OK's Rate Hike in Power

Sept. 18 (AP)—The public utilities commission has authorized Idaho Power to increase rates by about 11 per cent. The commission schedule is designed for an additional \$1,200,000 in 1942 and approximately \$883,700 in 1943.

The commission also denied any increase in rates for Idaho Power had higher rate in that area, because of the necessity for transmission lines between Salmon and Lake County. Age of 'Push-Button' War Begins as Navy Discloses Robot Craft Use in Korea

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—American robot planes launched at sea have blasted enemy targets in Korea, ushering in the age of push-button warfare.

The navy told for the first time Wednesday the story of a robot attack on a Korean military target Sept. 1. The navy held back part of the story, but what it told made it abundantly clear that the age of push-button warfare is at hand.

It told of an outmoded airplane launched by catapult from the deck of an aircraft carrier off the Korean coast, escorted by radio controls to its target area then unleashed on a heavily defended spot into which no piloted plane dared go.

From the political rostrums a good deal is being heard these days about liberating the captive lands of eastern Europe from the crushing Soviet grip. But when it comes to details, the promises trail off into thin air.

There is surely nothing wrong with stating that we can never, as a matter of principle, accept the permanent subjugation of the eastern satellites to Russian tyranny. We cannot recognize conquest, by whatever means.

It is well that we tell these peoples and the whole world again and again that we stand for freedom in eastern Europe, as we do everywhere else.

But it is something else to talk as if we were going to embark on liberating adventures the day after tomorrow. We should make clear in all our assertions of support for the oppressed of eastern Europe that we are not inciting them to early revolt.

To say anything to them in a way they may interpret as encouragement to rebellion is to play with their very lives. We can never forget the Warsaw massacre of World War II, when eager Poles rose up prematurely to strike against their Nazi conquerors.

Obviously we cannot mean at this time to stir even guerrilla warfare on any systematic, sustained scale. Struggle of this sort must inevitably fail if it is not finally assisted by other measures, perhaps including invasion by friends of the oppressed. There is not the slightest sign that any such decisive measures are in the making.

Much as we want to help these nations, we have to face the brutal truth that there is not a lot we can do concretely to aid them now. Naturally we must aid the refugees who courageously break across the Soviet-controlled borders of iron curtain countries.

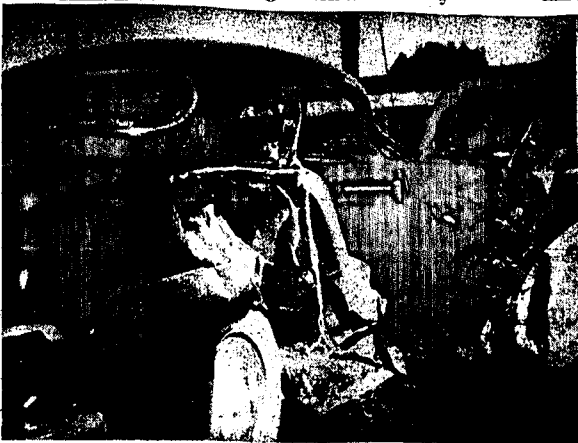

New Island Made in Pacific As Undersea Volcano Erupts

TOKYO, Sept. 18 (AP)—A new island thrust out of the Pacific ocean Wednesday with a volcanic fury.

It was pushed up by an undersea volcano which turned the sea around it into a cauldron and spewed a low sulphur and pumice ash 7,000 feet into the air.

The new island is in the Bonin about 600 miles south of here. There was there in 1946 that another island rose briefly, shattered and sank into the sea.

Two Japanese fishing boats first saw the island flaring from the Pacific. The weather was misty and dark and the fishing boats were not getting a good look.

The Tokyo newspaper Asahi said a plane over the area late Wednesday and a Japanese reporter said the island had grown to about a mile and a half long and half a mile wide.

From the air it looked like a plateau with a dragon starting for it. It had two distinctive humps on the back.

A lava stream trailed off to the south and was discernible on the ocean surface for a distance of 30 miles before it sank from sight the reporter said.

The Japanese marine safety board said the volcano is on the bobbing Ryukyu reefs. It has erupted at least three times before. The last time was six years ago when the other island rose to 137 feet above sea level in April 1946. But it was gone by the year it had sunk.

FBI Lopping New Leaders Of U. S. Reds

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—The U. S. Communist party appears headed for a "bread-and-butter" type of government job of the new heads which crop up out of the red hierarchy.

The FBI's arrest last year of 18 red leaders was another step in the government's campaign to "outpace" the Communist party by systematically eliminating its leadership.

The government started off with the American "collieries" in 1949. Since then it has concentrated on eliminating the Communist party's leadership.

Justice Department officials refused today to speculate about any future FBI raids, but commented that anti-Communist groups who move up in party ranks to fill the vacancies left by jailed or arrested leaders might find themselves the next targets of the anti-subversive drive.

FBI agents swooped down on 18 prominent reds in seven states yesterday. The "biggest single roundup in the three-year war against communists" was directed at the party organization in Missouri, Missouri and Washington.

All were charged with conspiring to teach and advise the violent overthrow of the government in violation of the Smith act.

The exceptions, whose bond was placed at \$40,000, were James Forest, chairman of the party in Missouri; Saul Weisman, Detroit, national secretary and coordinator of the party, and Henry P. Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Matt was crying. Matt could be counted on to cry any time for any reason. This time he stumbled into the room where his teacher was working at recess time, crying loudly. "What is it, Matt?" asked Miss Maria.

"My hurt my feelings," sobbed the sorrowing child.

"He hurt your feelings? Where did you have them, Matt?"

"Where did you have your feelings? You know that if you keep your feelings on your skin they will surely be hurt. And you'll always be crying and nobody will care. Just cover up your feelings so nobody sees them. Go back and play with 'Tooby'."

But Matt was too accustomed to carrying his feelings on his skin to find any comfort in the idea, and so went back to stand in the corner and cry—to the amusement of the other hardy souls whose feelings lay much deeper.

Nothing is easier than to teach a child to wear his feelings on his skin, so consult them about every happening and allow them to be uprooted all through the day. Mothers can do much to bring this about and some do. I imagine that, when Matt fell down, his mother ran to help him up, saying, "Poor baby, did the bad floor hurt him? Poor Mattie. Mother will kiss it and make it better." Matt would like that, and the more he got of it the better he would like it.

Then one day a playmate called him a sissy. His feelings were hurt and he stopped playing, began crying, and hurried to his mother for comfort. "That was a bad boy to hurt your feelings. Shame on him to hurt a nice little boy's feelings like that. You don't play with him any more." Matt would feel better and would go out carrying resentment, a feeling of injury, to bed and school, and home with him, and would be ready to burst into tears at any moment.

Most young children are susceptible to suggestion, and teachers and mothers can make use of that force for the strengthening of the child's personality. Instead of rushing to his rescue, view the situation calmly, tell him all is not lost, and still has a piece in the world if he will but claim it. He has within him all the power he needs to sustain himself in the world if he will but call on it.

Encourage him to call on a thought of power instead of one of fear. Teach him to keep his feelings out of sight and under control. He will be much happier, much healthier, and so will his mother and his teachers.

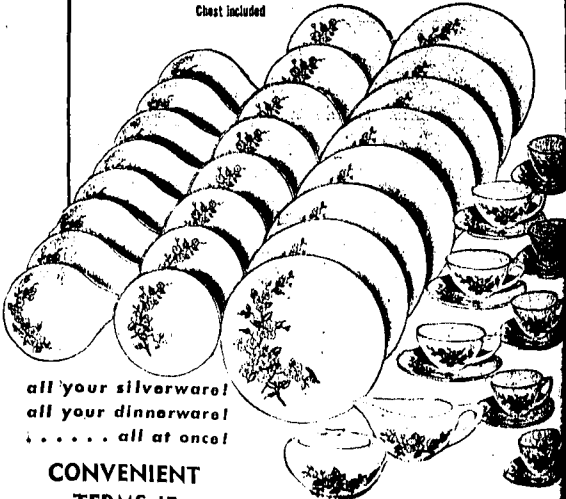

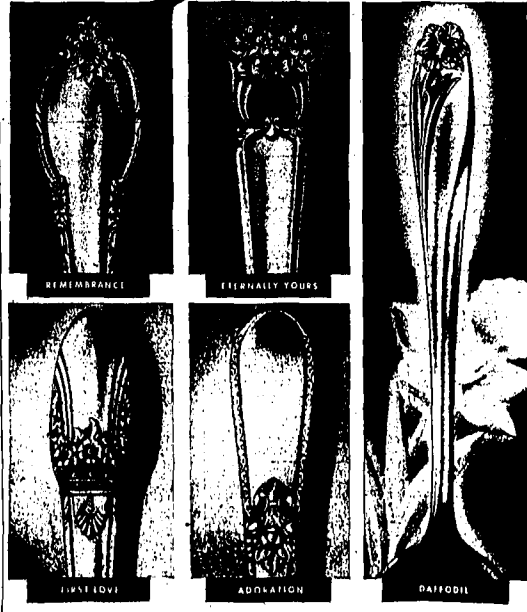

Vets Get Aid With Training

Many war veterans who are eligible for allowances to help cover flight training, according to House bill, Twin Falls representative of the veterans administration will pay 75 per cent of the cost under the Korean GI bill. The rest of the cost must be paid by the veteran.

Machine Being Used to Clean Ditches on Twin Falls Tract

Ditch cleaning operations which normally required days to complete can be done now in a matter of hours with a special ditching machine now being used by the Twin Falls Canal company.

The Briscoe ditcher was put into operation Tuesday. It digs a ditch two and one-half to four feet wide. The blades of the ditcher are adjustable making possible a ditch up to 12 feet at the top.

The ditcher, costing about \$7,000, travels in the bottom of the ditch. It is mounted on rubber and is towed by one or two tractors. It operates equally well in water, muck, hard or sandy soil.

It can be used to clean ditches or dig new ditches. Company officials claim that the machine can clean as much ditch in two hours as ordinary methods cleaned in three days. It also is claimed that the ditcher does a better, quicker job for less money.

All controls are hydraulic, making possible a wide range of cutter blade manipulations to meet all kinds of soil and terrain conditions. A special feature enables the ditcher to keep the same cutting plane regardless of the nature or unevenness of the bottom of the ditch.

The canal company expects to use the ditcher to maintain its canals and laterals during the fall and spring.

The machine is new to the Twin Falls tract but has been used in the King Hill and Burley areas.

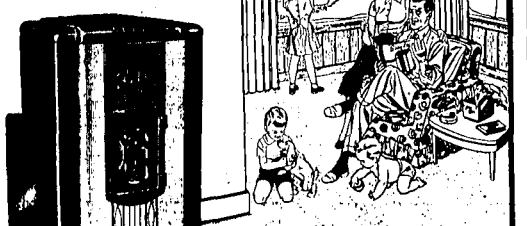

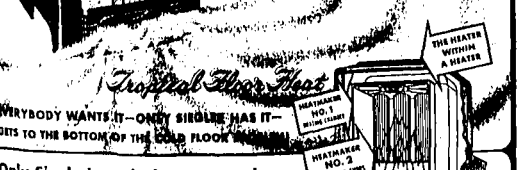

Experts Again Fight Big Sea Battle of War

ABOARD THE USS ESSEX, Sept. 12—The United States and Japan have fought the battle of Coral sea again, more than 10 years after the decisive naval engagement took place in the South Pacific.

But this time no huge ships lobbed their death-dealing shells over miles of turbulent ocean. Instead, there was just a miniature sea in the carrier's cabin on the carrier Essex.

Around the table Wednesday were the 10 men who helped to determine the five-day battle.

U. S. A. Japs

They were Capt. Paul D. Shoop, commander of the Essex, who helped plan the U. S. strategy for the battle, and Capt. C. C. Day, who was aboard the ill-fated carrier Lexington and saw former Japanese admirals, Yasuji Watanabe and Toshikane Takado.

The fight cost the United States 56 planes and 542 men, as well as the carriers Lexington and Sims. Japan lost 60 planes, 900 men and several ships.

Stopped Japan

The outcome of the battle stopped Japan from capturing Port Moresby on New Guinea and thereby prevented a conquest of Australia itself.

Wednesday's Coral sea fight was battled on charts and maps with tiny models simulating the two powerful navies.

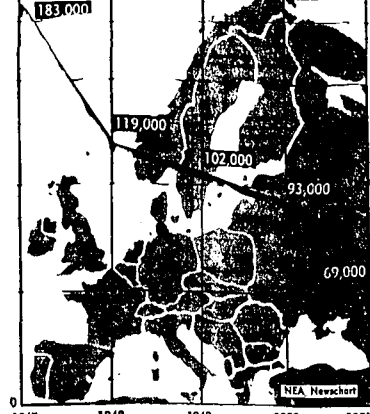
