WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared tonight that the Democrats' "completely artificial" for a valid campaign issue, and said they are attempting to win votes by "whispering-up and down the country trying to scare people... don't elect me," the GOP presidential candidate said. Eisenhower, who is campaigning through Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota, the Democrats in his camp and struck sharply at the Truman and Gov. Earl Warren Democratic ticket.

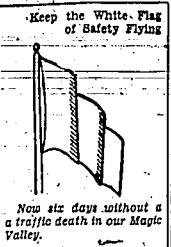

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

Many wonder the reason Washington newspaper conduct their own poll as to whether the country is being run by communists and their agents. Questions may be asked that are not answered by these polls.

Answer: The immediate result, although not especially constructive, seems to be the elimination of the "right to life" money from the current campaign for the simple reason that "everybody doing it." These are too many black pots and kettles on both sides. Moreover, the people do not appear to be too scandalized by these disclosures.

If this easy spirit of tolerance toward this evil should persist, it is probable that the campaign has ended and the settlement has died—down.

It is, however, unfortunate, for it would mean: (1) That only wealthy men can run for office, as Democratic National Chairman Mitchell never said; (2) that the government will be subsidized by private and irresponsible interests.

The Democratic process—under which a Jackson or Lincoln could become President—would, under and through this, be destroyed.

**PROPOSALS**—Numerous proposals for improvement and tightening of the financial sections of our election laws have been offered on Capitol Hill, but in answer, the House of Representatives has passed and the Senate has passed a bill which would, in effect, prevent the filing of such proposals, and would force them to be made along these lines:

1. Require all policy-making officeholders and candidates for office to file a statement of public and private income for a 10-year period.
2. Provide that the government finance the national campaign of both major parties, with provision for minority or independent groups.
3. Increase the salaries of top elective and appointive officials so they can be independent of outside help.
4. Adopt a code of ethics with respect to acceptance of favors of kind or nature any interest having dealings with the government.

Even such a body of statutes would not operate perfectly. It would require the utmost vigilance on the part of the public. As of today, the sky seems to be the limit.

### "Leisure" Time Produces Doll Collection, 400 Rugs

BY NADINE BOYLES  
The pleasure of creating something beautiful and useful during leisure time may be experienced by anyone—but a collection of 70 dolls and 400 crocheted costumes, and more than 400 handwoven rugs of many sizes and colors are Mrs. Roger Thomas, living southwest of Kimberly, has to show for her months of "relaxations."

The cost of Mrs. Thomas' 400 rugs is practically nothing, except for her time, since the rugs discarded clothing and boys no regular rug materials. The frames for her hooked rugs are made by her husband and, as she dislikes to work with the frames on stands, she has only those that fit the particular rug she is making and, without exception, are made by her husband.

Mrs. Thomas doesn't worry about color. She dyes her own materials and enjoys creating the various shades almost as much as the actual rug making. When preparing material for dyeing, she ties up the material in the desired shade. Another method of dyeing she uses is to obtain different kinds of wool which she dyes in different shades differently, thus the same tone is present, but in variations. Mrs. Thomas says she also dyes the wool to the boiling dye as it becomes lighter than obtaining shades of color.

Mrs. Thomas prefers to make hooked rugs because of her enjoyment from working on the crocheted hook on the design—on other types of rugs, the work done on the back and the design cannot be seen.

In addition to hooked rugs, she can display braided, woven and crocheted models. Her crocheted material is as she uses different stitches—corded, flat, plain, loop, etc., and she also has rugs for many combinations of hooked design center is completed with a braided or crocheted border.

Mrs. Thomas has an idea of about two weeks to make a hooked rug; many times working six hours a day with her daughter, Evelyn, help with the housework. Mrs. Thomas sometimes works from eight until midnight.

Her designs are very much in detail—the veins in the leaves and stems vary as she uses different patterns. Mrs. Thomas finds the summer especially helpful in her work, as she can get ideas from flowers to aid her in her designs. Flowers in handkerchiefs also have supplied many helpful hints.

Slides of the rugs vary from the small bath mat to the large, \$11 foot braided rug of silk pieces with shadings of gray, blue and green, and a 12-18 inch rug of silk pieces of velvet with shades of ivory, brown, rust and blue are the giants of the group.

As if turning out 400 rugs wasn't enough to keep one person busy, there is the doll collection started

For daughter Evelyn. The unusual feature is the crocheted costume each wear. All the costumes are complete in detail—from gown, hat, shoes to lingerie, all crocheted work. Imagine a tiny shoe less than an inch in length with a tiny button that permits its removal.

The dolls range in size from three inches to eight inches high and several sets are complete, for example, a bridal party (including the bride, bridesmaid, best man, flower girl, maid, ring bearer and flower girl), Mother Goose characters and circus characters, the "Lionheart" with a bright red coat, white topknot, top hat and whip, and the Hindu dancer, complete in costume, even with intricate poses.

Also an eye-catcher in the collection is the various "Miss New York" wearing a blue gown trimmed with white and featuring a "fishnet" skirt over a white tulle skirt with blue lace. A blue hat with a large plume perches on the doll's head and the entire outfit is complete to complete the all-crocheted costume.

"The 'Lionheart' is attired in a crocheted hoarse, wide-brimmed hat, chain, skirt, boots with yellow stripes, and a matching yellow blouse with white buttons down the front and on the cuff.

Gingerella is a dream in her white loop-knit gown over peacock. Metallic crocheted accents the gown and the very tiny crocheted gold sandals she wears complete the fairyland illusion.

Each doll is an individual. For instance, the Girl of the Golden West, Park Avenue Belle, Sunbonnet Sue, Jack and Jill, Overall Boy, Queen of Hearts and Cactus Fairy, all have their own charm and each stands alone in its attractiveness.

Mrs. Thomas now is working on a collection of "mattions of the world"—doll and Christmas dolls, including Santa Claus and the Christmas Fairy, as she expects to be busy for some time to come.

Not only does Mrs. Thomas have time for other accomplishments, including the silver anniversary party participating in church and community work, but she is also much in demand by crocheters throughout Magic Valley for her book reviews. It will be said that she spends her leisure time creating many things of beauty.

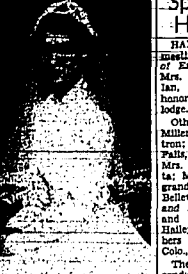

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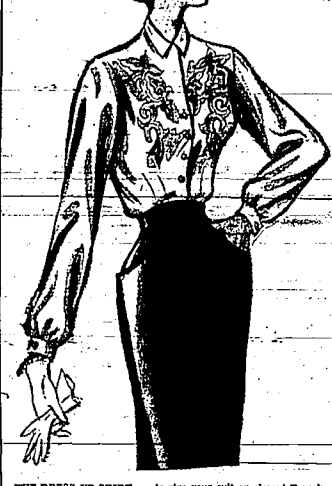

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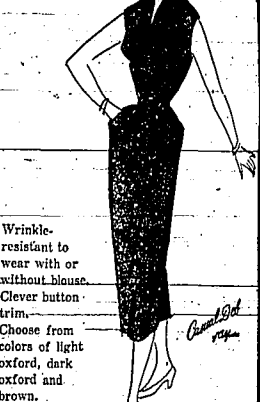

Idaho Moves Up for Lamb Mutton Total

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (Special)—Idaho's sheep and lamb slaughter for the first eight months of 1952 more than tripled the total for the same period last year to move the state from eighth to sixth rank in the 11 far western states.

The January-August figure for this year was 15,000 head, the USDA crop reporting board said. Last year's slaughter was only 4,400 head. California continued to lead the nation and the far west with 1952 total of 1,238,000 head. Colorado was second in the west with 325,000. Utah third with 147,000. Oregon fourth with 127,400 and Washington fifth with 95,900.

In total live weight, Idaho jumped from 783,000 pounds for the first eight months of 1951 to 1,020,000 this year.

For the month of August alone the state slaughter was 4,700 head—more than the entire eight-month period in 1951. In August, 1951, the total was only 1,900.

Average live weight per head in August this year was 100 pounds, down three pounds from the August, 1951, figure.

Interest Rates on Bonds Explained

BURLEY, Oct. 4.—The new interest rates on the outstanding indebtedness of the Cassia county school district has effected a considerable saving to taxpayers in the past three years, Superintendant Virgil reports.

Before reorganization all bonds of the various school districts in Cassia county were held by the state department of public investments at three per cent interest. The financing of the former indebtedness and a favorable sale of the building bonds the interest rates are now two and one-half per cent respectively, the superintendent explained.

This represents a saving of \$125 a year on every \$100,000 of bonded indebtedness, he added.

Although the bonded indebtedness before reorganization totaled \$179,320 and in 1945 another \$100,000 bond issue was passed, regular payments together with balances available for bond payments have reduced the bonded indebtedness to \$172,000.

Widely said the balances could be paid entirely in a period of four years at present rates of payment.

Such injuries result from falls, blows, automobile or other accidents, or strains from running, jumping, lifting, hitting, etc., which often cause no distress at the time and are almost forgotten. Sometimes they arise from sitting or working in one position for years, from pelvic injuries at childbirth, or other factors which appear to be too slight to cause trouble.

### PATIENTS SELDOM SUSPECT INJURIES AS CAUSE OF DISEASE

Histories, X-rays and other tests have almost invariably revealed some type of spinal injury to the many multiple sclerosis cases treated at Spears. 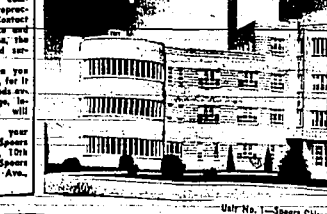
