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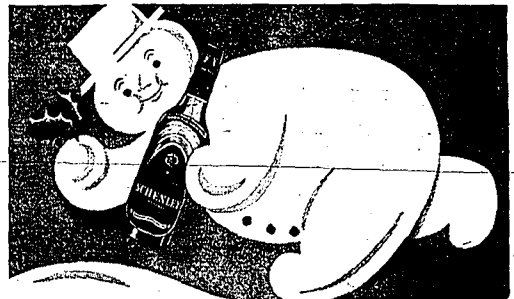

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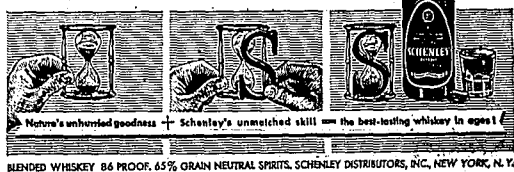

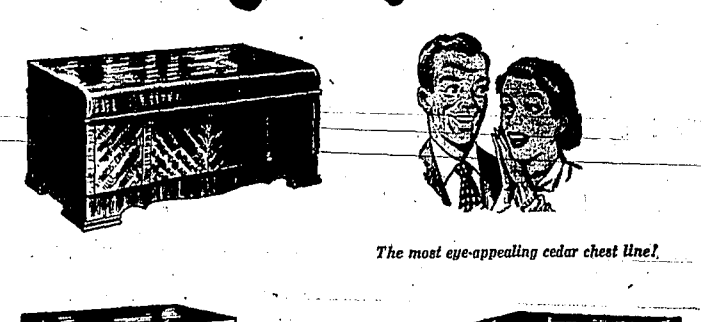

Lincoln County Resident With Full Life Observes Birthday

SHOSHONE, Nov. 18—Samuel D. Packard, native and pioneer of Idaho, celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary Sunday at the home of his wife, Mrs. Lawrence Clifford, North Shoshone.
Packard was born Nov. 9, 1872, at Deep Creek near what is now Preston. His father, Isaac Packard, was caretaker of a toll bridge built over Bear river by Nathan W. Packard the time of Packard's birth. This bridge was the first to be built over the river.
Packard grew up in an atmosphere of excitement, in addition to being toll keeper of the bridge, his father worked for a stage company. He kept horses ready and changed teams for the stage when they came through. The horses had to be harnessed and ready so the team change could be made without delay.
There was the ever present threat of Indian attack and, for safety, his lifetime, Packard has been in the rear of the supply station. When Indians attacked, the pioneers protected themselves in the holes.
One day when the stage pulled in and the men were busy changing teams, some stage travelers grabbed Packard, then about 6 years old, and placed him in a hole in the ground so that was standing nearby. The boy took exception to this treatment and ran scuttling through the sagebrush, Packard stuck to the ceiling pig and rode it without missing a step and across Deep creek. The travelers had so much fun over this they passed the hat and took up a collection for the boy. The collection was used to purchase his first suit, coat and long pants.
From this location the family moved to Franklin and settled on a farm. Packard helped get 168 and build their house, part of which still stands today.
Packard worked with his father at the single mill in Culo river canyon and on Maple creek. In his teens, he went to work for Joseph Hall at Palmyre and did ranch work there for six years. In 1893 he and a companion ran a government road between the Utah-Idaho line to the Canadian border. The measured distance was 762.5 miles. The roadster was left in Culo river canyon to keep the mileage correct. This trip, made by team, was accomplished in 22 days.
They left Franklin, Oct. 21, 1895, and arrived at the Canadian border on Nov. 21. After wintering near the border, Packard and four other men made a pack train trip into the wilds of the Yukon on a gold panning expedition. He also helped government scouts map out and find their way through this primitive country.
In the fall of 1897 Packard returned to Franklin in time to accompany his parents and several other families to Mesa, Ariz., to settle the area. The climate was so hot, they fell, and soon returned. While on the trip he met Ellen Rebecca Clayton whom he married in the Logan LDS temple in 1898. In 1899 the new Packard family moved to Gardiner, Canada. There were 600 LDS people in Gardiner at that time.
Packard headed the first load of lumber to Magrath, Alberta, Canada, and not knowing where the lumber was to be placed, decided to unload it where he stopped the team. Apparently he picked a good spot as the town was built exactly where he unloaded the lumber. The Packard family bought some land and built a house there and Packard helped build the first six houses in town. He also built a bridge over a creek and two bridges over larger streams.
In 1905 he moved his family back to Idaho, homesteading 310 acres 20 miles north of Preston. When his ranch work would permit, he worked at carpentry. In 1917 he moved to Logan where he spent his full time in the carpentry business.
Mrs. Packard died in 1924. He returned to Idaho soon afterward and has since made his home here.
In his lifetime, Packard has seen the establishment of cities from the wilderness, the transition from oxcart to jet plane travel, pioneered the country, chosen townships, been a carpenter, builder, teamster, farmer, harness maker, surveyor, rancher and farmer.

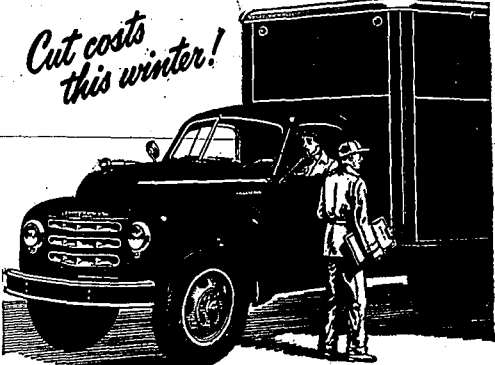

### Clark to Ask Ike for More U. N. Troops

TOKYO, Nov. 15.—Gen. Mark W. Clark will tell President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower when he visits the far east that he must have more allied forces at his disposal.

Clark also will insist that if new offensive orders are issued they must be coupled with a blockade of the Chinese communist mainland and dropping of bombs on the air attacks against Manchurian air and military bases, the sources said.

Clark is toasting the decision today in Washington while outlining alternative paths out of the costly and demoralizing Korean stalemate.

He is not clamoring for authority to break off the stalled truce negotiations and bring it out with the communists.

He must have more American or U. N. divisions in Korea, and a clear arm's parity over Europe before he can mount a new offensive.

World Welcome Drive. However, Clark was described as in a mood for welcoming critics to try a big drive if assured of maximum "big war" support by the United States and the western allies.

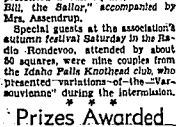

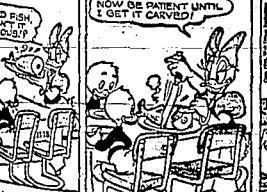

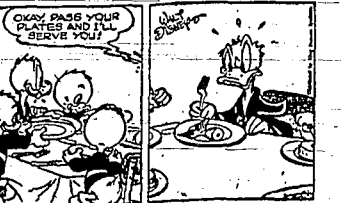

### Money Is No. 1 Problem for Eisenhower as New President

Washington (Associated Press)—The new President Dwight D. Eisenhower thinks that having won the election—his troubles are over, he has another think coming. His troubles are just beginning.

He won't be President for another nine weeks. But the mere job of getting ready to be President will involve burning more midnight oil than he is ever burned before. He may not have to make as many speeches as during the campaign. But he'll have to hold a lot more conferences in which, no doubt, everyone will try to tell him just how he ought to run the country.

The "No. 1" question will be on what he is going to use for money.

That may not set the headlines. From now on his inauguration day, you probably will be reading dopey broadcasts on whom the President is going to put in his cabinet and what he is going to say in his state-of-the-union message to congress, until you're blue in the face.

Behind all this gossip, however, will be the sober, solemn, serious money question. Eisenhower will have to weigh in on this constantly, to determine how his administration will be run.

There will be a budget deficit of around seven billion dollars as of Jan. 1. This is the operation in the red the liberals from the Truman administration and the economy-minded 82nd congress.

Jan. 20, and he has no powers till then.

However, he named a liaison man to work with the present budget bureau staff.

This situation hasn't arisen since 1932, when there was a change in political party administration with the election of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The timing was different then.

Congress covered the first Monday in December, 1932. Roosevelt took office March 4, 1933. Congress therefore considered a budget for fiscal 1934 prepared by President Herbert Hoover's administration. Congress had voted on all 1934 money bills except the District of Columbia appropriation, before inauguration day.

After he became President, Roosevelt put through an economy act which cut salaries 15 per cent. Veterans' benefits were reduced. Many government reorganizations were put through. All this lasted till about July 1, 1933, when cuts were restored and the government began to try to spend its way out of the depression in earnest.

This background may or may not set precedents for the new President taking office in 1953, 20 years later. Regardless of that, Eisenhower will have other money and tax problems to face, immediately.
