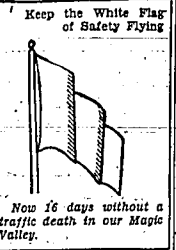

evidence that farmers are losing ground under the "new order."

"It has been very generally felt up until now that farmers would be influenced less by this election by so-called farm issues—such as price and federal farm-aid programs—than they were in 1948. This belief was based upon the fact that there is little difference between farm policies advocated by the two major presidential candidates."

The price decline has centered largely on products produced by midwestern farmers—the same producers who were credited with the big assist in Truman's 1948 victory. These products include corn, hogs, cattle, soybeans, flaxseed and chickens.

Prices of hogs, a major farm income item in the politically important states as Illinois, Iowa, Indiana and Ohio, have dropped more than \$2 a hundred pounds, or about 13 per cent, in the past few days.

By comparison, farm prices are about 5 per cent higher than they were at this time four years ago. On the other hand, prices paid by farmers for materials, goods and services have advanced nearly 15 per cent since then.

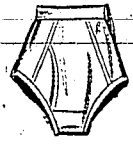



Doctor Urges Instruction in Blaze Hazard

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30—It's play for children to play with matches, light cigarettes, fire up the incinerator and learn about electricity, electric shock and dangerous chemicals—all under parental supervision, a widely known pediatrician believes.

Dr. Harry F. Dietrich, Beverly Hills, Calif., made these suggestions to the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults. He is one of this country's top authorities on accident prevention among children.

Introduction Needed Boys 2 1/2 to 5 should be introduced to the ways of fire. Dr. Dietrich says by allowing them to light cigarettes for other members of the family, by letting them start up the incinerator or fireplace when an adult is around.

When Junior wants to light matches, break out the kitchen set and let him in the driveway or on the sidewalk and make him light and blow out each match, one at a time.

The whole bit "This usually will give the parent a respite of 3 to 12 months from the match match," Dr. Dietrich said.

Girls' Interest Waives Little girls also should be taught similarly but their interest usually wanes. But boys have a compulsive attraction toward flames and their growing pyromania must be counteracted.

All children of this age should be taught by the parents that some liquids are inflammable; that some plants and shrubs will burn the flesh. The facts about electric shock should be taught gradually.

Some of them might reduce the accident toll which each year in the United States kills 20,000 children, permanently injures probably 40,000 others and requires medical attention for 1 1/2 million.

Price of Cigar May Hold Key To U. S. of Europe Possibility

By PHIL NEWSON, The Kootenai News Editor

The price of a cigar might be the difference in whether there ever is to be a United States of Europe.

Meaning that ever since the end of World War II the Benelux countries—Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg—have been trying to make an economic union work. They are the laboratory test cases in the larger dream of a European federation.

Aside from national jealousies, politics and the many intangibles that divide nations, the Benelux countries are learning by hard experience the difficulties involved even in such

a seemingly simple transaction as buying and smoking a cigar.

But upon the solution of such problems will depend others much bigger, including the success or failure of the Schuman plan to pool iron and steel, the federation of Western Europe and even the European army plan.

Here is the situation as experienced by the three little laboratory nations.

The difficulties lie mainly between Belgium and The Netherlands and Luxembourg because they have been integrated economically for more than 20 years.

But in Holland salaries are generally 30 to 50 per cent lower than in Belgium. The difference is the result of Dutch government subsidies on many commodities ranging from bread to electricity.

The Dutch adopted the subsidies policy after the loss of their East Indies empire. By keeping salaries down and prices to a minimum, the Dutch have been able to provide employment for their fast-increasing population by making their products highly competitive as far as price is concerned in European markets.

Belgians, on the other hand, followed what they labeled a "policy of economic orthodoxy" or, in other words, free enterprise. Prices and salaries were allowed to find their own levels. Belgian costs and standard of living are now among the highest in Western Europe.

The lower Dutch salaries and government subsidies enable the Dutch to produce their goods more cheaply than the Belgians and to "dump" them in Belgium at prices the Belgian can't meet.

For instance a recent Belgian tobacco industry review claimed that the Dutch can retail their cigars 25 per cent cheaper in Belgium than the Belgians can.

Belgian textile manufacturers claim they have been hit even harder. Similar complaints have come from the book and shoe, paper and transport industries.

No immediate solution of the problem is in sight. However, word from Brussels is that it will not wreck Benelux.

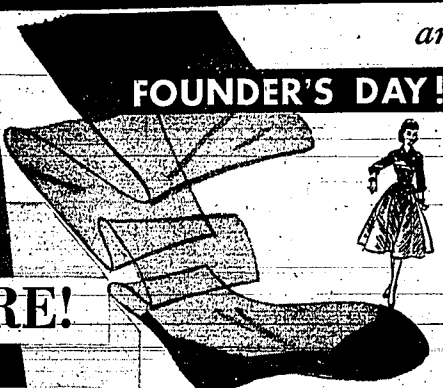

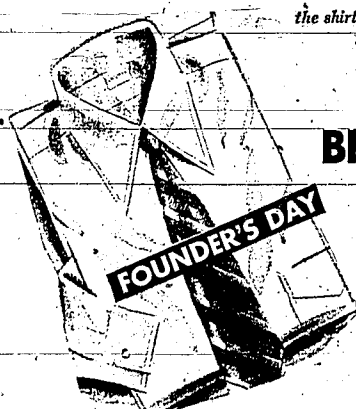
