WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—A long coal strike—possibly extending past the presidential election—seemed in store today with John L. Lewis insisting his miners get all of a government-limited pay raise.

Lewis appears to have turned down a dead-end street by saying striking soft coal miners will return to work only when they get the full \$1.50 daily pay raise his United Mine Workers union had negotiated with the industry.

The government's wage stabilization board had shaved 40 cents from this total, saying only \$1.10 was allowable under inflation-control policy. Mine owners say they can't violate the government order.

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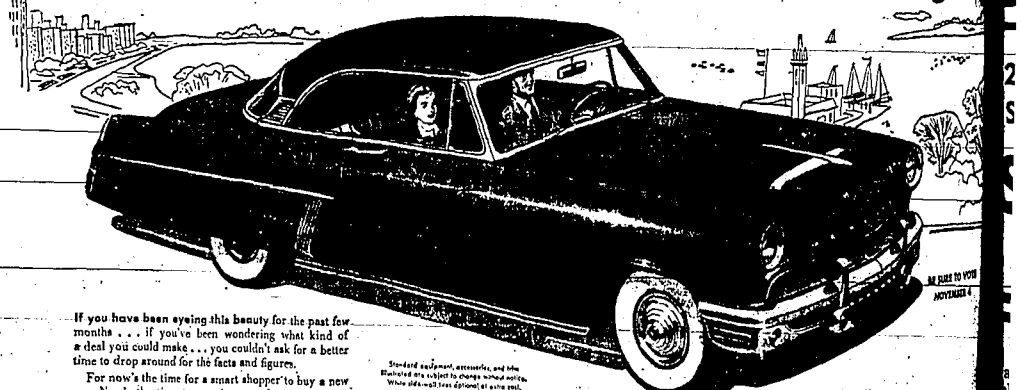

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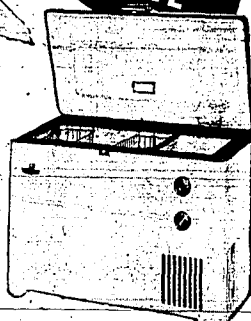

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

WASHINGTON—Professional labor leaders' rush to the new yellow journalism of several presidential monthlies, especially the *Washington Post* and *Washington Times*, is a case of being killed by the success of the deed.

A surprising ineptitude surrounds the circumlocution of "boss" Stevenson at a m.p.e.d., especially those heaped by John L. Lewis, Daniel J. Tobin, AFL teamsters' ex-president.

Stevenson's "election-into" walkout unless the wage stabilization board approved.

Stevenson in the same breath, John L. has virtually pointed a loaded gun at the candidates' heads.

Stevenson may resent tactics that resemble a political holdup.

LEWIS SUPPORT—John L.'s last-minute declaration is open to suspicion for other reasons. He is, in effect, and the late Iron Pans Hugh Johnson, all students and admirers of Napoleon, who has been a major force in the "Bony" tactics at Austria and Waterloo.

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SUPPORT UNWELCOME—John L.'s "kindness" treatment of Stevenson, however, is logical from the former viewpoint. It was motivated in part at least by Stevenson's recognition with Senator Fall. More important, he believed it would clinch WSB sanction of the above-cited pay raise, either before or after the election.

It is known that the Stevenson camp did not welcome the open announcement of Lewis' support. The Democratic high command calculates it will win the bulk of the labor vote, especially the miners, without the leader's name.

Stevenson's "Old Dan" Tobin, however, to let the political maneuvering of the day.

He predicted an "awful stagnation of industry" which the Roman Empire experienced in the days of the most servile of our history; and a war that nobody understands.

It is not surprising, in view of all these circumstances that Tobin should have such a view of the future of the country. He is a man of wide-eyed concern and suspicion.

"DISWASHING" SIDELINES—General Eisenhower's remarks on Uncle Sam's "dishwashing" sideline has become business in agriculture's pamphlets on this subject. The pamphlet, "Dishwashing," is the result of a study by the Agricultural Department.

The incident has also disclosed that a key figure in the dissemination of this kitchen advice was Milton Eisenhower, brother of General Eisenhower, who was director of information for the department from 1928 to 1940, when he was one of Henry A. Wallace's helpers.

REVIEWS OF OTHERS

HATCHET MAN TRUMAN

There have been—and no doubt still will be—many disturbing aspects of this campaign. But we think one of the most disturbing to many mindfully Americans is the spectacle of a President of the United States, in his capacity as President and not as candidate for office, being put in the country in the role of campaign-hatchet man.

Let us make one point clear. We do not question the right of the President to explain and defend the policies and record of his administration as part of this election campaign. In fact, that might well be said to be his duty. It would, however, be a disservice and it would be in defiance of the dignity of the office of President.

But when Mr. Truman deliberately assumes the role of itinerant, defamatory hatchet man, it seems to us he abuses his office.

It is not an argument as to the effectiveness of the campaigning Mr. Truman is doing. Some commentators and observers believe he is repeating his old trick of presenting a single, handily arranged, and unrepresentative view of the Democratic side. Others think his recklessly abusive statements are backfiring. One commentator who accompanied Truman wrote, "Truman has mainly succeeded in creating sympathy for the man he has tried to malign."

But let's put the campaign effect to one side and consider the effect of the Truman hatchet man role on the office he holds.

Does it add to the dignity and prestige of that office? Does it increase public respect for the man who, whether he plays the self-appointed role of hatchet man or not, is the President of the United States?

We do not think so. Instead we think it demeans and tarnishes the office of President to have the man who holds the office engaged in such reckless, abusive statements and carry on such an undignified, unrepresentative type of campaigning.

One point about this is particularly worthy of comment. On his tour, Mr. Truman is attracting attention because he is President of the United States, rather than because he is a campaign speaker for the Democratic party. And much of the attraction and attention that he attracts is due to the fact that he is seen as a young man can see the President. The high school band often is at the station to greet the President. It is not that he is the nation's chief executive.

What do the children see? A dignified man adding water and getting to the high office he holds? Not at all. They see a man who almost immediately launches into an abusive diatribe against the charges and cast aspersions upon a military leader whom the children (with previous assists from the man himself) have been taught to admire.—Sally Lake Truman.

Communist Party was Target.

The Readers Digest sent each reader, who inquired about my exposure, a reproduction of a letter from Hanson, Jackson and other anti-communists but omitting all mention of his own notorious past and present. Hanson praised Wallace and the Digest for its excellent reporting in the Tribune in Brown, Wash., Thursday and Friday.

Last June the Centre Daily Times of the town of State College, Pa., said the Pennsylvania Federation of Labor was holding an "anti-labor" at the college at which Hanson now had the gall to take the Digest of an anti-communist, but depicted "McCarthyism."

The Penn State College, on Nov. 9, 1935, announced that Hanson was coming to speak on "What Recognition of Soviet Russia Will Mean to Us." It explained that Hanson had toured Russia the year before. On March 1, 1933, the College said Hanson had said the United States must choose between fascism and socialism, which in the version of the Communist party, was Marxism socialism imposed by armed soviet revolution.

The College quoted Hanson as saying that his experience in Russia had convinced him that "Killing Hitler" was the only solution. The paper said Hanson "felt" that it would be adopted here. He commended planning had worked there, expelled teachers and students to steer allegiance.

McCARTHYISM—WHAT IS IT?

It goes without saying that Sen. Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin is the most controversial figure in this country today.

Since his overwhelming victory at the polls in his home state recently, however, there are some who are all the more puzzled as to what this controversy surrounding McCarthy is all about.

It's easy to understand, of course, why certain individuals high in the present national administration avail themselves of every opportunity to attack Senator McCarthy for methods he employs in his fight against communism.

When President Truman himself branded communism in this country as a "red herring" right at the time traitors and red spies were attempting to sell Uncle Sam down the river, it's a fair question to ask whether the high ranking new dealers would resent McCarthy's efforts and try to minimize the inroads communism has made into our own government circles.

Several years ago, it will be recalled, our former Congressman John Barnhorn of Hagerman, an intelligent and level-headed individual, made no apologies for defending Senator McCarthy's efforts to bring communism out into the open in this country. It was those who criticized McCarthy and who closed their eyes to his warning for their own ulterior purposes, who deserved the condemnation, according to Mr. Barnhorn's way of thinking.

Now, Wardis Fisher Idaho's outstanding writer, joins with his Barnhorn and others in this fight against McCarthyism.

"What is McCarthyism?" Fisher asked an audience in Gooding the other night. "To the traitors of this country McCarthy is the most meanest of communists. He is a cunning and dedicated patriot who has discovered the menace of communism and has set out to do something about it."

"We must recognize McCarthy for his human qualities when he is in error. Let's not just stand by and do something when he does uncover communism in government."

In condemnation of "Korea—Communism—Corruption" recently, the New York Sunday News touched on this same issue of McCarthyism.

Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., for example, has done more than any other man in public life to expose communists and their method here," said the News. "But Stevenson thinks McCarthy is too rough, too crude. Stevenson calls McCarthy a 'champion of the legislation.'"

"Stevenson, in short, is more of an anti-communist than an anti-communist—meaning we could expect no more help from him as President in cleaning reds out of Washington than we had from President Truman's boss Truman. Truman called the Alger Hiss case a 'Red Herring.'"

So, apparently, there is a strong difference of opinion as to whether or not McCarthyism has been good or bad for this country. There can be no doubt about President Truman's motive in trying to vilify Senator McCarthy, any more than there can be doubt about his motives in trying to vilify others.

When Governor Stevenson, for instance, stopped so low as to say that General Eisenhower has "no real faith in the future of America," we can expect anything from these rabble-rousers who are so intent upon keeping themselves in power after 20 years of what the New York Sunday News describes as "Korea—Communism—Corruption."

After all, who are President Truman and Governor Stevenson to point the finger of condemnation at anyone for smearing some of this country's outstanding citizens. They're doing the very sort of thing which they pretend to find so distasteful in others.

REV. MR. RICE LEAVING

Many in this vicinity will regret that the Rev. Herman C. Rice, pastor of the First Baptist church in Twin Falls, has resigned to accept the pastorate of the Baptist church at Ingwood, Colo.

During the 10 years the Rev. Mr. Rice has served as pastor of the local church, he has been largely responsible for many outstanding accomplishments and has won himself a widespread friendship, not only among the members of his own congregation but throughout the area.

The Rev. Mr. Rice is the type of minister who is generally liked. His personality radiates that fortunate combination of being genuinely sincere in his work, yet broad-minded, tolerant and good-natured.

It is unfortunate that Twin Falls and vicinity are losing a man of his caliber, but so we find ourselves on many occasions when outstanding individuals are called to other lines of duty.

Much as we regret losing him, we join with all the other friends in wishing the Rev. Mr. Rice the best of good fortune in his new field of endeavor.

Tenth of U. S. Income Given To Aid Funds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—The United States has loaned or given more than a tenth of its national income in the past seven years to foreign aid to friends and former friends.

That was disclosed Tuesday in a roundup of foreign aid by the department of commerce monthly publication, "Current Business." It said net foreign aid from mid-1943 to mid-1950 amounted to \$33 billion.

That was 11 1/2 percent of the United States' 288 billion dollar federal revenue in the seven years, and 10 1/2 percent of national expenditures—\$37 billion dollars—in that time.

Congress authorized foreign aid in the current fiscal year ending next June 30 of nearly \$3,000,000,000. That would raise the total to more than \$35 billion dollars by mid-1953.

Friends, former enemies, new friends and former friends now start to globe have been recipients of this greatest outpouring of help in the world's history.

Altogether, the United States sent abroad 38 billion dollars in the past seven years, most of it in the past two years.

But countries getting aid paid back three billions, making net aid for the seven years \$35 billion dollars.

Chiang Asks To Take War To Mainland

TAIPEI, Formosa, Oct. 22 (AP)—Chiang Kai-shek has endorsed a manifesto from the Kuomintang-nationalist China's ruling political party—urging the west to "give us the pole and we will finish the job."

The veteran nationalist leader in an unprecedented general news conference made clear the manifesto represented his government's views and called for a common front of east and west against communism.

"We strongly believe that the only way to break the communist control of our vast manpower resources is to launch a counter-attack against the mainland."

The Kuomintang, completing a reorganization of its committees that began in new blood, issued a manifesto against the red Chinese.

"When we return, they will greet us with open arms. And we shall be greeted by guerrillas and our own people behind the lines."

The declaration represents the nationalist's aim "because the Kuomintang leads the nation, Chiang said a news conference open to all foreign correspondents, the first he held on Formosa.

The Kuomintang pledged support of the "policy action taken by the United Nations in Korea against the Chinese and North Korean communists who started a war of aggression and atrocity."

Johnston estimated the county center of Idaho's lumbering industry, would favor Gov. Adlai Stevenson by 54 per cent. President Truman carried the county with 50 per cent of the vote in 1948.

Johnston said Stevenson "all could swing the undecided if he can make himself heard above the din in the last few days." He said President Truman's whistle-stop campaign through the west had hurt

Eisenhower and that the "Taft label has been hung onto like to his disadvantage." Johnston said he thinks the general is "changing back to a liberal" campaign as a result. The Lewiston paper is the only independent Democratic paper in Idaho. Others are either independent or independent-Republican.

Idaho's independent—county—voted nearly 1 to 1 for Truman in 1948, but David A. Thomas of Pocatello radio station KWRC predicts the Democratic margin will be about 55-45 this year. Thomas said the 60-40 estimate of a month ago was a "little optimistic" for the Democrats, but adds "Republicans have an uphill fight in this county and so far they aren't making it. There has been a startling swing of the independent voters to Eisenhower in the past few days, apparently because of Eisenhower's contradictions and tie-in with the Taft forces."

He predicted this swing may boost Stevenson's margin to 60 per cent in Blaine county.

Shoshone county, seat of the state's mining industry, is expected to give Stevenson about 60 per cent of the vote, the same margin it gave Truman four years ago.

L. W. Lieb of the Wallace Press-Times, said there has been "possibly a slight shift to Eisenhower as a result of the Nixon situation."

Upper Snake river valley, Idaho's potato raising belt, is expected to vote for Eisenhower, E. F. McDermott, publisher of the Idaho Falls Post-Register, forecast that Bonneville county would give the general about 54 per cent of the vote. Most other counties in that area were traced 50-50.

Naval School Exams Slated In 109 Cities

BURLEY, Oct. 22—Gen. Henry Drownback, 76, announced today that competitive examination for entrance to the U. S. Coast guard academy, New London, Conn., will be held from Feb. 24 and 25 in 109 cities.

He pointed out that graduates of the academy's four-year course receive an ensign's commission in the coast guard and a bachelor of science degree in engineering. At members of the nation's oldest seagoing service they are entitled to all the benefits of a military career, including 30-year retirement at three-fourths base pay.

There are no appointments or geographical quotas, Senator Drownback added. "I urge all qualified young men interested in a worthwhile career to write as soon as possible to coast guard headquarters in Washington, D. C. Applications must be postmarked on or before Oct. 15."

Candidates must be single, between the ages of 17 and 22, and in excellent physical condition. They must be able to show proof of their good moral character and standing in the community, Senator Drownback said.

The minimum educational requirement is a high school diploma. Although high school seniors who are assured of being graduated by June 30 are eligible to take the examination if they will have at least 15 credits by that time. All applicants must have three units of English, two of algebra, and one each of physics and plane geometry.
