Western Aid Gains Praise of Slav Chief

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia, Nov. 3 (AP)— Marshal Tito praised the western powers today for their unconditional military aid and pledged active Yugoslav support to a "joint defense" against Russian aggression.

In a 4000-word speech before the Yugoslav premier blamed Russia for the present world tension. He said the world's troubles stem from the Russian attack on Poland, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Moscow and Bulgaria conferences.

Mr. Tito said the western powers must stand with Russia responsible for the outbreak of the Korean war.

"The Soviet Union," he said, "has used its influence to push North Korea to aggressive war and to bring South Korea under its influence."

"In making this statement I do not mean to diminish in any way the responsibility of the western powers for the Korean war, which is the result of their bargaining for spheres of influence that the Korean war might degenerate into a world conflict."

Inspected Method

"If the role of the United Nations against aggressive attempts to be effective, these countries must continue to set important international problems such as were applied by Moscow and Berlin must first be abandoned."

SMALL BUSINESS SQUEEZE

Whoever is President next January and whichever party controls Congress, a new tax bill is likely to come up for debate. And when it does, says the nation's tax authorities, think the lawmakers ought to worry about more than how much money a tax law will pull in.

A recent scholarly tax study reminds us that, besides bringing in revenue, taxes have broad economic effects. They change the habits of businessmen. They affect the growth prospects of individual companies. They encourage or discourage incentive.

Take just one of these—the growth of particular businesses. The tax experts say that under our present federal revenue structure it is extremely difficult for a small corporation to grow. Basic corporation income taxes are high, but more severely handicapping is the excess profits tax.

That tax is founded on the largely false assumption that every corporation which made more money after Korea than before is reaping "war profits" and should be penalized for this extra gain.

Young businesses whose period of expansion coincides with this spin are distressed and jumpier with older firms which really are benefitting from war. The growing outfit cannot pile up the funds they need for new plants, and they can't attract outside capital because of the damper put on their earnings outlook.

There are other more technical features of the tax law which help to restrict an expanding business. They assure that small business will stay small.

Small business has many good friends in Congress. They are very anxious to be concerned with preventing little corporations from being squeezed by the big ones. But the tax law squeezes them harder than any ruthless industrial giant. It assures, in the view of impartial tax experts, that the big companies will be the only ones to meet the financial resources needed to keep growing.

FOREIGN DEMONS

There are probably more undecided votes in this campaign than in any presidential race in history. The doubtless are weighing "him for a change" vs. "you've never had it so good."

Each of those phrases is shorthand for a lot of things which are of genuine concern to millions of Americans. The election will be decided by the way in which these voters settle their mental tug of war.

However they make up their minds, we all ought to hope that it is without any nudging from Joe Stalin.

In the past dozen years, it has become fashionable to snipe the aid of foreign demons in U. S. campaigns. We're getting it again.

Some political orators are saying: "Stalin wants a Republican victory, so vote for Stevenson." Others are shouting: "Stalin wants Ike beaten, so vote for Eisenhower."

It used to be: "Hitler wants W. W. C. C. Or: 'The commies want Roosevelt.'"

Now this may not be as bad as some of the low-level personality attacks we've had in 1952, but it's not a great deal better.

Isn't it pretty much the only way the American voter picks a President on the basis of the factors which his strongest personally? Those factors are things like the state of his pocketbook, his feelings at having a son called and sent to Korea, the mounting cost of his groceries.

To talk as if he cared a hoot about who Stalin wants or doesn't want for President is virtually to insult him. He doesn't care, and he shouldn't.

We will make our choice Nov. 4 on grounds we think important to us as Americans. We will hope that, whatever our selection, it will be palatable to our friends abroad. But we are not going to be influenced by our enemies' estimate on the question of who can do them the least harm.

Every time a politician has the nerve to suggest we should listen to Stalin, we ought to be conveniently deaf.

Record Vote Forecast for '52 Election

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—A forecast of 50 million American voters' record numbers are expected to turn out tomorrow to vote between Adlai E. Stevenson and Dwight D. Eisenhower for president. The great interest generated by the hard-fought campaign, plus a forecast of generally good weather over the country, prompted election officials to predict that tomorrow's vote will be far and away the heaviest ever cast in this country's record set in '40.

The present record of 45,951,833 votes established in 1940 when Franklin D. Roosevelt and Wendell L. Willkie were the opposing presidential candidates. In 1948, when President Truman defeated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, New York, the vote was 42,816,693.

Registration figures, while still incomplete and unofficial, indicate that around 75 million persons out of a total adult population of 98 million have met various state law requirements for voting in 1954. There were only 65 million eligible voters.

Drives to get-out-the-vote have been conducted throughout the country by newspapers and radio stations. The Boy Scouts, League of Women Voters, chambers of commerce and other civic groups. The present registration drives are expected to have met with considerable success.

The turnout is expected to be exceptionally large in the states with the largest populations—New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Ohio, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Texas and Michigan.

Douglas Cites Great Cost of '52 Campaign

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Paul H. Douglas, D. Ill., thinks this year's election campaign, in which paid radio and television advertising cost as much as \$75 million dollars. Admittedly, that is "a little more than the cost of the election in 1948," but he said it is getting astronomical. Television and radio costs are expected to total considerably more than \$3 million dollars this year.

Present laws are not effective in keeping campaign spending down. They limit the national Democratic and Republican committees to \$3 million dollars each. But they do not limit the number of campaign committees, each of which can spend up to the \$3 million dollar limit if it has the funds.

There are about 7,500 such campaign committees in the country. High cost of election. Not all, of course, are spending up to the statutory limit. Still, there is no doubt that the cost of the election is the highest ever, and even the politicians are worried about it.

GOP's Attack Truman's Act On Document

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Nov. 3 (AP)—President Truman's first GOP criticism today for declassifying a 1947 "top secret" memorandum in which joint chiefs of staff recommended withdrawal of U.S. troops from Korea.

Mr. Truman added new fuel to the controversy over the memorandum as he settled down here to rest from an 18,000 mile "give 'em hell" campaign tour through 27 states. He plans to vote here tomorrow before returning to Washington to begin his last weeks in the White House.

The president announced yesterday he was declassifying the 1947 document "in order that the public may have access to the facts about the preliminary decision to withdraw U.S. forces from Korea. He said "many untrue accusations" had been made, but he cannot accept responsibility for the decision.

The document, a memo from the secretary of defense to the secretary of state, was in support of Mr. Truman's charge that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower had misled the public in blaming the state department for the decision to pull U.S. troops completely out of Korea.

Disclosed by Morse — Sen. Wayne Morse, Ore., a Republican who deserted his party to support Gov. Earl Warren, disclosed the contents of the memorandum at a political meeting last night in Independence, Mo., at a time he said the document was "top secret" but his use of it was "authorized."

Mr. Truman's act drew a charge from Sen. William Knowlton, R., Calif., that the president was "trying to protect" Morse from being guilty of a breach of security. Knowlton said that Mr. Truman lifted the secrecy from the memorandum he (Knowlton) had written the justice department demanding an investigation of Morse's use of it.

Widener Attacks — Lieut. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of U. S. forces in China in "World War II," joined the attack on the document in Congress. He said the administration and not General Eisenhower should be held responsible for the withdrawal of troops from Korea.

"Our military leaders and all other members of Congress have denied access to important information concerning the United States position in the far east" in 1947, he said.

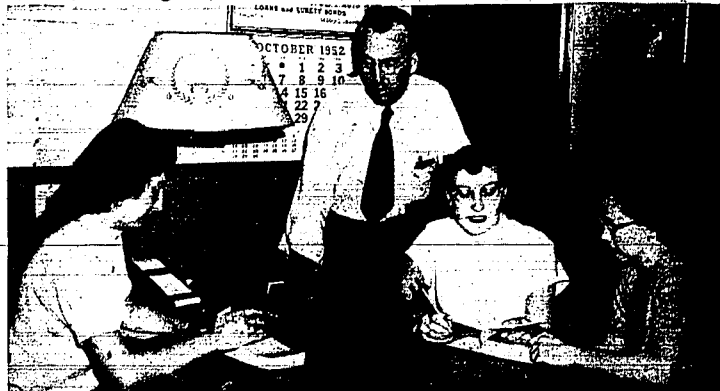

Hope on Two New Projects Appears Dim

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Regardless of the outcome of Tuesday's election, the chances of securing the irrigation proposals seem to face rough going in congress next year. The results of congressional races could have more effect on the fate of such projects than the national results, despite the extent to which the program has been introduced into the presidential campaign.

A case in point is the proposed Belle Fourche dam on the Snake river. Despite strong administration support for that 400-million-dollar project, it was opposed by both houses of congress and it made little headway in the house interior committee.

Sen. Ald. Needled The results, noted once again that it is almost necessary to win the support of congressmen representing the area before the bills can get committee approval for a project.

The central Arizona power-reclamation project on Colorado river faces trouble for another reason—a fight between California and Arizona over the heading toward supreme court after a 20-year battle in congress.

Idaho-Span. Harry Donohue and Herman Walker still will be in the senate in 1935. Reps. Hamer Budge and John T. Wood are considered favorites to win election in Idaho. Democrats who are for Idaho canyon.

More to Continue Sen. Wayne Morse, Ore., who recently visited the state and became an independent, presumably will continue fighting for Belle canyon in 1935 as he did in 1934.

Regardless of election results, Utah members of congress probably will support a third project, the Colorado river development program, which proposes an 800-million-dollar series of dams along the river's upper reaches.

Utah's Republican senators and Democratic representatives, have voted for the program. The approval of the dams would be in Utah, a state which needs water conservation.

Sen. Wallace Bennett continues in office next year. Sen. Arthur Watkins, who this year introduced a bill to authorize the upper Colorado program, seeks re-election. His opponent is Rep. Walter Granger, also a project supporter.

Forged Document Usage Is Claimed

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 3 (AP)—A former FBI consultant here today said today Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., once used a "forged" document in a speech. Edward Morgan, Washington attorney who once served as assistant to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, called the controversial senator the "voice of fascism" in a television appearance here last night. Morgan, who said he specialized in investigations of communists during his years with the FBI, appeared with Thomas E. Furchick, McCarthy's Democratic opponent for the senate.

Private Fire Department Has Varied Experiences at Boise

By TOM ADEN BOISE, Nov. 3 (AP)—The fire truck was speeding out of town over by roads when the fire chains—important winter equipment in Idaho—a haystack. But during that time the department has fought an average of a fire a week for others, saving thousands of dollars worth of property.

The Tate brothers started worrying about fire protection at their dairy farm outside Boise's city limits in 1941. They bought a pump and mounted it on a 1934 model truck.

The first rescue mission was a milk truck. Dairy employes spotted a sick animal burning nearby and drove to it, anxious to try out the new pump. The owner wouldn't let them. He was burning it down to get rid of it. Pretty soon, though, a pump caught on fire on the highway and they extinguished it. They discovered they needed an axe, so one was

added. A night call to a burning house revealed the need for flashlights. New items were added after nearly every call—adders, more hose, a water tank, helmets and raincoats—until a complete set of fire-fighting equipment had been accumulated.

They discovered also there was more to fighting blazes than merely pouring on water. They took instruction from Boise firemen.

The old truck became so loaded down the Tates bought a new one last year. One incident helped decide them to buy the new one and paint it fire engine red.

Answering a call in the old truck they collided with a car. A state policeman came up and asked the classic "where do you think you're going—to a fire?" "That's exactly what we're doing," replied "Chief" John Tate. "Well, it looks more like a garbage truck to me," the officer said. The work doesn't stop, and for the

last three years the dairy has been called to a fire. All the kids big enough to hang on pile on the truck and go along to help out.

"All boys, you know, go through a stage of wanting to be a policeman or a fireman," says Tate. "I guess we just haven't grown up."

One of the group's proudest achievements was winning the time trials in competition with other volunteer departments at the state fire school this year. The plaque is displayed prominently at the dairy.

Although the fire truck has saved nothing more valuable than a haystack at the dairy, it has provided the Tates with a substitute for outlawed fireworks on the Fourth of July.
