### EGG-HEAD EMOTIONS

One of the great commonplaces of politics is that the ordinary citizen votes according to his emotions. In one case they may pocket-whimper his concern for his pocketbook. In another they may mirror discontent over the trials of war, over some sort of control, over taxes, and the like.

But there seems no doubt that to doubt that people do vote according to their feelings about things which they believe affect them personally, they are seldom moved by abstract arguments, for example, over whether we are going to have more or less prospect of social justice in the future, or whether we are many people who deplore this, who believe that voters should be swayed principally by reasoned argument about the issues. Certainly candidates must try to offer such arguments for those who want to be elected, but it really is the bulk of the electorate that prizes a pretty emotional view of election campaigns.

In the campaign just concluded, the matters which struck to the voters' hearts were party and the issues, combatting inflation, eliminating corruption and communism in government, doing something about taxes.

Though the voters' decisions on these questions were deeply tinged with personal emotion, it is hard to see that they were actually a fairly sound layout of the problems confronting us as a people in 1952?

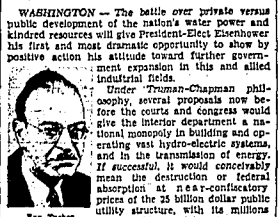
The emotions may not be such a bad guide to what we should do. In fact, after all, anyway, they are the only ones which can be said to be the voters' choice. Even the so-called intellectuals are not free from the coloring of emotion in their decisions.

The intellectual pride themselves that their actions are directed by almost pure reason. The performance does not support the claim. For instance, many switched horses in the middle of the 1952 campaign with such furious energy that it was obvious their minds were not then in control.

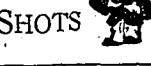

GENTLEMAN IN THE FOURTH BOW

FEDERAL MONOPOLY THREAT—With atomic energy now feasible for commercial application within five years, the threat of federal monopoly becomes a real one. The government has tried to set up this source of industrial generation on the ground that it is too valuable militarily for private ownership.

It was because of his knowledge of these generally unknown schemes that Charles E. Wilson, former president of the American Association of Economic Development, recently urged the sale of the government's seven billion-dollar (estimated) atomic power system to individual investors. He suggested a swap of government securities for stocks in these utilities.

In the case of the favorable reaction to the Wilson suggestion in many circles, which would also apply to other competing federal operations, it is understood that this idea will be pressed in the next congress, if elected.

### TO REMOVE SHADOW

Getting the government out of business, it would mean the reduction of the staggering public debt and a sharp cut in taxes. It would remove the shadow cast over the future of the country.

It is not known how far congress will go in this direction, for it is an extremely complex question. However, it is certain that it will eliminate entirely the 20-year "trend toward government ownership of industry and other public utilities and activities which, under the commerce or general welfare clauses of the constitution, could be deemed essential to the national economy and security."

### REPORT IN FEBRUARY

—Eisenhower will pass first on the question of private versus public power when a Truman committee submits to him its recommendations for federal development of the vast Missouri river basin after the pattern of TVA. The report is due at the White House next February.

Under a preliminary Chapman blueprint, this area, extending from the Mississippi river to the Rockies, and including the border of the Louisiana-Louisiana lines, would become a federal quinea pie.

The government would build new power plants and transmission lines, buy out existing facilities, and operate the integrated system. Industry, homes, farms, and interests would be wholly dependent on the bureaucracy at Washington.

### SOURCES ENERGY

—It would, however, be a radical advance on the TVA experiment, inaugurated and justified as a "water-power project." Due to the lack of a sufficient number of waterfalls, the principal sources of prospective energy listed in the Chapman report are coal, still commercially undertapped, shale oil, natural gas, solar energy, solar rays, and, believe it or not, windmills.

Thus, this program scrapes the original, relatively restricted Roosevelt-Roosevelt plan for TVA, Grand Coulee, Bonneville, etc., where the government produces and sells power only as a by-product of such constitutional projects as navigation, irrigation and wildlife protection.

### TOTALITARIAN TREATMENT

—The grandiose Chapman project would put the government into business on a multimillion dollar scale in a region of substantial opposition. Such phrases as "totalitarian treatment," "national defense" and "critical shortages" are cited in justification.

Even this program, however, is only a beginning—a sort of show window exhibit and pilot plan. For the broad plan, advocated by the Interior, contemplates the same totalitarian treatment of 14 other river valleys and basins, from New England to Texas and Washington to Florida.

Even Truman did not dare to sponsor this scheme, and named a special committee to review it, and it is in this body which will report to Eisenhower next February that it will be his role to determine if his coalition congress will underwrite these extravagant, bureaucratic blueprints.

### VIEW OF OTHERS

THE STATEMENT OF GOV. DEWEY OF NEW YORK that he expects to finish his term as governor has been widely interpreted as a sign that he would not accept the position in the cabinet of President-Elect Eisenhower. We prefer to think that it was a sort of making time announcement. The governor may have been stalling to permit Eisenhower to make some decisions, or in case some agreement already has been reached, to present the General's campaign statement that he is not a "desert" candidate.

In any case, it would be most unfortunate for the nation if Dewey cannot be persuaded to accept a position in the cabinet. Beyond any question, he is one of the most able, experienced and realistic men in the Republican party today. The new administration will surely desire his advice and realize that he cannot be found to cope with the pressing problems ahead.

More importantly, indeed, he could fill almost any cabinet position capable of possibly that of secretary of interior. 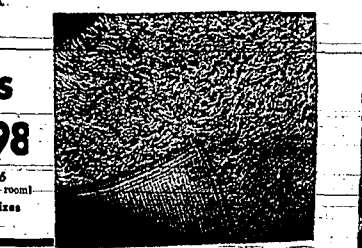

"We got thinking about what would happen after those 30 days and decided to leave," he added.

His wife, Anderson said, "I'm his first child next April. She said, 'besides, I couldn't go up town to look without a patrolman going along.'"

**Plea of Hiss Awaits Turn**  
LEWISBURG, Pa., Nov. 13 (UP)—Alger Hiss must wait behind federal parole hearings with lesser-sentence parolees at the Federal Reformatory for men to get a chance to make his plea for freedom, according to Dr. George Killinger, chairman of the U. S. parole board.

Killinger began the second day of hearing today on the parole applications of about 130 prisoners, among them the former state department official who confessed under oath that he never passed government documents to Whittaker Chambers, chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Prisoners serving long sentences were given first opportunity today at the northeastern federal penitentiary where Hiss has been held since May 1951.

Hiss will be eligible for parole on Nov. 21—the opening of his two concurrent five-year sentences for falsifying before a federal grand jury. Killinger said Hiss, like all other prisoners, would be given "full opportunity" to present his appeal.

### Grange Chief Urges End of Trade Curbs

ROCKFORD, Ill., Nov. 13 (UP)—Herchel Nelson, grand master of the National Grange, said Wednesday the nation has adopted "serious habits" that "eliminate or restrict the effect of competition."

2. An export incentive plan to counteract the "stifling" effects of tariffs on international trade.

3. Removal of artificial barriers preventing the flow of goods and services in compliance with price and demand.

### Deficit in Sugar Quota of Hawaii Is Redistributed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (UP)—The agriculture department has split up among four mainland sugar-producing areas a 700,000-ton deficit in Hawaii's 1954 sugar quota.

Under the reallocation, the quota for domestic cane sugar producers will be increased 8,000 tons, Puerto Rico's quota upped 18,444 tons, Virgin Islands up 102 tons, and Cuba up 45,969 tons.

The department said Hawaii is expected to supply only 950,000 tons of its 1,623,000 quota this year. It added that today's action will help prevent Hawaii from marketing more than its adjusted quota in the event that it is able to do so.

“Bureaucratic administration has extended the preference provisions so as to virtually exclude the customers of regulated electric companies from effective participation in supply of power from federal plants.”

A member of the California Public Service commission, Justice P. Cramer, said the customers of private utilities are paying for a five billion dollar annual tax load on the industry.

533 Per Capita Cramer said the tax burden amounted to 533 per capita, and added:

“In fact, since government owned and operated utilities pay no taxes, the tax bill per customer of privately owned utilities actually is greater than \$33 per capita or \$130 per family.”

Eugene S. Laughlin, chairman of the Connecticut public utilities commission, was elected president of the association, which ends its 64th annual meeting today.

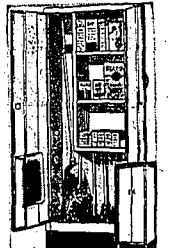

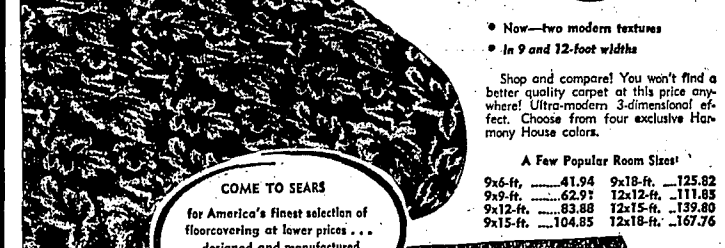

### Another Utah Sailor Writes Of Blast Test

**SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 12 (AP)—**An atomic explosion that mushroomed a white cloud eight miles high and nearly killed observers 50 miles away was described by a Salt Lake City seaman, in a letter released Wednesday by his mother.

Seaman Earl Fulmer wrote his mother, Mrs. Melva Fulmer, that the blast near Eniwetok on Nov. 1 made a large crater out of an entire island.

On a ship 30 miles away, Fulmer said that with his back turned to the blast and his hands over his eyes, "light filtered right through my hands it was so intense."

His account:

"The water about was already at cloudy height and rising rapidly. It was a ground blast. The base of the water spout was about three and one-half miles in diameter.

"Then the mushroom appeared above the clouds and went up and up, ever following out farther. The height was estimated by our executive officer at eight and one-half miles."

Shock Wave Strong

He said the shock wave hit about two minutes after the blast and "it damn near knocked me down." It sounded like a firing of a heavy rifle had fired right beside him, Fulmer wrote.

"We steamed past the island on which the blast was set off four days later," his letter said. "I know you have seen shell and bomb craters in the movies. Well, the whole island is like a large bomb crater. Only the edges left."

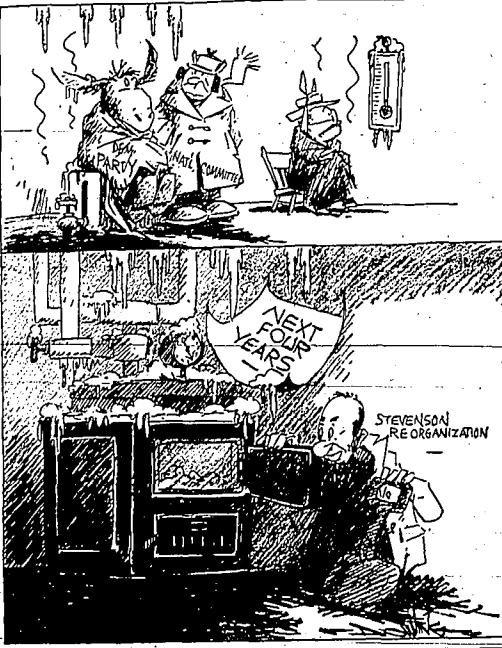

The bureau said it collected \$31,448 in September through sale of the 80 stamps to booties, numbers operators and other gamblers required to pay the tax under the new wagering tax law.

The bureau also said it collected in September \$880,654 through the 10 per cent excise tax on bets handled by gamblers. Total excise tax collections for the first three months of the 1953 fiscal year amounted to \$2,472,000.

States issuing wagering stamps in September included: California 39, Colorado 1, Idaho 78, Kansas 2, Minnesota 1, Missouri 7, Montana 32, Nevada 16, Oregon 20, South Dakota 2, Utah 40, Washington 106, West Virginia 26, Wisconsin 2 and Wyoming 27.

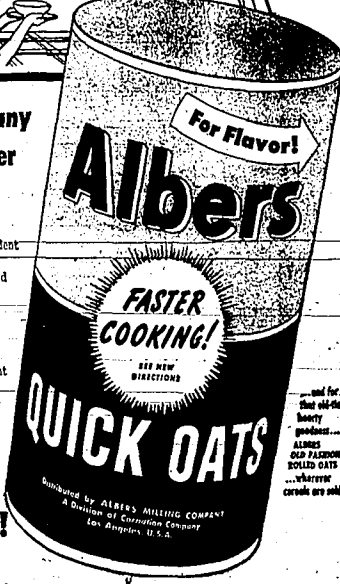

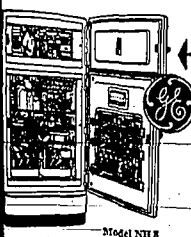

Ardalan made the disclosure in New York in answer to a British invitation extended last week for more discussion of the dispute. There was no immediate reply from Britain.







### War "Strain" Is Blamed in Tax Scandals

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 10.—Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder believes the wartime strain on the nation's tax collecting machinery forced the reorganization of the internal revenue bureau.

Snyder said prior to World War II the bureau had been charged with collection of "comparatively modest amounts of taxes from relatively few people."

**Sudden Spiral**

"The service suddenly had to handle millions of returns from taxpayers who never before had been required to pay federal taxes," he said. "It had to assume responsibility almost overnight for the collection of new kinds of taxes and the application of sharply increased rates on those taxes already in existence."

Snyder spoke at installation ceremonies for officials of the newly created revenue district for Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

Edwin C. Dougherty, veteran tax service man, was appointed commissioner for the new district, the 10th to be set up under President Truman's reorganization plan.

Snyder said the plan, approved by congress earlier this year, has streamlined the revenue service, eliminated complexities for the taxpayer.

"In streamlining the revenue bureau's operations, we have provided for improved supervision of employee conduct and helped eliminate the temptations to which some employees have succumbed in the past," the secretary said.

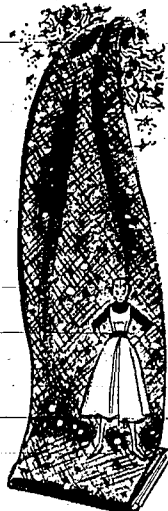

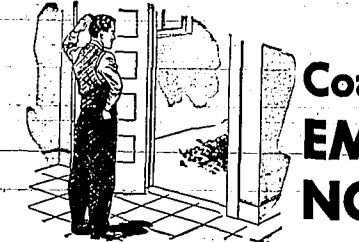

### Kennedy Beat GOP's Tide in Winning Seat

BOSTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Massachusetts' junior senator, John F. Kennedy—"Jack" to most people—bucked and beat a Republican tide to win the seat.

He won by 68,000 votes while General Eisenhower was carrying the state by more than 200,000. He defeated Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., who is quite a campaigner himself and tied in closely with Eisenhower.

And Kennedy had tied himself to Adlai Stevenson.

**Aided by Family**  
In the campaign Kennedy ran his own headquarters, but he was not alone. His mother and his sisters, Eunice, Patricia and Jean, were all working for "Jack" at a series of teas and receptions from one end of the state to the other—on his television campaign shows and even on his walking-down-Main-street trips to meet voters.

On the issue, he stood opposite Eisenhower on tiebreaks and federal price controls even when he was told his expressed views would cost him votes.

Although he's the son of a financier and businessman, Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain, Kennedy believes in some governmental control over business.

**Not Completely Private**  
"Private enterprise cannot be completely private," he has said. "Government has got to play a measurable part."

A genuine war hero, Kennedy is against war. He hopes that "man's political will can keep abreast of his scientific skill—so we may yet live to see World War III."

**Kennedy Wins a "PT" Boat**  
In the Pacific his boat was rammed and sunk by a Japanese cruiser. Some of the crew were killed. He got the rest ashore and swam from island to island for several miles to get an appeal for rescue back to the American forces.

He was decorated with the navy and marine corps medal for that feat.

**Sparsely-Settled County Is Ended**  
FERRIS, N. M., Nov. 12—Armstrong county had no incorporated towns, no public schools, no postoffice, no churches, no newspapers, no improved roads, in the 1950 federal census, it was the only county in the nation with no federal employees.

Now Armstrong county doesn't even have the status of a county, in the Nov. 4 general election, voters in adjoining Dewey county voted 1,520 to 417 to annex Armstrong county. The 11 voters of Armstrong county had no voice in the matter. The proposed annexation had been sanctioned by the 1951 legislature.

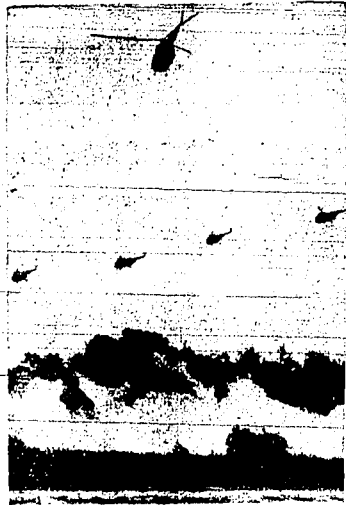

### Private Debt Increase Zooms At Record Rate, Banker Says

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—Americans are going into hock at a record rate. Private debt has doubled since the end of World War I. The rate of increase is the steepest on record.

Corporate debt has climbed 82 per cent. Debts of individuals and unincorporated businesses have risen up 120 per cent. Together these groups, owning 141 billion dollars in 1925, now approach a debt total of 300 billion dollars.

Add to this the nearly 255 billion dollars that the federal government owes, and the state and local government indebtedness of 27-billion dollars—twice what it was in 1925—and you have a total of around 600 billion dollars.

Bankers say the private debt is not out line with the increased national income, which was 277 billion dollars last year and will be higher this year.

In contrast, private debt in 1922 was 161 billion dollars, nearly double national income of 87 billion that year.

Some bankers, however, fret over the dangers they see in the present situation.

"First, they worry about the rate of growth of private debt—doubled in the last six years, while in the six years before 1922 it rose only 40 per cent."

And the last three years have seen the sharpest rise in debt. Private debt jumped 26 billion dollars in 1950, went up another 21 billion last year, and is expected to increase by another 23 billion this year.

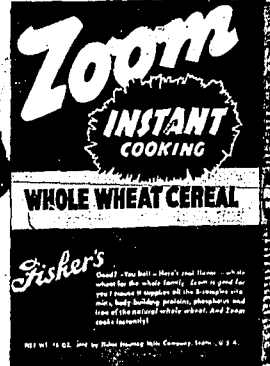

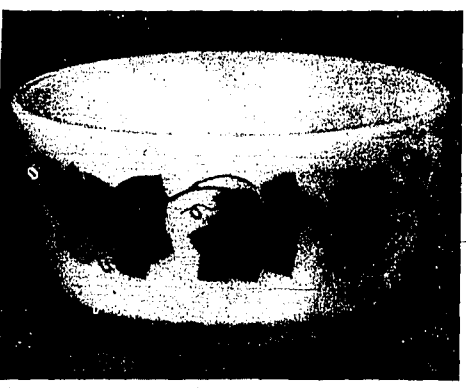

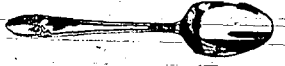

He said Eisenhower is more like Sen. Robert A. Taft than most people think.

"At heart, he is a reactionary and unlikely to understand the nature and strength of the nationalist impulses behind the communists in China," Wyatt said.

"To him the idea of heavy force suddenly applied will seem attractive... most likely, seeing things as a general, he will seek to bludgeon the Chinese into a truce by force and ultimatum."

See War Result

The result, Wyatt said, might be a third world war.

Wyatt said Eisenhower deliberately gave the impression during the

presidential election campaign that he would end the Korean War.

"It is hard to talk sense to the American people about Korea, as (Adlai) Stevenson discovered," Wyatt said. "Eisenhower and the Republicans talked nonsense about Korea and won. Now Eisenhower is committed to that nonsense."
