

## PK Forces Win White Horse Hill Again in Combat

Oct. 10 (Friday) (AP)—South Korean troops early on Oct. 10 (Friday) after a half of red fire and drove Chinese from White Horse Hill, focal point of battle in communist drive north of Seoul.

A U. S. American officer at White Horse said the Koreans are engaged in a "terrible hand-to-hand battle" between bayonets, rifles and rocks. He said he has seen a stray grenade.

There was no estimate of the number of tanks during the American invasion and the exchanges between Russian-built T-34 and American tanks had taken place.

2 MIGs Downed

J. S. Sabatelli pilots reported they estimated the Reds had shot down 8 MIGs and damaged three others in air battles in MIGs they were flying.

An American officer at the White Horse Hill fight, now hearing his own side, said the Koreans were fighting at a "bloody pace" against the Chinese who "have used up one position in the battle and are starting on their second."

8,000 Loss

He estimated the Reds had lost 8,000 killed and wounded in three days of fighting around White Horse. A Chinese division usually numbers 10,000.

The U. S. 8,000 army said about 10,000 Chinese were digging in on the crest of the mountain and nearby Arrowhead ridge, the peak dominates the Oboron valley and the American position.

Up to 15,000 reds attacked across the western and central fronts Monday night in the biggest counter-offensive since the summer camp.

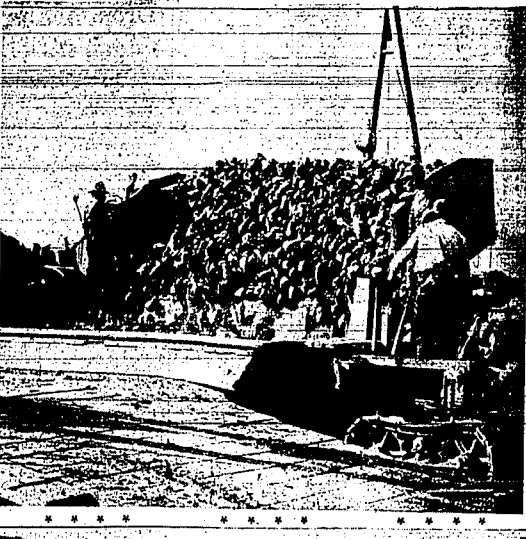

### Sugar Plants Turn as Harvest Of Beets Gathers Momentum

Amalgamated Sugar company factories in Twin Falls and Rupert were turning in high gear Thursday as beets streamed from the fields.  
 Harry Adams, Idaho district manager, reported a good crop and a high yield as prospects brighten.  
 Harvest of the beets began Monday and there were sufficient beets on hand at the factories to begin operations Wednesday.  
 Elcock said beets appear very heavy in sugar content. He declared that this year's crop should equal last year's crop, which was one of the highest in the past ten years.  
 Better than 11,000 tons of beets were coked at the Twin Falls sugar company in the first three days of harvest. An additional 10,000 tons were delivered to the Rupert plant.  
 Delivery of beets for the first three days of the season has been and can be attributed to the mechanization of the harvest.  
 Harvesting operations in the area north of the Snake river and at stations south of the Snake river will be halted Friday and Saturday, he announced. The move is necessary because the extreme warm weather makes the storage of beets impossible.  
 The two day recess will allow the sugar company factories to process the beets already piled. Both factories will accept beets again Monday morning and operations are expected to be continuous until the harvest is finished and processed.  
 Elcock pointed out, though, that warm weather allows beets to better mature and increases the sugar content.  
 Harvesting operations are expected to be completed by Nov. 8 or 10. Both the Twin Falls and Rupert sugar plants are fully manned and are expected to complete sugar beet processing in approximately 75 days.  
 Beets are being transported to the local processing plants by truck and rail. Elcock said that the Twin Falls sugar plant requires about 75 carloads of beets or 30,000 tons a day to maintain full operation. The Rupert plant can handle about 60 carloads or 23,000 tons a day. At the present rate, 400 truck loads of beets amounting to approximately 24,000 tons a day are arriving at the Twin Falls plant.  
 Beets are being piled and will be processed after beet harvest is over, Elcock said.

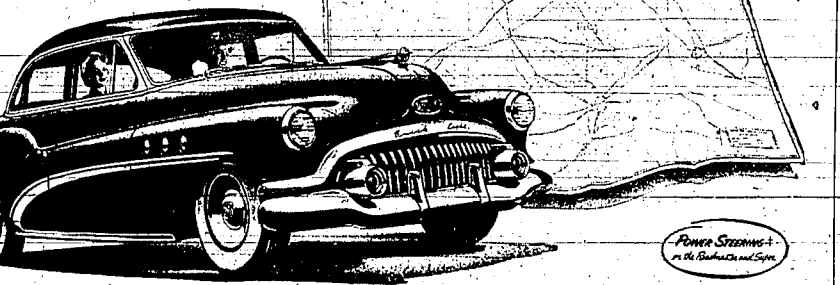

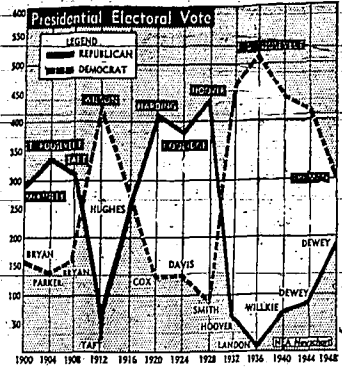

# Peacetime Use of A-Power Is Nearer Than You Think, Nuclear Expert Says

## Sees Gains

The author of the report on the scientific development of atomic energy for peacetime purposes, Dr. John B. Dunning, physicist at the University of Columbia, said today that the peacetime use of atomic power is nearer than you think.

The recent talk of "push-button warfare" and the development of atomic weapons may have given rise to the thought that a "push-button" war may not be too far distant.

But the prospect of a home owner heating and air-conditioning his house, operating the family washing machine and the family car and even moving the lawn from power supplied by a lump of uranium in his cellar isn't an immediate prospect. Nevertheless, the general peacetime use of atomic power is nearer than he thinks.

The atomic energy field typifies power and energy which can be used for human good or destruction. Man always has had to make a choice, even when he invented the atom bomb.

The question by using the atom to build a house or better out his neighbor's beam. Man answered the question by using the atom for both.

The enormous energy in a block of uranium generates the same problem of choice simply on a larger scale.

The present U. S. atomic energy program is largely the stockpiling of fissionable fuels usable later either for the production of energy or production. Basically, nearly everything working in this field always has in the back of his mind that

It's about the size of a banquet hall and weighs 6,000 tons.

Its sole purpose is to make high speed atomic fragments serve as bullets to bombard other atoms and find out how their nuclei are made. This process has produced over 100 new synthetic kinds of atoms. Nature made only about 200 atom types.

Through the process, other metals can be changed to gold. Unferrous alloy platinum is the best starting material for this so it is not too successful economically.

However, uses of atomic energy in practical ways outside the research laboratory are steadily opening up. Nuclear-power-plant-for-submarines and ships are being developed. The released energy in a one-inch cube block of uranium is enough to drive a ship across the Atlantic and back.

A few months ago, the announcement of the end of the first phase of the application of uranium power to aircraft propulsion was made, and the first units are being developed by aircraft companies.

These developments in transportation are continued by the fact that U-235 chain reactions at high power levels give off a large amount of radiation. The nuclear reactions must be sustained by a number of feet of shielding, which makes such power devices have a minimum weight of perhaps 20 to 30 tons. Because of this, atom-powered automobiles and lawnmowers are some distance in the future.

Atomic power plants to produce electricity and to operate industrial activities are approaching realization. Four industry teams are working on the best design for such atomic power plants, which will not only be able to produce power, but may also produce appreciably more per atomic fuel than is actually burned.

Even now, the production of this atomic power is cheaper than aviation gasoline. It-205 costs perhaps \$10,000 to \$20,000 a pound, but compared to the cost of coal or equivalent energy content, the cost of the energy would be around \$10 per pound and maybe eventually as low as \$2 a ton.

While there may never be an atomic refrigerator every cellar, it is certainly probable that when you toggle the switch on your electric toaster, the toast will pop up powered to a turn by power from atomic energy.

Our present achievements are based squarely on the use of energy. We are almost on the threshold of a new industrial and social revolution based on this new source of energy. All of this mechanization, as we look into the atomic age, provides a broad base for the development of a the finest aspects of man-

we are really working to use this atomic fission in all kinds of peacetime applications.

The real source of energy is in the tiny nucleus inside the atom. The problem is to find out more about this nucleus.

To do this, scientists the world over have been building larger and larger atom-smashers, or cyclotrons. We have one of the largest in the world at Columbia university.

He got a crushed foot when his tank was knocked out of action by a German anti-tank gun crew. The injury resulted in the amputation of his left foot.

Devries spent more than a year in an army hospital before being discharged in 1916. Following his discharge from the army he worked as a bicycle repairman, and later as a farmer. He was then hired by the Jerome Cooperative creamery as a cheese maker.

Lions Smith, Devries' employer, reports he has found Devries to be one of his most efficient and loyal employees who asks no special consideration.

# Acheson Not In Favor of Russ Break

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson told Sen. William F. Knowland breaking diplomatic relations with Russia as proposed by the California Republican "would be a step of the utmost seriousness, with world-wide consequences."

Knowland urged Acheson last week to sever diplomatic relations with Russia and demand the recall of Soviet Ambassador Georgi N. Zarubin in retaliation for Kennan's ouster of U. S. Ambassador George F. Kennan.

Acheson replied in a telegram to Knowland, the state department is "continuing to examine all aspects of our relations with the Soviet government and your recommendations will be borne in mind." But the secretary said the many factors other than those cited by Knowland would have to be considered before making any decision.

Acheson said Friday the United States had no present intention of taking for Zarubin's recall or of breaking diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union. A state department spokesman said this thinking has not been changed since Friday.

Acheson pointed out to Knowland that he had said Friday the United States did not accept charges made by the Soviet government against Kennan. He also recalled that he had supported Kennan's views on the treatment of foreigners by the Soviet government.

### Miner Union Report Cites T-H Threat

CINCINNATI, Oct. 9 (AP)—The United Mine Workers union said yesterday the entire labor movement is in peril from damage suits brought by employers under the Taft-Hartley law.

The union's convention heard a report by John L. Lewis, the organization's president, and other union officers estimating "at least" 200 million dollars of damage suits are pending against unions.

The barrage of money claims, the report announced, is "an unparalleled threat to all labor."

The Taft-Hartley law allows damage suits against unions for breach of contract and illegal boycotts. Federal courts recently upheld damage suits in Alaska against the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union and in Pennsylvania against an outspoken foe of the labor act, which has paid more than two million dollars in fines for such conduct since the law's enactment.

### New Fireball

## Is Sighted in Western Sky

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Oct. 9 (AP)—Another green fireball was reported in the southwestern United States last night and may mark the beginning of a new series of reports on the phenomenon.

Dr. Lincoln La Paz, director of the Institute of Meteoritics at the University of New Mexico, said he has received about 30 calls from persons living here who saw a "bright green" object about 6:15 p.m. Other reports were received at his home from 27 States, Tex.

La Paz has said before many more of the objects, which neither he nor any other scientist has been able to identify, are slighted most frequently in the last few months of the year than at other times. It was during November, 1951, that several of the "bright green" objects were seen in New Mexico and Arizona.

La Paz said he has been unable to contact anyone in the Tucson or Douglas, Ariz. areas who saw the objects. He also has a lack of reports from the vicinity on poor weather conditions. He said that the phenomenon indicated is plummeted from the sky and is similar to the Las Cruces, Deming or Lordsburg, N. M.

**Cats off Sparks**  
All persons seeing the object said it was "bright green" and gave off a "boom" from the west. News reported hearing any noise.

La Paz and other meteor experts have hypothesized the possibility of such objects being meteors. They point out that a "bonfire" meteor streaks in a series of explosions and usually is red in color.

### U. S. Seeking Way to Blast Recall Action

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—The United States is looking for a way to hit back at Russia for ousting American Ambassador George F. Kennan.

State department policy at the moment is to keep the Kremlin from taking any action which the recall may take. No one can say for sure this government will not order the recall of Soviet Ambassador Georgi N. Zarubin or that diplomatic relations will not be severed if these two moves are not anticipated.

**Question Open**  
The question of retaliation was left wide open by two state department spokesmen yesterday on the Kennan incident.

"We are continuing to examine all aspects of our relations with the Soviet government," Secretary of State Dean Acheson informed Ben H. Williams, U. S. News and World Report, who had suggested Zarubin's ouster and a break in diplomatic relations.

Williams said that Kennan was quickly by publication of a cryptic Soviet argument for denouncing Kennan's recall. But here again, the state department gave no hint of its future action.

**Compared to Nazis**  
The Soviet based their demand on Kennan's recent comparison between the "icy cold" life in Moscow with that of the "iceberg" in Nazi Germany where he was interned briefly in 1941-42. This, said the Soviet, amounted to "a series of false and hostile" statements by the American diplomat.

The Soviet, who said Kennan had "accurately and in moderate language" described the position of foreign diplomats accredited to the Soviet government.

### '52 'VE' Is Not Victory Sign, But Symbol for Disease Fight

WASHINGTON (NEA)—One of the nation's worst fears for animal disease epidemics has been eliminated by a state of emergency declared by the U. S. department of agriculture. This latest move is caused by a serious outbreak of the swine disease called vesicular exanthema. The epidemic provides another boost to soaring food prices and has caused marketing centers began with an outbreak of anthrax last winter. Next came an onslaught of the dread foot-and-mouth disease in Canada close to the U. S. border which required sudden and drastic measures in the U. S. to prevent its spread over the whole North American continent.

Now its vesicular exanthema—called simply "VE"—

The total cost in meat loss to the public, loss to the farmer, and expense of trying to control these diseases is impossible to estimate at this time, a USDA spokesman says. But he admits it is tremendous. And it could be much worse if the present emergency measures fail to curb the spread of the disease.

The cost to U. S. taxpayers of fighting the foot-and-mouth epidemic in Mexico, to keep it out of the U. S., has now reached 124 million dollars. That's an indication of what such programs can cost.

USDA experts are holding their breath, hoping that their emergency quarantine and quick-kill methods will confine VE to the 18 states in which it now exists.

VE affects only pigs, not humans or other animals. But it is very similar to foot-and-mouth disease. Sores appear on the animals' feet, pads, on mucous membranes and on the skin of the snout and nostrils. Death rate is not high, but it strikes the animal and causes other complications.

Infected or exposed animals cannot be sold as food for humans. Under the emergency regulations, they are slaughtered and either

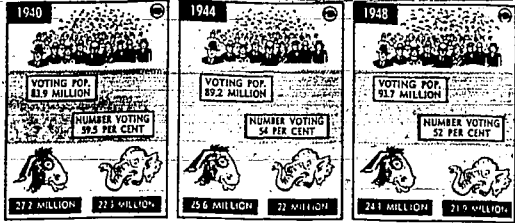

### Replacements' Shortage May Slow Rotation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—American servicemen may have to serve longer hitch in Korea because of the shortage of replacements.

While no decision has been reached, Gen. J. Lawton Collins, chief of staff, told a news conference yesterday that Korean tours of duty have to be lengthened.

In elaboration, an army spokesman said rotation of Korean troops is being continued. But he said the rate of rotation may be slowed.

He pointed out that the army always has had the present rate of only 90-long-as-adequate-replacements available to take the place of men eligible to go home.

The army is threatened with a shortage of replacements because of the present high rate of turnover of personnel. The army expects to have more than 100,000 men a year as soldiers complete their enlistment periods and others taken by the army or through the national guard or reserves become eligible for discharge.

These men will be replaced through the draft, enlistments and reenlistments. But there may be a shortage of trained men to replace those who are discharged.

Under the present system, soldiers in Korea become eligible for rotation after acquiring the points. They receive four points for each month served in the combat zone, two points a month for forward area, two points a month for rear area, and one point a month for service in Japan.

The rotation program began in April, 1951, and up to now about 300,000 army personnel have been rotated from the far east.

### War Would Mean End of U. S. Red Speaker Declares

MOSCOW, Oct. 9 (AP)—Soviet Deputy Premier Nikolai Bulganin said today that the United States would start a third world war would mean the end of the United States as a fighting power.

Bulganin and British communist chief Harry Pollitt met at the side of speakers to the podium after Maxim G. Saburov, chairman of the State Planning Commission, outlined objectives of the current five-year plan.

Pointing to the strength of the Soviet Union, Bulganin predicted that if American aggressors "kicked the frame of a new world war, it will be their last one. The deputy premier however, appealed for still further strengthening of the Soviet alliance.

Pollitt stressed principally the assistance of the congress for workers of the world.

### South Koreans 'Stay, Fight' Overwhelming Chinese Waves

WHITE HORSE MOUNTAIN, Korea, Oct. 9 (AP)—American military advisers said today that South Korean troops fought on White Horse mountain against the heaviest odds faced by any United Nations troops in more than a year.

"These little guys are unbelievable," said Maj. Clarence Crabtree, Bloomberg, Pa. "I've seen plenty of war, but I've never seen soldiers with such fierce determination to succeed."

St. Alfred P. Hughes of Seattle, Wash., said the South Koreans "just don't quit."

2. A probe into the role of Newbold Morris, former special corruption hunter for the Truman administration, in the story of the Meacham. Morris heads a foundation which owns the Meacham, through subsidiary firms. He has denounced the government repositioning plan.

### 'Ike' Camp Says Truman Made Needless Concessions to Russ

EN-ROUTE WITH HIS NEWSPAPER, Oct. 9 (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign staff today charged that President Truman made needless concessions to Russia in 1945 even after he knew the Russians would enter the Pacific war.

Rep. Walter H. Judd, R. Minn., traveling with Eisenhower as a campaign adviser, said Mr. Truman was a "reckless man" who committed "major postwar errors of judgment."

"When President Truman went to Potsdam in 1945 he was warned by Gen. Eisenhower not to make any concessions to the Soviet Communists in order to achieve his objective of getting them into war against Japan," Judd said.

"It was not necessary to make any concessions," Judd said. "The President himself told me just before he went to Potsdam that he knew the Russians were coming into the Pacific war."

"I urged that if he made any concessions, they should be for the purpose of keeping them out of that war rather than getting them in, because their coming in would do more harm than good," Judd said.

Eisenhower himself said in a foreign policy address at San Francisco last night that "political expediency" of Mr. Truman's administration led to this country being "winded" by Russia in the Korean peace negotiations.

Judd said in a statement that the published diary of the late Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal showed Eisenhower had warned Mr. Truman not to make any concessions to the Russians at Potsdam.

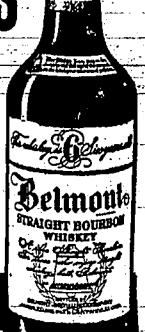

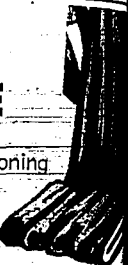

### "Some Increase" Predicted for Potato Production Next Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (Special)—"Some increase" in 1953 potato production is forecast by the USDA bureau of agricultural economics, with a "conservative" estimate 15 percent above the record prices of 1952.

"The 1952 crop is expected to total about 330 million bushels," the report said. "If the weather next year is average or better, the same acreage as planned in 1952 would produce a larger crop."

"Because of the rapid marketing of the 1952 crop, and because unfavorable weather cut yields in some of the late states—particularly Maine—the potato supply for the next spring threatens to be again on the short side, based on the Sept. 1 crop report."

"But, southern early states, it was pointed out, might increase planting to offset an anticipated shortage in the spring."

"The report warned that a seasonal decline-in-price-may-be expected even this year when the late crop moves in volume. The late crop is estimated to be at least 15 million bushels larger than the 1951 "disaster" production.

"Also," the forecast noted, "the

### Agent Voices Caution Note For Farmers

Licensed Men Banned

He pointed out that licensed warehousemen, truck buyers and truckers are bonded. The bond provides protection for the grower.

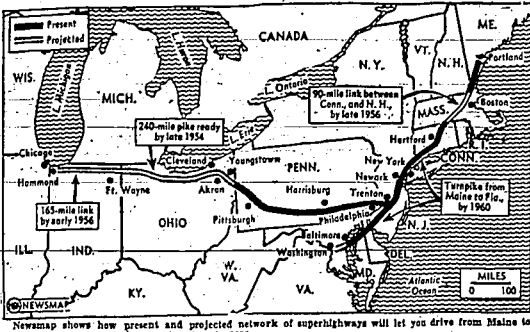
Truckers giving checks, asking credit or soliciting consignments should be avoided unless they can show a license, Bever warned.

Credit Warning

Warehousemen, truck buyers and truck buyers' agents also should not be extended credit nor should their checks be accepted unless they can show a license, he said.

The penalty for operating without a license is a fine of \$100, six months' imprisonment and \$50 per day of each operation, Bever explained.

CLEVELAND (NEA)—By late 1955, completion of the Ohio turnpike and some other projected ones, will enable you to drive all the way from Portland, Me., to a point just outside Chicago on high speed superhighways.

### Candidates Setting Precedent in Their Use of Plane Travel for '52 Campaign

WALDEN LARSEN (NEA)—If the candidates had back platforms and a 5,000-foot strip of runway, they would be a step they would take for a presidential campaign of this deficiency, however, candidates have decided that the airplane is better than the country to the extent of Democratic support. It is estimated that Gov. Stevenson will do about 85 per cent of his traveling in the air, and the rest by car. Eisenhower will do even less.

The candidate and his helpers, a total of about 30 persons, can move in one four-engine plane. The press, TV and radio people follow in one or two other planes, which they pay for themselves. American airlines, which has done most of the hauling so far, charges 42 per mile for its big DC-6. That price includes all food, with no charges for stops or for being on the ground overnight. The cost per mile on a special train is 4 1/2 cents per person. But that is figured on the basis of a minimum of 12 persons on the train. On top of this, passengers must pay additional for Pullman accommodations, food and tips. The special Pullman car which a candidate usually rides in costs a minimum of \$22 per day. There are still more charges for switching, air conditioning and stopping for any length of time which requires special sanitary arrangements.

The one charge you have on the plane and not on the train is for a hotel room. Practically all of the airlines will be used by the candidates and press some time during the campaign, although American has the cheapest rate. Outright charges \$22.50 a mile for its standard DC-6 and \$25.00 a mile for its bigger DC-6B. Eastern is most expensive, with a cost of \$22.50 per mile for its big Constellation. Aside from cost, an argument is being made among veteran newsmen and politicians who have accompanied previous campaigners, as to which mode of travel does most damage to body and soul. There are those who claim that the hotel and shower, each night, during a plane tour, outweigh the advantages of train travel. That the other side holds that early morning flights, usually necessary to get to the plane, is a "barbaric practice" they do not follow on the train.
