Red Speaker Says U. S. Lack Of Faith Led to Korea Defeat

MOSCOW, Oct. 19—Soviet War Minister A. M. Vasilevski has told the 19th Communist party congress the United States suffered a defeat unprecedented in its history in Korea because front-line troops lacked faith in their cause. In a speech delivered Tuesday, but not published until today, Vasilevski said: "More than two years of war in Korea have shown that the American imperialists have suffered a disastrous military, political and moral defeat, unprecedented in their history."

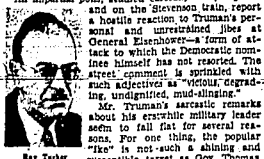

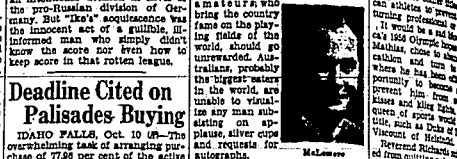

POTATO FIGHT

The whole conflict of Republican versus Democratic philosophy on the farm program is neatly wrapped up in the personal experience of Harold L. McKinley, a legislator from the state of Idaho.

McKinley is now serving as chairman of the Republican national committee's farm council. He is also national chairman of the Republican farm councils which, meeting in St. Louis, before the Chicago convention, drafted and practically dictated the farm policy plank later adopted by the GOP.

The most important thing about Mr. McKinley's career, however, is that for the last three years he has been battling the department of agriculture and its farm marketing agreements, particularly as it applies to potatoes.

In a long hassle involving charges and counter-charges, denials, press releases, injunctions and a court case which would appear to be the winner, on points at least, The McKinley case really goes back to 1941.

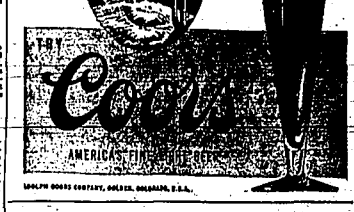

The compact commission will meet during the season of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee.

The governor said J. V. Rogers, director of the department of conservation of the state of Washington, was elected chairman, and Frank A. Banks, bureau of reclamation and U. S. government representative, was named vice chairman.

The compact commission will be located in Idaho. The commission has been authorized to negotiate a compact between Oregon, Idaho, Washington, Montana and Wyoming.

"The compact commission has a big task ahead of it and in my opinion should be given the fullest assistance in shaping the future development of the entire Columbia river watershed," Jordan said.

"This organization of representatives of the states in the basin, working with related agencies in the United States, will establish the machinery through which interstate agreements can be reached on the water resources of the entire basin. It is an excellent demonstration of how the states can assume their individual and collective responsibilities in solving problems that involve a community of interests."

Probe Indicates Missing B-29 May Have Crashed in Red Area

TOKYO, Oct. 10 (AP)—The air force said today the B-29 Superfort which disappeared Tuesday in northern Japan near the Soviet-occupied Kurile Islands may have drifted across the international boundary and crashed.

The Superfort was approached by a fast-flying plane from Russian territory by its image disappeared under instruments tracking the path of both aircraft.

The air force did not claim the Superfort was shot down but said it was "crippled."

Witnesses told the air force they saw the Superfort belching black smoke and crash at a point beyond the border.

The times of their observations checked in general with the loss of the B-29 disappearance on the radar screen, the air force said. It called the persons interviewed "reliable Japanese witnesses."

The air force diversified its original speculation that the Superfort crashed into the sea off Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost island, after the encounter with the unidentified plane.

"An oil slick stretched two miles east of Okhotsk shortly after the plane's disappearance is now believed to have been coincidental and not related to the incident," the air force said.

A veteran Japanese lighthouse keeper told the air force he saw a column of smoke on the eastern horizon over the Russian-held Kurile Islands.

Inquiry Made In Crash Fatal To 11 Airmen

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (AP)—The air force continued its investigation today of a collision between an F-34 jet fighter and B-29 bomber on Oct. 11 airmen aboard the Superfort near Wilsonville, Ore.

Alan Edin, Ida. man was one of the 11 victims. He was 8/5ft, Clarence A. Krohn, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Krohn.

A preliminary report issued yesterday from Travis air force base, Fairfield, Calif., where the B-29 was based, said the two planes were engaging in a mock dogfight when the accident occurred Wednesday.

No Explosives

The air force statement said preliminary investigation "revealed that a fighter-type aircraft was involved in the loss of the B-29... indicating that a collision, rather than an explosion, killed the 11 airmen."

It was revealed that the fighter involved was an F-34 assigned to the 48th Fighter Squadron at McChord air force base near Tacoma, Wash.

Fighter Lands Safely

Air force officers confirmed reports that the jet's right wing tip fuel tank was gone and that the plane landed safely at McChord.

However, full details of the crash were not released and the air force said it still had not been satisfied with the investigation so far.

The F-34 was piloted by First Lieut. F. W. McInchou with Second Lieut. P. G. Dunsen as radar observer. McInchou's version of the incident was not released but an officer at McChord said the pilot was not sure himself about what happened.
