Report Shows Boost for U. S. Spending Rate

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce reported today that every federal department except one is spending more money this fiscal year than last.

It called for careful scrutiny of the budget by the next congress, with a view to cutting ponderous expenditures.

In a report which it said was based on treasury figures, the chamber said that spending not related to defense totaled \$4,200,000,000 in July, August and September, a 75 per cent increase over the same quarter last year.

It said the labor and agriculture departments have set the pace by spending 60 per cent more as compared with the corresponding period last year. State department spending is up 25 per cent.

It said the only department spending less is the justice department, and this decrease is accounted for by a sharp drop in FBI spending by the legislative branch is up 352 per cent, it said.

In 1924 a supposed meteorite was found inside the smoldering trunk of a tree in the "Umatilla" region. In the summer of 1938 another "tree meteorite" was reported in the Ochoco national forest of the same state.

The story seems to be a case of the same kind as the one reported in the Christian Science Monitor. One of the dispatches ran as follows:

"The patrolman found a hole in a tree 40 feet from the ground. They felt the Dr. Forest was on, on taking the fire out of the hole, found the glowing meteorite. . . its course through the grain of the wood indicated that it had been traveling almost parallel to the earth's surface."

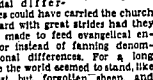
One of the most damaging conflicts known to man is that between the churches. Perhaps there may be more than a slight connection between the wars among the various church branches—was which many of us can remember with shame—and wars now raging between nations.

I believe that tens of thousands of potential converts who read and listened to the debates and arguments and sprees of name-calling and face-making simply turned away, saying:

"Well, let them decide what they believe or are going to believe—I can't. I'll take time out in my search for God until the experimenter for me who He is and where He may be found."

Likely for the church, that era of public warfare between sects has largely dwindled down to only an occasional skirmish—mostly aggressive by mis-directed Christians who labor under the delusion that people must belong to their church to be Christian, and who seem more

This past summer a similar report reached the press from Boise national forest in Idaho. Those who found the mass in the tree were sure it had come from the "great outer space."

In the Ochoco case, the American Meteor society was not able to obtain a specimen. The meteorite was the entirely-inked daily newspaper near the "find." Later, two national forestry inspectors were recorded a fictitious view of it. They reported it was light in color and weight and very porous.

In the case of the recent Boise object, splendid cooperation was accorded. The forest supervisor sent men an ample specimen of the suspected material, like the Ochoco "meteorite" it also was light in color and weight and full of holes. Embedded in it were pieces of charred wood.

Sample Checked

I sent samples to Dr. F. C. Leonard, "Agile" and Dr. H. H. Ware, Wininger, Window, Ariz., both international experts on meteorites. These men confirmed my belief that it was not a celestial visitor.

I had labeled it a clinker from a terrestrial fire where the air supply was quite restricted.

Meteorites are always solid and heavy. One type is composed almost entirely of iron and nickel. Aside from the general appearance and texture, these stones are made of iron and nickel. There are also definite chemical and crystalline tests.

These objects do not reach the earth hot enough to set fire. During the few seconds of their atmospheric flight, only the surface is heated to incandescence. They usually cease to glow many miles above the earth and finally fall as dark objects.

Expert Report

T. T. Munger, a leading forestry official, has said the following regarding these three meteorites:

"They come in a while someone finds a lump or clinker in the remains of a tree that has been felled out by fire while standing. This stone-like stuff gives a chemical analysis strikingly like that of wood staves. It looks as though, when a rotten tree burns while standing, the fire falls on the felled tree and gather in a solidified clinker. Therefore, before blaming transient celestial bodies for setting trees afire, look into the possibility that the 'meteorite' is just a fused bunch of the tree's own ashes."

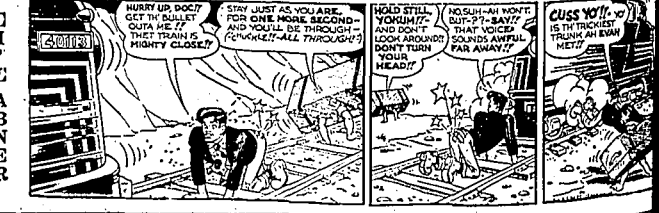
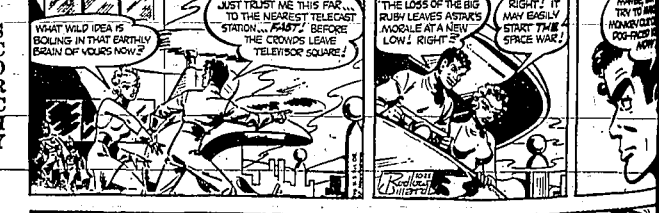

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The political offices in Lincoln county this November are one of the most exciting in the history of the county. A group of probable judges will be nominated and a three-man team from the office of county sheriff.

In Lincoln county when results of the election were not available, the county was divided into three precincts. The precincts were Blaine and Lincoln in their stead. Lincoln embraced the land north of Snake river, west of Elmore county and on the north, the area between townships two south and three north.

Now commenced the litigation with Blaine county. The act creating the two counties provided that Blaine transcribe the records and credit Lincoln with \$200,000, half the estimated value of the Blaine courthouse. Lincoln was designated to pay Blaine one-half of its outstanding indebtedness at the time of the separation.

Blaine filed its indebtedness at \$200,000, which, less the \$200,000 credit allowed on half the courthouse, still left \$125,000 to be assumed by Lincoln county.

Lincoln county's commissioners deemed the amount excessive and refused to pay. When Blaine sued and carried the case to the supreme court, that body directed Lincoln to pay not merely the amount asked originally, but boosted it to \$238,000.

Lincoln with a valuation of \$2,235,000 issued bonds. The last was paid July 30, 1917.

Lincoln county remained as first created until 1913 when Gooding county was cut off on the west and Minidoka county on the east. In 1919 Jerome county was lopped off the south. The area remaining comprises Lincoln county today.

The "unusual weather" enjoyed by residents of Wood river valley has resulted in a real corn crop for Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Watts, DELIVER. The crop is equal to that in the corn belt of their native North Carolina.

The corn, an 82-day variety, was planted by Watts last spring as an experiment. He also planted a 60-day hybrid variety which is almost a sure crop in the valley's short season.

Only occasionally in this mile high elevation does the first week in September pass without a killing frost. The corn crop has not occurred until last week. As a result, the 82-day experiment was a success and the corn grew 11 feet tall.

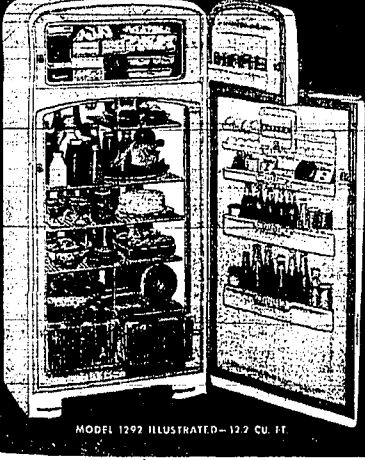

Car Accident Is Subject of Damage Suit

BURLEY, Oct. 25—Mr. and Mrs. Sam Haight Oakley, have filed suit for damages in district court here against Rose Beckhole. The action arises from an automobile accident Aug. 14, 1951, nine miles east of Cedar Rapids, Ia. Plaintiffs are seeking to collect \$24,985.25.

She remained in the hospital for eight days.

Represented by their attorney, B. T. Love, the plaintiffs are seeking to collect \$22,925.25 for hospital and medical expenses.

The plaintiffs further claim that, at the time of the accident, Mrs. Haight had a contract with the Cassia county school district to teach but because of the accident, she was unable to teach and collect her wages. She is seeking to collect \$2,000, the amount of wages shown in her contract.

Sanitation Decree Okayed by Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 25—Burley-city councilman Monday approved an ordinance regulating health and sanitation—facilities in dwelling units in the city limits.

The ordinance requires the installation of proper sanitation equipment in city dwellings and connections with sewer where the sewer available is adjacent or adjoining the dwelling on which dwelling is located. 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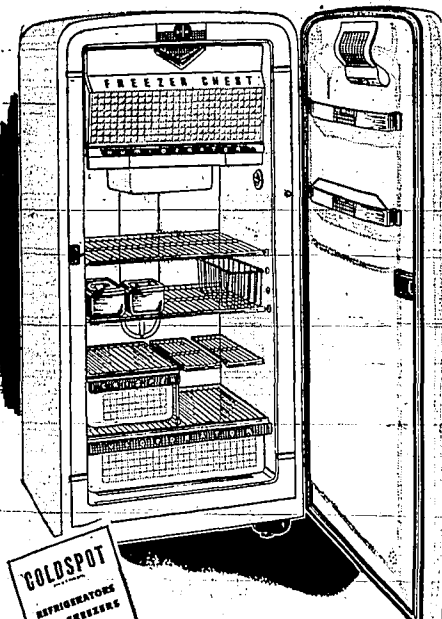
