Lahoe Firm Asks Federal Okay for Dam Plan Revise

Nov. 19 (79)—An alternate plan calling for three billion acre feet of usable storage in place of the one billion acre feet originally proposed for Snake river above the dam has been submitted to the federal power commission by Idaho Power company.

James H. Lahoe, vice president, said Tuesday the new plan was submitted because of "a variation of our long-range load plan" and an indication from the commission's engineering staff that larger spillway capacity than heretofore planned would be required.

The company is to submit the plan to the commission by the end of the month. The plan calls for a 277-foot high dam at Bromide, 23 miles back 6-8 miles, 1,500,000 acre-foot reservoir upstream to Weiser.

Idaho, Utah Go Against Lamb Feeding Trend in West States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (Special)—The smallest lamb crop on record and, increased slaughter in the 13 western states are expected to reduce lamb feeding this year far below last year in all but Idaho and Utah.

Two or three corn belt states also may reverse the trend, the bureau of agriculture economics predicts, but all others will cut down.

"Receipts of lambs into northern Colorado have been much smaller than a year ago," the situation report said. "Lamb feeding in the Arkansas valley is greatly reduced and it is not expected that many more lambs will be brought in."

"Shipments into California for the months of August through October are 25 per cent less than in 1951 with October showing the greatest drop. Other western states are expected to show decreases, except Idaho and Utah where the amount fed probably will be about the same or higher than last year. Lamb feeding in the North Platte valley of eastern Wyoming and western Nebraska will be on a smaller scale than last year."

Sheepet cuts have occurred in the plains states in which wheat pasture feeding is expected to support only about half the 1951 crop. Pastures and feed of all kinds were reported "very short" in western Kansas.

Western feeder lambs thus far have been generally of good weight and in good condition, the bureau said. Range feed conditions were best in the Pacific northwest and west in Texas.

Glomted statistics of all, however, was the note that feeder lambs in the Denver market for the week ended Nov. 1 brought only \$0.75 per hundred compared with \$32 last year.

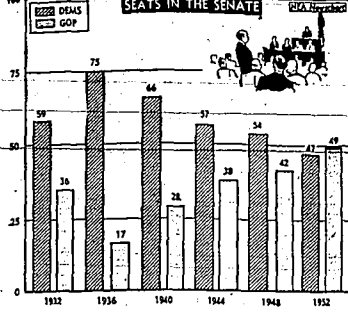

Railroad Men Fretting Over Car Problems

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Railroad men worry whether they will be asked to haul in the next few months cars for the winter.

The year's peak loading season, when crops move to market and materials shippers try to beat the cold weather, is waning.

But weekly carloadings still run ahead of the level of a year ago, and calls by shippers for cars are expected to stay at a high level well into 1953.

Fewer Cars
In the face of this, the railroads have available fewer serviceable cars than the total with which they started the year.

The party because the steel shortage has cut into the production of new freight cars. The railroads had some 20,000 new cars on order but deliveries fell to 8,000 in October.

Roughly a third of the cars now in use are more than 10 years old. They are wearing out faster than new cars are being built.

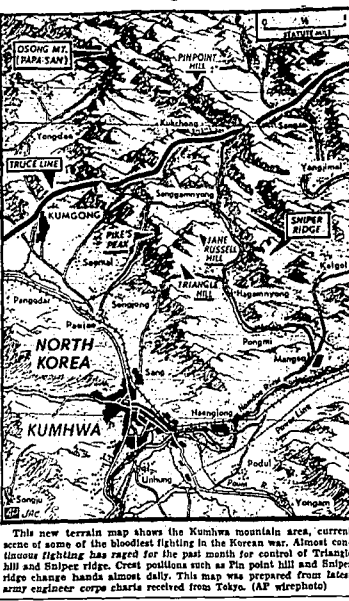
So in recent months the railroads have been retiring more overage cars than they have been able to replace.

Repairs Prove Drain
Heavy repairs also put a drain on the car supply. On Oct. 15, the railroads had more than 100,000 cars awaiting repairs, against about 95,000 at the start of the year.

Both the new car builders and the repair shops need steel, delivery of which was delayed by last summer's long strike in the steel mills. Their calls for plates and structural steel along with requirements of military production for the same items, now among the hardest to get, are well past long.

The picture isn't all dark, however. Steel output is being pushed along at a record pace, with October's 2,700,000 tons—the largest amount ever made in a single month. The defense transport administration has urged allocation of enough steel to produce 35,000 new freight cars each quarter.

Tax, Fiscal Riddles Could Put Eisenhower in Doghouse Early

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower may well bump his head on some tough new tax and fiscal problems before he ever gets to warm his boots on his new White House chair.

These three items bring up an estimated eight billion dollars in revenue a year. Will Eisenhower want to renew them, or let them lapse and take a chance on being able to cut government spending by that much later on?

Social security payroll deduction tax rates are scheduled to go up from 3-1/2 to 4 per cent for both employers and employees on Jan. 1, 1954, for a five-year period. This increase has been postponed in many years. But since both political parties are on record in favor of expanding the social security system, this time the raise may stick.

But all these matters bring up the possibility of a brand new tax program. Complete overhaul of the federal tax code has been advocated for many years, but never put through. Eisenhower will have a chance to show what he can do here, if he has the mind to and the political chickens in the campaign promises to cut taxes then will begin to come home to roost.

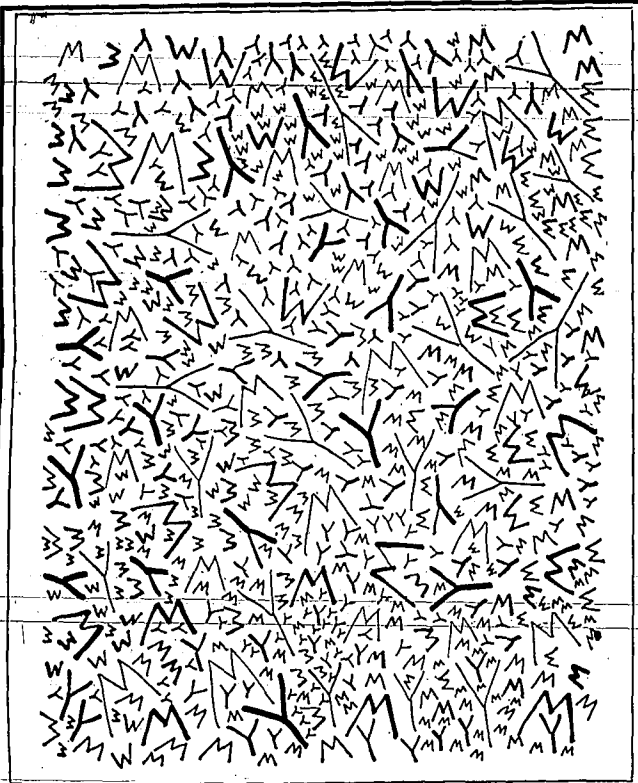

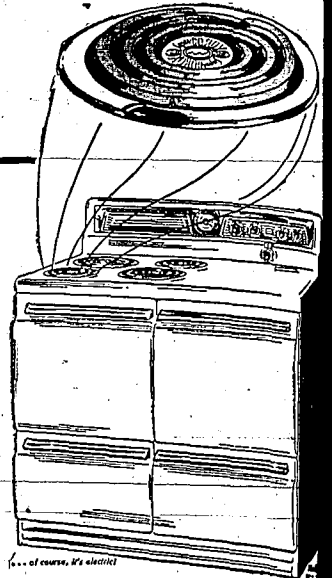
