NEW YORK, Nov. 6 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower today announced he would make an early visit to the Korean peninsula to inspect the progress of the UN Command's operations.

Carlton Retained as T. F. Sheriff; All Other Officers Are Republican

Sheriff Jesso E. Carlton was reelected by an overwhelming vote, the only Democrat in Twin Falls county to survive the nationwide Republican landslide. Complete unofficial returns from 41 precincts in Twin Falls county gave Carlton 11,367 votes against 7,147 votes for his Republican opponent, James H. Benham. The vote in the county—the only vote over the nation—was the heaviest in history. The presidential contest drew 19,014 votes, nearly 6,000 more than were cast in the 1934 election. Four years ago, when the Democrats dominated the national vote, Sheriff Carlton defeated the incumbent, Broda R. Rayborn, by the narrow margin of 186 votes.

Blaine County Goes Heavily Republican

HAILEY, Nov. 5—Traditionally Democratic Blaine county went overwhelmingly Republican in the election Tuesday for the first time since 1928. Herbert Hoover defeated Alfred E. Smith by 197 votes, however, and the GOP plurality Tuesday was 676. The only Democrat with the opposition to be elected was Sheriff L. E. Outz, incumbent, who defeated his opponent, almost two to one, Joseph McFadden, the incumbent prosecuting attorney, was defeated by his Republican opponent, George R. Kneeland, 1,660 to 999.

Camas Voters Tally Almost 100 Per Cent

FAIRFIELD, Nov. 5—Registered voters in Camas county turned out almost 100 per cent in Tuesday's election. Of the 469 voters registered in Fairfield, 454 cast ballots. All of the registered voters in the Blaine and Manard precincts went to the polls and all but two voters in Hill City cast ballots.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Republicans edged toward 60 per cent of the House today, but were locked with Democrats in a fight to the last seat for senate control. Dwight D. Eisenhower's tremendous popular vote apparently helped his party's candidates toward a slim margin in the House. The senate outcome still was uncertain. Returns showed both houses would be closely divided regardless of the final outcome. The GOP wrested four senate seats from the Democrats, including that of Senate Democratic Leader Ernest W. McFarland. But they lost three other Democratic seats. Senate returns showed 22 Republicans elected and one other leading. There plus the 26 holdover GOP senators gave the Republicans an incumbent 48 senate seats, one short of a bare majority. Democrats elected 31 senatorial candidates and one other was lead-

RENO, Nev., Nov. 5 (AP)—Lanky Tom McCall, the 31-year-old boy wonder of Nevada politics, conceded defeat early today to his Republican opponent, Sen. George W. Malone.

McCall, who astounded not only Nevada but the nation in September by winning the Democratic nomination after living in Nevada only eight months, sent a telegram congratulating Malone upon his victory, 44-12.

In a way, McCall's defeat was a victory for Sen. Pat McCarran, Nevada's most powerful political figure. McCarran, a Democrat, had been attacked repeatedly by McCall as the proprietor of a political machine he charged controlled virtually every major public office in Nevada.

"I don't worry," she explained simply during the closing campaign days. "I accepted the criticisms of Ike during the campaign as just part of a political contest. I'll face the problems of the White House as I come to them. The social obligations wouldn't bother me—parties have always been part of our lives."

Through all the excitement of campaigning, even when tumultuous welcomes brought tears to her eyes, Mamie kept her feet solidly on the ground.

"I think it would be hard to say that election day was the biggest day in my life, because as you grow older, different things become important." Mrs. Eisenhower said, speaking seriously and calmly though her day was crowded with overlapping appointments.

"When you're first married, the day your first child is born is the most important day in your life."

Now the next first lady is most interested in the vacation she and "Ike" planned as soon as the election was over.

"I think I've stood the schedule surprisingly well," she said in the last week of campaigning. "It's the longest period of concentrated strain I've ever been subjected to. After all, we've been at this for five months now."

She plans to use the time until inauguration to rest, "catch up on my personal correspondence and my household jobs." She'll also take time off to celebrate her 54th birthday anniversary Nov. 14.

Mrs. Eisenhower will have little opportunity to indulge in her favorite hobby—redecorating—houses, but she can bring along some of her favorite family heirlooms. Like the old spool bed Eisenhower's grandfather took from Pennsylvania to Kansas by oxcart.

An adoring grandmother, Mrs. Eisenhower also is independent enough to feel that every wife should have her own home. She has no plans to invite her daughter-in-law, Barbara, to move into the White House with her three chil-

24-Year Demo Help Is Ended For California

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 (AP)—California leaped aboard the Eisenhower bandwagon and voted Republican in a presidential election for the first time in 24 years.

Supposedly a loss-up state, California and its 21 electoral votes went to Dwight D. Eisenhower by a substantial margin. Republicans also were assured of capturing the lion's share of the state's 30 congressional seats as well as maintaining control of the state legislature.

Los Angeles county, which went Democratic in 1948 by slightly more than 8,000 votes, switched to the Republican President-elect in yesterday's election by so many votes that Adlai E. Stevenson was named under statehood.

Returns from 15,447 of the state's 20,773 precincts showed Eisenhower 1,064,200 and Stevenson 1,239,833. In Los Angeles county which accounted for two-fifths of the state total registration, returns from 5,786 of the county's total of 8,148 precincts gave "Ike" 709,470 and Stevenson 580,156, an edge of 140,323.

Because of the record-breaking number of ballots cast in yesterday's election, tabulation of the vote was slow but it appeared certain Eisenhower's smashing triumph would guarantee the Republicans a firm hold on the state's congressional delegation.

Here's Eisenhower Program

Korea—Plans to go to Korea to see what can be done to bring the war "to an early and honorable" end.

Taxes—Wants taxes reduced after spending has been cut.

Tidelands—Favors legislation to give ownership of the so-called tidelands to the states.

Social Security—Wants congress to "improve and extend" social security coverage and benefit.

GOP Victory Is 'Warning,' Senator Says

As in every election, the oddities of the 1952 record turned Tuesday provided drama, pathos and comedy. Here are a few culled from the press service wires: A voting machine in New York's 24th election district broke down and 40 voters milled about while election officials tried to fix it. A woman voter finally pushed her way forward, pulled a bobby pin out of her hair, and used it as a cotter-pin to fix the machine. A woman in Boston's back bay section arrived at her polling place early in her chauffeur's limousine. She found a long line waiting to vote and directed her chauffeur to stand in line for her. When he reached the head of the line she stepped into place and cast her ballot. In Ashland, O., Charles Richards, 67, collapsed and died of a heart attack as he stepped from the booth to hand his marked ballot to an election official. Friends said he was a Republican. Patrick Walsh, 31, lied in vain to get the autograph of his hero, Dwight D. Eisenhower, in New York. When he accosted a tall, heavy Irish policeman assigned to the door of the general's home on Morningglades drive, the policeman teasingly asked him: "You want my autograph? You're as good a man as Ike." Patrick stood back, eyed the policeman and said: "Yeah, but you ain't gonna be the next President." In Danville, Ky., J. J. Isaac, who had worked for three days about his injured pet cat, found it waiting for him when he went to the polls to vote. Having babies may come first with some women, but nothing comes before voting as far as 49-year-old Mrs. Joan Willis is concerned. She stopped to vote in North Hollywood, Calif., while in route to a hospital to have a baby. She stopped at the polling place at 8 a. m., then proceeded to St. Joseph hospital where she gave birth to a baby girl at 9 a. m. Mother and child are doing well. In Vineland, N. J., however, all was not excitement. Seven town councilmen resigned. A by-election was called to replace them. Nobody entered the race. Only 16 out of 272 registered voters showed up at the polls to write in candidates. One spoiled his ballot. The voters decided today to try again next Sunday.

One Pollster Proves Correct In His Prediction of Outcome

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (Special)—A pollster who predicted the 1952 Democratic landslide predicted a similar victory for Eisenhower on the eve of the 1952 vote. Idaho rated among states in the "first-run son strength" in a mail poll run by Emil Hurja, Washington public relations consultant. All the other nine mountain states except Arizona—where Eisenhower was conceded a fighting chance—also should go Republican, Hurja said. "I was only wrong by 500 votes in a state in the mountain area in 1952. People there think alike and the polls in the last election—what I don't think I'll be wrong this time." The pollster said he sent no more than a "few hundred" ballots to the mountain states of the \$3,000 he circulated throughout the country. "What's important in elections is the percentage of shift," he declared. "My results show that 30 per cent of the people who voted for Truman in 1948 are going to go for Eisenhower this time. And only three per cent of the Dewey support in 1948 is going to Stevenson."

"Ike" Urges Both Parties to Forget Political Past, Aim for Better Future

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower called on all Republicans and Democrats today to forsake the immediate political past and work for a "better future."

Eisenhower made his plea for national unity in a speech at the election 34th President of the United States.

His beaming wife at his side made his victory statement to more than 2,000 screaming supporters gathered in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Commodore to see him appear for the first time in his new role.

The man who will become President next Jan. 20 accepted humbly the responsibility and a great responsibility to his losing political opponent, Illinois Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson.

"I am not certain, my friends, whether or not you have read or heard the telegram that Mr. Stevenson sent me, reads:

"The people have made their choice. It is up to you to be the servant and guardian of peace and make the 'wage of peace' which is the duty of every citizen. Best wishes, Adlai E. Stevenson."

Eisenhower said he, in turn, had dispatched a telegram to his defeated Democratic opponent thanking him for his graceful handling of the political state of the past and thanking them for the service they have given to the people of a better future.

"The new President-to-be then said:

Stevenson Calls on Americans To 'Close Ranks,' Help 'Ike'

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 5 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson called upon Americans today to "close ranks" and offered his prayers to Dwight D. Eisenhower, president-elect, who defeated him for the presidency, can lead the nation toward a better future."

"There were no regrets, only a smile on Stevenson's face when he congratulated his republican rival in a speech at 12:44 a. m. (CST) today.

The 32,000 miles of campaigning, the best "driving record" of his life, and years behind him, Stevenson gave every sign of a man relieved.

Despite agonizing moments, Stevenson, by his campaign director, it was learned on good authority that Stevenson, in his political state of the past and then his defeat and his snowballing proportions even as the early returns rolled in.

"I am glad to see that Stevenson is so close to us as he is," said Stevenson's spokesman. "He is equal to the task that lies ahead of him. And then, in keeping with the theme he sounded in recent days, the unsuccessful candidate declared:

"I give you as many as I can give as one. With a united people, with faith in democracy, with common concern for others less fortunate around the globe, we shall move forward with God's guidance toward the time when his children shall grow to freedom and dignity in a world of peace," he said.

As for immediate plans, Stevenson told the United Press he would

catch up on state business, eat aside during the closing weeks of the campaign, and then perhaps take a brief vacation.

"In the more distant future were the possibilities of a neglected children law practice, his own health service to his country in the field of foreign affairs, and stretching out before him in order of his faithful followers."

"It's Give in '56."

"But all of that for ahead. For the moment, it is a good night's sleep and the comfort that close friends and his sons could bring."

Loading up for Canyon Plunge

Cable Car Ride Into Canyon Provides Novel Means to Visit Urie Trout Farm

For a new experience, the Urie family of five and their 23 foreign countrymen as one example of the American way of life. A tour of the trout farm shows the result of hard work without the benefit of heavy equipment. The trout farm itself is composed of a series of fresh water pools fed by spring water registering 45 degrees. Urie points out that the water is cooler than the water used by most hatcheries. However, he feels that it helps produce a fish with more firm meat. Only fish of uniform size are kept in each pool. Larger fish often eat the smaller fish, so the pools are policed thoroughly. Urie raises nothing but Rainbow trout. Not just regular trout, but hatchery trout. The feed formula contains 90 to 95 per cent grain, some special prepared fish food and ground trash fish taken from the Snake river. The Urie family shares in operating the trout farm. The fish are raised and harvested just like any other crop. One year's finishing requires 10 to 12 months. Most of the orders placed with Urie are from Montana resorts. The fish are processed and placed in plastic bags and packed in ice. Then they are taken out of the canyon by the cable car for shipment. Urie entered the trout raising business shortly after World War II, giving up a dairy farm. He readily admits that what he has learned about raising has been the result of hard work and experience. There is even a special fishing stream for frustrated fishermen unable to curb a desire to fish. Urie keeps the stream well stocked and

fishermen pay a nominal rate for what they catch. Urie plans to develop a section of his canyon home into a recreational area complete with shade areas, picnic grounds, bathing, fishing and swimming facilities. "Of course that will take time," he adds. The canyon home is just about ideal for raising a family. Urie believes that his children are better able to take care of themselves as a result of environment. All have well above average school records and attend church each Sunday. The trip to the Urie trout farm takes a little time, but it is worth it.

Joint Efforts Discussed on Safety Plans

Walters says it appears that three groups will get together, and the Magic Valley group will have representation on the Highway Users association legislative committee along with the Governor's Safety conference and the State Safety council, and the groups will coordinate their efforts.

Soviets Charged With Enchaining People of China

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia, Nov. 5 (AP)—Foreign Minister Edvard Kardelj charged Russia today with attempting to enchain China, neutralize Germany and trick the western European powers away from their defensive alliance with the United States. He spoke before 2,500 delegates attending the first general congress of Yugoslavia's ruling Communist party since 1948, when Premier Marshal Tito's government broke with the Russians. Kardelj blamed Russia for promoting the present world tension—including the war in Korea, which he said was designed by the Kremlin to harness China to the "Soviet wagon" and to prevent the Chinese from engaging in their big task of reconstruction.

Washington Town Flees Tidal Wave

LONG BEACH, Wash., Nov. 5 (AP)—Frightened by radio reports that a huge tidal wave was approaching the Washington coast, between 1,500 and 2,000 people on Long Beach peninsula evacuated their communities briefly Tuesday.

Schools stores and polling places were closed as the residents fled to a hilly area. Their flight was hastened by warnings broadcast over a public address system on the community ambulance at Long Beach, a town of 800 population. Nine polling places along the 28-mile long peninsula were shut down for two hours by election officials. The evacuation was directed by Jack Myers, Pacific county-deputy sheriff, as "entirely orderly though rapid."

Students were marched out of the high school and grade school at Ilwaco and taken by buses to higher ground. Myers said "we were all plenty scared but there was no hysteria and no wild racing around in automobiles. Everyone just lit out for the high hills."

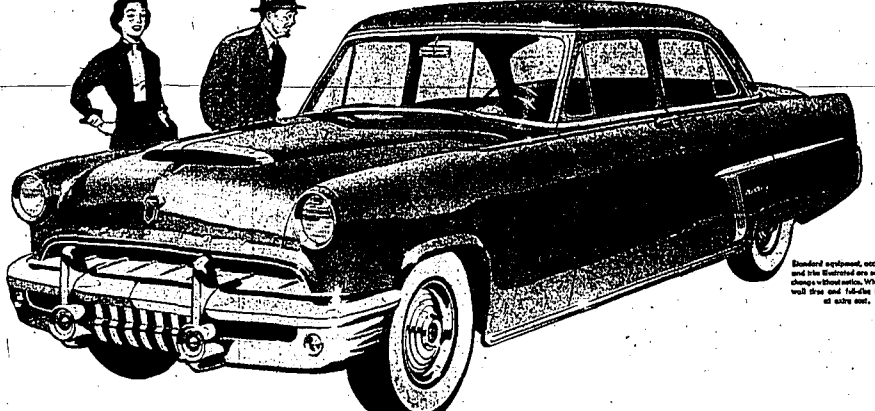

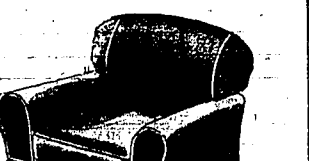

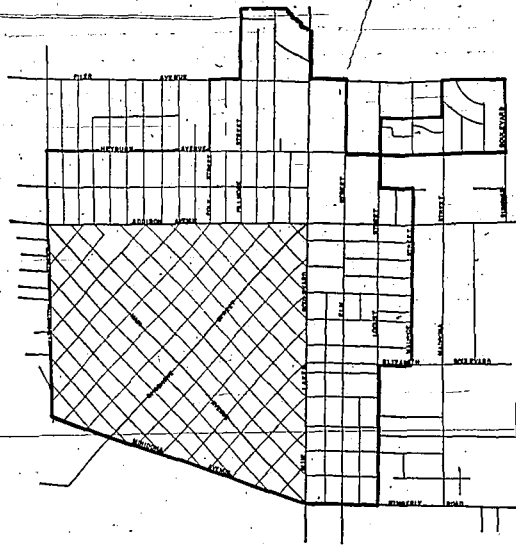

Applications for City Permit to Keep Animals to Be Available Here Monday

Permit applications for keeping animals inside the city limits will be available at the city hall Monday, according to J. L. Latimore, Twin Falls city manager. Latimore said the city hall has had numerous requests for the permit applications since the passing of a new animal control ordinance Oct. 20 by the city commission. The ordinance was passed under suspension of the rules and grants residents 30 days in which to comply with its terms. The applications will be handled at the city clerk's office beginning Monday. Latimore urged animal owners to file their applications as early as possible in order to allow time for the city sanitary inspector to examine the application and inspect the applicant's property. Outside the prohibited areas, permits must be issued for goats, horses, sheep or cows under provisions similar to those for rabbits and fowl inside the prohibited areas. Permits may be revoked on the recommendation of the sanitary inspector or upon receipt of a petition signed by 50 property owners near the property concerned. However, the party concerned is allowed a hearing by the city commission. Penalties for animals must be open for inspection at all times. A penalty is provided for violation of the ordinance. Latimore declared that the city commissioners wish to take all precautions not to work a hardship or inconvenience on any individual. But at the same time feel that the rights and privileges of its citizens within the concentrated residential districts must be protected. An fee must be filed with the application.

Latimore pointed out that the application requests extensive information about the size of land and type of facilities available so that it through entry can be made of animal conditions in Twin Falls and thereby enable the city commission to understand problems and situations. It was emphasized that the ordinance did not apply to animals being kept in business or industrial areas for business and sale. Latimore said the ordinance was drawn up so as not to work a hardship on anyone with sufficient land to keep animals without causing a nuisance. Under the ordinance, pigs are not permitted inside the city limits. The prohibited areas, the center portion of the city, excludes roads, ponds, lakes and sheep. Fowl and rabbits are allowed under certain conditions. However, permits must be obtained and the limit is 50 or less rabbits or fowl, depending on the size of the property.

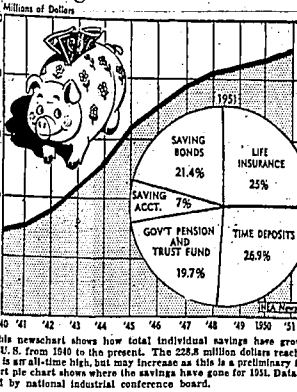

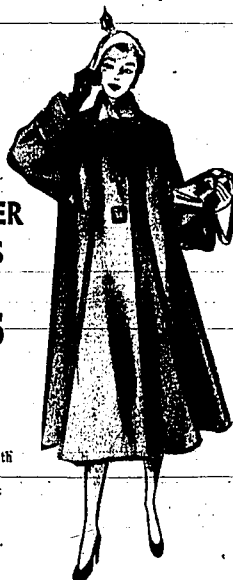

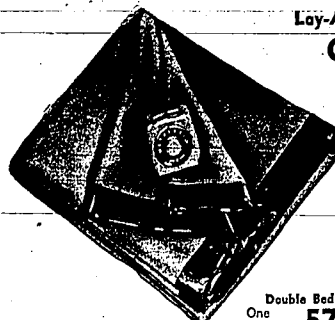
