Conroy, director of the professor and special editor of the issue, and in supporting statements, the scientists said that the state department for "heavy and needless red tape procedures" and "over-ignorance and unawareness" by Gen. Pat McCarran, D., Nev., is an "obstacle to progress."

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 13 (AP)—Pope Pius XII has warned that the world is threatened by a "violent and subtle" enemy which is trying to build a godless economy.

The Pontiff addressed 20,000 members of the Italian Catholic action organization and other faithful presiding in St. Peter's square. He left little doubt that he referred to communism although he did not mention it by name.

"To the listeners it was necessary to 'halt this enemy and keep him from sowing ruin and death,'" he said.

"Today not only Italy and Rome, but the entire world is threatened," the Pope said.

"Do not ask us who this enemy is nor how he is dressed. He is everywhere and among us all. He is violent and subtle. He is working towards the intellectual, moral and social disintegration of all."

"The highest nature without grace, reason without faith, liberty without authority and often authority without liberty. No man is becoming always more conscious."

"It is attempting to construct a world on foundations which we do not hesitate to point out as responsible on the moral and political level for our humanity, namely economy without God."

Plumas County Sheriff M. H. Schoeler said at noon that doctors permitted her to question the child.

"I'm banking a lot on what she will tell us," he said. "She's a bright little girl, way beyond her years."

A general alert was ordered throughout the western states for information leading toward a solution of the tragedy that stunned this tiny mountain town.

"Their slayer" were picked up near Albuquerque, N. M., Sunday but they were cleared a short while later. The only remaining clue were a blood-caked piece of steel pipe and a length of oak cord.

Young and the children apparently were waylaid by one or more men Friday afternoon while they were on their way back to Chester from the bank at nearby Westwood where Young had drawn \$7,100 to cash J. Edgar's paycheck.

Tests Provide Clue on Lead

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—Tests have shown lead can be recovered through conventional processes from a rare ore mined in Idaho, the federal bureau of mines reported today.

The bureau said "valuable" knowledge of ways of separating ore containing nonradioactive lead was gained through tests of ore taken from the Sherman mine in the Island district near Burke.

The predominant lead-bearing mineral was a minor ore called pyromorphite, little of which is being mined in the region. Laboratory experiments were made with four tons of pyromorphite lead ore, then tests were made.

"It was found that conventional concentration methods of flotation and gravity separation give excellent lead recovery," the bureau said. "Considerable difficulty was encountered, however, in recovering the silver contained in the ore."

The tests were made in the bureau laboratory at Albany, Ore.

Near Recluse North of Ketchum Sells Idyllic Home in Woods to Church Group

CAREY, Oct. 13—To most people the kind of life lived by Frank Young, Ketchum, would be a most inconceivable existence. His daily contact with people in the last 33 years have been with passing sheepherders, deer-hunters and the people he sees on his few trips to town for supplies.

Since 1911 he has lived in a little canyon located in the Sawtooth national forest, approximately 20 miles north of Ketchum. If people want pine, tree, and mountain, among them and a fishing stream handy, then Young's place is the spot.

When he arrived there he obtained from an old farmer called Rustan John. With the use of the saw mill he saved out enough lumber to build four large cabins and several sheds and outbuildings. He even saved the flooring in each building but says that was an extremely hard job.

Between building the cabins in the summer and trapping in the winter he has lived away many years. He also located a gold and silver mine but reports that developing it was too big a job to undertake alone.

His buildings were purchased from him last month by the Blaine stake of the LDS church and will be used by various auxiliary groups for summer recreation activities. The large cabin with the group really is a house large enough to house 10 people. All the furniture, chairs, tables, cupboards and desks were built by Young. The house has elaborate rustic decorations. Long the door are rough pine slabs, unpeeled. The lumber used in the upstairs walls has been arranged in fan shape and the design emphasized by inch boards fitted between each night inch one to give a dark and light effect.

Young's most prized possession is a 1916 Buick. It was one of the first things a person noticed as he drove into the spot. Surrounding the car was an eight-foot fence of chicken-wire topped by a roof. This "cage" Young said kept curious hands off the machine. The automobile was licensed last in 1942. He plans to sell the car as an antique and to make it more saleable he sent it to a garage in Ketchum with instructions that it was to be put in A-1 shape. When he bought the car, his first, he had the dealer drive it to his place and then look over.

"I didn't need a lot of lessons to learn," he said.

During the summer Young raises a small garden which supplies his family and cans any surplus he has. Surrounding the garden is a light fence to keep out the rabbits. The rest of his time he spends hauling iron logs which he cuts into sizes lengths for use during the winter.

He also does his own laundry and has a woman, would, be kind, to have her white things look as white as his do.

In commenting on the winters he says they are too long. Most of the days a car cannot be driven over his road until in June. Last year it was snowed to town for supplies.

Last winter the highway department made an effort to move him to town so they wouldn't have to worry about him. But before two weeks had gone by he was in the highway office begging to be taken back up to his cabin.

"It's too darned lonesome here," he explained.
