He drew a scene of the George Washington monument, and called the towering memorial "the shaft of purpose."

"If we were to characterize peace in one or two words, one such word would be purpose," he declared.

"There will not come peace on this earth, in this country or in our lives unless we have a purpose after which we thrust ourselves in every waking moment."

Next, he said, "peace entails responsibility."

Peace, he went on, begins at home "with the living with each other and for each other."

"Peace will be first in our hearts, in our hallways, on the football fields and in our community."

Turkey to Be
Prepared for
All U. S. GIs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—American servicemen in every part of the world will have turkey dinners Thanksgiving day.

Front-line troops in Korea will get their Thanksgiving dinners from mobile field kitchens or from frozen meat containers that keep food hot as it is carried up to the frontiers.

The armed forces will serve 2.8 million pounds of turkey—2 million to overseas personnel of the army and air force, 1 million for army and air force personnel in the United States, and 600,000 for the navy and marines.

The army quartermaster corps, which purchases food for all services, began buying turkeys last spring for the world-wide Thanksgiving dinner. A master menu for the army and air force was distributed last June.

In this country servicemen and women will eat chilled turkey cup or shrimp cocktail, roast turkey with sage dressing and giblet gravy, cranberry sauce, whipped potatoes, candied yams, buttered green-beans and creamed corn.

The menu also lists celery, olives, sweet pickles, carrot sticks, Parker house rolls, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, fruit cake, coffee and assorted fruits, nuts, candies and dates.

Katyn Forest Probe Group Resumes Job

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—A special house committee continued its search today for the men who set the government in World War II at an evidence that Russia, not Germany, murdered 15,000 Poles in the Katyn forest, near Smolensk, in 1940.

Called for testimony today were two former ambassadors to Moscow, Adm. William H. Standley and W. A. Fewell. Harriman's Harriman's daughter, Katherine Harriman, former Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles, and others.

Germany first disclosed the massacre in 1943, contending the Russians were responsible. The area was one that changed hands during the war; either Russia or Germany could have committed the crime, depending on just when it was done.

The committee, after a year's study, has formally charged that Russia was responsible. At hearings this week it is trying to learn "why details of the massacre were withheld from the American public and whether there was any collusion by American authorities to cleanse the Soviet record of guilt."

Witnesses were called yesterday to support members' contentions that government officials tried to stifle anti-Russian broadcasts by Polish-language radio broadcasters in this country, and that government leaders insisted that Germany was to blame for the massacre.

Senator Francis P. Matthews, testified he was suspended from his radio job three times and censored in 1943 after he blamed Russia. Kenneth Borton, program director of radio station WZLX, Buffalo, N. Y., said he was removed from the air by station WBNY in Buffalo early in 1944 for indicating the Russians were responsible.

Both men said they believed "Washington pressure" was back of their troubles.

URGES CHARGES
 ASHLAND, Wis., Nov. 12 (AP)—John Campbell, editor of the Appleton Daily Press, said he hopes to sign a complaint charging Russian Premier Joseph Stalin with a "murder" in connection with the Katyn forest massacre.

Chicago sent a telegram yesterday to Rep. Ray Madden, D. Ind., chairman of a congressional committee investigating the slaying of 15,000 Polish soldiers at Katyn early in World War II.

Travel Ruse Of 2 Probed

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 12 (AP)—The federal bureau of investigation today said it has been notified that two youths joined today in an attempt to unravel a story of two California youths who supposedly had been extended European vacation at the expense of the government.

D. A. Byrce, agent in charge of the FBI here, said his office had entered the case, but like "finger officials" declined to comment.

The youths, both in their early 20s, were arrested at Tulsa Monday night when their attempt to hitch a ride on an air force plane to Oklahoma City failed.

However, reports indicated they already had taken a jaunt to Washington and three foreign countries. Apparently finding it a simple matter to board the planes, they caught a ride to England, then to France, then to Italy and France before returning to this country—all courtesy of the government.

Officials studied a possible charge against the pair for illegal wearing of the uniform.

First Jet Ace to Seek More Duty

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 12 (AP)—Major James Jabara, America's first jet ace in Korea, says he does not see an immediate end to the war there and he wants to go back because "I don't think I've done my share."

Jabara, an ace for the second time by shooting down six enemy planes in Korea after being 9½ planes in World War II, said he had applied for a transfer to Korea for another crack at communist MIG fighters.

"There's only one reason why I'm wearing this uniform," he told an Atlantic city gathering here. "I want to do a job that's a job my service and my country when we are at war."

"And it doesn't look like the Korean war is going to end tomorrow," he said.

War II Hero Cites Danger Of Bombing

TYLER, Tex., Nov. 12 (AP)—An atomic stockpile far smaller than that of the United States "could temporarily paralyze and possibly defeat us," Gen. James H. Doolittle warned last night.

"I do not know, of course, how large a stockpile of atomic bombs Russia has today," Doolittle said. "But... it would be foolhardy to assume that they have not attained a substantial rate of production."

"If Russia has solved the problem of firing an atomic weapon from the deck of a submarine," Doolittle said, "this fleet creates a serious threat to our great port cities."

Special USAF Aide
 Doolittle, special assistant on research and development matters to the air force chief of staff, spoke at a Shriners' ceremonial here.

Doolittle said the activities of Klaus Fuchs and "three other spies" gave a big boost to communist production of atomic weapons.

"It is possible for us," Doolittle said, "through strength, to avoid the unrepeatable horror of an atomic world war. I believe we can do so by holding, dispersing, protecting and continuously improving the means of delivering atomic weapons on Soviet targets in case we are attacked."

"Make It Clear"
 "Only in this way can we make it clear to the Kremlin that its war-making centers are real to be destroyed and that she will inevitably be defeated and perish if she attacks the free world."

"In my opinion, the Soviet union will never go in war until she is satisfied that she can win."
