I. E. Rockwell, Blaine County Resident, Dies

HAILEY, Sept. 22—I. E. Rockwell, author, industrialist, farmer, engineer, miner and legislator, died at his home in Broadford at 2 a.m. Monday. He was considered by many as Blaine county's most outstanding citizen.

Mr. Rockwell had a varied career and is credited with saving the American Falls reservoir project after the project had been abandoned. His best known literary work is "The Sags of American Falls Dam" which he wrote when he was 85 years old.

Mr. Rockwell was born Dec. 25, 1850, at Sun Prairie, Wis. When he was 10 he came to Idaho with a group of men in the founding of the Minneapolis Journal. Six years later he studied geological surveying and left newspaper work in 1880 for Chicago. While there he established an office and started a publishing business which still does business on a worldwide basis. In 1900 his health broke and he moved to Idaho.

Broadford in those days was a thriving community and Mr. Rockwell built a home there. Broadford has disappeared but Mr. Rockwell still maintained his home there. He is credited with having perfected several disease resistance species of seeds and plants.

Mr. Rockwell was married to Lillian Rockwell White. She died in 1940. While living at Broadford he became interested in mining and took up the study of geology and engineering. He eventually purchased the Minneapolis office and sold it in 1928.

In 1928, when the American Falls project was abandoned, Mr. Rockwell made a state senator for Blaine county in 1916, 1918 and 1922. While in the state senate he was instrumental in having the abandoned project revived. He was a member of the Idaho State Bar and the Idaho State Engineers' Association. He was also a member of the Idaho State Historical Society.

Hearing for Murder Charges Asked Here

Mr. Barbara Brown, 23, Buhl, asked a preliminary hearing Monday morning when arrested before Justice of the Peace J. O. Pumphrey in her room at Magic Valley Memorial hospital on a charge of first degree murder. The hearing is set for 10 a.m. Friday.

Loud Greeting Hails Adlai at Union Session

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Cheering delegates to the American Federation of Labor convention roared, pounded tables and yelled approval today when Gov. Adlai Stevenson repeated his belief that the Taft-Hartley act should be scrapped.

A jam-packed audience in the hotel where the AFL is holding its national convention interrupted Stevenson for nearly a minute in a wild ovation.

Stevenson previously urged repeal of the law in a Labor day speech at Detroit. But the AFL session exploded with applause when he voiced the same sentiment today.

He stopped the Democratic presidential candidate six times with laughter and applause in the first moments of his speech. Cries of "pour it on, Steve" and "give it to 'em, Adlai" yelled down at the governor from all sides of the hall.

Stevenson was introduced by AFL President William Green, who said, "There are many of us sitting in this hall today who believe he is the next president of the United States."

Stevenson addressed the convention last Wednesday, said he favored compulsory arbitration of labor disputes, and he pictured his Republican rival as being only "black cartridges" at labor problems.

Mr. Rupert was a member of the Lincoln school and the Rupert high school for 24 years, retiring nine years ago. He married Mary Brunst in Idaho Falls on Oct. 1, 1888. She died Aug. 22, 1930.

Mr. Rupert was active in LDS church work. He was presiding elder and bishop in the church in Idaho Falls and, because there was no LDS church in Rupert when he arrived, he became church director at the Methodist church. He helped in the organization of an LDS church and was its presiding elder and bishop in 1922. He became a patriarch in the church.

Jordan Gives Hint of GOP's Concern

Probe Continues On Hunter Death

GARSDALE, Sept. 22 (AP)—Valley county authorities were continuing today their investigation of the death of a hunter, who was shot by a wild animal in the first fatal hunting accident of Idaho's 1932 big game season.

Sheriff Merton Logue said Kennedy was killed early Saturday while hunting with other Twin Falls hunters about six miles from the Big Creek range station, deep in Idaho's primitive mountains.

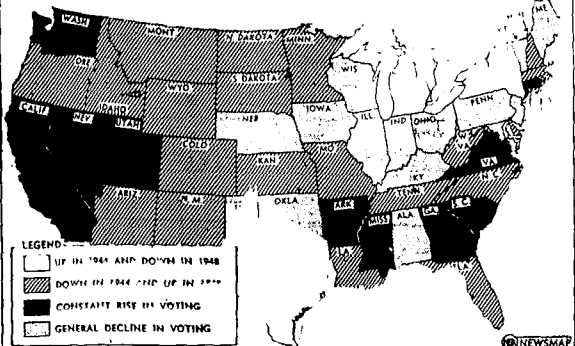

Average Power Bill in Idaho Is Due for Increase of \$1.05

BOISE, Sept. 22 (AP)—If you are an average residential user of Idaho power company electricity—with an electric stove, refrigerator, hot water heater and lights—your monthly bill is about to increase from \$6.65 to \$7.70.

The rate hike follows the company's new schedule, approved today by the public utilities commission to give Idaho Power more revenue to meet the added cost of labor and materials and other operating expenses.

Every consumer's bill, except those for some special services, goes up 15 per cent. This is expected to bring a gross increase of 11 per cent, or \$1,910,416 annually, to the company—\$883,700 after taxes. The PUC approved this overall increase last week.

Idaho Power realizes only the 11 per cent gross because street lighting and irrigation pumping rates are not affected.

Neither will rates go up in the Salmon area, where rates already are the same as the new level because of added cost of transmission to that remote section of Idaho.

The customer who uses electricity for space heating also may be able to save on his monthly bill if he watches the electrical load in his home. PUC accountants said. Under the old schedule, \$1.25 was charged for each kilowatt of space heating.

This charge is eliminated under the new schedule. The space heater's bill goes up only if he uses over eight kilowatts in a month. Each half-kilowatt of demand in excess of eight is charged at the rate of 20 kilowatt hours multiplied by 3.8 cents.

The consumer who uses an electric stove, refrigerator and lights but not an electric hot water heater, will find that his bill will be raised from \$5.25 to \$6.10.

Wood Explains His Opposition To Plan of Hells Canyon Dam

BOISE, Sept. 22—Rep. John T. Wood, D-Ida., who is making re-election a first district congressman, has issued this statement in support of his position in opposition to the Hells Canyon dam.

Existing federal law declares no dam can be authorized for government construction unless it serves the following purposes: irrigation, flood control, navigation. The generation of power is merely incidental. No dam can be constructed for power production alone.

There is a definitely existing policy in the department of the interior to controvert existing federal law so that dams may be built at the taxpayers' expense for the primary purpose of power production. All acts of subterfuge are employed to attain this result.

The department of the interior has sought to adduce more or less spurious factors of flood control, navigation and recreation facilities under the so-called "incidental" method of computing costs, so that a considerable portion of the primary cost of construction may be shifted off to the taxpayers, thus lowering the cost of power production. This shuffling would be questionable in any case, but when such methods are used to permit governmental competition with private enterprise, they become intolerable. Hells canyon dam represents the first of the great government dam-building projects designed to change existing law. It shall not be legal unless congress permits it by passing the bill for its construction.

The taxpayers of other areas, unable to avail themselves of this so-called cheap power, have now become aware of this hoax, and I do not believe their representatives in congress will vote for a change in existing federal law.

They know there is no such thing as cheap power. No one has ever claimed that government can produce more cheaply or more expeditiously than private enterprise. Indeed the facts point to the opposite conclusion. The taxpayers must make up the cost difference.

Government construction actually exceeds estimated costs by as much as double. Many authoritative reports have shown the final cost of Hells canyon dam as a few hundred million dollars.

The bill, as introduced into congress, merely mentions the possibility that as some remote period in the future proceeds of power sales might be used to finance irrigation project.

But no such irrigation project can even be introduced into congress without a certificate from the secretary of the interior justifying the cost and repayment of those costs to the federal government. It was pending during a meeting of the Idaho delegation with the secretary of the interior who asked if he would be able and willing to furnish such a certificate for Mountain Home. He answered, "I would not. Which seemed to me to settle the fate of that construction."

The enabling act which made Idaho a state specifically declares federal government can never do anything to controvert the water rights of Idaho citizens. At the committee hearings on this bill, it was admitted Hells canyon dam might do this very thing.

"The constitution of Idaho prohibits the state, or any of its subdivisions from engaging in competition with private enterprise. Thus, these bodies cannot engage in the sale of electric power with-

out a constitutional amendment. This would mean that any grant of power from the construction of Hells canyon would be utterly meaningless as the state could not use it.

Statements have been made that Hells canyon will help Lewiston's waterway to the sea program. The facts are the five dams below Lewiston will help the waterway materially. The Idaho delegation in congress has supported all the dams below Lewiston. All have been approved by congress. The administration in power has simply failed to provide funds for their construction, while urgently stressing the authorization and providing funds for Hells canyon which could be of little or no help to the waterway program.

U.S. Seeks to Sell Atom Plant City in Top Real Estate Deal

RICHLAND, Wash., Sept. 22 (AP) — The biggest real estate sale in the nation is brewing here.

Atomic Energy Commission officials are preparing to sell lock, stock and barrel, the entire city of Richland, the home of 25,000 persons, where plutonium is made from uranium. Plutonium is the explosive element, the nuclear fuel in atomic bombs.

It is not that the U.S. atomic energy commission is closing up shop. On the contrary, a \$11 million dollar expansion program is about to begin this fall.

The real reason for the big real estate sale is the commission's decision that it should stick to splitting atoms. Last August, the commission's panel on community operations recommended that Richland, along with Oak Ridge, Tenn., should be self-governed and home and business property privately owned.

But the process of converting a city this size, nearly 25 years old, into a privately-operated enterprise is providing U.S. planners with a king-size headache. Tentative appraisal prices were released recently. They made a lot of Richlanders most unhappy.

Most persons believe the land price is too high. Others want to buy a house but not the one they live in. Some houses are along unpaved streets.

The settlement was reflected in a survey just released by the U.S. bureau of census. Last May 2, the bureau sent questionnaires to 9,400 Richland residents eligible to buy homes or vacant lots. About 425, or 64 per cent, said they would like to buy Richland property, but 61 per cent considered the asking price too high.

The reaction from businessmen was about the same. The check revealed 64 interested in buying; five said no and eight are undecided. Would they buy at the tentative appraisal prices? Twenty-one said yes; 37 said no and 19 were undecided.

Homes range all the way from \$18,000 for a one-bedroom pre-fab home in a low-rent zone to \$16,160 for a four-bedroom house. The average is about \$7,000.

Another thing: Richlanders like the low rents they get from the government. A one-bedroom pre-fab home can be rented for \$27 monthly. This includes an electric refrigerator, range, water heater, sink, heat and lights and garbage disposal. A two-story, three-bedroom home, complete with basement, can be rented for \$32.50.

Uncle Sam so far has more than 700 million dollars tied up in Richland and the atomic work. Of this sum, 100 million is in the town, houses and utilities. If current appraisals are followed, the government will sell the whole works for about 20 million dollars.

Just how private enterprise will run the city nobody knows. In the past few years under government operation, a million dollar yearly deficit has had to be made up by U.S. taxpayers.

Losses of home are proving to be hard bargainers. They will remember that by holding out a bit four years ago, the government sold 100,000 of furniture for \$200 cash. They still believe prices will have to come down. Meanwhile, the AEC has hired a new firm to make appraisals.

Next January, a bill will go into the hopper in congress, giving residents of this town in southwestern Washington a chance to buy it. By then government officials hope, everybody will be happy.

Aircraft Carrier, Destroyer Collide

PITTSBURGH, Scotland, Sept. 22 (AP) — The royal navy's newest and largest aircraft carrier, the Eagle collided with a Dutch destroyer off the Jutland coast last night, Operation Mainbrace headquarters here announced today.

The headquarters for the large fleet maneuvers said no serious damage was done. The destroyer was identified as the Van Galen. The 35,000-ton aircraft carrier and the destroyer were part of the North Atlantic treaty organization's sea, air and land exercise.

The 2,533 ton destroyer sustained superficial damage and was able to proceed to Der Helder under her own steam.

The collision happened while the destroyer was refueling the carrier off North Jutland, Denmark. There were no casualties.

Production was 89,000 chickens, compared with 86,000 in August, 1951, and an average of 26,000 for the 1949-50 period.

Total chick production of 3,853,000 during the first six months of the year was the second highest on record, being topped only by the 3,969,000 laid during the same period in 1951.

Navy Seeking 'Supermen' to Man Atom Sub

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP) — The navy disclosed today it is recruiting "supermen" from the fleet to man the world's first "atom" powered submarine, the Nautilus.

Crew members already are being secretly prepared with special training, including in naval history. The Nautilus, with upward of 100,000 miles of range, speed and almost indefinite underwater capability, is to be ready in 1954. Human endurance may be a crucial test.

Volunteers sought

Cmdr. David B. Bell, in charge of submarine officer placement, said volunteers from among the navy's 1,500 highly selected submarine officers are being screened for "unusually healthy people."

"They must be supermen, by which I mean to stay on sea and under water indefinitely," Bell said.

Capt. H. G. Rickover, father of the revolutionary Nautilus, said, however, he is sure navy men can meet the challenge of atomic life below the sea.

Not uncomfortable

He insisted that life aboard the nuclear-powered craft, despite unprecedented patrols and underwater operations, will be no more uncomfortable than living in Washington with a case of hay fever.

"And it will be a lot easier than in a fox hole," he said.

Living conditions aboard the Nautilus, Rickover predicted, will be about the same as "and certainly no worse" than on present day long-range submarines.

To a collective bargaining election held June 24 the Westinghouse employees voted 30 to 2 for representation by the AFL unit instead of by the CIO union. Eighteen workers voted for neither union and 23 ballots were challenged.

Four of the ballots were challenged by Westinghouse, which contended they were cast by plant clerical employees. The board ruled, however, that such workers were eligible to vote.

The 19 remaining challenged ballots were cast by technicians and the Oil Workers union contended their votes should have been counted. However, the board ruled that the technicians should not be included in the collective bargaining unit.

Idaho Woman Seeks Halt in GOP Disunity

ST LOUIS Sept. 22 (Special)—Mrs. Clifford Mayes, former assistant chairman of the national Republican committee, pleaded Sunday for Eisenhower headquarters to "call on the 75 million" and present a "final rift in the party."

"We are standing with our arms wide open," the Idaho woman leader declared, "and we are trying to help."

Mr. Mayes was the first national GOP figure to call attention to the unhealed breach since the Nixon crisis cost the chairmanship over the Missouri phase of the party's 1956 campaign.

In the official glance following the "Kansas City statement" on the Nixon affair, speculation has arisen over whether that will be the "smoking gun" in Eisenhower's entourage slow in their own sweat or whether he will mobilize organization Republicans to the candidate's defense.

Mrs. Mayes stressed her willingness to assist in the campaign in any capacity and denied that she presented in the slightest her abrupt replacement last August by Mrs. Roy Priest, Utah.

"My term had expired and I had no desire to remain until November," she said.

Fledge Ken Aid

She disclosed, however, that she had pledged her support to the Democratic campaign of Missouri's James Ken in response to an invitation from the state Republican women. This will include participation in a stumping tour of the state next month following her return from New York and a possible visit to Idaho.

Ken, a member of the party's extreme right, received little notice during Eisenhower's visit.

Referring directly to the Nixon incident, Mrs. Mayes called for sympathy for the young Californian.

Experience "splendid"

"My experience with the Nixon has been splendid. I knew them throughout my three year stay in Washington and know they lived modestly almost frugally. I know personally that they even hesitated to hire baby sitters to meet the demands of Washington social life. "I am certain that no part of the contributions made by his California constituents was spent by Senator Nixon for himself or his family. I think it's a tragedy that young men who are bright come must be handicapped in public life."

Federal Engineers Surveying Western Domain at Fast Rate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (U.P.)—Federal engineers are surveying land in the government's vast western domain at the rate of about two million acres annually.

Two million acres would seem to be a big parcel, nearly twice as large as Delaware. But it's a small bite into the 118 million-acre chunk of federal land which never has been surveyed.

A recent report by the federal land management bureau, interior department, says Arizona alone has 24,965,922 acres of unsurveyed land.

The acreages in other states include Nevada 20,443,112; California 12,310,225; Utah 10,323,259; New Mexico 9,917,476; Montana 9,698,219; Idaho 9,236,265; Washington 6,030,292; Oregon 4,904,152; Wyoming 2,853,491; and Colorado 1,822,954.

While some of the bureau's 40 crews are making original surveys, others are busy connecting boundary lines which were fixed in the past century.

As a result of the surveys, land areas are identified and boundaries are marked with iron or copper-bearing steel pipe fitted out with a concrete core and brass cap and placed two feet into the ground.

William H. Richards, chief of the bureau's survey branch, considers resurveys as important as original surveys.

"More than half the area of the 11 Rocky mountain and Pacific coast states are public lands," he told a reporter. "Although two-thirds of this area has been covered by the original surveys, much of the territory was surveyed prior to 1910."

"The early surveys were carried on in advance of settlement in an undeveloped wilderness. Existing conditions called for speed, and the land values did not justify a high degree of accuracy.

"Corners were marked with wooden stakes or stone. With the passage of time, much of the existing evidence of these early surveys disappeared.

"Comprehensive restoration of these original surveys is essential for the identification of the public lands and the privately owned

William Campbell, Boise, said the campaign would not skip areas normally regarded as Republican, adding:
