Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

The telephone is one of the great gifts from science. It wipes out distance and creates time itself. It brings the voice of a distant friend into the room with us; it brings the doctor on wings in emergency; it aids us in so many ways in the round of daily living.

If you can, if you cannot upon trying it, it is a source of trouble. There are times when it should be left in its cradle to give us time to cool off a bit, but we say the wrong thing and make an enemy where we should have made a friend.

The school child comes home one day with traces of tears and excited. What's wrong? Teacher made me stay in. She always blames me. Mike kicked me under the desk and he didn't see him. She never sees him, always me. So I hit him back and she saw me and she gave me a failure and she put me in the mean old thing. I hate her.

Keep away from the telephone. Walk and see. I have seen a teacher and parent ready to set each other on a situation, while the ten boys were playing together happily, going home after school with arms about each other. Children have their spots; that is all they are if allowed to pass like the clouds of summer. If they are aggravated by hot words to the teacher or the other set of parents, they become family feuds to the detriment of all concerned.

No hot words should ever go over the telephone. People are likely to say things then that they would not think of saying when face to face with the other person, things they would be ashamed to say. Words over the telephone are carried by the tone of the voice. Anger is the ugliest emotion a human being can entertain. Who wants to shine in his ugliness?

One should be more than careful about telephoning to a school. Only in the greatest emergency should it be done. School is a busy place. The care of other people's children is a heavy responsibility. For instance, it is unwise to telephone to the school asking for a child sent home. No responsible teacher will send a child out of school on a telephone request, unless it is definitely urgent.

The telephone is a blessing and it should be used with that thought behind every message that goes over its wires, particularly when those messages concern children, your own or a neighbor's.

Ohioan Takes 'Star Farmer' Honor of FFA

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 13 (AP)—A 31-year-old Ohioian who started farming seven years ago on "practically nothing" was the "star farmer of America" today, chosen out of 32,000 members of the Future Farmers of America.

Walter Wayne Vogel, route 2, Republic, O., received the honor at the 25th annual convention of the FFA here.

Vogel was cited for a seven-year fight to make his tenant farm a success. He started on a one-acre place near McCutchenville, O., with his mother when he was 14.

The FFA citation said he expanded from "practically nothing" to his present assets of more than \$10,000 in livestock and equipment.

An Ohio FFA official said Vogel has conducted his remarkable progress until today, three years out of high school, he is as well established in farming as many men who have worked a lifetime.

During Vogel's four years at McCutchenville high school, the FFA said, he earned almost \$2,000 from farming and \$1,200 from other work. He was married last August.

Awards of \$500 each went to three other FFA youths named star farmer for 1954: Reynolds, Jr., 20, route 1, Goodlettsville, Tenn., for the south; Frank L. Arnold, 21, Middlesex, N. Y., for the north Atlantic region; and George H. Warrington, 20, McConnville, Ore., for the Pacific region.

Warmington was honored for his achievements in livestock production. He started farming as a 4-H club member when only 17 years old. Now, he has a dairy herd of 23 cows and a farm bonded in value since he purchased it. His present net worth is about \$40,000.

The youth's farming enterprises include a dairy herd of 23 cows, 27 acres of small grains, 11 acres of alfalfa, 39 head of Jersey cattle and 15 registered, Suffolk sheep.

Knowland Advises Soviet Ultimatum

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Oct. 13 (AP)—Walter P. Knowland, R-Calif., said last night the United States should lay down an ultimatum to Russia to stop further red aggression.

"We must face up to the fact that the free people of the United States and the world sooner or later must say that if the Soviet Union persists in furnishing arms and munitions to other countries supporting aggression, either the Soviet union get out of the United Nations or we will get out of the U. S.," Knowland said.

Knowland, speaking at a Republican rally in the national change show auditorium, said he did not believe there was any chance for peace by continually yielding to international blackmail and extortion.

Churchill Thinks War Is 'Unlikely'

LONDON, Oct. 13 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill said Tuesday night he doesn't think there is a "world war likely because both sides realize the untold horrors it would unleash. But he also said that the main decision would come within the first month.

Churchill told the Anglo-American Pilgrim society any new war would begin with horrors "on a scale never dreamed of before" and would be crippling to a power depending on vast land armies. Although he didn't name Russia, he was warning obviously was aimed at her.

He said that, though "the quarter century continues for an indefinite period, after the first month it would be a broken-back war in which no great army could be moved over long distances by land."

Suspension of U. S. Attorney May Be 'Step'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—Suspension of U. S. Attorney Howard L. Doyle Springfield, Ill., may be the first step in a general crackdown on federal district attorneys with lucrative outside law practices, informed sources said today.

The justice department announced last year that Doyle, a U. S. attorney since 1933, had been suspended at his own request pending completion of an official investigation of his financial affairs.

Att.-Gen. James P. McGranery has been auditing the outside legal activities of all U. S. attorneys and their assistants. Informants indicated disciplinary action may be in store for more of them.

There was no indication, however, when the department will complete its study of which U. S. attorneys are in line for disciplining.

Doyle's suspension stemmed from his testimony before a house judiciary subcommittee last week that he received about \$45,000 in outside legal fees from 1945 to 1950 and that he had "overlooked" a \$50,000 fee in reporting his 1945 income. He said he remembered the fee and paid taxes on it a few weeks ago.
