Lewis and Hard Coal Operators Okay Pact

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—John L. Lewis and hard coal operators signed an "interim" contract today assuring production of home-burning coal through the winter.

The United Mine Workers' chief and the anthracite producers reached agreement in a final four-hour bargaining session, 14 days before a strike deadline for some 65,000 hard coal diggers.

The pact was reached as the government prepared to embargo shipments of soft coal from northern mines in anticipation of a major soft coal strike Sunday night.

Under the agreement, the hard coal operators agreed to boost payments into the union's hard-pressed welfare fund by 20 cents a ton, making the total now 80 cents for each ton of coal mined.

Other terms, involving wages, of the 1952 hard coal contract were to be worked out following a settlement between the union and the coal industry.

While the hard coal agreement was announced, there is still a good chance of a soft coal strike.

The proposed order would hard coal shipments after midnight Thursday from all bituminous coal mines receiving notices from Lewis' United Mine Workers that would permit termination of the existing wage agreements Saturday.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower told organized labor today he favors changes in the Taft-Hartley law to eliminate "union-busting" provisions, but he would do it through amendment, not repeal.

Jordan to Heed Appeals For Small Budget Boost

From UP and AP Reports BOISE, Sept. 17.—Governor Len Jordan said today he will Budget Director Leonard Wood "expect to be guided by the consensus of the opinion of farm, business, education and labor leaders who feel the tax income to Idaho will begin to level off after 1953."

The governor said the state would be almost forced to adopt a conservative view to meet minimum budget requirements.

He pointed out that the current biennium's 39 million dollar budget would be increased by about 10 million dollars to meet such essentials as more state aid to the minimum school program and a 10 per cent increase for other departments.

He was looking for—and received—advice on the kind of budget he and Wood should submit to the 1953 Legislature.

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Truman Assails Users of 'Big Lie' in Red Attacks

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—President Truman declared today it is "a big lie" to say he tolerates communists in the nation's government.

And he accused those who say so of employing a tactic used by the communists themselves, a tactic he describes as "the big lie technique."

That technique, Truman said, "was developed by the communists, perfected by Hitler."

No names were given in the angry speech. Mr. Truman prepared for the National Conference on Citizenship, but he asked the voters to identify the users of "the big lie" regardless of party affiliation.

The President said anyone who resorts to "the big lie" technique is "not a good man." And he urged out for special attention those who call Gen. George G. Marshall traitor.

He told the conference: "It is a big lie, for example, to say we tolerate communists and other disloyal persons in our government. It is a big lie to attack me and my great generals, and the traitors whom this country ever had and call him a traitor."

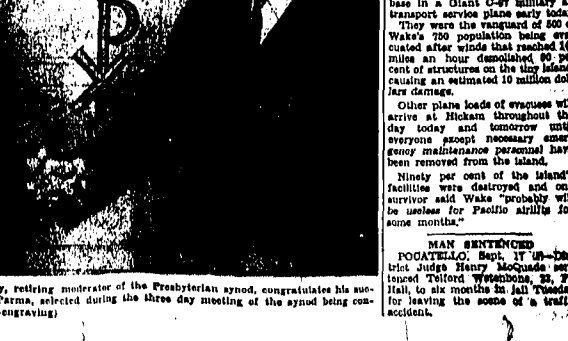
Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, has denounced Marshall and Secretary of State Acheson as "monumental liars" and has said they are "deserving of a hanging."

Sen. William E. Jenner, Indiana Republican also up for reelection, has called Marshall a "traitor" and "front man for traitors."

Storm Evacues Land in Honolulu

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 17 (AP)—Red-eyed and weary, 81 evacuees from typhoon devastated Waikiki Island and evacuated from a base in a Giant C-97 military air transport service plane early today.

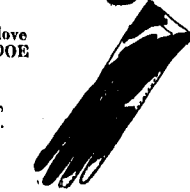

'NON-SKED' AIR LINES

When the non-scheduled airlines became embroiled in a series of accidents last winter, cries went up that they should be put out of business. The civil aeronautics board wisely resisted this emotional clamor. Now, however, it is engaged in a sober review of non-sked operations to determine what place they should occupy in the airline picture.

The regular, or so-called certificated airlines, make many arguments against the non-scheduled companies. They say competition from them is unfair, since they do not have to stand the expense of serving intermediate points but just tap the lucrative traffic between big cities.

And they add that, though these lines are not supposed to offer regularly scheduled service, in combination with each other they usually do offer such service. On top of this, their investment in equipment and facilities is small. The non-skeds do not own big fleets of aircraft. For the most part they lease planes from the U. S. air force.

The arguments for the non-skeds are that they act as a competitive spur to the regulars and provide a means for bringing new blood into civil air commerce. The lines are seen as comparable to small business in some other field.

There seems little doubt the non-skeds were a large factor in pushing the regulars into the now expanding air coach service, and they may have had something to do with the growth of air freight operations among the certificated airlines.

It has always been contended, too, that the overhauling built of the non-skeds were small, veteran-operated outfits. The government, it was said, had a duty to encourage outlets for the talents of thousands of wartime pilots and navigators. But evidence indicates this is less true today. Many non-skeds are fairly big companies which make substantial profits.

The CAB must now decide exactly what it does want to allow. The governing commercial air operations makes no provision for non-sked operations at all. The CAB improvised in permitting them to function in the first place. If it now believes, after thorough study, that they have a proper place in the aviation scheme, that role should be carefully defined in recommendations and spelled out in amendments to existing law.

Such a course would bring the non-skeds within the purview of the law and thereby give them the same kind of responsibility the regular airlines are expected to exhibit. With that advance, the nation could confidently look upon them as a normal part of commercial air traffic upon which it could depend for safe and efficient service.

When Judge James Patrick McGranery of Philadelphia first took over as U. S. attorney less than four months ago, he found that many of the attorneys were reporting for work around 10 o'clock in the morning. They had a very good reason for this. Four months is of course insufficient time in which to clean up completely a government of 4,500 people, when it has been going down hill for six months. This figure of 4,500 takes in only the staff that is supposed to be the government's top law enforcement agency. It does not include the staff of the federal bureau of investigation, 7,000 in immigration service, 3,000 in bureau of prisons. As more or less independent branches of department of justice, they are thus far clear of any of the scandals that have rocked the parent organization.

Best estimates now are that it would take another year and a half to reorganize and restaff the department of justice and get it running as it should be. Attorney General McGranery doesn't have that much time. He has only another four months before a new administration takes over.

So cleaning up the mess in the justice department won't get done by the incumbent attorney general unless, of course, Governor Stevenson should be elected President and decide to keep Judge McGranery in his cabinet to finish the job he has just started.

ADLAI'S RIGHT!

It was a new wrinkle in political campaigning when Gov. Adlai Stevenson, in going on the defensive, denied that the Democrats alone are responsible for corruption and misconduct in the federal government.

"Whose fault is it?" he asked? "And get what we deserve in government?" We got his answer was: "It is the fault of you, the people."

Although the Democrats' presidential candidate wouldn't care to admit it, judging from his own remarks, the people are to blame for keeping the new administration in power for 20 years. All the resultant "corruption and misconduct in the federal government."

Maybe Governor Stevenson is helping to prove the point that public apathy and indifference are largely responsible for this country's present predicament. Maybe that will help to convince the people that it's high time to clean house in Washington.

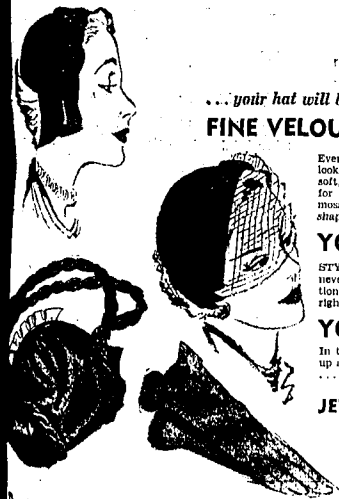

BOISE, Sept. 17—A commercial apple crop production of 1,693,000 bushels for 1952 was forecast today by the U. S. department of agriculture's crop reporting service.

The department said 1,610,000 bushels were produced last year, and the 10-year average, from 1941 to 1950, stands at 1,672,000 bushels.

Tardy Check For Training Pay Is Noted

Veterans planning to attend college under the GI bill are advised by the veteran administration they will receive a tardy check for the payment for a full month's training.

According to Arnold Helweg, Twin Falls representative of the veteran administration, trainees allowances will be paid until after the VA at the end of each month showing that the return actually was submitted to the VA during the month.

After the VA receives the certificate, it must complete GI allowance and mail out the payment. This procedure takes approximately 30 days.

Checks will be mailed regularly after the first two month period so long as the veteran remains in training.

Allowances for full time training in colleges and universities are \$110 for veterans without dependents; \$135 for those with one dependent and \$160 for those with more than one dependent.

Allowances for part time training, on-the-job training and non-attendance on term training are somewhat lower.

Veterans may make checks of government life insurance premiums payable to the veteran administration, according to Arnold Helweg, local representative.

Previously, checks or money certificates had to be made out to the treasurer of the United States. As a result, many premium payments were sent to the treasury department rather than to the VA office handling the insurance account.

Veterans were advised not to send cash through the mails, but to use checks or postal money orders. Canceled checks or money order stubs make convenient receipts for premium payments, Helweg pointed out.

Nov. 1 Deadline Set for Registration To Cast Ballots in General Elections

Idaho voters have until 9 p.m. Nov. 1 in which to register for the Nov. 4 general election. Persons registered for the primary election in August need not register again. Anyone may contact the county clerk, T. W. Bowers, for a service-man's absentee ballot. The applicant may sign the application for the serviceman and must give the serviceman's address to the county clerk who will mail the ballot.

It is not necessary that a serviceman be registered in order to vote the registration form for servicemen is on the back of the ballot envelope. He may register at the same time he votes.

Although ballots will not be available until the second week in October, other applications for absentee ballots are being accepted by the county clerk. The ballots will be mailed to voters when they are ready. Except in the case of servicemen, requests for absentee ballots must be made by the person desiring them and the applicant must sign the form which will be sent by the county clerk. Ballots going overseas will be sent airmail to insure delivery in time for the election.

Persons who did not vote in the 1934 general election must re-register if they haven't already done so since that election. In order to be eligible to vote, an elector must have been a resident of the county 30 days and of the state 60 days before the election.

Three political parties have candidates listed on the Idaho ballot, Democratic, Republican and Progressive.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

There is nothing so hard for a parent to accept as the fact that his child is different from others. When they play he sits back, no sign of interest, perhaps, in his face. If there is any such sign, it is a passive one that prompts no action. When other children go to school and learn to read and count, he goes to school, however, the teacher sees that he is "different" and reports this to the authorities who set to work to help him—we hope.

First, the child is examined. The doctor goes over him carefully, reporting on the conditions he finds in the child's physical body. Then the psychologist examines him to learn the condition of his mental being. On their findings, the school people base their future efforts toward educating him. He is placed in the Special Class.

This class has its good points, and its bad ones. Just as any life situation must have, nothing can be completely perfect. The bad ones are: the lack of high-grade intelligence among the pupils to inspire effort and ambition in the weaker ones; the disdain of the other children expressed in such terms as "crazy class, dopes, dummies"; the lack of professional training in the teachers and principals of the schools in the field of mental retardation. Few have this training and that is a handicap to all concerned.

The lack of association with normal children can be remedied by adjusting the program so that the pupils of this class move from room to room for each basic subject, returning to their class teacher for lessons that reinforce those of the "regular class" teacher. The attitude of the other children can be modified by instruction, by teaching them to help these children whenever they have the chance. This on the principle that we learn to love those we care for.

Teachers' colleges can remedy the lack of professional training for the education of these children by providing courses in the field of mental retardation; institutions that care for these children can, as Vineyard does, offer their facilities as a laboratory for students of handicapped children. The board of education and the superintendents can help greatly by insisting upon professional fitness of all such teachers and by paying them well for their services. Teaching such children becomes a delicate, skillful, soul-trying task that calls for self-sacrificing devotion. That should be paid for as far as it is possible to pay for a work of the spirit.

Food Official Claims Price Trend Down

NEW YORK, Sept. 17—By a year's shopping, housewives can fill a basket with groceries for the family table for less money now than a year ago, a spokesman for the United States Department of Agriculture said.

Paul P. Willis, president of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said the latest index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics tends to show the impression that all food prices are rising. That index, however, is based on a year's shopping.

Willis said in a statement, consumer prices for beef, beverages, sugar and cereals have remained virtually unchanged during the year, while other major food items such as the following have dropped substantially.

Beef and mutton, 14 per cent; eggs, 4 per cent; fish, 4 per cent; frozen, canned and dried fruit and vegetables, 3, 2 and 4 per cent, respectively.

U. S., Russia Avert Battle On Embassy

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Washington and Moscow finally seem to have found something they can agree on.

Diplomatic authorities report the two cold war disputes are about ready to sign a truce to resolve new headquarters for the U. S. embassy in Moscow.

The Kremlin informed the U. S. embassy some months ago that it wanted the seven-story building at No. 13 Mohovaya street by Jan. 1, 1938, for use by the Moscow university. The building had served as U. S. embassy headquarters in Moscow since 1924.

Some diplomats here had feared that the Soviet request might kick up new trouble. They suspected the Reds might have some ulterior motives. There was some talk about a "vigorous protest" if the Soviets tried to reduce the American embassy staff by offering smaller and inadequate quarters.

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., Sept. 17 (AP)—Trout are going to help build a college here. Yep, that's right, trout—the kind you catch, not don't, in streams and lakes.

While Michigan's regular trout season closed Monday, Gerald Olson announced he would open his trout farms here to fishermen from Thursday until the end of the month. Fishermen will pay 10 cents an inch for any they catch and payments will go into the building fund of Northwestern Michigan college.

Idahoan Points to Top-Heavy Load of Federal Tax in State

ST. ANTHONY, Sept. 17—Idaho taxpayers now pay about three times as much in federal taxes as they pay in state and local taxes combined, according to M. W. Smith, manager of the St. Anthony Flour Mills and member of the National Association of Manufacturers.

This was revealed today by Smith in commenting on a 47-page state report on federal and local taxes compiled by the NAM.

Last year, Idaho wage earners paid \$122,589 in state taxes and \$38,198,108 in local taxes. Next year, almost 243 million dollars will be taken in federal taxes, Smith said.

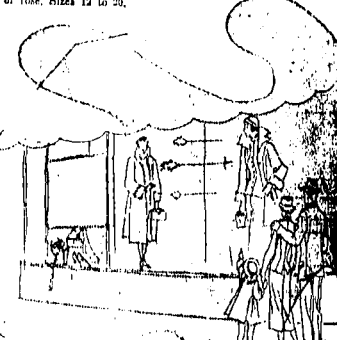

West Not Set On Choice in Fall Election

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—The mountain and western states, almost as solidly Democratic as the south in presidential elections over the last 20 years, now are regarded by editors and correspondents as leaning Republican but still a tossup.

An Associated Press survey, based upon individual county estimates by editors and political writers in each state, indicates their combined opinion is that only one of the 11 states could be considered reasonably safe for the Democrats if the election were held at this time. The Democrats captured 10 of the 11 in 1936.

Still in Doubt
If present trends hold good through Nov. 4—and many of the states still must be kept on the doubtful list—the newspaper men say the 79 electoral votes of the mountain and western states should line up this way behind the presidential nominees:

For Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower: California 32, Oregon 6, Washington 9, Idaho 4, Utah 4, New Mexico 4, Montana 4, Nevada 3, Wyoming 3; total 69.

For Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson: Arizona 4.

They Hold East
Associated Press surveys of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware, indicate editors and political writers hold a composite belief that if the people were voting today the 105 electoral ballots of those five states would go to Eisenhower by a narrow margin.

The eastern votes, plus 69 from the west, would give the GOP nominee 174 of the 268 needed to clinch a victory.

But in the west, as in the east, even a slight shifting of the political winds could blow almost any state in an entirely different direction by the time Nov. 4 rolls around.
