Demos Assert N.Y. Heckling Is GOP Plot

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (AP)—Democratic charged leaders in the New York state committee organized groups of youngsters to boo President Truman during his New York state whistle-stop tour. Democratic State Chairman Paul P. Fitzpatrick said in a statement "this ruse is to check all Americans." At "stop after stop" small but vocal groups of youngsters booed the President, he said. Most of them carried painted signs. "Information reaching us at several stops was that the youngsters were paid by local Republican leaders at the direction of the Republican state committee," he said.

Asked to comment on this charge a Republican state committee spokesman retorted: "How ashamed you will be if you find out that we have been conducting this kind of a campaign. It wouldn't be necessary to pay anybody to boo him."

One Eisenhower supporter said one Eisenhower supporter said facial injuries and a hand were injured in an assault charge in the wake of Mr. Truman's New York state tour. And so far it all was Mr. Truman's own fault, he said. He said he stopped a "joke" on the way from the rear platform of the airplane.

The lasso-losing incident occurred at Independence, N.Y., Friday when 4,000 greeted the President when he appeared to make a brief speech.

A heckler in the crowd tossed the lasso to it splashed on the railroad station platform some 25 feet away from Mr. Truman. The President apparently didn't notice the incident. At Schenectady, N. Y., a few hours later another heckler carrying a flag with the name of the President on a right cross to the jaw by a Stevenson supporter. The assailant disappeared in the crowd. The tables were turned when Mr. Truman's train arrived at Grand Central station here last night. Stanley Stone, 23, a merchant seaman, was arrested for "assaulting" the President.

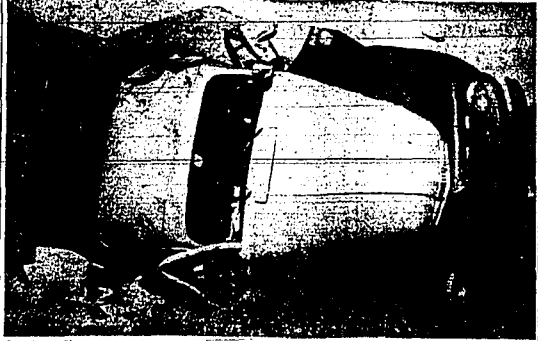

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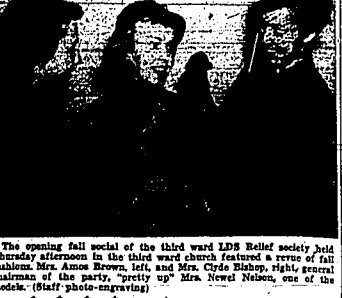

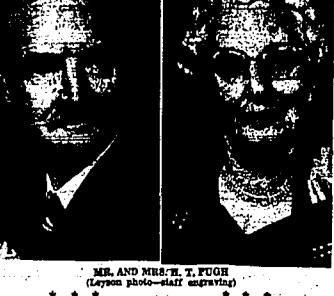

3. Purchase of 48 acres of power company property for the fish hatchery at Americana Falls, for an estimated price of \$800.

4. Exchange of two lots now owned by the state for two lots now privately owned, and purchase of two more lots in the Teton river park area for the purpose of consolidating a game department holding in a public access area.

5. Granting an extension to St. Martin Lumber company to allow additional time to remove lumber from department property.

Jensen Urges Local Action in Drafting of U. S. Water Laws

BOISE, Oct. 11 (Special)—Idaho irrigation districts should provide the clause protecting irrigation in any federal legislation affecting Idaho watersheds, W. H. (Peter) Jensen, Democratic candidate for congress, said Saturday in a statement released here.

Jensen said he feels strongly that the proposed Hells canyon project on the Snake river is "not even close to being fair" in the amount of power that would be allocated to Idaho.

Rather than oppose construction of the big downstream dam, Jensen argued, Idaho should bargain with its neighbor state of Oregon and Washington to secure a greater power allotment, in return giving the great states assistance in meeting their navigation and anti-stream pollution needs.

Jensen said the best way to assure the future of irrigation in this state is "not blind opposition to any project taken before congress, but a vigorous agreement written in clauses covering and protecting irrigation rights as drafted by our own water experts."

He said Idaho has attorneys suited to the job and mentioned one as being Pat Parry, Twin Falls. Jensen said Parry has an international reputation on water law.

"Because I have returned to be a citizen's representative of large-scale hydro-electric development, it has been said that I would jeopardize Idaho water rights.

"This is a plain falsehood. I am a farmer and that is the last thing I would do.

"The biggest danger to our present and future irrigation is that by standing alone in opposition to full development of the steps of the northwest, we will be badly out-
