Lewis Orders Men To End Coal Walkout 'at Once'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—John L. Lewis today told 350,000 United Mine Workers of his nation-wide soft coal strike "at once."
Lewis' president telegraphed union district leaders that he is "urging each member to return to work at once" while the government reviews the coal contract.
The stabilization board cut 40 cents from the \$1.90-a-day wage increase Lewis negotiated with the soft coal industry. His telegraphed order to the striking miners followed President Truman's personal intervention into the situation.
Lewis said an appeal he filed in conjunction with soft coal industry leaders to review the decision by the wage board is pending.
"It will require a reasonable time for review of amended facts and the reaching of a decision," the miners' boss said. "It is my opinion that our industry should be operating during that period and that the best interests of the mine workers and the nation are served by such a course."
Lewis asked the district leaders to notify all the miners and request their return to work.
"In a surprise move, Mr. Truman called Lewis and Harry M. Moses, president of the Bituminous Coal Producers association, last night. Also called by the president were Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam, David Cole, director of the federal mediation service, and Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman. Mr. Truman's specialist on labor problems."
"At the conclusion of the nearly half-hour long meeting, Mr. Truman said a statement saying he had urged Lewis "in the common good" to "use his best efforts to effect a return to work at once."
"Mr. Lewis has assured me of his cooperation," the President said. "Both Lewis and Moses declined comment after the meeting except to say they were working on the statement."
"No final plans" for the strike were outlined. The miners would be granted their full wage increase on one price for settling the several day-old strike. Labor circles, however, believed Lewis must have obtained a statement saying he had agreed to his previous adamant stand that the miners would not return to work until they were above their full rate.
"Mr. Truman's statement, however, indicates that the President is possible reversal of the wage board's position that the miners should be granted their full wage increase until after the strike is over."
"Serious consideration" of the miners' demands that return and prompt consideration would be given to the miners' demands for a review of the wage board's ruling.
"In addition, the President said he was prepared to start paying immediately the \$1.90 of the wage increase if the miners would return to work and if approved the remaining 40 cents per day of their contract."

Red Attacks Fail To Extend Hole

SEOUL, Korea (Tuesday), Oct. 28 (AP)—United States marines smashed a 3,000-man Chinese attack yesterday and in valiant counter-attacks sealed a hole in their western front main line that might have been used for a communist drive on Seoul.
"But Chinese late last night still held two of three outpost positions overrun in their 'human sea' attacks along a three-mile front northwest of Korangop-pi.
The lighthearns, fighting in the tradition of two Jima and Tarawa, threw back massive Chinese assaults with their main line after an artillery barrage described as the heaviest in history against a single marine regiment.
The attack was only 30 miles north of Seoul, the head of one of the two major invasion corridors to the Republic of Korea capital.
The second is the Cheron-Jung corridor, whose defenses the communists tested in recent savage fighting at White Horse mountain, Triangle hill and Sniper ridge.
Marines fighting at times hand-to-hand with the Chinese, drove back two enemy battalions of some 1,500 men who struck their main line at the 11th mile northwest of Korangop-pi about 5 p. m. (A. M. ST).
Late last night, according to telephone reports from forward outposts, the marines had eased back from their main line and set the hook because of heavy artillery and mortar fire.
An officer said bunkers along the crest were so smashed by artillery they gave no protection.
"The marines were not 100 yards during the day in support of allied infantrymen—fifteen close support platoons, two heavy machine gun platoons, one mortar platoon and one rocket platoon—were aimed at behind-the-lines areas where the reds might be gathering reinforcements."

Top Aspirants And President Renew Drives

With his eye on Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's widely expected speech from Chicago tonight, Eisenhower campaigned in Pennsylvania with a promise to root out subversion out of the government but warning against damaging individual freedom by "false charges."
"Re-States Twice"
In speeches at Philadelphia and Lancaster Pa. yesterday, Eisenhower re-stated his policy on subversion at a time when his staff predicted high turnout over that McCarthy would have to say tonight.
"McCarthy has not informed the president of the contents of his speech, and the GOP presidential candidate decided today to set the record again with his attitude toward subversives and what to do about them."
"Earlier in the campaign, Eisenhower said he had differences with McCarthy over how to attack subversion, but that they had agreed on the goal."
"Again Pledge Fight"
Eisenhower also again promised to go to Korea if the communists first took toward winning an early peace and assisting the people of Korea to set up a defense of their own front lines.
"Stevenson, meanwhile expressed his confidence that the communists would be defeated in the Korean war, and that the Korean war was an 'army' toward 'chance for an armistice'."
"The two candidates' speeches were broadcast on radio and television."

Former Resident, Woman Are Killed In Airplane Crash

A former Twin Falls resident and a Pocatello woman were dead Monday, victims of the crash of a light plane in Snake river canyon two miles east of the Hansen suspension bridge. A third occupant of the plane was in fair condition at Magic Valley Memorial hospital.
Flipped into an spin by telephone wires spanning the canyon, the plane plummeted into the river Sunday noon, killing the pilot, Beryl Yelton, 28, Pocatello, and Darlene Hegstrom, 27. Yelton formerly lived in Twin Falls.
The survivor of the crash, Leo Dobryznski, 30, also of Pocatello, swam free of the wreckage.

Planes Seek Daring Ocean Over Flier

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 27 (AP)—Coast guard planes searched today for a daring flier who attempted to fame an approaching hurricane by "flying" it with a secret formula for "beating" the storm.

The Miami coast guard rescue center sent planes aloft at dawn in a search for Gordon Clausen, Norman Oak, believed down in the Florida Straits southeast of here. Clausen was reported to be attempting to break up the oncoming hurricane as it roared toward the Bahamas Saturday night. The flier was heard from in a radio message he reported his single-engine Luscombe plane was running out of fuel.

Wife Reports "He thought he could stop it" his wife told a Miami Herald reporter by telephone. "I have no doubt he was in front of the hurricane, seeking the clouds."

He didn't want anyone to know what he was doing, because he wanted to test his theory."

Clausen, 40, said in a faint radio message picked up by the airport tower in Miami at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday that he was lost over water, probably south-southeast of Miami.

Second Message "A few minutes later the coast guard said he sent a second and final message: "My engine's quitting. I'm going down. Give my love to my wife."

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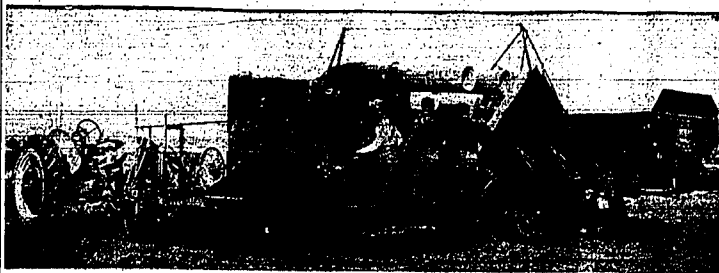

New Harvesters Can Dig 4,000 Sacks of Potatoes in One Day

Many Blazes Break Out in Dry Regions

A rash of forest fires cracked through woodlands in the midwest today.

Waxy blankets of smoke and haze hung over much of Ohio, Indiana and West Virginia as fire fighters fought to snuff out the blazes.

A large fire whirled into the army reservation at Camp Atterbury, Ind., threatening buildings and burning off trees and brush.

The officer of the day reported troops were called out to fight the fire and had brought it under control. He called the flames "very high."

The officer, however, denied a report that the blaze had caused an explosion in the army camp.

Indiana Gov. Henry Schricker called out national guard units to fight fires raging in the vicinity of Bloomington and a state official warned the fires "may cover 3,000 acres" before noon.

A summer-long drought and a tinder-dry Indian summer have caused repeated fires in America's timberlands.

The only area getting enough rain to ease the fire danger was the western slope of the Blue mountains in Oregon and Washington. The big Douglas fir forests there have been protected with seasonal rains.

'Expert' Averts Donut Dunking Change Points to Win for 'Tke'

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 27.—There's a trend toward more relaxed donut dunking in Oklahoma, and Stan the Donut Man that spells a Republican victory in the Nov. 4 election.

And what does donut dunking have to do with Eisenhower and Stevenson?

Everything, according to Stanley Anderson, executive secretary of the National Donut Dunking association of America.

With a conspirator's eye he has observed this subtle trend from stopping the sinker from the cup into the mouth to the more casual "dip and let drip a while" method. The change, in his opinion, is a political portent—the surface sign of a profound and deep-running current which will rock the country on election day.

This is no snap judgment, Stan says he has been studying the state of dunking in Oklahoma for five days.

Stan's greatest concern, however, is over what's happening to the hole in the donut. It's getting smaller and smaller.

"Look at this," he says, holding up a donut about the size of a half dollar. "You know what I found it in Washington, of course."

"Anyone knows dunking such a sinker is out of the question. You burn your fingers," he explained.

That isn't all that's happened to the donut either. He produced a preze-shaped piece of fried dough topped with icing.

"Hoff it any way you like, how are you going to dunk this thing?" he asked.

Now Stan figures this whole invidious business of making holes smaller, or multiplying holes to give the illusion of plenty, has been going on for about 20 years.

"I wouldn't for the world point my finger at the present administration," he insisted, "but it is an example of present day trend there's just one answer—we are

confused and something ought to be done about it. Anybody got a better way to feel the public pulse?

Work at Arco to Continue Through Winter Weather

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 27.—Work at the national reactor testing station here will not slow because of winter this year, in fact, it never has.

The atomic energy commission construction and operation program is designed so that cold weather does not slow the main functions of the project. For example, contractors have even operated in 25 below zero weather.

Access roads and other preliminary work for the aircraft propulsion reactor will be completed before nearly snow flies. Construction of the reactor starts next spring. Total construction and other personnel involved in the project is expected to swell to some 3,500 persons by next summer. About 2,500 are employed at present.

The experimental reactor reaction will be completed more than a year ago; the materials testing reactor started during the past year. And the atomic thrust reaction is still in its construction stage. Beside the aircraft reactor, the other major test reactors are the chemical processing plant.

Welter Flays Demo Bosses

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Sen. Herman Welter, R., Ind., said today President Truman and Gov. Adlai Stevenson are "destroying hopes for future unity on foreign policy."

In a statement distributed by the Republican national committee, Welter said Truman and Stevenson, the Democratic nominee for President, are "mouthing the same identical malarky and selling the same untruths."

Welter added:

"We Republicans have pointed out time after time that it was the Republican 82nd congress which passed the original Marshall plan program—provided aid to Turkey and Greece and interim aid to France and Italy and which adopted the Vandenberg resolution which paved the way for NATO—North Atlantic treaty organization. And we have shown that Republicans made a formal protest against the Truman withdrawal American troops from Korea."

"President Truman... has continued to try to steal credit for these constructive parts of our foreign program from the Republicans. And now we find Governor Stevenson calling in one breath for unity at home and in the next destroying me for it by mouthing Mr. Truman's own distortions."

Here are answers by both Congressional candidates to important questions by Idaho Farm Bureau Federation (a non-partisan organization) as reported in the Oct. 23rd Fall-Talk-Tribune.

Q What are your views on price and wage control?

A (BUDGE) Most controls unnecessary, and the nation, and particularly the farmer, better off without them. Do not favor.

A (OPPENENT) Favor controls when setting where necessary picture changes with cost.

Q What are your views on present Hells Canyon Dam bill?

A (BUDGE) Opposed to it. The 21-member House committee unanimously rejected the proposed bill. Too much federal encroachment.

A (OPPENENT) In favor of private ownership and when it is a job without waiting to deprive the people of it they should be exempt. Canyon dam bill will bring more wealth state and not hurt water.

Q Are you in favor of some kind of valley authority for the watershed?

A (BUDGE) No. Too much "distant" control by bureaucracy.

A (OPPENENT) Yes. The Tennessee Dam Authority has been a benefit.

Q What are your views on universal military training?

A (BUDGE) Do not favor, at least under present draft law.

A (OPPENENT) In favor of U.S.A.

Q Explain your views on how a strong farm program can be met.

A (BUDGE) Some supports necessary under conditions as at present. Does not favor the states 20 percent parity, reluctantly voted for it, but would prefer gradual reduction of parity support and provision for flexible parity plan.

A (OPPENENT) Favors the program as outlined operating.

Q What are your views on the present foreign aid bill?

A (BUDGE) Should be drastically cut. Twenty-seven other major countries, all receiving foreign aid, have a combined national debt, which if multiplied by two would still be less than the U. S. national debt.

A (OPPENENT) Favors foreign aid program. Very important and needed.

Q Do you think taxes can be reduced in the coming year?

A (BUDGE) Yes, and they must be. This year the first time in history that the U. S. dollar has been discounted in Canada. Last year it was \$1.08. Now it is 92 cents. Too much taxation to insure a stable national economy.

A (OPPENENT) Under the need for a change of any program reduction.

Q What are your views on a balanced budget?

A (BUDGE) The budget can be balanced through curtailment of unnecessary spending. Some minor examples, typical of many large items: An \$18,000 appropriation for a study into the emotional strains of steep acid grass.

A (OPPENENT) Could be balanced, but not that it will.

Q What are your views on the defense program?

A (BUDGE) Much money is being wasted. "Votes" for all measures called for cuts in the program. Military now has more money than it can spend in one year, even with a \$10 billion cut this year.

A (OPPENENT) For that we should cut expenditures.

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
