TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Former Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson's formal proposal that the government reduce the public debt and cut taxes by selling its surplus property to private interests was rejected by President Truman because the latter feels the Democratic party is "committed to government ownership."

Wilson disclosed this radical idea in a letter to the writer, who had asked him to elaborate on his idea for getting the government out of competition with private business and industry in this and other fields. It is probable that the plan will be pressed when the Republicans assume control of congress in January 1947.

DEBT REDUCTION—In a statement after he resigned his defense job here, the former head of General Electric advised to "sell the surplus property to individuals of all federal holdings, including tin, rubber, power and atomic plants, bridges, etc. This would reduce the national debt by about 25 billion dollars and raise several billion in new taxes annually."

Wilson said that the government debt through disposition of certain power projects and other properties, "is by no means insurmountable."

"It was early in 1946, when the national debt was mounting dangerously, that I discussed the possibility of selling the surplus property to individuals who were disposed to buy securities in the new companies, for private operation of previously public property, for their security in the government bonds."

Wilson said the idea was first advanced to Mr. Truman, Vice President Barkley, Secretary Snyder and Attorney-General Clark, and possibly to a few other government officials.

DEMOCRATS COMMITTEED—Nothing came of the proposal because the president reminded me that the plan was committed to what he described as public ownership, meaning, of course, outright government ownership.

"I discussed the general proposition with the President a number of times since, but was unable to work up an enthusiasm for it. The president, the Wilson suggested, has taken root to such an extent that Reconstruction Commissioner Michael W. Egan, although a Republican, has been discussing the plan with the state of power projects to the state of California. There also have been proposals that Grand Coulee, Bonneville and TVA be operated by private enterprise as regional public power authorities."

"The government debt mounted, continues Wilson, with the nation's credit rating lowered, faced with some responsibility for debt increase, inflation and higher taxes. I renewed interest in the general program outlined above."

"An added incentive was the realization that the original concept of TVA as a water-power plant had been checked for its feasibility had installed considerable steam power and contemplated vast expansion of additional steam power."

"I conceive any good reason why the whole project should not be sold to a private company, and by private," I mean one that would offer the plan to all Americans who desire the opportunity to invest."

BUY WITH SAVING BONDS—"In the public power field alone," estimates Wilson, "more than a billion dollars of United States savings bonds could be sold. The plan would be to offer the securities to those who purchase the new securities. If sufficient people wished to invest, the amount would be far in excess of the amount needed to finance the project. It was not unkindly of the fact that the private operating company would be a big payer of national savings bonds, and that the plan would be to offer them to the same thinking applies to many other projects, including the largest of the currently government-owned projects in California and the northwest."

"I quite frankly admit that, in all consideration of my proposal, my principal motive of interest was the ownership, by literally millions of people, in such an important field of power generation and distribution."

"So much about adult education in the current economic of our country, but I have had and continue to have interest in the matter of the so-called practical-lessons, would be to secure 50 to 100 million shareholders in pioneering in typically American industries."

"I would give you a deeper sense of responsibility in and for our American economic system."

VIEWSOFOOTHERS

THE ELECTION

So they say newspaper editors have any interest? We don't consider that newspapers were entirely responsible for the Eisenhower landslide this week, because of the carrying criticism leveled at newspapers for the last 20 years for being on the "wrong side of the fence," and because of the many attempts to discredit newspapers in this country, we think the following figures are more than interesting.

Eisenhower had the editorial support of 87 per cent of the daily newspapers representing 90 per cent of the daily circulation. He received 83 per cent of the electoral vote and more than 55 per cent of the popular vote.

Stevenson had the backing of 14 per cent of the nation's daily newspapers with almost 11 per cent of the circulation. He received 17 per cent of the electoral vote and more than 44 per cent of the popular vote.

If you examine the results on a state-by-state basis the parallel is even more interesting.

In 39 of the states where a majority of the daily newspapers supported Eisenhower during the campaign their candidate was elected.

In five southern states a majority of the newspapers or a large majority of their daily circulation, backed Stevenson and he won the electoral votes in those states.

There were only four states, all in the south, which did not go the way a majority of newspapers in those states.

It is too early for a comprehensive survey, but if you examine the state and local elections for congress, state legislatures, etc., you will find that a majority of the candidates approved by newspapers were voted into office.

What does all prove?

—For one thing, it disproves all the charges that press critics have been making for almost 20 years, that newspapers, through their editorial policy, are affecting the interests of the people, etc., etc.

The results of the election, we think, do disprove the charges that have emanated from the White House and other sources charging that newspapers represent only Wall Street interests, the "country club set," big business, etc.

If this is true, there were 32,000,000 "bankers" and members of the "country club set" who believed, as the newspapers did—Editor and Publisher.

That is the touch which may mean that the case truth is stranger than the fiction.—Salt Lake Tribune.

DETROIT, Nov. 21—Charles E. Wilson vowed Thursday he would give the secretary of defense the "darndest whirl" he has ever had.

The 62-year-old white-haired president of General Motors made the pledge in an interview after his resignation from the post.

'Engine Charlie'

Continued from page 1: Wilson is one of America's foremost industrialists as named by Fortune magazine.

Wilson, a tuff slough in a tight fitting blue suit, appeared to be in the best of health and vigor. He is 62 years old.

Wilson bantered with reporters in relating how he had walked through a battery of reporters outside Eisenhower's New York headquarters—Wednesday without being recognized.

He was asked if he had ever engaged actively in politics. His answer was prompt.

"No, sir," he said, "I never had any ambitions in that direction either. I'm sure that this is in no sense a political appointment."

Wilson said he would take a leave of absence from General Motors and when his appointment is confirmed he will have GM "complete."

Wilson laughed when newsmen asked him how his salary as secretary of defense would compare with his earnings at GM. His 1950 income, including bonuses, as reported by the securities exchange as a cabinet officer, will be \$22,500.

Wilson said Harold H. Culler, executive vice president of GM, will take over as acting president of GM when Wilson departs.

Wilson will take into his new job the responsibility American industry has for a "guns and butter" production program.

Since before the Korean outbreak Wilson has sponsored the use of plant construction to produce for both the military and civilian needs of the country.

Wilson is an electrical engineer, described by his friends and acquaintances as an administrator of tremendous capacity.

He took over the GM presidency in January 1949, following the late William S. Knudsen's appointment to the then national defense advisory commission.

Vote in Texas Called Revolt, Not GOP Win

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series reviewing the political situation in (left to right) Democratic states with the exception of the present Democratic election.)

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 21 (AP)—Although Dwight D. Eisenhower carried Texas by a whopping majority even the staunchest Republicans readily concede they were still the minority party of the state.

Gov. Alan Shivers, a Wilson Democrat who nonetheless headed a Texas Democratic campaign for Eisenhower, questioned whether the election vote even indicated a trend.

"The vote was for Eisenhower as a man and against Truman and the things Truman stands for. I'm still a Democrat and expect to remain a Democrat," he said.

Election Sentiment
U. S. Sen. "Doc" Price Daniel, Texas present attorney general, has echoed similar sentiments. Daniel, who justly campaigned for Eisenhower and may hold the balance of power—between Republicans and Democrats in the senate, styled himself as "independent Texas Democrat."

Alvin Lane, chairman of the Republican state executive committee, openly criticized "a lot of help from good Democrats" with making the GOP victory possible.

Wallace Savage, chairman of the Democratic state executive committee, and Dallas law partner of the Republican executive committee chairman, said he saw no threat to Democratic dominance in Texas.

He too, doubted Eisenhower's victory "indicates a Republican trend." "If you analyze the returns from over the state, you see that the same people who elected Eisenhower, elected Shivers on the Democratic ticket," he said.

In an effort to woo as many Democratic votes as possible to Eisenhower, Texas Republicans had embraced Shivers and a full slate of 14 other Democratic nominees as their candidates for state offices.

Texas Democrats went through the formality of placing the name of Adlai Stevenson on the ballot as the Democratic nominee, and then, in an unprecedented action, used party members to work and vote for Eisenhower.

As a result of these two actions, party lines merged at two points to become almost indistinguishable.

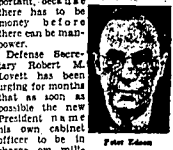

New Chief's Defense Problem Is Lack of Money, Manpower

(Editor's Note: Fourth of a series on his views before the new President.)
By PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (NEA)—Money and manpower were the two big military questions dumped in Dwight D. Eisenhower's lap immediately after election. As usual, money is considered the most important, because there has to be more money before there can be more manpower.

Defense Secretary Robert M. Lovett has been urging for months that as soon as possible the new President name his own cabinet officer to be in charge on military affairs. Having spent most of the last 12 years, in government service, Lovett wants out.

Replacing him will be the No. 1 manpower problem of Eisenhower. Others run right through all ranks down to determining how many buck privates and gobs the U. S. needs, and where they will serve.

On the money angle, this year's military budget is \$2 billion dollars in round numbers, including \$1 billion dollars for foreign aid. The \$2 billion U. S. defense budget is divided roughly 12 billion army, 13 billion navy and 21 billion air force.

There have been hints—principally from Rep. George Mahon, D., Tex., chairman of the house military appropriations subcommittee—that next year's budget would be about 10 million less than this year's. Where these cuts might be made has not been indicated.

The new budget must be submitted to congress by President Truman before Eisenhower is inaugurated. This is why it is necessary to have the new secretary of defense chosen soon, so he can all in on the job.

combat to three combat jobs, which is considered far too high.

The really big manpower problem of the armed services comes in replacements for the armed services. Over 100,000 men are completing their two-year tours of duty every month. Army Secretary Frank Pace estimates 10 million men will be needed by the armed services in the foreseeable future—taken to mean 10 years.

How these men are to be recruited by draft, by universal military training or a combination of both is a fundamental policy decision awaiting Eisenhower.

Creation of a permanent military staff for the secretary of defense and the reorganization of the joint chiefs of staff, 10 separate com-

mand and planning responsibilities, are hot topics for Pentagon discussion at this time.

They could lead to a new conference of top civilian and military defense officials to reappraise American strategic roles and the responsibilities of the various arms. The last such conference, at Key West, Fla., was held five years ago.

Foreign aid programs will be reviewed at the North Atlantic treaty organization meeting in Paris in December. In this connection, two important international agreements will have to be approved by congress to give Americans overseas the exemption from foreign taxes and customs duty.

BPA Leader Lauds Choice For Interior

PORTLAND, Nov. 21 (AP)—Senator Administrator Paul J. Bauer lauded Gov. Douglas McKay, Oregon, for his "courage, vision and wisdom" in seeking a solution to the Pacific northwest's power problems.

Bauer directs the huge federal hydroelectric project on the Columbia river and elsewhere in the region, commented on the selection of McKay as interior secretary in the Eisenhower cabinet.

"At this crucial time in the development of the region," Bauer said, "especially with regard to our power situation, it appears to me to be particularly fitting that Senator-Designate Eisenhower has selected a man so thoroughly familiar with our knotty power problems."

He said Governor McKay has proved "diligently in the furtherance of Willamette valley development and contributed faithfully and generously to the work of the Columbia basin interagency committee."

The committee, which includes representatives of federal agencies and governors of five Columbia basin states, is a coordinating and advisory group.

"It is my sincere conviction that the Pacific northwest can feel secure in the furtherance of its development program under the guidance and leadership of Governor McKay," Bauer said.

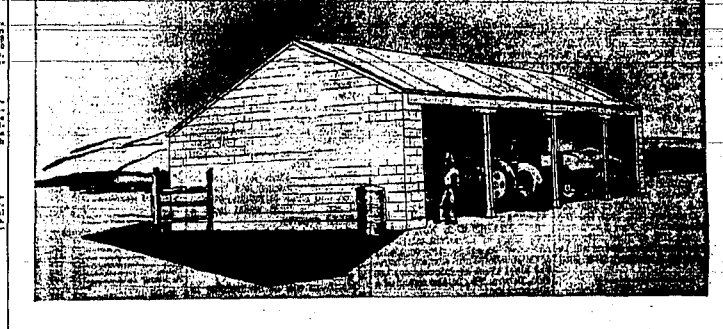

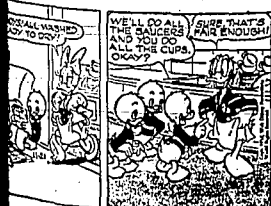
