A POINT MADE CLEAR

To talk about the Korean war without suggesting political overtones is almost impossible in a campaign year that has found Korea a prime issue. Yet there is one point that ought to be made clear.

The U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, headed at the time by General Eisenhower, recommended in 1947 the withdrawal of American troops from Korea. Their report stated that the military occupation of the area was not necessary to the military security of the United States.

So far as can be learned, it did not state what such withdrawal would mean to the future safety of Korea itself—which is a totally different question. So the report could hardly serve as a basis for merely the withdrawal of troops but the open declaration by Secretary of State Acheson that Korea was beyond the U. S. defense perimeter.

Here is the crux: The 1947 Joint Chiefs' report did not pass on the issue of Korean security. But even if it had, there was no compulsion upon Mr. Truman or his secretary of state to announce that we did not intend to defend Korea. There was no compulsion to tell the Russians our own secret estimate of Korea's military value or its security outlook.

The decision to tell that to the Kremlin and the world was not a military decision. It was a political and diplomatic decision which must be placed at the door of Acheson and the President.

There is a vast difference between a secret military judgment and a public diplomatic declaration which can have repercussions throughout the globe.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (U-C) —
As he is designated "This gave no
