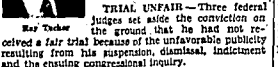

## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A Boston federal court's reversal of the conviction of Denis W. Delaney, former internal security agent, has resulted in a new and powerful challenge to congressional investigation of executive wrongdoing. It already had questioned Delaney's cooperation and ridiculed the results of a salaried or red herrings.

Delaney's conviction last January of accepting bribes in tax disputes, and of certifying that \$150,000 of them against delinquent taxpayers had been paid when according to the government, they had not been discharged, was a WPA relief worker. Delaney was promoted to collector in 1944 and retained until his indictment in late 1949.



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**TRIAL UNFAIR—**Three federal judges set aside the conviction on the ground that he had not received a fair trial because of the unfavorable publicity resulting from his suspension, dismissal, indictment and the ensuing congressional inquiry.

Incidentally, many other Truman officials have been re-arrested under the same circumstances, and the appeals pending in many cases. It should also be noted that, if it had not been for the alleged laxity and criminality uncharacteristic of the Internal Revenue Agency, with its nationwide ramifications, might have been suppressed by Delaney's administration. The charges were made last Jan. 20.

**ALBERT B. FALL SCANDAL—**If the Boston reversal is upheld by the supreme court, it will weaken or destroy the power of congress to investigate both the executive and judicial branches of the government. A right to a fair trial is guaranteed by the Bill of Rights, internal revenue and IFC exposé. An extremely grave constitutional issue is involved.

By some judicial reasoning, it appears, the conviction of Albert B. Fall, former secretary of interior, could have been invalidated. No trial ever generated in the public eye, mostly after Delaney's cabinet member, before and during his conduct that led the accusation that he had accepted bribes from Delaney to have oil reserves in Bohery and Sinclair.

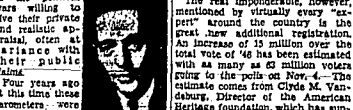
The sensational affair involved a dead President, cabinet members, big oil officers and prominent politicians of both parties. It was handled throughout the nation as the "Herald scandal" which has been requested under the current presidential campaign as the office to Truman corruption.

Nevertheless, despite all the political and journalistic attacks, the supreme court will uphold the conviction of Fall, a far more important figure than Delaney.

An increase of 15 million over the total vote of '46 has been estimated with as many as 45 million voters to split the drive for this mass increase in the number of citizens eligible to vote.

Both Republicans and Democrats are claiming the new registrations will help them. The real question is where it is concentrated. If it is mostly in the small town and middle-income areas, then the GOP stands to gain. This could be the factor contributing to a big electoral majority for "Ike."

But if the greater part of the increase is in the cities, then Democrats may be able to offset a strong Republican trend on the farms and in the towns. Registration in New York City is at a near-record high and the same is true in Philadelphia. In most other cities the increase is phenomenally heavy.

### THE "INDEPENDENT" VOTER

The public opinion pollsters and many political analysts have done much to foster the idea of the increasingly potent independent vote as a factor in American elections. There are reasons to doubt the full validity of this theory.

But there can be no question that more and more people are telling poll takers that they have no hard and fast political loyalties; that they "vote for the man," that they try to decide each election on its merits.

But the test is not the individual statement: "I am an independent." The test is what the voter does in the polling booth. If he has voted Democratic for four or five straight presidential elections, it is not fair to label him a Democrat, despite his reluctance to accept the label.

Nor is it necessarily proof of his "Independence" that a voter has consistently split his ticket, voting one way on President, another on senator, and so on.

Really, we must recognize that in this critical age the governing choice is the one we make for President. The White House provides the nation's true leadership, be it weak or strong, and it sets the tone for the conduct of the nation. Men looking to their futures put their big chips on the main race.

By that measure, most so-called independent voters fall either into the Democratic or Republican category, with pretty fair consistency. Pollsters have found that by and large they actually vote Democratic by a margin of at least three to two.

Any sensible analysis of the nation's voting complexion must therefore assign these voters to the respective parties on the basis of their actual voting record. Their political loyalties may be loose and vague, but their performance in the polling booth is reasonably clear.

This does not mean, however, that there is no significance in a voter's effort to classify himself as an independent, a relatively small group genuinely deserves that tag; they should around constantly and conform to no pattern. The remainder properly should be distinguished from the deep-dyed party faithful.

For even though they may show marked leanings one way or the other, they are potential converts for the opposition. Their attachments are not firm. They are not publicly willing to admit their affiliation. In many, many cases they are honestly doubtful, and give serious thought almost up to voting time to switching over. Whichever way they go, they have misgivings.

From this broad group are drawn the elements which determine our elections today. Its increasing size reflects the growing confusion and doubt which plague Americans as they face their crucial voting task in a puzzling world. The party which can most successfully end that doubt and resolve that confusion will soon insure its own and the more lasting allegiance of a large share of these "independent" voters.

### PREMATURE RELEASE

Premature-release-of-information on the army's new atomic artillery has caused a lot of explaining at the White House by the Pentagon brass. The original plan was to have the big gun unveiled by President Truman.

The place was to be the Aberdeen, Md., proving ground. The date was to be Oct. 15, after the President returned from the whistle-stop tour of the West.

Mr. Truman was to make some remarks on national defense—with obvious political implication.

But when one television program and then one newspaper released a picture of the huge weapon two weeks ahead of schedule, other papers followed suit and the Pentagon finally let go of the whole story.

The Oct. 15 demonstration is still on. But there is considerable doubt whether the President will go to Aberdeen at all. And the mistake may have cost him a pretty political trick.

As far as security is concerned, the army insists that release of this information on the big gun is in line with the policy to tell all about every new weapon as soon as it is released to troops in quantity.

### HEALTHFUL PRECEDENT

An NEA dispatch, published recently in the Times-News, says that both General Eisenhower and Governor Stevenson are in sound health. In the opinion of their doctors, they are fully fit physically and emotionally to serve as President.

This is good news for the American people and the candidates were wise in permitting it to be published. The office of President is the most important that this nation can bestow. It is also one that places severe physical and mental demands on its holder.

The American people have a right to know that the man they elect is capable of meeting the strain; that he is not, as President Roosevelt was in 1944, ill and infirm.

General Eisenhower and Governor Stevenson have set a desirable precedent. Similar reports should be demanded from all future candidates.

It seems rather silly to waste much time on people who are naturally hard to please.

### WOMEN OF 50 AND OVER

The government has recently published a booklet on job opportunities for women beyond age of 50, and for married women whose release from child-care permits them to return to the family income. In advertising for feminine help in executive agencies, current notices issue the warning that "No body over 45 need apply."

It is a military truism that the greater part of intelligence information which the world has and constantly collecting and compiling about each other, is obtained from such open sources as industrial and agricultural statistics, corporation reports, chamber of commerce publications, etc. The remainder comes from the sources so denoted to Hollywood photo researchers—"broken" codes, beautiful women and sinister women.

As an excellent example of this truism there is the case of Robert Sawyer, a reporter. He related to the Christian Science Monitor that he recently located the vital important new air base at Thule, Greenland, with other news items. They were shown about and told that "most statistics about the base were, naturally, secret." Back in Washington, Mr. Sawyer paid 5 cents at the Coast and Geodetic Survey office for a map "which anybody else can buy, giving length and breadth of Thule air base, its location, necessary facilities, etc. It is a good thing for landing aircraft... location of beacons, proper approaches and minimum altitudes." He comments that "Our military map is a beautiful collection of who was seen up to Thule especially to prevent us from printing their very statistics on the ground of military secrecy."

All of which recalls another military aphorism to the effect that it is well to act on the assumption that our enemies know at least as much as we do. In the light of the Thule map incident, it should be considered something like: "Our enemy is at least as dense as we are."—New York Times.

### THE THIRD CAMPAIGN

There is a third campaign on. It does not seek for Republican or Democratic votes. It seeks simply for the nonpartisan drive to wake up the American voter is being pushed under the sponsorship and leadership of the American Heritage Foundation. The chairman of the American Heritage Foundation, the United States citizens contemplate with reverence the great American in the election of the British, 98 per cent of the British, and 78 per cent of the American went to the polls in their general election, only 10 per cent of Americans voted in President in 1948!

Australia is a nation that deserves whatever it gets. In the United States, the citizen who is too indifferent to register to read, listen, think, decide, and vote merely forfeits the moral right to exercise his administration he may get. And he may get practically anything if he simply apathy grows.

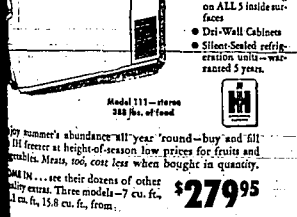

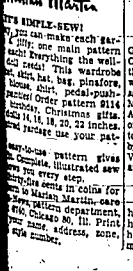
