WATO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Wato growers agreed today to sue for an injunction to prevent any step toward curbing potato production in the state.

The growers approved two resolutions, besides those dealing with price control. One urged continuing the National Potato Council and asked the Idaho advertising commission to pay to the council a portion of the money received from the Idaho advertising tax on potatoes.

The other resolution urged that the present standard, fixing 1 1/2 inches as the minimum size for U. S. No. 1 potatoes, be continued.

A federal potato marketing agreement was discussed and some farmers' opinion regarding the agreement was expressed.

M. C. Evelyn, state potato association president, was reported to have said that Wato potato price controls were in prospect.

The new offices are the fifth location in 20 years in Twin Falls.
