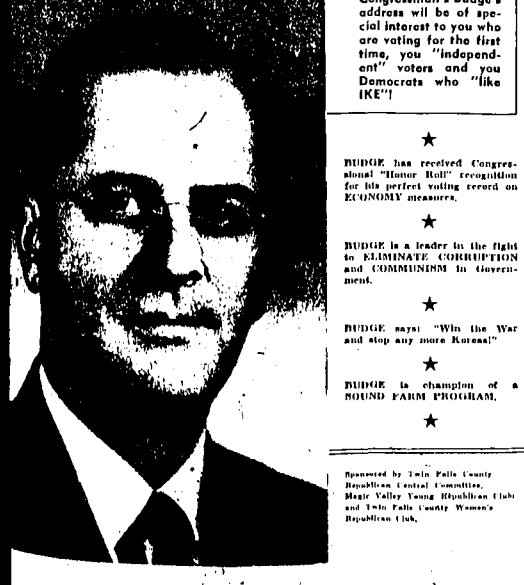

He Supports Man's Suggestion For Praise of Democrat Party

Editor, Times-News: In regard to Mackey J. Brown's suggestion of praise of Democrats in the future, in which he states himself with others of Magic Valley wonder if at least once in a while we couldn't have an editorial on some point the Democratic administration has done in the 20 years? I cannot see why an editorial of this kind would not be easy to write, and also would be true information to the voters of both political parties.

On page five of the Times News of Sept. 22, I note a short article by the "A" which states that the population in the 11 Pacific coast and Rocky mountain states increased from less than 4 billion to more than 20 billion dollars in the last 20 years. He Criticizes Delays for Two Bridges, Other Highway Work

Editor, Times-News: From press reports, it now appears that the project to eliminate the bottle-neck and hazardous situation at the site of the Rock creek and Deer Creek bridges west of the Magic Valley Memorial hospital, presumably scheduled for 1950, has been deferred again. Both bridges are inadequate to carry present traffic, while the Rock creek bridge, over 30 years old and built in the horse and buggy days, will not figure for the moving loads it is required to support.

One panel of the floor fell through years ago and last year an effort was made to replace disintegrated concrete that has fallen from underneath the slab.

Owing to the nearby location of the hospital buildings and the congestion on Addison avenue west for two-lane traffic, a new location should be made to connect the present four lane highway on the west side with four lanes and sidewalks intersecting at the junction of Washington avenue and Fourth avenue west (the Truck Lane) at east end of project.

The new project should provide for fills in both canyons with a tunnel or multiple arches to carry both roads and year-round traffic of four lanes with sidewalks. Enough excavation was wasted from the hospital. Seams, Trenches, concrete buildings and other building sites to have filled these canyons, but was used in building riparian rights on these streams.

U. S. 93 still continues to take the toll of serious accidents from north of Rogerson to the Nevada line. Visibility, width, curves and cheap construction constitute a real hazard to anyone not familiar with this sagebrush trail. Numerous arrests have been made on charges of reckless driving, when innocent and unsuspecting motorists, upon leaving the modern roads in Nevada, fail to make the hairpin turns or run off the narrow road onto soft shoulders to avoid collisions.

Instead of being arrested they should be able to obtain redress from the courts for damages to life and property from those responsible for these hazardous death traps. This international highway, from Mexico to Canada, is highly improved, except in Idaho where it is still the orphan child of the federal system throughout much of its length.

About one-fourth of a million dollars was spent on what should have been left a farm to market road from Piler to Buhl. The original plan to extend the four lane highway from Piler west was abandoned in 1947 on the change of administrations. This project would have eliminated two dangerous grade crossings and provided a free way to Buhl. This worthwhile improvement now appears to be abandoned.

School Construction 2 Months Ahead Of Schedule and Progressing Rapidly

Construction work on the new \$200,000 Twin Falls high school building is two months ahead of the building schedule and progressing rapidly, according to A. D. Knowlton, project general superintendent. Construction of the new school plant began in February. The low-cost, one-story building provides more floor space per dollar than is possible in a two-story building. Knowlton declared the buildings are definitely not the "little red schoolhouse" variety. They are constructed of red and tan brick giving a "mottled" effect. Progress reports show that roofers are slated to complete their work within the next 10 days. Pouring of the concrete floors will begin sometime next week. The buildings are expected to be completely enclosed by Oct. 15. Concrete and sun shields eliminate the need for installing tinted glass in the many buildings. No delays have hampered construction efforts thus far. Unusually fine weather has resulted in excellent building progress. Knowlton figures that if the warm fall weather continues another week, all precast outside work will be completed. The project is composed of four wings including the main administration building. The structures extend for approximately three city blocks, at the largest end of the street. The work is being done by M. Sweeney and the Triangle Building Company.

Construction on the new \$200,000 high school gymnasium is reported to be on schedule. The project began Aug. 15 with construction calling for the building to be completed in 90 working days. Ninety per cent of the gymnasium's foundation has been completed and trusses framed. Sewer lines excavations are under way and sewers should be connected to city sewer lines in approximately three weeks. Contract for the general construction is being done by the Water Construction Company. The gymnasium will be 144 by 111 feet in size with 16,000 square feet of floor space. Half of the 3,700 seating capacity will be in two balcony areas. Average height of the building will be 22 feet with a ceiling of 22 feet.

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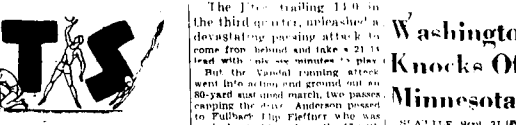

Progress of Projects on King Hill Water District Checked

KING HILLS, Sept. 27.—Progress of improvement projects in the King Hill irrigation district this week was checked Friday on the second annual inspection tour.

The tour began at 10 a. m. and finished at 3 p. m. at the district office here with a lunch served by the King Hill Change women. A discussion period followed the lunch.

A highlight of the tour was an inspection of the automatic gate controlling flow of water from the concrete flume of the Idaho Power company on the Malad river three miles west of Hagerman.

The gate installed in 1926 automatically adjusts the proper flow of water. The water-recontrolling meter installed at this gate in 1931 indicated the gate is working properly.

Progress on steel and concrete

work on the main canal also was noted. Terrell Foster, district manager, pointed out the project had cost about \$700,000 during the past 10 years.

The tour also showed progress on building of seven miles of dirt canal around the west side of Pasadena valley six miles south of King Hill. It is replacing wood pipe installed 24 years ago and carries water to Cilenna Ferry and Summit.

Foster explained the new canal costs are less than repairing the old pipe. The work is being done with district equipment when it can be spared from regular maintenance work.

The cost was estimated at \$20,000 to date and is about 75 per cent completed.

The district's main canal is 44 miles long and has 52 miles of levees. Fifteen miles of the main canal includes concrete flume built by the reclamation bureau in 1907 and 1922.

Six miles of steel and concrete siphons include the one across the Snake river near the Malad river and across Big Pilgrim and Bear gulches about 15 miles down the canal from the Malad, and another

crossing the Snake river near Cilenna Ferry.

Moss in these flumes is controlled by using clay dumped in at one-half to one-mile intervals. Foster said. The silt from the clay helps prevent seepage and in making handy ground easier to water.

Persons on the tour were told breaks in the system have been few. One serious break occurred in 1947 below Bear gulch. The water was out from Aug. 27 to Sept. 10.

Improvements in the system have been made possible by using the large amount of equipment owned by the district, Foster said.
