Stevens plant is another portion of the descriptive paragraph which reads: "In the typical castor-bean (R. Communis) the leaves are large, sometimes three feet across, and divided into from 5 to 11 lobes. The average castor-bean plant (garden variety) has leaves large for the size of the plant, but not of the huge dimension as the hybrid grown by Mr. and Mrs. Stevens. In the tropics the Palma Christi often reaches a height of 40 feet."

For comparison there are castor-beans growing at the rear of the E. C. Elliot home, corner of Times avenue and Marice street. These are from three to five feet in height and have many typical flowers. Then at the R. E. Morehouse residence, 1981 Maple avenue, may be seen a plant that has shot upward almost to the top of the house but not of the dense tropical growth type as that at the Stevens home. Also, it has one cluster of flowers, and divided into from 5 to 11 lobes. It also, it seems to shoot upward on a long fuzzy stem and is the only flower on the plant. One castor-bean plant at the Morehouse home is shorter and more stocky, the stalk looking like polished mahogany.

Mrs. Stevens sent away for the hybrid seeds, five coming in the package. Only the one seed grew, producing the "tropical wonder." Mrs. Morehouse purchased a package of ordinary castor-bean seeds at her grocery. For those who like to "plant and wonder" the castor-bean is interesting in conformation, coloring, size and the fact that it makes a quick-growing hedge for summer. The plant is an annual.

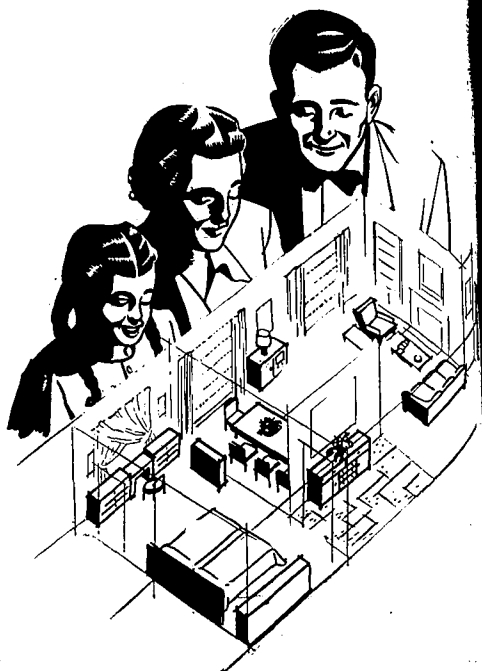
Grange Meets

Idaho Wheat Record Due, USDA Avers

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—The U. S. department of agriculture predicts that 1951 Idaho wheat production will break all existing records with a total of 42,362,000 bushels indicated.

The production, if realized, will exceed the 1947 record high by about nine per cent. Meanwhile, the USDA reported, prospect of the over-all crop production improved slightly during the month of August.

Potato prospects were estimated at 1,600,000 bushels per acre, a record high set in 1948 and 1950. The USDA reported the crop was ailing, and insect damage was at a minimum.

Increased yields were also predicted for oats, corn, beans, peas and sugar beets, while hay was expected to exceed previous production records.

The USDA also reported Idaho dairy manufacturing plants made 1,750,000 pounds of butter and 2,365,000 pounds of cheese during July this year.

Butter production was six per cent less than June and 11 per cent less than July 1951. Cheese production was about three per cent less than June but about eight per cent above a year ago.
