**TOWARD FUNDAMENTALISM**

Several political goals which held considerable attraction before the election campaign approached its climax and the outcomes of which were naturally obscured by news of the Eisenhower-landslide, may now be analyzed. In fact, Governor Jordan and Lee have taken similar stands on many administrative issues. And the results of the election in Idaho likewise amounted to a vote of confidence for Governor Jordan, in addition to all-out support of General Eisenhower.

But as it turned out, the majority of the people of Utah were with their governor in his determined effort to conduct the affairs of state in a laissez-faire and relaxed manner. It is a substantial vote of confidence in winning reelection.

Historians and politicians may argue and quibble about the issue and the Soviet posture. However, the Truman doctrine, the Marshall plan and aid to Europe were only variations of the original non-revolutionary, they simply constituted the early offensive alliance in a "cold war," as readily and threateningly as an actual conflict. They were necessary and obvious reactions against the dictatorship of Moscow and its predecessor helped to strengthen.

In several instances in recent years, Idaho has had an unfortunate experience with its representation in Washington, and the reelection of Rep. Homer Budge is a signal to the Idaho Congressman—a commendable Budge is a fundamentalist in every respect as he re-emphasized following his re-election.

Upon my return to Washington, he told the people of Idaho, "I shall continue in my effort to support the interests and the interests of the nation, with the firm belief that in this term of office I will be able to accomplish a great many more of my objectives under the Republican administration."

What one prominent Democrat, Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada, had to say following the election is also significant. "I think that this change brought about by the vote of the American people is a signal to the Democratic party to look into its own affairs and clean house and to remove some of the leftist organizations that have sought to take over the Democratic party."

It is to me set up in this country a militant group of Americans for patriotic action. America cannot relinquish its leadership of the civilized world. It can best carry on that leadership by keeping patriotism in American hearts and heads, and above all, in the American government."

AN ALARMING TREND  
 One of the great afflictions of modern-day federal government is the creeping silence that spreads through departments and agencies and blankets information the American citizen ought to have.

World War II gave great impetus to this disease, until now it is of epidemic proportions. Military security was the great excuse for not telling the public the country's business, and the habit, once established, was never shaken off.

Perhaps this should have been expected. Local officials, seeing the example of the federal government, could hardly help imitating the practice.



Straus Admits Big Projects 'May' Not Halt Now That Republicans Hold Reins

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (Special)—Construction of big dams by the federal government will not necessarily halt with the Republican victory, Bureau of Reclamation Commissioner Mike Straus admitted today.

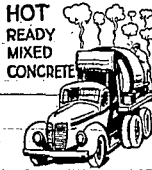
Even such a project as the controversial Hells canyon dam on the Snake might go forward under the new administration, he said, although under different terms from Democratic policy.

Both parties and both candidates pledged on the record for western water and resources development. Now we'll see how the Republican pledges are put into action," Straus said.

Straus, whose advocacy of reclamation through the Roosevelt and Truman administrations has aroused violent GOP opposition, was under no illusions that he would be retained by Eisenhower. Like most Democratic officials in the capital, he was sub-

pointed out that both candidates had endorsed more local control on reclamation and power projects. "Although some states, such as Utah, are already constitutionally prepared to take over federal projects, many western states have no legal machinery to do this. They're going to find out that states' rights also will mean state work. Jurisdiction over water rights by the states instead of by the federal government also will create new problems," Straus declared.

Another development in water policy was forecast by Straus. He pointed out that both candidates had endorsed more local control on reclamation and power projects. "Although some states, such as Utah, are already constitutionally prepared to take over federal projects, many western states have no legal machinery to do this. ### Tall Corn's Getting Common

### Life in MAGIC VALLEY

BELLEVUE'S tall corn, as grown by Woodrow Walls, may be a record for Blaine county but Dean Butler, Bliss, thinks he has the record for Magic Valley. His corn this fall averaged 14 feet and some stalks grew to 16 feet.

Easy on Butler's corn were between 9 and 10 feet off the ground. By standing on the seat of his tractor, Butler found it difficult to reach the top of some of the stalks. His corn grew so tall the soil conservation office at GOODING sent J. Boyd Fries out to take pictures and measure it.

Last year the field upon which the corn was grown was planted to alfalfa. The alfalfa was plowed under last spring and the corn was planted on May 23. Last winter, before the field was plowed, Butler fed 30 tons of hay to a herd of Aberdeen-Angus beef cattle on the field. Then Butler added 100 pounds of ammoniac nitrate to every acre of the field.

The combination must have been exactly right to produce such a crop. Butler said the ensilage weighed approximately 30 tons to the acre. Despite his record production Butler admits the 11-foot corn in Bellevue really is an accomplishment, too, considering the elevation of that part of Blaine county and the relatively short growing season for the area.

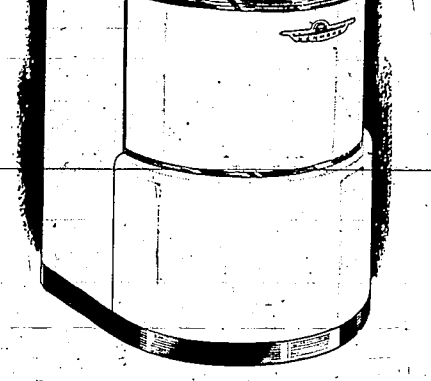
