### Mock Vote at Shoshone School Follows County Election Trend

SHOSHONE, Nov. 6—The mock election at the high school Tuesday for students of the high and junior high turned out about the same as the Lincoln county vote.

Dwight Eisenhower led the county two to one for President but at the school he was a three to one winner. The student vote was 174 for Eisenhower and 50 for Adlai Stevenson.

A similar margin was followed through all county and state offices. There were 150 student votes cast for Hanes H. Budge for U. S. representative and 61 cast for W. H. Jensen; Jack M. Murphy got 175 student votes for state senator compared with 49 for Albert Clapp. C. O. Paulson received 78 votes for representative over Archie T. Jones who received 50 votes. P. O. Wentworth, county commissioner first district, received 121 votes compared to 91 for Samuel Danner.

Walter Bowman, commissioner third district, received 118 votes while Floyd Kisting received 101. Thomas Connor, sheriff, with 121 votes led George Merrill with 51 votes. Ross B. Haddock, probate judge on the Republican ticket was supported and received 210 votes while Howard E. Adkins, prosecuting attorney, a Democrat received 118 student votes as compared to 93 for Fred Schwartz.

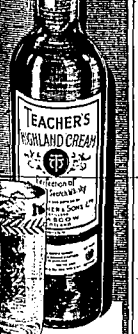

U. S. Leader Assails Russ For Seizure

BERLIN, Nov. 6 (AP)—U. S. high Commissioner Walter J. Donnelly complained today to the Russians about the "communist" infiltration and childlessness of their security system in detaining an American officer for six days and at the same time denying that they knew where he was.

MOSCOW, Nov. 6 (AP)—Russia gave police today a warning not to allow U. S. naval defensive zone in Korean waters. The note said that a U. S. order of Sept. 7 was an extension of a 1950 blockade which violated freedom of the seas.

The announcement was in a note delivered to the United States government in Washington Tuesday and broadcast by the Moscow radio tonight. Aggression Clarified. The note called the order a "new aggressive act" and said Russia put forward its responsibility for "aggressive acts" on the United States government.

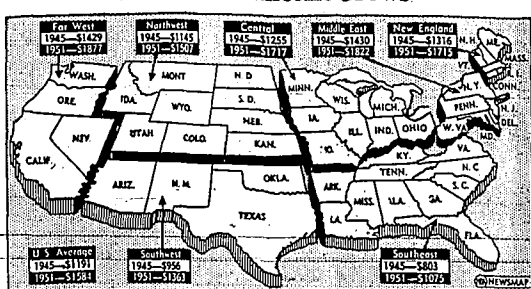

## GOP Landslide Buries Demo "Deals" Of Past 20 Years in Ballot Avalanche

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (AP)—The new deal—the deal which began 20 years ago in the great depression—went tumbling into history with the Republican presidential victory.

The voters' decision to send Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to the White House closed the chapter, one of the most exciting and stormy in the life of the republic.

Warm—and cold, declared and undeclared—already had put the brakes on many of the social and economic revisions started by Franklin D. Roosevelt and advocated by his successor, Harry S. Truman.

Very few such legislative changes have been enacted since the outbreak of the fighting in Korea, or even the end of World War II.

With Eisenhower calling signals from the White House after January, the emphasis on legislative objectives may shift.

That is not to say that a drive will start to dismantle all the Roosevelt-Truman laws, Eisenhower and his Democratic rival, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, III, were in agreement on the need for such matters, as social security, farm price support and the development of nat-

ural resources.

The winning candidate took the stand, however, that there should be a maximum of local participation in those affairs, a minimum of federal interference.

The "new deal" got off to a flying start in the first 100 days of Roosevelt's first term. In 1933, An economic panic then had gripped the United States.

Immediately after his inauguration, Roosevelt ordered a three-day bank holiday to slow down runs and failures, then he called an emergency session of congress.

If the members of congress were not sure that they were supposed to go, Roosevelt's "brain trust" supplied a steady stream of drafts for new legislation. These measures went through swiftly.

One of the first big emergency items was an outright grant of 500 million dollars to the states for the relief of unemployment. Organizations known as the federal emergency relief administration and later the works projects administration were established to provide work for the unemployed, at government expense.

Billions of dollars were spent by these and other "alphabetical agencies."

Another major new deal venture was the national industrial recovery administration of NRA, blue eagle fame.

The agricultural adjustment administration—"tight A"—was established to control farm production and to store crop surpluses at government expense.

To restore public confidence in the banking system, the government set up the federal deposit insurance corporation which guaranteed that no bank depositor could lose his first \$5,000 on deposit if the bank failed. The first congress later boosted the guarantee to \$10,000.

The Tennessee valley authority, whose lakes, dams and power lines now sprawl over a vast area of the upper south, was another creation.

All these developments formed only the base layer of the new deal. The succeeding phase of the program included passage of the national labor relations Wagner act, the social security law, the rural electrification act, housing legislation and the reciprocal trade law

which provided for a gradual reduction of tariffs.

Some of the key new deal measures came under attack in the courts. The supreme court knocked out NIRA and parts of the farm program.

World war II brought a practical end to the new deal. But after Roosevelt's death and the war's end, the new President, Truman, revived most of FDR's recommendations under the title of the "fair deal."

But this program hardly got off the ground. Congress was more interested in other postwar issues—getting the fighting men home, ending economic controls, providing benefits for the veterans. The election of a Republican congress in 1946, the 80th, was a telling blow to the "fair deal."

The "Fair Deal" law made drastic revisions in the Wagner labor relations act. "Civil rights" legislation languished.

Then came the Korean war.

### Total Popular Vote May Go To 60 Million

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (AP)—The total popular vote in this year's presidential election may reach 60,000,000, by far the largest figure ever.

Mr. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower easily won the championship on individual vote getting, outdoing the previous record set by Franklin D. Roosevelt 16 years ago.

Over 57,000,000 When returns had been counted from 135,471 of the nation's 146,581 voting units, Eisenhower had 31,822,045 votes and Adlai Stevenson had 25,854,242 for a combined total of 57,676,287.

If the remaining precincts cast votes at the same rate as those which have reported, the grand total would soar to 62,293,200. However, the last precincts to come in are traditionally the isolated smaller ones. On the other hand, many votes yet to be counted are among the absentee returns.

49,202,112 Old Mark The largest popular vote for President in any previous year was the 46,226,212 total piled up in 1948 when

Roosevelt defeated Wendell L. Willkie. The greatest vote cast for any one candidate heretofore was 27,701,567. READ TIMES-NEWS WANT ADS.

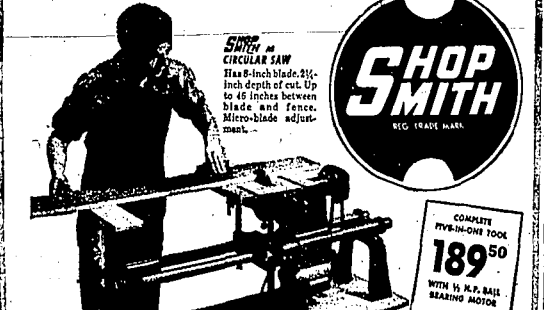

MADISON, Wis. Nov. 6.—Just where the Republican election landside leaves controversial Joseph P. McCarthy seemed to be anybody's guess today.

The Wisconsin Republican won reelection to the senate in Tuesday's balloting, although he lost the rest of the Republican ticket. But there was the possibility that just two years in office will be vastly different than the first six—especially the stormy, exciting time between 1950 and this fall.

**Big Question**

The top question was: Will the new Republican government help him make good on his promise to "fill Leavenworth" with allegedly subversive public employees?

It was in 1950 that McCarthy made a speech to a small gathering in West Virginia, telling his audience the state department was riddled with communists.

**Affair Snowballed**

When the news service picked up his speech, the affair began to snowball, and before he knew it McCarthy was "A-1" national figure. (A) Hear witness before congressional committees. (C) A sought-after speaker and (D) the sworn enemy of the state department Democrats and liberals.

He became so important in the presidential campaign that reporters were careful to note just how far he stood from Dwight D. Eisenhower on a rear platform and how many times the two men shook hands.

It didn't put the new word "McCarthyism" into the political vocabulary—his enemies did that—but it was just the same and will probably get steady use for some time to come.

GOODING, Nov. 6.—"Warning! Rockitis! Highly contagious—All are susceptible—No known cure." This or words to this effect were posted at the Gooding convention of gem collectors of the state in August. Those bitten by the "bug" claim it's true.

Typical of the avid followers of rock collection are Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Leidig, Biloxi. They are members of the Magic Valley Gem club, a growing club with more than 60 members. The club meets each fourth Thursday of the month.

Claude Campbell, Wendell, is president. Other officers are Lynn Woody, Hagerman, vice president, and Mrs. Leda Hendrickson, Hagerman, secretary-treasurer.

The Leidig collection consists of thousands of rocks, stones, fossils and minerals. Most of these have been collected within 80 miles of Biloxi. One of the most intriguing items is the girard stone or petrified from pre-historic animals or birds, found on the Bureau desert and termed by mineralogists to be at least 125,000,000 years old!

"These stones, ranging from base-ball to pea in size, are not native rock of the Bureau area. Each descriptive term is understandable, though, when a picture agate is held up to admit.

Leidig has a perfect picture of a snake. Springs, false, desert scene and tree silhouettes make beautiful and necktie pieces. The remarkable thing about these particular picture rocks is that they are in color. They, too, are found in Gooding county.

Leidig claims that gem collecting became his hobby after a search for something to do in his spare time. He tried several hobbies and discarded them for lack of interest. Since he does not hunt or fish but does like the outdoors, gem collecting seemed to be a natural. He has a 16-inch stone cutting saw and polishing machine and spends many

hours in his "rock house," putting the final polish on stones before he takes them into the "collection" room.

He knows rock is in sight and he has informed his wife and son Darryl, Biloxi high school freshman.

### Utahns Claim Title for High Poll Turnout

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 6.—Utah today put in a claim for the highest percentage of voting voters in the nation.

Virtually complete returns from the Tuesday balloting showed that nearly 52,000 Utahns exercised their franchise in giving Dwight Eisenhower a 58,000 vote majority over Adlai Stevenson.

This exceeded any previous presidential vote by nearly 32,000—which indicated not only an increase in the state's population but a tremendous upsurge in interest in the 1952 campaign.

**50 Per Cent**

Unofficial calculations showed the turnout represented nearly 80 per cent of the state's men and women over 21. In 1924 the turnout was 48 per cent and in the 1948 presidential balloting, Utah led the country with a percentage of around 75.

The even higher vote participation should win Utah not only the national honor but might give the capitol the services of a high-paid janitor for a day.

**Gov. Dan Thornton, Colo., had** wagered with Gov. J. Bracken Lee, columnist at the Denver Post, that losing state's election promise to mop out the winner's capital. No percentage figures were yet available from Colorado, though.

Without waiting for Thornton, Utah voters did some sweeping of their own at the statehouse. They turned out all Democratic state officers and replaced them with Republicans and installed the GOP in complete control of the legislature.

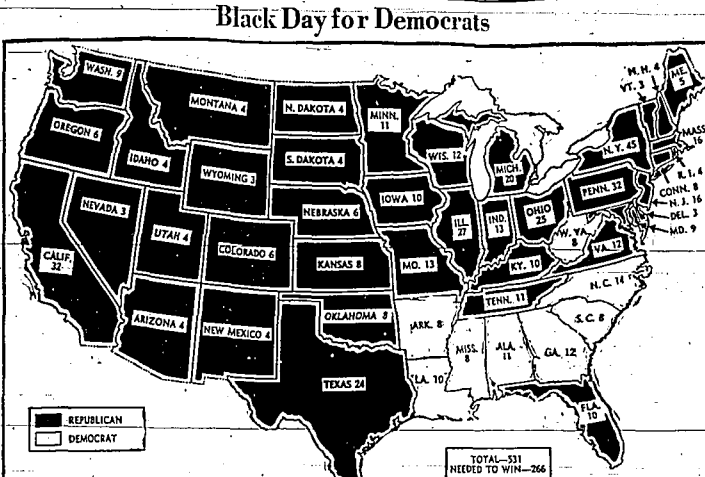

The Chicago Daily News, supporting Eisenhower, put the two lines of thought together and said it was Trumanism that lost not Stevenson.

New York Daily News, Eisenhower: "Things get pretty rotten in this country now and then, and many people begin to fear that no cleanup is possible. Then, almost come the voters in their might and majesty, and boot the rascals out. It's as simple as that—and as noble."

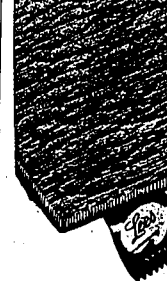

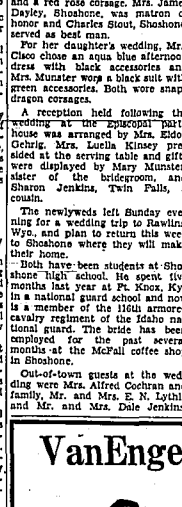

### "Ike" to Find ROK Problem Is Tough Nut

CENTRAL KOREAN FRONT, Nov. 6 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower comes to Korea, he probably will be told that the South Korean army, even if given all-out American material support, cannot be counted on to defend Korea alone for a long time. Several American officers serving as advisers to the ROK forces on this front said building a South Korean army strong enough to hold the entire front and check a renewed Chinese offensive would take years, not months.

**Leader Shortage**  
The biggest single problem is a shortage of experienced leaders, from sergeant to general, and the heavy casualties by infantry combat leaders just as they are becoming effective after months of training.

Major Edward J. Russell, Honolulu, an American adviser with a Korean division, said, "During the battle for Triangle Hill the infantry got within 50 yards of the top at least 10 times. A good squad or platoon leader could have taken them the rest of the way."

**Lack "Last Once"**  
"They just don't have that last ounce of drive," Major Ross E. Lecky, San Diego, Calif., an advisory officer with a Korean regiment, explained that many newly-trained non-commissioned officers were killed in battle while trying to set an example to their men.

"We had one class of 14 which had just completed training and went right into battle," he said. "Almost all of them were killed."

### Reseeding for Lincoln Area Is Considered

SHOSHONE, Nov. 4.—Recommendations of Vern Heidenreich, Boise, range specialist for the Idaho soil conservation service, regarding projects in the Wood river soil conservation district were announced by Leonard V. Bond, local conservationist, this week.

Heidenreich spent two days last week looking over areas to be reseeded and met with farmers and Bond at Mont Johnson's farm in Richfield. Bond estimated the area considered at Johnson's to be 1,200 acres and said it had been burned in preparation for reseeding.

Heidenreich said the burning was not sufficient to eliminate growth and recommended that the land be disc plowed and seeded with a drill. For the most successful new crop, he said, the competitive vegetation must be eliminated before reseeding is done. Donald Riley, Richfield farmer, is considering reseeding on his farm and heard the instructions by the state officer.

The second day of Heidenreich's visit was spent in viewing land along the railroad. Plans for erection of new fences also were considered.

In areas not to be grazed along the railroad, he recommended fallow created wheat grass to be drilled in where possible. In loose places of dirt, he said, bulbous blue grass could be planted by broadcast. A new grass, rather difficult to obtain but highly recommended, is called streambank wheat grass and could be used to advantage in place of wheat grass or as an alternate type of grass.

Recommendations of the tour will be sent to Boyd Baxter, Union Pacific agricultural agent, Pocatello. He will make final recommendations for the plan of work to the railroad company. Included in the information to be sent Baxter will be maps of the area with suggested reseeding spots marked. Recommended type of seed to use also will be named.

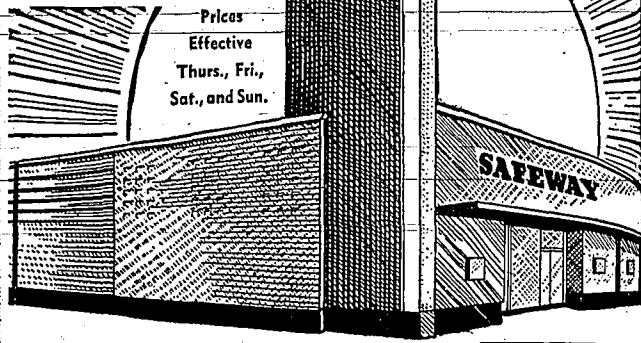
