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90 Persons Killed or Lost in Air Crashes

After one of its most grim aviation week-ends, the nation today counted 90 persons dead or missing in the disappearance or scattered crashes of eight American military planes and four civilian aircraft.

Some 31 passengers and crewmen aboard two U. S. air force transports are missing; 48 are known dead in the crashes of a military transport, a fighter plane and three navy craft; and 11 are dead in the civilian crashes.

Nine air force planes crashed in vain yesterday for a huge C-119 Flying Boxcar which disappeared in Alaska Saturday with 20 men aboard. The air force fears the big transport crashed.

Meanwhile, helicopters and navy small boats sought the Goz of Japan for 11 men missing after a C-46 transport dived into the water off the east coast of Korea Saturday night. Seven others were rescued.

As for the missing military crates, an air rescue plane was flying out the tangled bodies of 44 passengers and crewmen killed or missing in the crash of another C-119 Flying Boxcar 28 miles east of Honolulu.

Twenty persons died last night in the worst of the week-end civilian crashes. Their single-engine, private planes hit disaster near Dallas, Tex., on a flight from Tulsa, Okla., to Los Angeles, home of the firm. Among the dead were a mother and father and their two small children.

The commission upheld boards of equalization of Cuneida, Washington, Teton and Blaine counties denying the church a claim. "We do not believe the legislature intended to exempt all property of a charitable corporation," the commission said. "The purpose of the act was to exempt only the property of a corporation organized primarily for charitable purposes and not for the purpose of those purposes," the commission order stated.



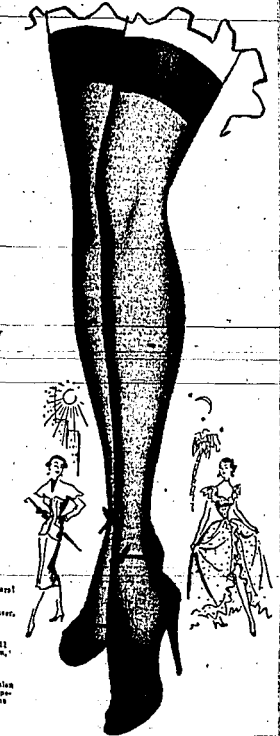

County Agent Says Time Ripe
To Control Gophers in Valley

Now is the best time to begin pocket gopher control measures, says County agent.
Daleh noted that gopher mounds are visible now along ditch banks because of the lack of crop growth. He said the gopher leads a solitary life feeding exclusively underground. It is the tunnels which cause large losses of water from irrigation ditches.
To eradicate gophers, the farmer must first find the gopher's main runway by probing the ground near the mound.
Three methods of eradication of gophers are being used in Magic Valley with good results. Daleh said.
One of the cheapest methods is to cut several carrots into small pieces and sprinkle with strychnine. The carrots are then placed in the tunnel for the gopher and the hole is carefully covered with soil.
Several types of traps are used in gopher control work including the box and wire loop traps. The traps are placed in the gopher tunnel runways and left uncovered. The gopher sees the sunlight and steps into the trap while attempting to repair the hole in its tunnel.
Use of gas cartridges also is recommended. The gas bombs are lighted and placed in the tunnel and the hole sealed up resulting in the gopher's death.
Daleh said traps, gas cartridges and strychnine are available at his office in the old county hospital building. Persons desiring additional information can contact him there.

**West Growers
Of Apples Ask
Subsidy Okay**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Western apple growers haven't given up yet in their attempt to get an export subsidy program on the 1952 crop.

The agriculture department announced last August that the apple export subsidy program, which had been in effect for three years, would be dropped this season. Last year the program cost the department more than \$3,300,000.

However, protests from apple growers have continued to pour in to the fruit and vegetable branch. And yesterday Ernest Falk, Yakima, Wash., a growers' spokesman, came to the department to renew the plea.

Falk said apple growers had been hurt by irregular price support programs, are now facing this season a new export subsidy program—which boosts exports and takes apples off the market. He said the government's aid is needed because of dollar difficulties. Foreign buyers cannot buy apples without the government's aid, and John W. Stewart, official of the fruit and vegetable branch, said that case has been reviewed several times since August. He conceded that growers in some areas may not be getting the returns they are used to, but he said the average price level is good.

There has been no change in the department's decision to date. This year's commercial crop is estimated at 92,000,000 bushels, compared with last year's 110,000,000 bushel crop and a 10-year average production of 110,000,000 bushels. However, the last two figures include some apples growers held off the market and never were harvested.

Under the subsidy program last year the department paid up to \$1.25 a box to exporters who shipped more than 2,000,000 boxes of apples overseas.

**NRA Change
Draws Attack
Of Publisher**

WENATCHEE, Nov. 17 (AP)—The Wenatchee World has charged that the National Reclamation association has become a tool of the "special interests."

Publisher Wilfred Woods, writing from the association's annual convention at Long Beach, Calif., declared: "We find that in recent years, the special interest groups have wormed their way into positions of influence in the organization. For once again in the Washington delegation irrigation people are actually in the minority. Representatives of the private power companies and the roads are here in force and hold the balance of power."

Woods, whose newspaper has long supported the work of the U. S. bureau of reclamation in the Columbia basin and other projects, continued: "The association has reflected other changes since the dark days of the depression when it was born. Westerners rallied behind the then U. S. Commissioner of Reclamation Edward Mead to save us from what would have been a tragic stoppage of the program."

No Kind Words
"But there are different days. We hear no kind words for the bureau that has helped the west grow strong economically and politically. Instead there are recriminations and accusations. . . . The reports of the water policy commission of the association under the chairmanship of Marshall Dana, Portland, included the usual private power line of argument for sale of federal power at the bus bar, or damsite, which would ultimately lead to private control of federally produced electricity."

**Employment Dip
Noted on Farms**

BOISE, Nov. 17 (AP)—Idaho farm employment in October was 68 percent below that of a year ago. The Idaho employment security agency reports.

Farm employment in October totaled 94,710 compared with 101,000 a year ago and 98,250 in September. The potato harvest accounted for the big increase from September to October.

The decrease in farm employment during the past year was attributed by the EIA to increased mechanization, decreased acreage of high labor demand crops, trend toward larger farm units and some marginal operators entering non-agricultural employment.

The upward trend in nonagricultural employment which began early in the year was stopped in October. Employment dropped to 141,600 workers compared with 142,400 in September, the EIA said.

**Stevenson Wins
Up His Vacation**

BARABE, Ariz., Nov. 17 (AP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson today won a five-day vacation, his first rest since the presidential campaign.

Stevenson is staying near here at the La Osa ranch, owned by a longtime friend, Dick Jenkins. The Illinois governor returns here today and files by commercial plane tonight to Springfield, Ill.

Stevenson made his first statement over the week-end regarding his future status in the Democratic party. He said the Democrats must be a positive and intelligent opposition.

**Short 'Recession'
Seen by Business
Advisory Council**

SEA ISLAND, Ga., Nov. 17 (AP)—A brief "intermediate recession" may hit business late next year or in early 1954, is the opinion of some top business leaders.

The forecast was voiced privately by members of the commerce department's Business Advisory Council, which Friday agreed that prosperity conditions are assured at least until mid-1953.

The commerce advisory group said when government delays come into play to reach the peak in about nine months, begins to taper off, some members told reporters.

The dip should not be severe and should last only a few months before sales and production regain their present momentum, the industrialists said.

One of the nearly 100 corporation heads who make up the council said none of the members expect President-elect Eisenhower to "work any miracles" in tax-cutting or budget balancing.

"We do expect a better climate for business in Washington," explained this source, who asked not to be named.

**"Strong Faith" Is
Urged by Truman**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—President Truman said Sunday Americans must keep a strong faith in God if they wish to maintain their freedoms in the face of the terrible menace of totalitarianism and war.

The President also called on the nation's religious leaders to unite against "outbreaks of bigotry" he said might arise from time to time, but could be prevented "if we will be true to our national ideals."

The remarks were in an address delivered at the laying of the cornerstone of a new temple for the 100-year-old Washington Hebrew congregation. The new temple, not far from the Washington Episcopal cathedral, when completed this fall will replace the downtown synagogue in use since the Civil war.

"I hope Almighty God will give me the wisdom I need to carry on."

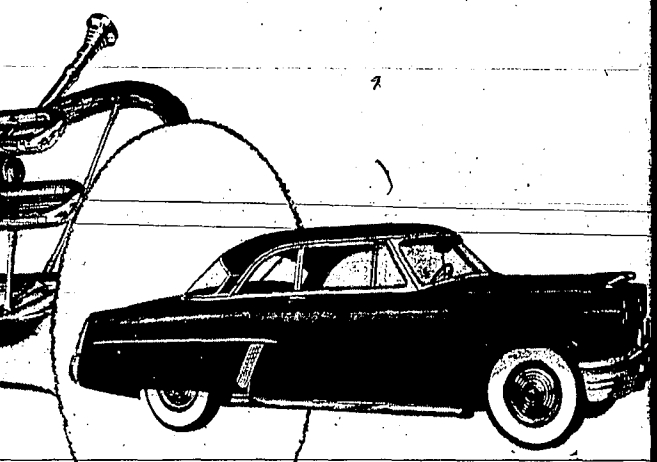
In addition to his duties as acting president, McDonald will continue to be in the present capacity of public relations officer in San Francisco, the headquarters of the steel union.

Gifts to "Ike" Pose Problem For His Staff

NEW YORK, Nov. 17 (AP)—While President-Elect Eisenhower sought in Florida his staff here wrestles with the problem of what to do with a live goose and a pair of baby elephants decorated with white elephants.

These are two of the gifts arriving in daily floods for the President-elect at his residence at Columbia university.

The Eisenhower staff also is trying to handle piles of letters and telegrams daily, with the total at \$5,000 so far.

The goose arrived from Idaho with a note around its neck reading "I don't vote, I just squeak." It was consigned to a nearby farm.

Other gifts, like gold golf tees, fishing flies, jewelry, books, socks with "Ike" and "Mamie" on the pattern, and good luck charms—including a horseshoe once worn by Kentucky derby winner Citation—were less of a problem, except for the space they take up.

But the staff still hasn't found a home for a white pigeon, for 19 cans of grub for fishing.

And it has not yet been decided who will make the formal presentation to the President-elect of the elephant-decorated shorts.

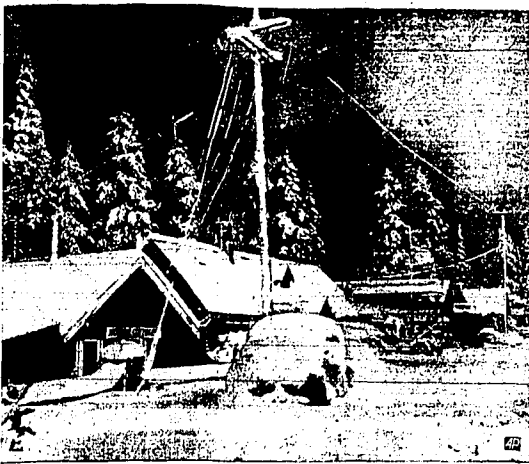

But an expert from the federal bureau of land management, which is directing the campaign, declares: "Halogeton has continued to spread rapidly, advancing on so many fronts that simultaneous control attacks are a physical impossibility. It is clearly evident that the large area now infested will continue to increase before control efforts will result in significant decreases in infested areas."

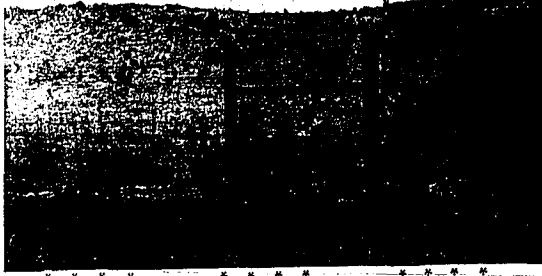

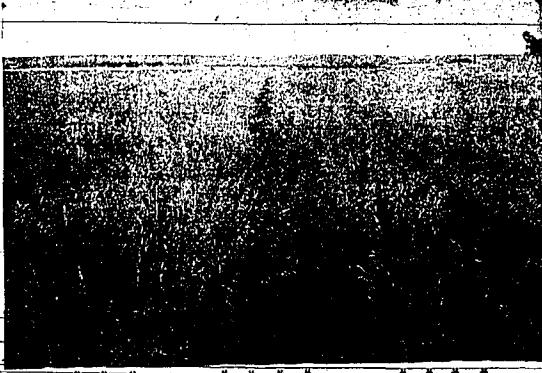

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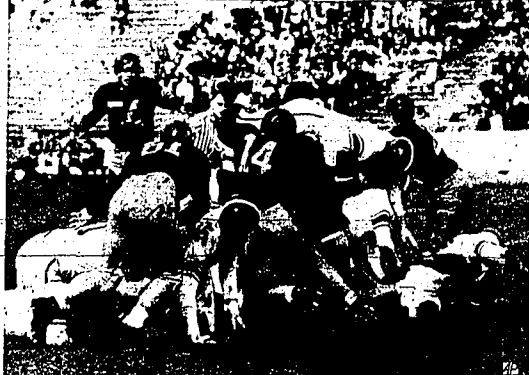

Curbs on Hop Sales Advised By Committee

PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—The growers' allocation committee of the U. S. hop control board has recommended that hop growers of Washington, Oregon, California and Idaho market only 64 1/2 per cent of their 1937 crop.

W. J. Broadhead, Portland, head of the western field office of the department of agriculture hop agency, said the recommendation was made to Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan. Brannan is expected to approve it.

The recommendation was made in the form of a production recommendation of 61,978,000 pounds. Last July the hop control board recommended that the quantity of salable hops from this year's crop be limited to 29,200,000 pounds. This means that growers will be permitted to sell 64 1/2 per cent of their crops if Brannan approves the production recommendation. Broadhead said.

Hop growers of the four states began a vote today on a plan to abolish the present hop marketing agreement program. If 51 per cent of the growers producing 51 per cent of the hop crop vote to abolish the program, there will be no hop marketing agreement next year, he said.

Results of the voting will not appear this year's program, Broadhead added.

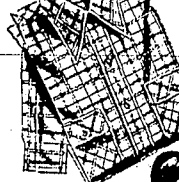

Du Pont Firm To Face U. S. Suit Tuesday

CHICAGO, Nov. 17 (AP)—One of the biggest anti-trust cases in history opens tomorrow when the government begins a battle to break up the Du Pont financial empire.

The court fight, a civil action, may go on for years.

More than three years have passed while opposing lawyers prepared their cases on the government's charges filed June 30, 1933. In that time, one of the principal defendants named in the case, Lamont Du Pont, has died.

Control Cited

Prosecutors charge that the Du Pont family, through stock holdings, control E. I. Du Pont de Nemours and company, General Motors company, and United States Rubber company.

The charges alleged that by using the holding as "leverage" the family entered into a gigantic conspiracy aimed at closing competition by barring competitors from markets.

"Thirty-one prosecution and defense attorneys were expected to be present within the bar when trial opens tomorrow before U. S. District Judge Walter J. La Bay who will hear the case without a jury."

The lawyers will be backed by literally hundreds of legal and administrative clerks, stenographers, secretaries and other workers.

Rent Hotel Floor

The Du Pont company and family rented an entire floor of the Palmer House, one of the city's biggest hotels within three blocks of the domed U. S. courthouse.

The defendants' companies sent press agents and U. S. Rubber set up a complete "news bureau" in the Palmer House. General Motors had a battery of publicity people scheduled to arrive today.

Many lawyers reserved hotel rooms indefinitely and some were looking for apartments and houses to rent. Prosecutors ask that the court order the Du Pont family and its private holding companies to sell all private stock they now hold in General Motors and U. S. Rubber.

Blasphemy Sought

As a result of this action, they said, "the control exercised over a network of tremendous corporations through the interrelated stock holdings of certain of the defendants will be cut in such a manner that each of the manufacturing defendants—Du Pont company, General

Motors, and U. S. Rubber—will be required to stand on its own bottom and compete in the traditional American manner required by the Sherman act for access to the markets represented by the buying needs of the others."

The two principal individual defendants are Lamont's two brothers, Pierre S. and Irene (pronounced "Ear-eh-y") Du Pont. The three are described as "both the abject and the principal crafters of the conspiracy" which allegedly began about 1915.

In addition, 116 other members of the family were made "class" defendants. They need not be present for the trial but any judgment handed down will apply to them, as well as to the principals. However, court-room attendants must provide 115 chairs in case they will want to show up in court.
