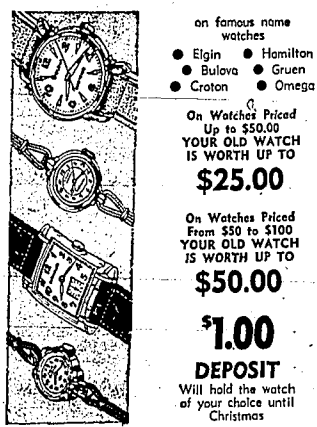

**Speaker Stresses Friendship**  
**Between United States, Canada**

BURLEY, Nov. 22—The importance of Canada and the United States to each other, economically and militarily, was emphasized by John Fisher, Canadian inventor, at a Burley-Rupert Knife and Fork club dinner meeting Tuesday in the Elks dining hall.

"The Hollywood-portrayed Canada with her Eskimos, mounted police and wolf packs is a false picture and urged Americans to learn more about the 'real Canada,' which possesses the second highest standard of living in the world."

"We understand what makes you tick," he said. "Your radio broadcasts, newspapers and magazines go into Canada unrestricted," he explained. "Moreover, Canadians are familiar with the birth and development of the United States because the history of this country is taught in Canadian schools. The people of Canada are interested in the U. S. government, economic and social conditions and follow the U. S. elections. More should be taught in United States schools about Canada so a more full understanding can be reached between the two nations."

Pointing out that Canada has two neighbors, the U. S. on the east and the USSR on the north, Fisher maintained that Canada's geography and size are extremely important not only to Canadians and Americans but to the rest of the world.

"It is conceivable that Canada could be the Belgium of the next configuration," Fisher declared.

Following his assertion that Canada and America are "the best friends in the world," he cited special instances to prove his statement. "You can't buy friends," he said, "and Canada is the only country that does not nibble at your treasury and we are proud of it."

He said the United States has more neighbors in Canada than in any other country and that Canada is the United States' biggest customer. At the same time, he added, the United States is Canada's biggest customer.

The speaker enumerated the natural resources which flow into this country from his country. Ninety-eight per cent of the nickel used here comes from Canada, he claimed. Titanium, he pointed out, comes to the U. S. from Quebec. He said Canadian and American capital are working together in developing this metal which could revolutionize modern American living if brought into use for developing. Four out of five parts of receipts in

the United States comes from Canada, he said.

In addition, he spoke of the large quantities of iron ore this country receives from Canada and named oil, gas and uranium as potentials.

On the other hand, he named the volume of materials produced in Canada from the United States. "Interchange of products," he said, makes for international good will.

Fisher spoke of the seaways and power plants now under construction at Labrador and other Canadian points to explain the progress his country has made in developing her natural resources. Speaking of the Alcan highway, built by United States army engineers in less than two years, he termed it "a miracle of engineering." Science, he said, has been responsible for development of northern Canada.

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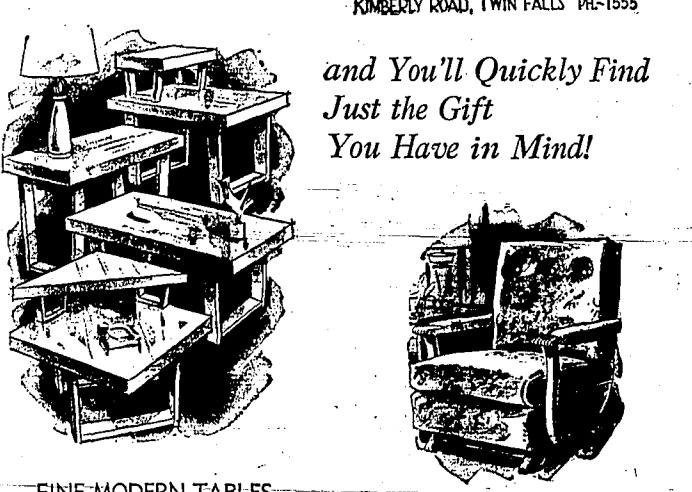

### Senator Says Korean Trek Idea Is Ike's

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—Sen. Frank Carlson, R. Kans., said Friday Dwight D. Eisenhower personally conceived the idea of visiting the Korean battlefield about a month ago before he made it a campaign promise.

Carlson, a close friend and adviser of the President-elect, told a reporter Eisenhower has been "wounded" by Democratic charges that the forthcoming Korean trip originated in the brain of a "ghost-writer" loan from a slick magazine.

Claim Recalled  
The New York Times reported on Oct. 29 that Emmett J. Hughes, a senior editor of Life magazine then serving as an Eisenhower speech writer, had "produced the idea" of the Korean trek. The article said Hughes wrote the promise into a speech draft and Eisenhower accepted it "immediately."

Clare Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential candidate, cited the Times dispatch in a number of campaign speeches in which he accused Eisenhower of "playing politics" with the Korean war.

Wants Straight Record  
Carlson said that "in the interest of getting history straight," he wanted it known by Eisenhower that he was advised by the President-elect to visit Korea as announced by the former himself in a conversation with Carlson about the GOP campaign train.

He said the train was rolling through Minnesota at the time, but could not recall the precise date of the conversation.  
Eisenhower's campaign train was in Minnesota on Sept. 6, Sept. 10, and Oct. 4.

Eisenhower publicly promised to visit Korea if elected in a speech at Detroit on Oct. 24.

### No Value for Atomic Bomb Use Is Noted

SEOUL, Korea, Nov. 22 (AP)—American and South Korean military officials say use of the atomic bomb would substantially help the United Nations in the battle of Sniper ridge.

"If you were to drop an atomic bomb on Mount Papa," said Lieut. Col. Sidney C. Carpenter, a senior American adviser to South Korean forces, "you would still find Chinese up there."

Mount Papa is the towering ridge peak 2 1/2 miles from Sniper ridge.

ROK Chief Agrees  
Maj.-Gen. Xang Mun Pong, ROK division commander in the Kumhwa sector of the central front, agreed with Carpenter. Pong said the atomic bomb would be wasted in the Sniper ridge area because the terrain is too hilly and the force of the explosion would be wasted.

Furthermore he said the Chinese

troop area at Mount Papa is too close to the U. N. battle line. He said the target was not that important.

Under Constant Fire  
U. N. artillery and mortars have been firing on Mount Papa for 40 days and nights, seeking for the deeply dug red artillery and mortar positions and for caves sheltering enemy supplies and men.

Some observers believe the Kumhwa ridge might be a place where atomic artillery could be used to advantage in Korea. They thought it might break the Chinese defenses. The experts disagreed.

"The bomb is not the answer to all warfare," Carpenter said, "although it is a powerful weapon."

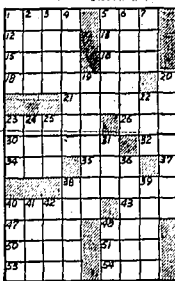

### Inflation Policies Loom Box for "Ike" Question

Many materials are catching up with demand. Fewer wants to resign Dec. 31. Eisenhower, in picking his successor as top mobilization director, also will pick a man to set and carry out the new administration's anti-inflation policies.

Fewer has asked his price, rent and wage authorities for recommendations on what the continuing policies should be. But these recommendations may be largely ignored by the new congress, which will want to write its own ticket.

One other important phase of the anti-inflation program is the control on credit. The last congress abolished federal reserve board power to control consumer credit on housing, automobiles and all installment buying of radios, TV dishwashers and other household furnishings and appliances.

The result has been that consumer credit zoomed from 20 billion dollars in May to more than 21 billion in August. There is every indication it will reach a new peak of perhaps 27 billion dollars or more in the Christmas buying season.

The federal reserve board now takes the position that regulation of this consumer credit is not as important as it was formerly. The reason is that the federal reserve board does not now have to support the treasury's borrowing program through the government bond market. It therefore can control bank credit better at the source. Many economists believe this is the best of all anti-inflationary controls.

This brings up the whole complicated problem of treasury-federal board relationships. The new president, his fiscal advisers and the new congress probably have no more important policy to determine than whether the federal reserve board is to be completely independent, or subordinate to the treasury in the handling of government fiscal affairs.

Over 64 cents of every dollar of U. S. national income goes for wages and salaries.

With this much of the economy already decontrolled and with the price lines up only one-tenth to one per cent from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15, there is considerable feeling that the economy is now pretty well in balance. In this situation, there is strong agitation from business interests to take off all controls.

The wage stabilization board will go out of business April 30, if the board itself doesn't fall apart before that time.

The fixate over the coal miners' wage case, following the steel wage case which wrecked the first wage board, is sure to leave a bad taste in many labor and management mouths with no appetite for any more such monkey soup in the future. Yet it is recognized that there can be no inflationary controls if both prices and wages are not under controlling restraint of some kind.

Priority and allocation powers for channeling scarce materials into defense production expires on June 30. Henry H. Fowler, the mobilization director who succeeded Charles F. Wilson, has declared he would recommend extension of this authority even though supplies of

### Gooding Methodists Pledge to Cover Indebtedness of Church

GOODING, Nov. 22.—Pledges amounting to \$12,500 were turned in Sunday at the Gooding Methodist church to clear the new building of its indebtedness. The ceremony marked the end of 28 years of effort and nearly 45 years of Methodist in Gooding.

Dr. J. Wesley Miller, retired minister and director of recent campaigns to raise funds to complete the sanctuary, turned the pledges over to the Rev. George H. Allen. The money will be used to pay off the balance of the loan from the board of home missions and church extension, to meet the proportionate share in the Idaho Conference Forward Movement and to provide funds for decorating the interior of the church.

During the ceremony plaques of recognition were presented to Dr. Miller and Mrs. Helen L. Smith, his secretary, for their work in the fund raising campaign. The plaques were signed by Dr. Forest W. Wertz, Twin Falls, district superintendent of the eastern district of Idaho.

Others taking part in the service were Eric Whippley, acting in behalf of the board of trustees, and members of the board.

The beginning of the Methodist church in Gooding dates back to the summer of 1890 when two lots on Seventh avenue, a block west of Main street, were donated to the Rev. C. A. Varnum, at pastor of the Gooding circuit. The new towns of Wendell and Jerome were included in the circuit.

At least one pioneer Methodist pastor preached in Gooding before this time. Dr. H. W. Parker, who was pastor of the Methodist church at Shoshone from 1903 to 1908, came to Gooding, then known as "Tuponic," and preached here before the church building was built. He held services in a school located in the northeast part of town.

The Rev. Mr. Varnum served the

Gooding circuit until Jan. 1, 1909 when Gooding was made a new and separate charge. The Rev. Samuel Cheney was appointed to Gooding and began work July 4, 1909.

District Supl. George A. Barnes had taken the lead in organizing the Methodist work in Gooding. At services conducted in the school on Jan. 3, 1909, the organization of a Methodist congregation in Gooding was discussed and apparently a decision was reached to organize and to erect a church building. A subscription paper was circulated and pledges obtained to raise the money for the building. A contract was let early in February, 1909, to Huff Brothers and The first Methodist building in Gooding was erected.

On Sunday, March 21, 1909, the first Methodist church of Gooding was organized by Superintendent Barnes and was dedicated on the same day.

The Rev. R. D. Osterhout, Sunday school missionary for the Idaho conference, held services on March

28, and the following Sunday organized Sunday school. The Ladies aid was organized in the first week of April and Mrs. Jessie Painter, who still resides in Gooding, was the first secretary of that organization. The Epworth league was organized during the early summer of 1909.

After three years the church building was moved to a new location more centrally located for residents. This location was north of the original site and was purchased from the Gooding townsite and the two lots on Seventh avenue were deeded back to the company. The building soon became too small for the growing congregation and an addition was erected and a tower added.

Again, because of increased membership, the building was found to be inadequate and on Feb. 16, 1917, the trustees decided to trade the four lots for the present four lots on Main street. This occurred during the pastorate of the Rev. G. J. Johnson.

While the Rev. William J. Douglas was pastor in 1911, a committee was named to consider the advisability of building a new church but plans were postponed because

of the war. The Rev. Mr. Douglas resigned because of ill health and was succeeded by the Rev. H. G. McCallister.

The Rev. Mr. McCallister took a leading part in arrangements for a new building and on June 4, 1923, the membership voted to construct a new house of worship. Construction was started in 1924 and the cornerstone was laid on Aug. 4, 1924. Cost of the building erected at that time and the six lots on which it stands was approximately \$20,000.

This building of the basement was completed in December, 1924, and dedication took place Dec. 4, 1924. Pastor McCallister served as pastor of the church from 1922 to 1930, leaving to become superintendent of the western district of the Idaho conference. Others serving in the church were Dr. H. S. Hamilton, 1930 to 1932 and serving two years; Dr. H. C. Kohr, September, 1932 to July 1933; the Rev. William C. Bowman, 1933 to August, 1933.

During the pastorate of the Rev. Mr. Bowman the lots for the church were purchased. Also during this time the

25th anniversary of the Gooding Methodist church was observed.

Other pastors serving the church were the Rev. Ralph W. D. Brown, 1932-37; the Rev. Theodore Miller, 1937-1942; the Rev. Laurin Wahlgren, 1942-1943; the Rev. E. R. Karmer, 1943-1945; the Rev. Irvin S. Mola and the Rev. William J. Lambertson. During the pastorate of the Rev. Mr. Mola a campaign to raise \$25,000 for the construction of the sanctuary was conducted under the leadership of Dr. J. Wesley Miller, and from 1941 to 1949 plans for completing the building were made.

In January, 1950, the Rev. Cecil G. Hannan came to Gooding and it was during that time and under his leadership the construction of the sanctuary was completed. The building committee consisted of A. C. Thompson, Ralph Faulkner, R. W. Day, Charles M. Oee, Ernest E. Fields, Fred Hendrickson and Harold Bright.

Dr. Miller again directed the financing campaign at the request of the church leaders. The board of home missions and church extension

of the Methodist church granted the church \$5,000 for final financing. Lay members contributed several thousands of dollars of voluntary labor as well as funds for the final construction of the church.

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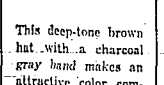
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
