More Pay, Not More Colleges, Held Answer to Idaho Problem

Editor, Times-News: Reading the letter in the Times-News by Zona Gale Bird favoring the reopening of the Idaho and Northern Idaho College of Education, I thought perhaps you might be interested in an article I wrote presenting the other side.

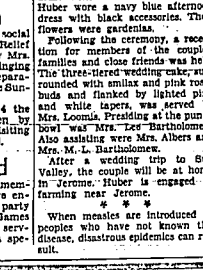

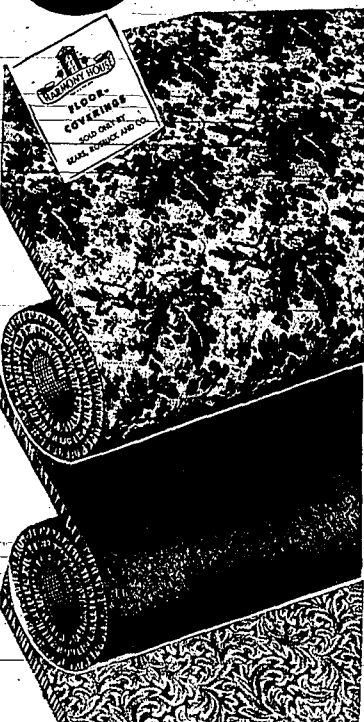

Vega Bright
Somewhat west of Deneb and very high in the sky, Vega, principal star of the harp of Orpheus, is very bright. Five dim stars very near Vega outline the principal body of the classical harp, known as Lyra.

Around the middle of the month a few faint meteors can likely be seen in the morning sky. They are bluish in color and very swift.

Court Upholds
Labor Ruling

BOISE, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court today in a 3-2 decision has upheld a lower court order restraining a labor union from picketing or interfering with the operations of a Pocatello bus company.

The Pocatello local of the Amalgamated Association of Street Cleaners and Motor Coach Employees had appealed from an injunction granted last November by District Judge Preston Trasker, Bannock county.

The injunction restrained the union from "interfering with the business of the plaintiff . . . by picketing, threatening prospective passengers who are members of other unions with fines . . . by interfering with drivers . . . and by permitting the name of the plaintiff to remain upon the unfair list of the Central Labor Council of Pocatello."

The court, in a decision written by Justice William D. Kretton, upheld the lower court's ruling that no labor dispute existed and picketing was illegal since there was no contract between the union and plaintiff, J. E. Tarr.

Tarr had purchased the equipment of the Motor Transport company, which had discharged two of the union's members, Ray Scheel and Lovella A. Scheel. Tarr began operations May 10, 1951.

The union demanded that the Scheels be hired and given back pay allegedly due them from the motor transport company. Tarr refused, and his employer voted to strike. When he hired non-union help, his loading stations were picketed.

Decree Filed
A decree determining time of death, heirs and their right to property of A. J. Carbin was filed with the county recorder Friday by his widow, Mrs. Mary Carbin.

Mr. Carbin died in Nez Perce county Feb. 4, 1944, leaving an estate in that county and a lot in Buhl. The widow received the property.

County Prisoner
Gets His Release

Claude Loghry was released from custody by District Judge Hugh A. Baker Friday after he served three months of a six-month sentence for deserting and failing to support his two children, ages 3 and 2.

The desertion occurred Feb. 27 and Loghry was sentenced Aug. 1. He is required to pay to the custodian of the children \$75 monthly if he is not living with them and must support them if he lives with

his wife and makes a home for them. The provision is for the next six months. Judge Baker pointed out that a man must support his children, regardless of difficulties with his wife.

Loghry told the court the children were taken to his mother in Nevada by his wife until he is released from jail and can make a home for them. He indicated he will return to his wife and has employment.

Expansion Is Seen in West Fertilizer Use

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The commerce department says expansion of fertilizer production and use in the Rocky mountain area is inevitable.

"With raw materials and transportation readily available and with large and growing markets lying close at hand, this industry in the west is on the verge of a great new development which will go far beyond the important beginnings which already have been made," the department said.

Such an expansion program, the department added, would contribute significantly to the industrial building of the area and increase substantially the production of the land, particularly that suitable for pasture.

The report was prepared at the request of Senator O'Mahoney, D., Wyo. It has mailed copies of it to members of the senate interior committee, of which he is chairman, and to Wyoming farmers and ranchers.

O'Mahoney said in a foreword: "The high production in the west of fertilizer from western re-

sources available in western markets, unburdened by cost of present long freight hauls, would of course have far reaching effects upon western agriculture, both as to crops and as to wool and cattle production.

Between 60 and 85 per cent of the nation's supply of phosphate, a raw material for fertilizer, is in Idaho, Wyoming, Montana and Utah.
