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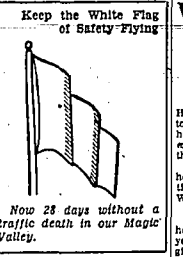

Man Sought for \$118,500 Swindle

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 11 (AP)—Bancroft Mitchell, 47, son of former U. S. Atty.-Gen. William D. Mitchell, was sought today by authorities who charged him with using forged securities to swindle five banks out of \$118,500.

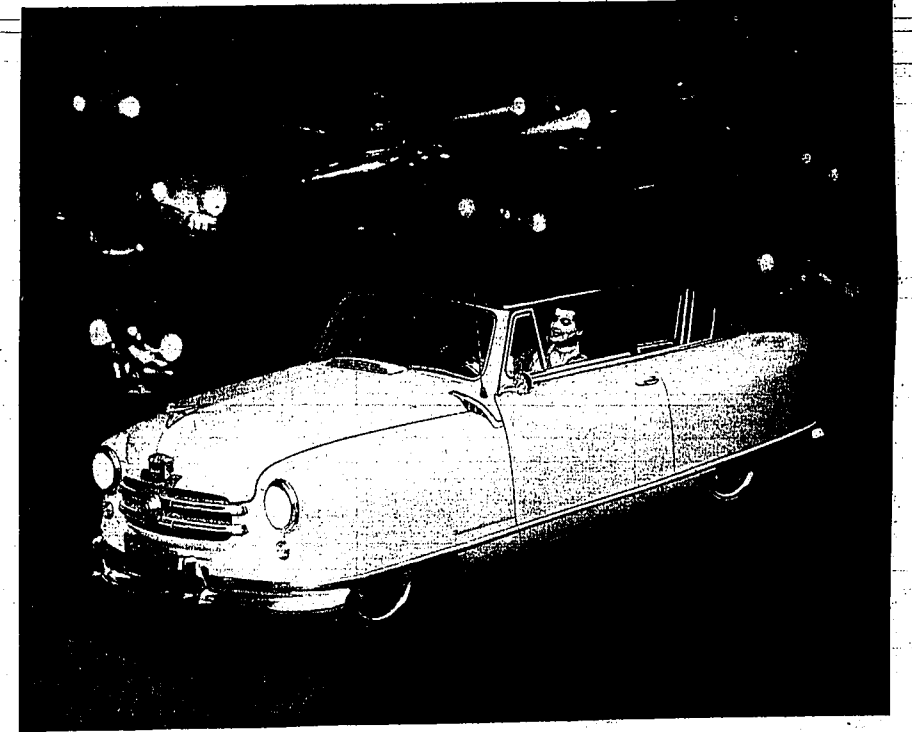
The department sets minimum wage rates and prices used to determine which growers are eligible for government subsidies paid under a sugar control program.

HEADACHE AHEAD

Some idea of what is in store for General Eisenhower can be gleaned from the announcement of British Foreign Secretary Eden that he plans to confer with the new President soon after the secretary's arrival here to lead his country's U. S. delegation.

Eden is said to be deeply concerned over relations among the members of the western alliance. He wants the U. S., Britain and France to give fundamental reconsideration to their attitudes toward each other.

One of the big problems is whether France and Britain can enlarge their military budgets to step up the size of the North Atlantic treaty armies under General Ridgway. A new study by the mutual security administration strongly suggests they cannot.

PRE-INAUGURAL ACTIONS

For many months, perhaps, the people must have the same faith in him as they had in the previous administration. A remarkable demonstration of confidence.

They must rely upon his pre-inaugural actions and appointments to give them confidence. It is not an accident that Eisenhower, efficient, and economical management of the nation's business.

VIEW OF OTHERS

IN THE SAME RANKS?

It is not easy to differ with the sentiments of one who has suffered greatly for his country. Sometimes it is necessary to dissent from the reasoning or emotion which grows out of a wartime anguish.

Last February a potent speech was made in the French National Assembly by a new deputy, Georges Heutillard, then racked by effects of ill treatment received in German concentration camps. It has just been quoted by Edward Herriot, speaker of the assembly, at the Federal of the deputy.

M. Heutillard had spoken against the proposal for a European army in which Frenchmen, Germans, and others would serve together. "I should not like to see our country," he said, "that my men or my women might serve in the same ranks with the tyrants and torturers of their fathers."

Remembered in time, but nations and peoples change. One strength of armies the United States twice has sent to the aid of France has lain in the fact that the United States has granted the right against each other in the American Civil War. The French army today contains descendants of Burgundians, Gascons, Normans, Bretons, Basques, Flemings, Provençals and Alsatians, many of whom raised arms against each other.

Heutillard, it is difficult to conceive a finer, more fitting memorial to the fallen of the First World War, than a European army—a military service—in which German, Italian, Dutch, and Belgian youth would join with Frenchmen to defend their own countries and France—Christian Science Monitor.

PLEASUED WITH DRAFTES

Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd, Jr., commandant of the marine corps, came back from his Korean inspection highly pleased with the way the draft was fitted into the leatherneck organization.

The marines had never had to use drafted men before, and prided themselves on being volunteers. In Korea, General Shepherd said he couldn't tell one from the other. And the same percentage of both draftees and volunteers were indicating a desire to be drafted.

One of the toughest decisions the marine command had to make in Korea was in distribution of the new "bullet-proof" vests. Only a limited number were available. Should they be given to the draftees? Or to the marines fighting with the American marines, or should they be given to U. S. army troops first?

It was finally decided to supply the army first. Korean marines had to wait.

Cash Offered For Ideas on Better Roads

SEOUL, Korea, Nov. 11 (AP)—Pvt. Dick Contino, 22-year-old accordionist who served six months in federal prison for draft evasion, said today he is happy in Korea and doesn't want to leave.

Contino arrived in Korea two weeks ago as a member of a special company. He will spend 90 days during the baptism.

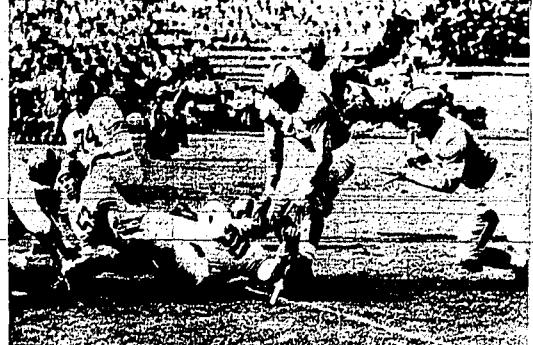



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Longer Nights Present Added Problem for Highway Drivers

BOISE, Nov. 11 (Special)—Shorter days and longer nights signal the approach of winter and are danger signals to motorists doing more after-dark driving in the days ahead, warns Idaho's traffic safety director.

Reduced visibility is a leading factor in the relatively high occurrence of crippling and death-dealing traffic accidents during the hours of darkness, he points out. He urgently requests state motorists to:

- 1. Check vehicle's lighting equipment for burned out bulbs or faulty wiring. Check battery and general lighting equipment to forestall failure.
- 2. Check headlight beams and aim them properly for most effective, non-glare visibility.
- 3. Observe carefully the state law requiring dimming of lights when meeting or following other vehicles after dark. Dimming should be done when within not less than 500 feet of the other vehicle.
- 4. Reduce driving speed after dark and limit it to prevailing conditions. Never overtake the vehicle's headlights range—let it be prepared to stop within the distance clearly illuminated by the head-

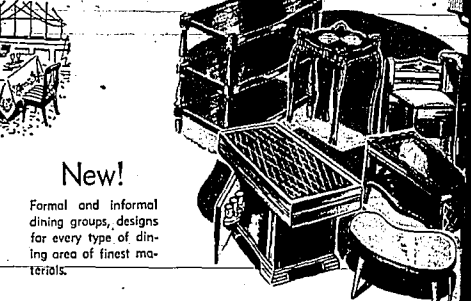
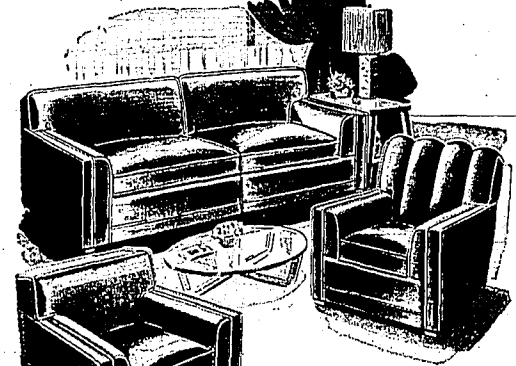

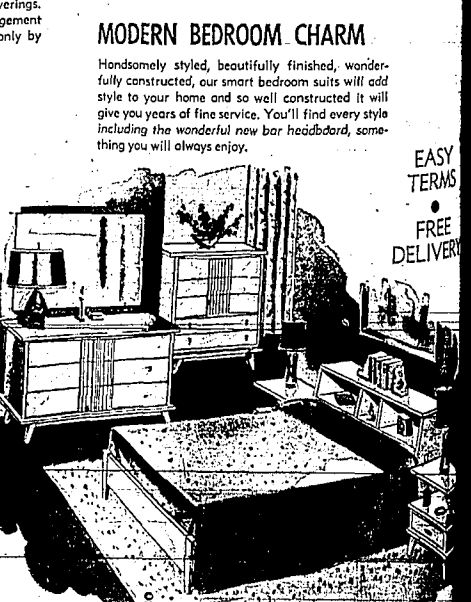
