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## U.N. Opens Top Infantry Attack Of Year in War

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 14 (AP)—Allied infantrymen lashed out today with their heaviest ground attack in nearly a year and grabbed portions of two Chinese-held hills on the central Korean front.

The attacking troops, backed by heavy tank and artillery fire, knocked the rods off two knobs of Triangle hill, north of Kumhu, Two miles to the east they swept over a portion of "Sniper ridge." Both hills are about 1,600 feet high.

The initial "charge" carried the attack for a great distance of Triangle hill, but the Chinese regrouped and regained the crest.

After trying to scramble back up the state-covered slope, the U. N. soldiers abandoned their frontal attack. They began working their way across the nearby hill saddle for a thrust from the east.

A former officer said the triangle is a very difficult hill to climb, let alone assault.

An estimated Chinese battalion held the crest of Triangle hill and rolled hand grenades and rocks down the slope. From atop the hill, they fired snipers' rifles and machine guns.

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## Four Persons Are Killed In Two Valley Accidents; Area's Toll Mounts to 38

Four more are dead in Magic Valley's mounting toll of traffic deaths. The score now stands as 38—three more than at this time last year. Three died instantly Monday night while the fourth died early Tuesday in Magic Valley Memorial hospital. Another is in "fair" condition at the hospital.

Three of those killed died as a result of an accident near Eden at 9 p. m. The other was killed in a crash at 8:30 p. m. nine miles north of Rupert on highway 27. The traffic toll for Jerome county now stands at six while Minidoka county's score is also six. Dead in the Eden accident are Juan Tarres, about 30; Raul A. Castillon, about 23, and Jose Ruiz. It was Ruiz who died in the hospital.

Jose Delgado is in "fair" condition in the hospital. Sillas Washington, 36, a Negro, was killed in the Minidoka accident.

The Eden accident occurred on highway 25 two miles east of Eden.

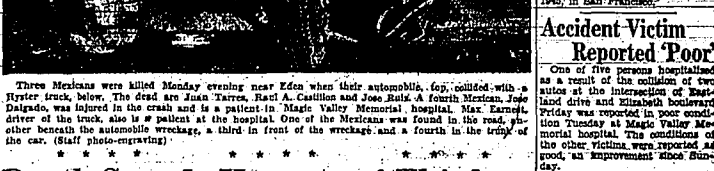


Three Die in Crash Near Eden

When the automobile in which the four Mexicans were riding failed to stop for a stop sign, it roared onto the highway and collided with a giant Hyster truck driven by Max Earnest, Portland, Ore. Earnest received multiple scalp injuries and a possible back injury. He is in "good" condition at the Magic Valley Memorial hospital.

Earnest told police he saw the Mexicans car approaching the highway at a high rate of speed. He said the driver of the car attempted to turn east on the highway but was unable to do so. The truck which was being driven west.

Other speakers will be called upon to discuss different objectives of the conference.

## License Lost Fourth Time by T.F. Driver

A Twin Falls driver is serving a five-day jail term as part of his sentence for reckless driving. His driver's license was ordered suspended for 90 days and it is at least the fourth time he has lost his driver's license for traffic violations.

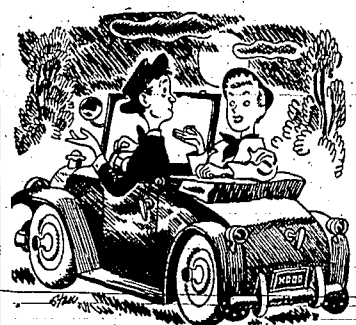

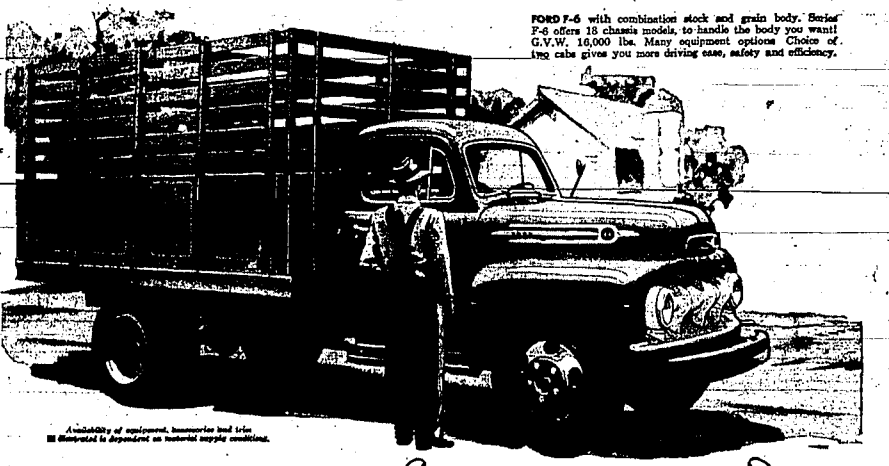

A city which avails itself of a minimum's notice might save a life.

The police chief said he was making the suggestion in the interest of public safety, not to interfere with private enterprise. He displayed a picture taken by the police last week of the edge of Twin Falls in which five persons were hurt. Five firefighters had to be used to save a man from drowning.

Cliffette pointed out mortuaries get many "dry runs" because of calls received from citizens. He said mortuaries get no money when an ambulance is not used. He estimated police receive 75 ambulance calls yearly.

James Reynolds agreed a good many calls are free, but said he did not believe the station because the "dry runs." He said citizens sometimes call for ambulances that are not needed and that ambulances are needed as called.

If the child wants something to do, and his parents like the idea, it does no harm to say: "Read over today's reading lesson. Here are three examples like the ones you had this morning. You can do them tonight if you like." Beyond that, I have found little use for home work in three grades.

Beginning with the fourth year is good practice to give the class five words to study and use in sentences. Three arithmetic problems, with which they are familiar, to work and a review of the day's reading lesson. The whole student should not take more than half an hour and one of the items should be voluntary. This gives a child something of what is going on in school, and

helps to make the work more important to the child. From the fourth year on, the homework increases in amount and in importance. The teacher's part in the making of essential homework should limit the homework to the extent that it requires only twenty-five minutes in the fourth and fifth grades, an hour and a half in the eighth. Less will do no harm but more is likely to be too much and lead to trouble.

When the upper grades are departmentalized the teachers must cooperate in making assignments so that no pupil is asked to hand in more than two subjects at one time. This means that they study history and geography, or math and science, the next, and then English as a single assignment because it usually calls for reference to books and a good deal of writing.

Homework must be limited to the ability of the teacher to review, correct, and rate it otherwise, what use is it?

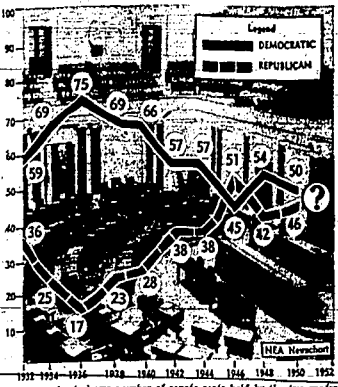
### Check Seniority Mile Okayed
